GROUND PROMOTED TO SHIFT FOREMAN REPLACING LAMBERT WHO MOVES TO EFFLUENT CONTROL





HELIPORT-TOPPED PLATFORMS ... dot the Den area 30 miles out in the Gulf of Mexico, site of the new Shell-Phillips gas field announced this week. The new field -- named Den -- is expected to yield 110 million cubic feet of gas each day. Under the terms of Shell's agreement with Union Carbide, the Shell portion of this daily production -- 55 million cubic feet -- will be sold to Union Carbide for use in their chemical plant at Texas City. Phillips is retaining its share of the gas and will use it similarly in its chemical plants at Pasadena and Sweeney. To bring the gas ashore, the Black Marlin Pipe Line Company has filed application with the Federal Power Commission to begin immediate construction of a 16-inch, 52-mile long pipeline from the Den Field to Texas City. These small platforms contain production facilities and aid-to-navigation lights and fog horns. These small islands in the Gulf will be linked by underwater pipeline to two larger permanent platforms - yet to be built - to produce the gas field. The heliports will allow employees to travel by helicopter to the various platforms to control production from the well and to service the navigational devices.

SIX REFINERS SELECTED TO ATTEND AREA MANAGEMENT COURSE NEXT WEEK

A one-week training course for some 30 selected Shellmen in the Houston complex will be held next week at the Flagship Hotel in Galveston.

Representing the Refinery will be S. F. Good, Manager Gas; R. W. Henry, Manager Aromatics; J.J. Leonard, Research Engineer, Research; L. B. Rothfeld, Group Leader, Research; P. E. Slack, Assistant Manager Personnel, P & IR; and P. D. Wallace, Refinery Auditor, Treasury.

The purpose of these sessions is to provide broader understandings of organization, operation, and relationships of the various units in this geographic area, including their problems and objectives.

Included among the members of Senior Management who will serve as conference leaders is Refinery Superintendent A. S. Lehmann, who will discuss manufacturing.

SHELL OIL INCOME AT NEW HIGH FOR FIRST QUARTER OF 1966

Shell Oil Company had its best first quarter in history this year, with consolidated net income rising 12% over the 1965 period, Richard C. McCurdy, President, told the annual meeting of shareholders in New York yesterday.

The 1966 first quarter earnings amounted to \$61,657,000, or \$1.01 a share, compared with \$54,889,000, or \$.90 a share last year.

"Revenues for the first quarter of 1966 of \$805.3 million exceeded those of a year ago by 9%, mainly as a result of higher sales volumes of refined products, chemicals and natural gas," Mr. McCurdy said.

Refined product sales volume increased 6%, with automotive gasoline, jet fuel and distillates accounting for most of the gain.

In other segments of Shell's business, crude oil and natural gas liquids production was up 8%, natural gas production up 10% and Refinery crude intakes up 11%.

"As to prospects for the future," Mr. McCurdy said, "the industry appears to be in a sounder position than for some years past, there being little excess Refinery capacity or excess inventories, so that we can hope for stability in product prices. The current forecast of an increase in domestic oil demand of about 3.5%, and 4% for gasoline, together with increased operating efficiency, should enable the earnings of the oil industry to improve moderately.

"Shell's production and sales volumes of oils and chemicals will continue to grow, and we look forward to a further steady improvement in earnings."





THE FACTS ABOUT RABIES - AND SOME OF THE PRECAUTIONS YOU SHOULD TAKE

The widespread publicity given the current outbreak of animal rabies may be giving you cause for concern - here are the facts from Dr. C. A. Pigford - Director of Public Health.

There has been a noticeable increase in the number of cases of rabies in skunks in several nearby counties. There have also been a few scattered reports of the disease in cows and horses. An unusually large number of cases have been reported in Jefferson County (Beaumont-Port Arthur area).

"Although this outbreak is presently concentrated outside Houston in animals of a wild nature, the disease could spread to domestic animals and pets and possibly to man at any time," Dr. Pigford commented. "This is why pets are required to be vaccinated annually. They should also be penned or leashed," he added.

Rabies, also known as hydrophobia, is transmitted by biting or licking by an infected animal and enters the body through a break in the skin. Individuals who are bitten by a stray dog or other animals should immediately cleanse the wounds with

soap - then see a doctor. The animal should be observed for 10 days and the incident reported to the Health Department.

If the animal cannot be found, the person may have to take 14 daily injections of vaccine.
