### Gay and Lesbian community sees Clinton administration as dawn of new era

Hours after Bill Clinton was sworn into office, some 1500 people attended the first-ever gay and lesbian inaugural ball, a celebration of what the gay community sees as a new era of inclusion in American society.

Gay leaders say Clinton got more than 70 percent of the gay vote, and perhaps no group has higher expectations of change when the new administration takes office Jan. 20.

"It marks a turning point, and I call it a rite of passage," said Robert Bray of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, a sponsor of the inaugural gala at the National Press Club. "We're going from political outsider and social pariah to part of the governing coalition of our nation."

Gays look to Clinton for support in three areas—an end to the ban on gays in the military, federal protection of their civil rights and a greater government role in the fight against AIDS. They also expect to see more openly gay and lesbian people in high government jobs.

So far, they say, the signs are good. About 15 members of the transition staff are openly gay, and the Clinton people "are seeking out our views and providing us an opportunity to have input," said Gregory King, spokesperson for Human Rights Campaign Fund, the largest gay advocacy group.

On Jan. 19, the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, which supports gays running for political office, honored David Mixner, a gay Los Angeles corporate consultant and Clinton friend who

helped shape the president-elect's policies toward gays.

Among the Clinton heavies attending were Secretary of State-designate Warren Christopher, Secretary of Commerce-designate Ron Brown, senior strategist James Carville and transition communications director George Stephanopoulos.

Bray noted that Clinton mentioned the fight against AIDS only 26 seconds into his acceptance speech on Nov. 3. King recalled Clinton's call to the family of Ricky Ray, the 15-year-old Sarasota, Fla., boy who recently died of

AIDS, leaving two hemophiliac brothers with the disease. Clinton has invited the family to the inauguration.

"People feel they've come out of the darkness of the last 12 years" of the Reagan-Bush administrations, said Bob Hattoy, an AIDS-infected man who spoke at the Democratic National Convention last summer and now is on the Clinton transition team.

Clinton supports appointment of an AIDS czar and full funding for the Ryan White Care Act, which distributes federal money to cities to combat AIDS. He said he would sign an executive order

prohibiting discrimination in federal employment, contracts and government services.

He does not believe gay and lesbian couples should be allowed to marry and receive the legal and tax benefits available to heterosexual spouses. He also opposes job quotas or affirmative action plans to make up for past discrimination.

Hattoy said policies now being pulled together will clear up the doubts of any who worry that Clinton won't find the money to combat AIDS or will give in to Pentagon pressure and postpone lifting the ban on gays in the military. Hattoy said it was unlikely, as suggested in some reports, that Clinton might decide on a roundabout approach rather than issuing a definitive executive order rescinding the ban.

Clinton has endorsed a federal civil rights act to outlaw discrimination against gays in housing and employment, an important issue because of regional setbacks like the passage of an anti-gay rights referendum in Colorado.

"The anti-gay concept is being exported to other states, and the ultimate strategy (for blocking that) is federal legislation," said Tony Ogden, acting director of Equality Colorado, a Denver civil rights group.

Passage of a gay civil rights bill could take several years, but "the president can address the civil rights issues inherent in this type of vitriolic legislation. He is in a position to demonstrate strong leadership," Ogden said.

### Former President Jimmy Carter says he opposes Colorado boycott

Wednesday, Jan. 13 (AP)—Former President Carter says he opposes the boycott of Colorado over the anti-gay protection measure Amendment 2 and will attend a charity auction next week in Crested Butte.

"I just go back to the civil rights days," Carter said Tuesday on the NBC

"Today" show.

"If everybody had boycotted the South and there hadn't been any civil rights workers who came into our country back then, I think the civil rights victory would have been long delayed."

Carter will preside over the charity auction which will benefit his Atlanta

Project, an effort to help poor people in that city.

During his interview with Katherine Couric, Carter described Amendment 2 as "very unfair and perhaps even unconstitutional."

Still, he said, "I honor the people's right to boycott if they choose."

The former president said the boycott punishes people in cities that voted against the amendment, which prohibits governments from enacting civil rights laws based on sexual orientation. The measure, set to take effect Friday, rescinds such laws in Denver, Boulder and Aspen.

