Supreme Court Members Side With Communists

In the recent case before the Supreme Court involving the six lawyers in the trial of the eleven convicted Communists, the full terms of from one to six months given them by Judge Medina of New York for contempt of court, were upheld.

Three members of the Supreme Court dissented, thereby siding with the Communists and, by inference, defending the right of subversives to enter into conspiracies to overthrow the government of the United States. The Justices siding with the Communists were Douglas, Black and Frankfurter.

But that is water over the dam and the only solution is to turn the rapscallions out in a body and clean out the joint from cellar to garret, a job which can only be accomplished by intelligent and patriotic voters acting in accord at the next election.

Kick-off meeting for adoption of Socialism as the policy of the American government and history of attempted switch from a Constitutional Republic to a Marxian Democracy is recalled and reviewed for information of those who did not know, or have forgotten, this sordid chapter in political infamy.

It was sweltering weather in the City of Brotherly Love during the week from June 23 to June 27, 1936, where delegates to the first National Democratic Convention since the election of Franklin D. Roosevelt four years earlier, was in session.

Tempers flared and here and there a hot-headed Southerner protested violently at first and feebly toward the last, against apostates and heretics who re-wrote the rules, framed the resolutions and charted the new left-wing course down which the party was to be steered in future.

Gradually the New Deal bulldozer, operated largely by Roosevelt appointees, Federal government employees and administration brain-trusters, flattened out all opposition so effectively that all was sweetness and light by the time the full representation convened in the auditorium to pass on committee reports.

It was a "yes man" affair from start to finish; nowhere in the proceedings of protest against desecration of party principles was allowed to crop up and all resolutions were shown as having been adopted unanimously.

The conflict between master minds and the clash of rapier-sharp intellects which had marked conventions of an earlier era when mental giants debated fundamental issues of the party were noticeably absent at the Philadelphia gathering.

Probably this was because there were no master minds or mental giants present and the only issue permitted to come up for discussion was how to squander the greatest amount of the taxpayers' money in the shortest space of time.

Roosevelt had had four years in which to lay his plans for this occasion when a transition from Constitutional government to a Socialistic State was to be undertaken under the guise of social benefits to the people in strict accordance with specifications laid down in the Communist Manifesto by Karl Marx which served as the New Deal bible.

A vital part of his preliminary preparations for conversion to Socialism had been the recognition of Russia and the opening of immigration bars to undesirable aliens who were experts in propaganda, subversion and infiltration of government and other agencies with the virus of Socialism and Communism, its ideological twin.

So the Roosevelt puppet show got under way and delegates who were sent there to represent various sections of the country and to defend and preserve differing sectional viewpoints, fell into line, one by one, and performed like marionettes as New Deal satellites pulled the strings.

It was about this time also that infiltration of churches and religious groups was getting well under way and political prayers were part of the official proceedings of the convention and sounded the note that was to mark party policies from that day forward.

A prayer by William H. Fineshriber of Reform Congregation Keneseth Israel, Philadelphia, delivered at the main session was typical of the political and social trend which was shaping up and which was later to branch out into many churches throughout the land.

"... Incline our hearts to pity for the aged and helpless but let not that pity be the 'counterfeit presentment' of smug content... Let 'all men's good be each man's rule'... Protect us alike from the suicidal madness that lusts for unbridled wealth... and the unworthy fear that shuts us out from the Parliament of Men and Federation of the World... Thou knowest no color, nor creed nor race..."

In the meantime, the master stroke of the alien factions who did Roosevelt's political thinking for him, had been accomplished in committee and all opposition to the abrogation of the two-thirds rule for choosing presidential nominees which had held the Democratic Party to safe moorings since its inception, had been hammered into subjection.

The Committee on Rules struck the blow which transformed the party of Jefferson from an instrument for upholding and preserving Constitutional

As Long as Truman Is President, We Will Have Corruption in Government

Americans who hoped that the president would make a sincere effort to clean up corruption in government had as well forget it.

If Washington were actually purged of corruption in government, it would mean that the president and most of his appointees would have to go and, naturally, he would not be a party to any bona fide investigation which would bring this about.

The appointment of Newbold Morris to conduct the clean-up is sufficient proof that the proposed probe was a phony and that it would result in a whitewash as all similar movements before it have done.

Newbold Morris has been touted by the president as a Republican who would approach the task with an open mind and not be influenced by partisan bias.

As a matter of fact he is not a republican at all but a "liberal" who has been associated with Communist front organizations and who is no more sympathetic to real Republican Party principles than Truman is in accord with real Democratic Party policies.

Also, it now develops that Morris' law firm was counsel for interests who shipped material to the Chinese Communists at the same time we were at war with them, which transforms him from the role of a prosecutor into that of a witness and totally disqualifies him for the job, even if he had been qualified in the first place.

In other words, he has evidently profited financially by some of the corruption which he was appointed to uncover and on this basis the president Lamar Caudle to the job.

As conclusive evidence that the president means to hamstring all attempts of proper authorities to get at the truth, he has thumbed his nose at a Committee of Congress set up to investigate the Department of Justice and flatly told them that he has instructed all Departments to refuse them information they have requested.

In the meantime, he has hopped a plane for Key West where he has donned his collegiate slacks, Hawaiian shirt and sun glasses for his daily romp on the Florida beaches which will keep him in shape for the strenuous campaign he intends to wage for votes of the suckers on whom he depends to keep him in office.

Virginia House Passes Income Tax Resolution

F. E. Packard, head of the Western Tax Council, Chicago, has announced the passage by the House of the Virginia legislature, the resolution memorializing Congress to submit the repeal of the Sixteenth or income tax amendment to the Constitution to the States for ratification, and the substitution of one which limits the amount of tax which Congress can levy to a 25 per cent maximum.

According to the Council, this makes twenty-eight State legislatures to act favorably on this matter. However, there is some confusion in the matter as some of the legislatures previously taking favorable action have submitted to Fair Deal pressure and rescinded their former approval.

There is disagreement among Constitutional authorities about whether or not a legislative body can rescind action of this kind by a previous session.

The answer, it would seem to us, is to have a sufficient number of State legislatures to pass the resolution that there would be no doubt in the matter. Now that twenty-eight have acted favorably on it, it should not be hard to get action in enough additional bodies to off-set the action of those who have tried to rescind the resolution.

Opponents of Communist Frontier Have The Last Word

Last month the First Methodist Church of Houston through its pastor invited a Negro Communist Frontster to address the congregation in observance of "Brotherhood Week".

When this unprecedented procedure was rumored to be on the program, members of the church and other groups protested violently. The Church Board had decided to cancel the invitation, it is understood, when a notorious Houston millionaire Socialist who contributes liberally to the church, implied that his generosity might be withheld if the Negro Communist Frontster's speaking engagement was cancelled.

That did it, and the Negro made his scheduled appearance, and spoke to a mixed audience which was composed principally of Negroes.

One of those who had protested was an official of the American Legion.

Just before the Negro spoke the white pastor read what he said was an unsolicited telegram from a higher Legion official at Austin saying that the protest of the Houston Legionnaire was his own opinion and did not represent the Legion.

The Negro also stated preceding his talk that while he had been charged with being a member of Communist Fronts, he had been cleared by the FBI.

Later the Austin Legion official, when he sent it because he was requested to do so by a Houston Rabbi.

When J. Edgar Hoover was asked if the Negro has been cleared by the FBI he wrote: "... The FBI is strictly a fact-finding agency and it is not within the province of its prescribed functions to issue clearances to any individuals".

Those who follow the instructions which govern Communists and fellow travellers are expected to employ lies, deceitful tricks and all sorts of subterfuges to avoid the truth being known, but it is a sad day for Christianity when these tactics are used in the church.

All Public Schools In The U.S. Were Once Like This

If all school officials in the nation were as alert in guarding against subversion as those of Fort Worth, the danger of infiltration with Socialism and Communism in our public school systems would be reduced to the minimum.