### Lesbian and gay activists protest sentences in Paul Broussard murder case

Houston area gay rights activists Brian Bradley and Scott Lewis organized a protest outside the state courthouse at 301 San Jacinto last Friday, Jan. 15. Bradley and Lewis joined about 50 other concerned citizens to protest the 15-year prison sentences given recently to three of the assailants in the 1991 Paul Broussard gay-bashing murder case, which they consider too lenient.

The three assailants, all teenagers, Leandro Ramirez, Jaime Aguirre and his brother Javier Aguirre, plead guilty to the charge of murder, but requested probation, downplaying their role in the crime. Paul Broussard was assaulted and killed as he walked home from a Houston gay bar on July 4, 1991.

Under Texas law, the three could be eligible for parole in 15 months, but must


remain in prison pending any appeal of the sentence.

In a written statement, the organizers outlined their objections to the sentences, saying that the brutality of the crime indicated longer prison terms. "After consideration we feel that this sentence ... sends the wrong message to the general public. This says that a gay man or lesbian's life is of lesser value in the state of Texas."

"We ask the question, is this justice? When these thugs are eligible for parole in 15 months our society, and judicial system will be committing another crime, not just against Paul Broussard, but against everyone in society, because we are all different from each other. No one deserves to pay for this difference with their lives. Our punishments should fit the criminal's crime. Fifteen months is not enough," the statement continues.

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

### Is the resurgence of role playing asserting itself in the lesbian community?

If you have read my column in the previous weeks you might have noticed that I tend to write on a variety of subjects. It appears to be on what ever catches my fancy, with no rhyme or reason.

What this long, round-about introduction leads us to a topic about which I have become fascinated/curious. But, I am asking for some feedback from you. The topic is role playing, the resurgence of butch-femme or femme-butch in the lesbian community.

The last few books that happened upon me (by this I mean that I will read just about anything offered to me) have been either about the "herstory" of lesbianism (Odd Girls and Twilight Lovers) and most recently "The Persistent Desire, A Femme-butch Reader" edited by Joan Nestle. Although I did manage to squeeze in a "Reader's Digest" (last week's column) the Sunday Chronicle, a murder mystery, always The New Voice, and other assorted written words.

I digress from the issues, which are: (1) Is there a resurgence of role playing in the lesbian community?; (2) If so, why do you think this phenomenon is occurring?; And, (3) Do you think that today's role playing is different from that of the earlier era? Reply in essay form, letter or crayon.

Formerly, my personal thoughts about role playing were that it was an outdated mode of expression that once served a purpose but was no longer applicable. In my smug attitude I assumed (everyone know what assume means? "ass" out of "u" and "me") that those who did play roles were uncomfortable with their lesbian identity or sexuality.

Well ladies, don't get up in arms, while reading these books I considered, reconsidered, puzzled, and genuinely decided that my prejudice was ignorance. I have not come to any conclusions at this time. What I am going to do is condense some of the theories I read as to why role playing exists, and its validity, for you, and wait to get your opinions and thoughts.

Studies show that lesbians in long term relationships have sex less often than other couples. The reasoning behind the study was that women tend to slip into affection and comfort roles. Also, since no one is the clear-cut aggressor, neither woman takes the sexual lead, each waits for the other.

In butch-femme relationships there is polarization. Polarization helps maintain the eroticism in the relationship. Either the Butch or the Femme may initiate the lovemaking but each does it in a manner consistent with her role. Now to confuse the matter more, in today's role playing it is acceptable for the roles

to be switched back and forth within the couple. Thus, the meaning of Butch and Femme is not the same meaning it had in the '50s.

Following are some definitions for the terms butch and femme. Let me stress that there are no universal definitions for these terms. I chose several individual's definitions that I thought were interesting:

Femme—1) Femmes are women to women; dykes to men. 2) Women who act and look like girls and who desire girls. We are just the queerest of the queers.

Butch—1) To look masculine but be a woman. 2) butch deconstructs gender. (The following definition defined the Butch of the '50s but I have included it because the idea it represents.) 3) She was a woman who created an original style to signal to other woman what she was capable of doing—taking erotic responsibility.

I should add that Butch and Femme are not defined by the breakdown of chores done in the house. A very clear concept I received from these books is that, although the household chores may divide in a heterosexual imitation, the femmes doing traditional women's work and butches the men's work, the chores are actually divided by who likes doing what, or is more skilled at that particular job.