The teaching of American and Texas history is compulsory and there is no evidence that National Education Association and UNESCO propaganda which seeks to induce teachers to discard the teaching of Americanism and to condition the pupils to "living in an international community" has made any headway whatever.

Also, when speakers are invited to address Fort Worth school teacher groups, efforts are made to secure those with unblemished records in good citizenship rather than left-wingers, Socialists and fellow travellers who are ready, at the drop of a hat, to fan out over the country and infect the teaching profession and adolescent pupils with their poisonous propaganda.

For instance, in observance of public school week recently, a personnel director of a responsible business concern of Dallas was invited to speak to a large group of Fort Worth teachers, parents and others interested in educational problems.

He pointed out that Federal subsidizing of education will mean the end of free public school and he particularly attacked UNESCO as a medium of infiltrating schools with vicious propaganda.

He told the teachers that UNESCO was

government into an implement for promoting Socialism in this country when they offered this resolution:

"Resolved, that all questions, including the nominations of candidates for President of the United States and Vice President of the United States, shall be determined by a majority vote of the delegates to the convention, and the rule heretofore existing in Democratic conventions requiring a two-thirds vote in such cases is hereby specifically abrogated."

There was hearty applause following the reading of this resolution which was unanimously adopted.

"As many as favor the resolution will vote 'aye', opposed 'no'; the ayes have it" intoned the chairman and in this brief space of time the greatest act of infamy in our political history was committed with not one single voice raised in protest against this servile desertion of a great party principle.

At about this time the Great Brain from Texas, the Honorable Tom Connally, arose and took the floor not to thunder out in protest against the traitorous action which he had just witnessed and which forced the South to surrender all power to the underworld political machines of the North.

He took the floor, instead, to attest to the immortal virtues of Franklin Delano Roosevelt and to second the nomination for president of the United States a man who, less than an hour before, had neatly slit the throat of every Democrat in the South:

"Mr. Chairman and delegates to this great convention: We have met to nominate a candidate for President of the United States — more properly we are met simply to register a nomination already made in the hearts and minds of the Democracy of the Nation—we are met to name a candidate for President who has already, at the bar of public opinion, been selected by the American people to serve them for four more glorious years."

Following this initial burst of oratory, the Senator from Texas related the events leading up to the nomination of Roosevelt at Chicago four years before and then struck a dramatic pose as he demanded of his audience:

"Is there a State in the Union, is there a delegation in this magnificent convention, who regrets for a moment what was done at Chicago?"

When the applause had died down the Senator continued: "The record of Roosevelt . . . has been written not simply in cold and pulseless type, not simply in fervid and frenzied oratory . . . but in every furrow of the farmers' field. It throbs in every stroke of the artisan's hammer. It is registered in the hours and wages of every man who toils. Every depositor carries it with him to the bank . . . It rings from the American dollar, the soundest and safest and most secure currency on the face of this revolving globe." (Editor's note: Some of the ring has gone out of the dollar now that it is only worth 43 cents). "It is witnessed by millions of brawny men whose hands were empty of the implements of toil but who are now busy again with honest labor". (Editor's note: They were busy raking leaves and picking up rocks from one place and putting them in another and then putting them back where they had them in the first place). "It covers all over with the glow of a new life the agriculture, the industry, the business, the finance, the labor and the vast economic structure of these United States. Roosevelt . . . found greedy and lawless malefactors who had exploited and robbed the people. He took them by the throat and drove them out of the market place". (Editor's note: This was before some of Elliott's and Jimmy's deals made pickers out of the "lawless malefactors" to which the senator referred). "The New Deal, the Roosevelt administration, the acts of the past three years stand out in living letters of fire on a sky that was black and threatening . . . Today the Democracy of the Nation, yea more, the people of America call upon Franklin D. Roosevelt to lead us in the future as he has led us in the past. (Editor's note: Led is right. Roosevelt led and most members of the Senate, including Connally, followed like a bull with a ring in his nose) with superb faith, with high courage, with splendid vision and with a generalship that overthrew the battalions of disaster and set the American people once again upon the high road that leads to prosperity and economic recovery". (Editor's note: He started us on the high road that has led us to such economic recovery that we now owe \$260,000,000,000). "As the spokesman of Texas Democracy, I come to second the nomination for president of the United States our heroic leader, our courageous champion, our victorious general, Franklin Delano Roosevelt."

Thus did the senator from Texas shower the most extravagant expressions of praise and appreciation on the man who had just robbed Texas and the South of their mighty political weapon by eliminating the age-old rule which gave that section of the country the balance of power in the selection of presidential nominees.

Recently the senator has been frantically publishing his voting record in a futile effort to prove that he has voted against the New Deal and Fair Deal consistently.

When analysed, this record shows that he voted against the Roosevelt and Truman Socialistic proposals on an average of about once a year for the past twenty years.

If he had voted against them twenty times a day, instead of twenty times in twenty years, he could not have atoned to his constituents in Texas for allowing himself to be charmed into abject servility by Roosevelt's toothy smile to the extent that he was willing to become an accessory to the robbery of the people of the South of the political prestige bequeathed them by the immortal statesmen who founded the Democratic Party.

conducting a campaign to urge teachers to drop all American history courses and all materials that "would cause a child to have love and loyalty to the United States". He pled with teachers and parents to continue to stand up for free public education "safe from interference by any group, religious, political or international". Superintendent J. P. Moore and a co-operative School Board are responsible for the wholesome and sound policies in effect in the Fort Worth school system.

"We Are Not Fighting Communism, Our Government Is Promoting It"

"We are not fighting Communism, because our government is busy promoting Communism" says Congressman Howard Buffet of Nebraska who proves his point by quoting the record.

"Universal Military Training is Article 182 of the Soviet Constitution. Truman demands it here. Every Russian youth is a prisoner. He can't emigrate. Same in America at age eighteen" Mr. Buffet said.

Other comparisons noted by the congressman were:

Russia has paper money, steadily losing value. America has paper money, constantly losing value. In neither country is a citizen allowed to own gold.

Russia has strong price and wage controls. We have them here and while they are not as rigid as in Russia, Truman wants them stronger.

In Russia the government wages foreign war and calls it peace. Ditto in America.

Russia censors news and information. Truman issues a gag order on news and information here.

Russia allies itself with Communist governments in other countries. American government allies itself with Communist Yugoslavia and other Socialistic governments.

Russia taxes its people to supply foreign governments with military and other supplies. We do the same.

Russia directs production by controlling and allocating key materials. The same policy is followed here.

Only part of the effects of this march toward Communism has been experienced by most Americans, Mr. Buffet said and added:

"American boys conscripted to die in Korea by executive order have had the full impact of Communism. From these lads life itself has been taken away. They could not lose more."

Indications Point To Two-Party System In The South

Two facts in connection with the current presidential campaign give us an idea of the changed attitude of the South in political thinking.

One is the incident of Senator Robert A. Taft's speech in Houston recently where he spoke to a jam-packed city auditorium and was cheered to the rafters at the mention of the corruption, squandering and confiscatory policies of the Truman administration.

The other is that Truman plans to conduct a strong campaign in the South either in the interest of his own candidacy or that of some hand-picked candidate whom he may choose to succeed him.

We don't remember of any other occasion when a Republican candidate for president came to Texas and if he had, he would only have had a corporal's guard to hear him.

Also it is most unusual for a so-called Democratic candidate to feel that it is necessary for him to campaign in Texas or any other Southern State. That this vote would go to anybody offering on the Democratic ticket was taken for granted.

We hope these two facts indicate that in the future there may be a two-party system in the South which would be valuable insurance against the Federal government ever becoming clogged with corruption again.

In New Delhi, recently, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt told her audience of Indians, in effect, to hold everything until she got back home and brought the American people into line and got the situation under control.

Teacher Has First-Hand Experience With the Horrors of Socialism

One Texas teacher has had her eyes opened to the evils of Socialism through first-hand experience and being intelligent and patriotic, she is warning her colleagues in the profession of its capacity for the destruction of a nation's economy.