The dynamics in a lesbian relationship are different, in that what-

ever the action taking place, e.g. chores, sex, or whatnot, both women arrive at it as equals. There is no masculine superiority complex, no society mores or customs that are being followed. This also holds true for the femme-butch relationship.

There is even a sliding scale of terminology so as to be able to label the extremes to the moderates. How the terms Butch and Femme came to have negative connotations is traced to the feminist-lesbian movement. During the late '60s and '70s when the women's movement gathered its strength, sexuality was repressed.

It was repressed due to its resemblance to the traditional sex roles associated with the patriarchal society. Men dominated and exploited women, and so, it appeared, did the butch-femme relationship. Equality was the lofty and idealistic way to live. Equality translated to conformity. All women were expected to dress similarly, lesbians included. Outward manifestations of femininity or masculinity were frowned upon. Androgyny was the look.

### Toward a new gay liberation. Should public sex be punished?

Within the last year there have been conflicts between gays and the guardians of public morality in a number of cities over the issue of public sex—the fact that some gay men engage in sex in various "public" places: bars, bathhouses, movie theaters, adult bookstores, alleys, rest stops, parks, forest preserves, even at parties in private residences.

A dozen years ago, the National Organization for Women announced to anyone who cared to listen that public sex, among other things, was not a lesbian rights issue. Well and good. But it is emphatically a gay men's issue. It is impossible to walk around a bar, party, or other gay gathering and find many gay men who have not engaged in public sex in one form or another and would not cheerfully do it again. In fact, a "Playboy" reader survey found that among the 1,000 gay men who answered, "most" (say, roughly 65-80 percent) said they had done sex in public.

And yet, though I have seen defenses of other socially disapproved behaviors, I have never seen a defense of public sex. When gays are harassed by the police, community reaction ranges from "They got what they deserved," to the defensive whining of "Don't the police have anything better to do?"

Nonsense. The police are doing what police always do: creating the illusion that are promoting public safety. Since they cannot catch real burglars and murderers until too late, they turn to the easier (and safer) practice of harassing people who behave differently to assure the public that they are "on the job" protecting "Public order." But no one should be arrested for behavior that does not hurt anyone. So we need to Develop an affirmative response on public sex in

order to put the police on the defensive, embarrass the politicians and hold off the predations of moral entrepreneurs.

One way to do that would be to mount a successful attack on the argument against public sex. But here we find a paradox: Never have I seen a sustained and cogent argument against it; it is just assumed to be bad.

So we will have to imagine what the reasons might be. For instance: "It is illegal." True, but irrelevant. That is only a description of its legal status. What we seek is an argument about why it should be illegal.

"It is immoral." Who says, and why? Again, this is not an argument but a category claim that needs an argument or two to support it. Why is public sex immoral? There are a number of behaviors conventionally viewed as immoral (or sinful) that are not criminalized, and do not result in police harassment: simple fornication, for instance, or even homosexuality in many states.

"It is rude and offensive to others." Maybe, maybe not. In our culture, rudeness is not criminalized, nor is an object of police concern. As to its supposed offensiveness to others, we should ask, "Which others?" People who go where they think sex might happen "in public" surely know what they are doing and are giving tacit consent. I cannot imagine someone saying, "I know that there is sex going on at the Hotsy-Totsy Bar and I am offended by it—and now I am going to go there."

With regard to places far more open and public: Those of us who live in big cities assume as part of our lives that we will regularly encounter a number of distasteful experiences every day. We run into intrusive panhandlers, youths with boom boxes, truly ugly people, street preachers declaiming at us, places where people have urinated,

squalling babies, grossly fat people on buses, and women with too many children. We learn to avert our eyes and practice avoidance. If people really are offended why should public sex be different?

"It doesn't really bother us adults, but we need to protect the children." Again, an interesting claim offered as if self-evident. It assumes that seeing sex is bad for children, and that we are running our society geared to children's sensibilities. But it seems to me that adults should be ashamed to hide behind their children when they are asked to give serious arguments. Children are seldom in gay bars, bathhouses, adult bookstores, gay theaters; or parks, allies or forest preserves or anywhere else out in public late at night. They are usually accompanied by an adult who, if disapproving, can change course in advance. If parents with children encounter couples engaging in sex, they can tell their children whatever they say when they go to the zoo and the chimpanzees start copulating. In a society saturated with sexuality on cable and daytime network soap operas, is seems unworldly to think that children can or should be so protected.