Her name is Mrs. Dorothy Naylor of Houston. She has been an exchange teacher in New Zealand for the past year and since that country is one of the world's most advanced Socialistic States, she had an opportunity to see Socialism in action.

Mrs. Naylor painted a pathetic picture of the land where the government owns everything and exercises complete control over the citizen from the cradle to the grave.

She explained that although the Nationalist Party in New Zealand returned to power two years ago the sixteen-year rule of the Laborites had muddled and bungled the economy of the country to such an extent that the people apparently cannot pull out of the throes of Socialism.

"New Zealand is a beautiful country and I had a lovely year there, but now that I am home, I feel obligated to be truthful about what I saw," Mrs. Naylor stated in a frank interview to the press.

"The government has long since discouraged any type of private enterprise so that now nobody has enough capital to start any new type of industry" Mrs. Naylor said.

She pointed out that the government is broke too, because instead of operating for a profit, it has tried to exonerate Socialism by operating for the alleged benefit of the people and of course has failed.

They manufacture nothing in that country and have suffered severe coal, gas and electricity shortages.

Her most outstanding impression was of the government's failure to let the government take care of them; of the shortages of trains, buses or planes; the short working hours and wholesale apathy; of towns closed up tight as drums on Saturday and Sunday so that even a loaf of bread can't be purchased on the week end.

"I've heard Americans warn of such things in this country but I never really realized exactly what Socialism was until I saw it in action" Mrs. Naylor said and added:

"If we lose our sense of personal responsibility and demand that the government take over everything, we'll be strangled in the same noose."

No greater public service could be rendered in this period of history when Socialism has all but closed in on our government, educational, religious and other institutions than for some group with money to spend, to subsidize this teacher and send her as a missionary to preach the gospel of Americanism among the members of her own profession in this country.

Nice Work If You Can Get It

The coffers of the Rayburn family have been enriched with an additional \$15,000 per year of the taxpayers' money.

This was accomplished by the appointment by President Truman recently of Robert T. Bartley of Bonham, nephew of the Speaker of the House, as Federal Communications Commissioner, at a salary of \$15,000 per year.

When Is A Treaty Not A Treaty?

A treaty takes precedence over the laws of the countries which are a party to it according to rulings which have been made which have held United States laws invalid where they were in violation of the United Nations Charter.

However this rule does not apply in cases where world Socialism is not the issue and the Supreme Court of the United States repudiated it when Truman and his Pendergast political thugs wanted to highjack the people of Texas out of their Tidelands.

By this decision, a treaty was held as having a very low status and not superior to any law, since there was no law nor Constitutional provision on which the Court based its decision except the law of might and greed.

"So in gallops the legal cavalry of Washington do-gooders and they said: 'Madam, it is a painful task but you have got to pay a fine and go to jail'. They didn't dare put her in jail, but they imposed a fine. So she took that to court. A Democratic judge upheld the fine. She appealed to the United States Court of Appeals. It reversed the fine. Our cute little treasury department had confiscated her bank account, but the Court of Appeals ordered that restored. It was hers and they had no right to take it away from her any more than she had the right to take money out of her employees' pockets.

"Well there is one grand example of Americanism. And there is our hope."

Mr. Jones concludes with the assertion that an army of outraged women is our country's best bet.

Another Catch in the "Covenant On Human Rights" Is Discovered

There are so many underhanded and crooked provisions in the Covenant on Human Rights of the United Nations that it is impossible for the average citizen to comprehend them all.

One of the trickiest of these is the one which was approved by the United Nations General Assembly at Paris, December 10, 1948, which says:

"After the draft covenant is finally reviewed and revised, it will be open for signature and ratification and will come into force when twenty countries ratify it".

In other words, even if the United States Senate should reject this traitorous covenant, it would come into effect any way when twenty other nations ratify it.

That leaves only two courses open to the lawmakers who would preserve our institutions and organic laws and that is either to vote the amendment proposed by Senator Bricker which would prevent any treaty or world covenant superseding our Constitution or to pass the bill of Congressman John Woods of Idaho which would take us out of the outfit altogether.

Our preference would be the latter.

Sensible Solution Of Negro Problem Found By Baptists

In Dallas the increase in the number of Negro Baptists created a problem for the persons of that faith in that area.

The situation was found when two large Baptist church buildings, belonging to white congregations were put up for sale to Negro members of the church.

The churches were located in South Dallas where Negroes predominate.

Connally and the Texas Tidelands

An editorial in the Fort Worth Press points out that the real fight of the Federal government to secure control of the Tidelands of Texas started in 1937 when a resolution passed the Senate calling on the Federal government to file suits to win control of the Tidelands.

The editorial claims that the resolution passed the Senate unanimously and that although Senator Tom Connally was present, he made no fight against it.

They might have added, also, that Senator Connally further aided and abetted in the Tidelands grab when he went to the aid of Tom Clark who found it necessary to take a powder out of Texas. Connally took him to Washington and got him a job in the Justice Department where later, as attorney general of the United States, he worked up the case for the big steal of the property of his native Texas.

Soldier Is Not The Only One Who Has Been Asleep On Duty

The ten-year sentence given a private first class in Korea for sleeping on duty after seventy-two hours of constant sentinel service without rest, is inhuman and more in keeping with disciplinary procedure of Russia than just punishment of an American soldier.

Any way the private first class was not doing anything that the American people have not been doing for twenty years.

If we had not been asleep on the job since 1932 there would be no little man in the White House who has outgrown his britches to such an extent that he calls a war without Congressional sanction in order to keep the economy geared to a spending basis and himself in office.

In other words if we had not been asleep on duty, this soldier would not have been in Korea but at home with his family where he belongs.

Maybe They Use It To Pave Their Courtyards

In her column written from Bombay recently, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt related how she had made a sanitary inspection of the homes and premises of poor people in remote Indian villages.

She told happily of being allowed to peek into each room of their dwellings, even peering into their pots to see what was cooking.

The former first lady appeared delighted on discovering that in India "cow dung is no longer being used entirely for fuel".

There Is No Such Thing As Government Or Federal Aid

Recently a press dispatch was sent out of Washington which stated that in the past eighteen years from 1934 through 1951, inclusive, the Federal government had "given" to Texas the stupendous sum of \$3,185,377,930.00 in Federal aid for various projects.

The impression was left that the Federal government out of generosity and big heartedness had reached down into its treasury and made the State a present of that amount and there are plenty of people who are stupid enough to believe just that.

The truth is that the Federal government has not "given" Texas a thin dime. They have simply sent back a very infinitesimal part of what the people of Texas have "given" them.

In the last four years alone, Texas has sent to Washington \$5,436,255,693.02 in Federal taxes which is \$2,250,877,768.02 more than has been "given" back to the State in the past eighteen years.

There is no such thing as "Federal aid." The Federal government does not have any money to aid anything or anybody except that which is given it by the States.

They use the income tax law to drain the money out of the States and then by taking a small part of it and labeling it "Federal aid" and returning it to the States, they are able to control the internal affairs of that State so far as whatever project they have "aided" is concerned.

Karl Marx pointed out this method as the proper way to kill off a Constitutional Republic and install Socialism and Communism and that is what is happening here.

We have not looked up figures any further back than four years but it is likely that during the 18-year period referred to, Texas has probably sent more than \$20,000,000,000.00 to Washington for which they

Philip Jessup is one of those "representing" the United States at Paris in the United Nations General Assembly.

Jessup's confirmation was not voted on by the Senate for the reason that they were not given an opportunity to vote on him. Through some shenanigan of Tom Connally's, his name was withheld from the list of those sent to the Senate.

It is claimed that he would have been turned down by that body although they did confirm others who were of the same ilk.

After digesting that one, we are given this morsel to chew over from "The International Problem of Growing Up" by the same Jessup who is "representing" the United States whose standing among nations he repudiates in the following paragraph on page 62:

"I, for one, reject absolutely the idea of an 'American Century' in which the United States in complacent benevolence will tell the rest of the world and each part of it what is good for it."