"Sex by its nature should be private." An interesting idea, but what is the justification for the claim? Like many of the other reasons given, this is a normative claim presented as if it were a factual statement. Clearly people who do sex where others are present do not agree.

"But sex is so beautiful and wonderful that it should be shared only in private." This claim gives up trying to argue that observers will be harmed and substitutes the assertion that the participants will in some undefined way be harmed. But even if we were to agree that sex might be of better quality in private,

that doesn't prove that in public it is without value, only that is of less value there.

After all this, sociologist Murray Davis (author of "Smut: Erotic Reality and Obscene Ideology"), always a sage and sober guide suggests it is not the offensiveness of public sex but the very attraction it holds for people that is the threat. Somehow it tends to draw people in, at least on a psychological level, and they feel the need to resist, experiencing that effort to resist as an aversion. Another possibility, Davis suggested, is that people engaging in sex are usually preoccupied with each other, or themselves, and therefore not ready for social interaction with us. Public behavior that tends to widen social distance or increase people's sense of alienation from others tends to be frowned on, Davis noted.

To understand the irrational supports for a law is to see why that law is improper, unjustified and properly an object of disrespect. To understand the difficulty of overcoming the law because its supports are irrationally based is to understand the limited and indirect role that reason can play in altering society.

Nevertheless, if the analysis here is correct, it can tell us what is right and wrong, where we should place the burden of moral opprobrium, where we should feel that injustice is being done, what direction we want to push society in, and when it is legitimate to fight back against the law, the police, and religious ideologues. Tactical prudence will help us choose among the means to use

## 'Lips Together, Teeth Apart' brilliant look at relationships

Every now and then, a theater company can be a victim of its own success. An example: The Alley's production "Lips Together, Teeth Apart," which is being presented on the Large Stage through Feb. 7th, is so good in every respect that the rest of the Alley's season will, more than likely, pale in comparison.

"Lips Together, Teeth Apart," written by Texan Terrence McNally, is a brilliantly studied examination of relationships in mid-life crisis. The title, as revealed toward the end of the play, comes from the phrase repeated by a wife to her husband to help him quit grinding his teeth in his sleep. It also serves as metaphorical advice for the characters as they mismanage tension and conflict in their lives.

The action occurs through the course of one Fourth of July at a Fire Island beach house. Two couples are spending the weekend together.

As the play unfolds we learn that Sally (Shelley Williams) has inherited the house from her brother, David, who has recently died of AIDS. She and her husband, Sam (James Black), his sister, Chloe (Annalee Jefferies) and her husband, John (Peter Webster) confront various emotional challenges during the day. They approach from different angles, but they all share the experience of internal struggle surfacing in varying degrees of confrontation.

At different intervals in the play, all the characters, except Chloe, reveal tormented aspects of their respective lives through internal monologues.

Sally copes with an unwanted pregnancy, which she has yet to divulge, even to Sam. Her previous pregnancies have ended in miscarriage, and she fears she is incapable of carrying a fetus to term.

Sam laments the knowledge he possesses unbeknownst to others. Sally and John have slept together, but Sam doesn't know how to, or even if he should, confront Sally. Sam also speaks abjectly of how others regard him. "I know they laugh at me," he says somberly, underscoring his uneducated, rough-hewn persona.

John exposes his failing health and his closed-minded impatience. He has inoperable cancer and grapples somewhat ineffectively with his mortality. Even more chilling, he displays a prejudicial intolerance, a suppressed bigotry. It surfaces only in his mind, but the slightest inconvenience provokes virulent attacks on "...niggers...kikes...fag-gots."

As John rails about his disease, he despairs in a manner that is unsettlingly familiar. He refers to his malignancy as the worst plague ever to strike humanity, as an insidious growth that is slowly undermining his health.

This is, of course, an accurate description of most cancers, but it also serves as an unmistakable allegory for AIDS.

The underlying significance of AIDS extends well beyond John's illness. Sally sits at an easel, painting a seascape. As she peers out toward the ocean, she notices a young man swimming far out from shore.

She becomes very concerned, wonder-

ing why anyone would swim out so far. The implication is clear and disturbing: a gay man committing suicide.