He is over there advocating a World Government with the United States as a member. By his own words he does not consider us capable of leadership. So, naturally, there is some country to whom he is loyal and which he regards as capable of "telling the rest of the world what is good for it."

What country is that?

RUSSELL FIRST DEMOCRAT IN TWENTY YEARS TO ANNOUNCE FOR PRESIDENT

Senator Richard Russell of Georgia has announced that he is a candidate for nomination as president on the Democratic ticket and that he is in the fight to the finish.

Senator Russell is the first real Democrat to announce for that office since the Socialists took over the Party in the Thirties.

The Senator has not announced his platform but does not need to. It is naturally assumed that he will stand for States Rights, local self government, American Free Enterprise and all the other fundamental principles which made the party of Jefferson and Jackson a worthy and honorable segment of the two-party system in this country and that he will oppose centralization of power in Washington.

If men of the type of the Georgia lawmaker had been at the helm for the past twenty years, the State of the Union would have been vastly different at this time; corruption and Communism would not be riding the Federal government agencies like a pestilence and the nation would not face bankruptcy as a result of unlim-

ited squandering of the taxpayers' money.

Since the party machinery is in the hands of big city underworld political factions, Senator Russell has no more chance of being nominated at Chicago than a one-legged man in a foot race but we hope he causes them plenty of headaches and louses up the deal of the Socialists who expect to manipulate the Convention.

In the Georgia senator, Truman has an opponent who has played in the major league and he knows it and those who enlist under the Russell banner can't be brushed aside and trampled under in 1952 as the amateurs who headed the Dixiecrat movement were in 1948.

The best one yet was the crack of James B. Carey, a CIO character who said in Washington recently that the Civil Rights program of the president was opposed by Communists. Since the program was cooked up in Moscow many years ago, it is a little hard to understand why those who originated the movement would now oppose it.

DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES OF THE SOUTHERN CONSERVATIVE

The following principles on which the Southern Conservative is founded will appear in each issue of the paper hereafter:

Those of us who are responsible for initiating the Southern Conservative plead guilty to the charge of being hopelessly old-fashioned as we love our own country with a blind and passionate devotion, above all others on earth.

We find ourselves without the slightest desire to change our form of government to conform to foreign ideologies or to attempt to re-shape it in the Soviet mold.

We are convinced that those who founded this Republic framed the greatest instrument for the government of men ever devised by human mind.

We wish to deny, before it is made, the charge that we are subsidized by any special interests or that our undertaking is just another scheme dreamed up to attract the support of big business.

In our discussions of State and National issues, we shall show no more partiality to the Tycoons of Industry than we shall to the Czars of Labor.

In fact, we seem to remember that some of the biggest business men in the nation teamed up with labor union racketeers in playing ball with the New Deal when that economic atrocity was riding the crest and have continued to string along with its more vicious counterpart currently administering the government in Washington.

The courage, integrity and patriotism which must be commanded if the Republic is to survive will not be found exclusively among representatives of big business or leaders of labor unions.

It must be drawn from that vast group of average Americans who ask nothing of government except that it secure them in their inalienable right to work, to save and to keep a reasonable share of the fruits of their toil.

We are against the domination of government either by big business or big labor and we maintain that favoritism to either group on the part of a State or National administration is un-American, immoral and a flagrant abuse of power.

As to political affiliations, we acknowledge allegiance to neither of the two major parties.

As presently constituted, both are so shot through with radicalism as to render them incapable of resolving the serious problems confronting the Republic.

We acknowledge our indebtedness to the courageous and patriotic Coalition Bloc of sound-thinking Democrats and Republicans in both Houses of Congress which has prevented Communistic influences from complete domination of our Federal government.

We are opposed to the reckless squandering of the taxpayers' money by incompetent, irresponsible and improvident public officials and we contend that taxes should be levied for purposes of revenue only and not to punish the rich, reward the poor or redistribute the wealth.