More significant is the presence of the pool. Although inviting and ostensibly refreshing, none of the characters wants to go swimming. David swam in that pool, and David is dead. They speculate about the activities David and his friends might have engaged in while playing in the pool.

It ultimately takes John, already resigned to death, to brave the pool. The reaction of these people is all too realistic. Their fear of contracting AIDS through chlorinated water is as ill-founded and paranoid as the hysterical ravings of parents determined to prevent HIV-infected children from attending public schools with their children.

The tragedy of this pervasive attitude is displayed by the playwright as part of a larger wariness. McNally's characters are not just terrified of contracting AIDS; they feel tangible discomfort simply spending a weekend surrounded by gay men.

On one side they hear opera, on the other, disco. They look at and appraise the neighbors' well-honed physiques—the women with playful lust, the men with dismissive envy.

The men, in particular, are uncomfortable. Neither wants to initiate conversation with the neighbors, and both make telling remarks. John referring to the bikini g-string trunks worn by so many says, "It looks like he's flossing his ass." Sam, when trying to make a point about the lyrics of a Broadway show tune, says, "Let's ask the experts."

McNally almost certainly drew upon his own experience in detailing the characters' reactions, but his presence in his play extends further.

McNally imbues his characters with his own ideals and personality. This is most clearly represented in Sally. The playwright's disdain for those who query him about his work is evident in Sally, who speaks distastefully of people who comment about her paintings. She knows, as he does, that they are judging, and she doesn't like it.

The impetus of his personal experience is also admirably shown in the play's crisp and well-developed dialog.

McNally was still avidly listening to radio when most other teens had become glued to television. He fully credits this fact with his knack for verbal interchange. His natural flair is abetted by the unlikely circumstances of his characters.

The couples are amazingly mismatched. Sally is demure, intelligent and plainly sensitive while Sam is bluster and crude. Chloe is brash, intrusive and insecure; John is stoic and arrogant.

It is no surprise to learn that Sally and John are attracted to one another since they share a silent, superior veneer. Chloe and Sam are as similar as two siblings could be.

The play works on so many levels that its minor flaws seem somewhat irrelevant. Nonetheless they merit discussion.

In two areas, McNally utilizes contrived mechanisms and in both instances, they involve Sally.

Although she is clearly an intelligent woman, Sally is incapable of correctly recalling the titles of movies and songs. This doesn't fit the rest of the character and is present only as a tool for comic effect. Still, in all fairness, it works quite well in that regard.

A more fundamental contrivance lays the foundation for the play. As mentioned, Sally inherited the beach house from her brother, David. David, however, had a lover, Aaron, who is still alive. It seems highly unlikely that a gay man would not leave something as valuable as a beach house to his partner, especially since that partner provided full-time care as David's death approached. McNally attempts to justify this in the second act by revealing that Aaron did receive the apartment in the city, but this is nothing more than a papered-over hole in the play's construction.

These small shortcomings are easily overlooked in light of the superlative results. Not so easily ignored are director Michael Wilson's additions to the play.

He opens and closes the action with the characters moving in slow motion. This could be construed as an effort to prepare the audience for sequences

taken out of reality (the internal monologues). However, there is nothing in the play requiring this kind of forewarning. The net result is that the beginning and the ending seem ethereally overwrought.

Another puzzling addition from Wilson occurs at the very end. After the characters have (slowly) left the stage, a silhouette is seen above, against a starry sky. It is the outline of a child with an outstretched hand. A symbol of hope, perhaps? Maybe a visual allusion for outreach? Whatever the intent, it's nothing more than superfluous imagery.

Fortunately, Wilson's minor miscues with padding don't at all effect his directorial skill. He does an excellent job of catching the sub-surface angst that is part of each character. The interaction between the actors is well controlled and completely believable. Wilson never permits his actors to step on each other's lines, a difficult task given the amount of confrontation and comic interchange in the play.

The actors, too, deserve high praise. Their performances are all outstanding. Annalee Jefferies is wonderful as the boisterous, unflappable Chloe. She has a disarming, sunny earthiness that's perfect for the role.

James Black as Sam utilizes an affable characterization. More distinctly "blue-collar" than Jefferies, he does a great job displaying a likable simple-mindedness.

Peter Webster as John has an ideal, aloof quality. Better still is the rage that erupts from him when provoked.

Shelley Williams as Sally is anguished and troubled. She beautifully shows the pain associated with the death of a loved one, and the death of a stranger. She also shows a shocking callousness when she tells Chloe's children of the death she witnessed. She's terrific.

With such great acting and such sound directing, the entire play could have been performed on a bare stage and still have been good.

Stage designer Hugh Landwehr, though, has supplemented the impeccable material and fine artistry of the presentation with a gorgeous set.

Most of the stage is designed as a deck. A glass wall marks the entrances to the beach house. In the center, is a set of double glass doors which lead to a kitchen with a utilitarian island. On either side are single glass doors leading to the bedrooms. The interior of the house is used sparingly but effectively.

On the deck itself are a lounge chair and end table, as well as a patio table and chairs. On the extreme left, is an outdoor shower with circular privacy fence. On the right is a barbecue pit and a flag pole. Atop the flag pole, an American flag flutters, but on this flag, the stars are red, and the red stripes are now the colors of the rainbow unity flag.

Below the deck, in an area equivalent to an orchestra pit, is an actual pool, not quite suitable for laps, but ample evidence of a remarkably well-designed set.

"Lips Together, Teeth Apart" is a shining example of contemporary theater. The Alley's production is as good as it gets. This is great stuff; the kind of theater you'll want to see again.

## NO-AIDS Task Force offers free HIV Counseling and Testing Marathon

NO/AIDS Task Force will offer a marathon day of free, anonymous testing for HIV, the virus thought to cause AIDS, Saturday, Jan. 23 from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at their 1407 Decatur St. location.

Participants will spend 20 minutes with

a trained HIV counselor in one-on-one pre-test counseling. The counseling will include discussion of the importance of the test, risk reduction and a variety of other issues related to HIV and AIDS. Blood will be drawn and sent to a Louisiana state lab. Results take two weeks.

During this first meeting NO/AIDS HIV Counselors will schedule post-test

counseling sessions to discuss test results.

Testing is free and anonymous. People need not give their names. Only numbers are used at the Task Force, according to Jean Redmann HIV counseling and testing coordinator. "Many people find it hard to decide to be tested for HIV, and it is even harder when you are confronted by a wait of several weeks. By offering walk-in coun-

seling and testing, we hope to encourage those who find the wait intimidating, cannot pay for a test, or wish to be tested anonymously.

The February show will feature the work of several

# How do I know my youth is all spent? The year I turned forty

In 1983, I turned forty and learned a song written by Pete Seeger that went, "How do I know my youth is all spent/my get up and go/has got up and went..." The song was on a record made at The Weavers' (Seeger's group) 1981 Carnegie Hall reunion.

I met Seeger and his wife, Toshi, when they were staying at a nearby guest house. They were in town to perform at New Orleans' "Louisiana Jazz and Heritage Festival," more better known as "Jazz Fest."

Seeger is a man who wrote and sang of a better world when songs were about all the ammunition the hopeful had. His songs chronicled and glorified the American labor movement, civil rights movement, peace movement, feminism, and the nascent gay and lesbian rights movement. He is listed in "Who's Who" as the world's premier banjo virtuoso, and credited with patch-working together the music, words and ideas that grew into the 1960's anthem "We Shall Overcome." Every college student from the '40s through the '70s knew Pete Seeger.

He was and is managed by the New York City booking agent that also handled the early Joan Biaz and Bob Dylan. The three played often on the same bill. Dylan and Biaz, then in their teens and early twenties, had a publicist's romance (and maybe a real one) while Seeger was their approving, pear-toned grandfather.

Seeger was well into his seventies when we met. He lived on Pritikan's

Diet, and preferred natural things over high-tech ones. He walked me to my apartment, that day in New Orleans, to hear a Sweet Emma Barrette record. As we walked, I wondered if anyone passing or looking from a window knew this slender, tall, elderly gent with the long turkey feather in his hat and the short, fat, younger man were acting out one of my dreams.

However, it is one of life's curious disappointments that awesome ideas, such as walking with Pete Seeger, can be awfully mundane when they happen. Neither children nor press followed in adoration and no neighbors said "Look,

Leonard's dream walking."

I opened French doors onto the courtyard and pulled up Venetian blinds. A Spring breeze whispered through the curtains. Seeger stretched his long frame on the floor as Sweet Emma's record poured out her fine, "Breeze, you took my man away/Left me to cry all day/Sad and lonely./Breeze, he was my only one... it When it finished, Seeger sat up and said, "Sweet Emma's is the best music anyone has given me in New Orleans."