We are firmly committed to the principle of States Rights and we hold that the people of any part of the United States are entitled to maintain their own social customs and traditions without interference from politicians seeking votes to perpetuate themselves in power.

We are unequivocally in favor of Free Enterprise as opposed to government ownership of business and insist on the responsibility of every American to seek to improve his social and economic condition through initiative, energy and thrift rather than leaning on the arm of government for support.

We concede to every man the right to work and the opportunity of profitable employment regardless of whether he does, or does not, belong to a labor union.

On the other hand, we claim for the employer the irrevocable right to hire and fire his employees without instructions from any government agency or intimidation by Federal Police.

We feel that at this crucial time in history, it is imperative that newspapers and other groups seeking to influence public opinion should exert every effort within their power to help preserve our republican form of government, our Free Enterprise system and American way of life. We shall exert all our energies to that end.

These are the sentiments of the SOUTHERN CONSERVATIVE and although ours may be only one small voice crying in the wilderness, we will fight for fundamental American principles, as we understand them, without apology to any man or set of men.

LEGISLATION PROPOSED TO PROTECT CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS OF AMERICANS

We cannot understand how any member of the United States Senate could have failed to join in signing S. J. Resolution number 130 proposing an amendment to protect the Constitutional rights of Americans.

There have been rulings recently which held that the laws of the United Nations superseded those of the Constitution of the United States and the proposed amendment would correct this unthinkable situation.

Incidentally, we are informed by those who have peered behind the Iron Curtain that Stalin, too, is enjoying the cat and mouse game of refusing to place his stamp of approval on the man who will succeed him as head of the Russian slave State when he is called to face judgment for his diabolical crimes.

We can understand why Stalin should control the selection of the Dictator who will follow him but why Truman should have any say-so whatever as to who will be president of this Republic when, and if, we are ever fortunate enough to get rid of him, is beyond us.

It is no more Truman's business who is the next president of the United States than it is of some section hand in a construction camp, or any other voter in this country.

The Divine Right of Kings to succession was one of the issues in the war which preceded the setting up of the United States government and the fact that intelligent people listen to any such nonsense as that Truman is entitled to name his successor is further evidence of the general state of mass stupidity prevailing among the people as a result of twenty years of petty dictatorship.

Salvaging A Wrecked Economy Will Require Fifty Years

Whoever is elected president in 1952 is to be pitied rather than envied, if he is a good American and wants to return to Constitutional administration of the government, for his heritage will be nothing but disorganization, confusion and corruption.

MY NIGHT

By the Editor

I am writing my column tonight in a comfortable and attractive hut in Zanzibar where I am the house guest of members of the Swahilli Tribe on the East African Coast.

Last night I spent the early evening visiting with a group of native women in the nearby hills and while I always enjoy meeting new people, I was saddened to learn that these ladies have failed to take advantage of the cultural opportunities which Amalgamated Countries has provided for them.



Through the influence of our world group, the United States government was recently induced to send ten shiploads of lipsticks, nylon hose and brassieres to the young women and girls here in order to implement Democracy in this section of the world. The lipsticks and hose were furnished as part of the Marshall Aid Plan and the brassieres came under Point Two of the president's program to uplift the people of backward countries.

I feel that the mis-use of these products is traceable to the short-sighted policy of our leaders in Washington who have neglected to send social service workers and other government representatives here in sufficient numbers to properly assist the population in converting to our New World Order.

At any rate, it was rather disheartening to me to discover that the brassieres were being used as seines for catching minnows; that the nylon hose were being tied together and converted into ropes for staking out milk goats and that the lipsticks were being employed to draw grotesque figures on the naked bodies of Swahilli warriors.

In spite of my disappointment at this lack of appreciation of our good-will gesture, I did not feel that my visit here had been in vain since I was able, later, to persuade a large group of native men and women to assemble in a natural amphitheater on the side of the hill where they listened attentively as I discussed in detail the steps necessary to be taken in acquiring control of a Democratic precinct convention.

"For example, a teacher cannot work on the assumption that this is a Christian nation, at least by tradition".

Colored Church Cancels Speech Of Negro Communist Frontier