We talked about July 25, 1965, the day at the Newport Jazz Festival when Bob Dylan defied hotly debated folk tradi-

tion and played his set using newfangled electronic gadgetry. This was a turning point for American music. Seeger, who can be seen on film looking angry, said, "It didn't bother me as much as folks thought." Later, I asked a music editor friend at a huge east coast publication about this. She said, "To the best of my knowledge Seeger was very upset with Dylan."

On a subsequent visit to New York City, Seeger and I met at the offices of his manager. Walking down 57th Street, people did come up to him, shake hands, and express admiration. Several said they had been children at upstate New York Summer camps when Seeger, again blackballed, was playing that lowly circuit.

Alone, in the subway, asking directions back to the East Village, a student at New York University said he would show me where to get off. Inside the car, leaning together on a pole, we talked about New Orleans music. I told him I had just come from lunch with Pete Seeger, adding I had sent a recording of Sweet Emma Barrette's to the Seeger's in Beacon Hill and they had sent back a copy of "The Weavers' 1981 Reunion at Carnegie Hall." He seemed politely interested but not impressed. As we emerged in the afternoon sun he admitted he did not know who The Weavers or Pete Seeger was.

We shook hands, parted, and The Weavers sang in my head, "How do I know my youth is all spent/My get up and go has got up and went/In spite of it all, I'm able to grin/And think of the places my get up has been."

Donald Douglas Michael, co-chair of New Orleans Alliance of Pride and activists for gay and lesbian rights died at home Jan. 11 of AIDS, at age 38.

## U.S. Army barred from discharging admitted lesbian until January 30

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Thursday, Jan. 14 (AP)—The U.S. Army has been temporarily barred from discharging a Fort Leavenworth major who acknowledged that she had a lesbian relationship for nearly a decade.

A federal judge granted a restraining order after Maj. Joyce L. Walmer sued the Army and U.S. Department of Defense Thursday morning in Kansas City, Kan., just hours before an honorable discharge she fought for 10 months was to take effect.

U.S. District Judge Earl E. O'Connor granted the restraining order that bars the Army from discharging Walmer until Jan. 30. No hearing date has been set.

A national policy bars homosexuals from serving in the military. The policy says homosexual activity is regarded as "incompatible with military service" and is grounds for an honorable discharge.

In a written statement Thursday, a Pentagon spokesperson said more than 14,100 service members have been discharged since the current anti-gay policy went into effect in 1982. That accounts for less than half of 1 percent of all military discharges during that period.

The Pentagon declined to discuss the Walmer case. Walmer could not be reached for comment Thursday night.

In her lawsuit, Walmer, 35, asks the

court to let her remain on active duty. She also seeks to void military rules and procedures that she claims unconstitutionally require homosexuals to be discharged without "rational basis" and that wrongly reflect "societal prejudice."

President-elect Clinton has pledged to end the military ban on homosexuals, although most of the nation's military leadership opposes lifting the ban.

Jeff Eller, a spokesperson for Clinton in Little Rock, Ark., declined to comment Thursday on the Walmer case.

A military board began an inquiry of Walmer's status 10 months ago after a civilian friend told Army officials that she and Walmer had a homosexual rela-

tionship and used marijuana, according to the lawsuit.

The civilian told Army officials the two women were married in 1983, according to the lawsuit.

In a formal statement to a military board of inquiry in July, Walmer acknowledged she had a homosexual relationship. But she contends in her lawsuit that she made that admission under threat of court-martial.

The lawsuit alleges that one of her commanding officers at the base was a "religious zealot hellbent on persecuting perceived homosexuals." Walmer said in the lawsuit that the officer threatened her with court-martial if she did not agree to face the board of inquiry.

BRADENTON, Fla., Saturday, Jan. 16 (AP)—A homosexual couple seeking to adopt a child has criticized Florida's reasoning for banning gay adoptions, saying it intrudes on privacy and

implies homosexuality is bad.

James W. Cox and Rodney M. Jackman on Friday filed a legal brief that was the latest salvo in a lawsuit the two men filed in June 1991, after the state

Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services denied their application to adopt.

Last month, HRS officials maintained adoption by homosexual parents

would deprive a child of a role model and risk unknown effects on the child's sexual development.

### National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences suspends Colorado activities

LOS ANGELES, Monday, Jan. 11 (AP)—The National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences said it will drop a schedule of events in Colorado to protest an anti-gay rights law passed by voters last year.

The academy, best known for its prestigious Grammy Awards, said Monday it had suspended all events scheduled for Colorado.

That means academy President Michael Greene will not be the keynote speaker at the Jan. 29 Colorado Music Educators Association convention, and the Colorado Grammy In The Schools and Grammy Colorado's All-Star Jazz Band programs will be suspended. They were scheduled to begin Jan. 28.

Voter approval of Colorado's Amendment 2 in November spawned efforts by gay rights organizations and some Hollywood celebrities to boycott the state.

Amendment 2 bars passage of any law guaranteeing civil rights protections based on sexual orientation. It annuls such ordinances already on the books in Aspen, Boulder and Denver.

Greene, in a press release, said the amendment "violates principles which rest at the heart of our culture. No organization that's dedicated to cultural diversity and individual expression can stand idly by while personal liberties are violated.

Greene also said the cancellation wasn't meant to reflect badly on the Colorado Music Educators Association.

The Grammy In The Schools program offers free lectures, master classes, performances and workshops with professionals to students around the country.

Despite the cancellation, the academy will make the program's print and video materials available to the affected students.

### Elisabeth Kubler-Ross to conduct Houston area workshop in March

Internationally known psychiatrist Elisabeth Kubler-Ross M.D. has scheduled a five day "Life, Death and Transition" workshop for March 22-26, 1993 at the Christian Renewal Center in Dickinson, Texas. The workshop was designed by Kubler-Ross to help people deal with the trauma and grief that surround death.

Kubler-Ross describes the workshop as an intense probing into any pain in one's life that may be keeping a person from wholeness and joy. She says that for many who have attended, it was more effective than five years of psychoanalysis.

Kubler-Ross earned her medical degree at the University of Zurich, then traveled to the United States in 1958 to complete four years of training in psychiatry and

four years of specialized study in child psychology.

She began her pioneer work with the terminally ill during her tenure as assistant professor of psychiatry at the University of Chicago's Billings Hospital.

The cost of the workshop is \$600, which includes room and board. Applicants are urged to register at least 10 days in advance, however applications will be accepted until Monday, March 22. Participants may be eligible for 30 CEU credit hours. More information may be obtained by calling Dianne Archangel at (713) 487-2131.

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





### Newspaper: Ohio group wants anti-gay rights constitutional amendment

LORAIN, Ohio, Friday, Jan. 15 (AP)—Gay rights activists claim a group called the Ohio Pro-Family Forum wants to ask the state's voters to strike down laws prohibiting discrimination against homosexuals, a newspaper reported today.

Passage of a similar law in Colorado last Nov. 3 prompted gay rights activists to launch a boycott they claim has cost the state \$20 million in tourism so far. That same day, Oregon voters rejected an anti-gay measure.

Gay-rights activists predict Ohio will be one of several states to have anti-gay

rights constitutional amendments on the ballot this year, The Morning Journal of Lorain reported.

Scot Nakagawa, a director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Policy Institute in Washington D.C., said conservative religious leaders have targeted several states for anti-gay-

rights legislation next November.

Besides Ohio, they include Michigan, Wisconsin, Idaho, California, Washington and Missouri, he said.



Oregon Legislature considers civil rights protection for homosexuals

SALEM, Ore., Thursday, Jan. 14 (AP)—Bills pending in the Legislature to guarantee civil rights to homosexuals probably would have no effect on cities that pass an anti-gay rights initiative, the Oregon Citizens Alliance said Thursday.

State Labor Commissioner Mary Wendy Roberts has introduced bills in the 1993 session to prohibit discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodation based on a person's sexual orientation.

But OCA chairperson Lon Mabon

said he thinks cities' home rule powers under the state constitution would allow them to ignore such a statute if local voters approved the OCA's anti-gay rights initiative.

"It says municipalities will not enforce a law that grants any type of special status to homosexual behavior,"

Mabon said. "When it is that specific, I think it would pre-empt something like Mary Wendy Roberts' statute."

Roberts said that while cities' home rule power is subject to legal interpretation, she doubts cities would have the authority to thumb their noses at an anti-discrimination law passed by the Legislature.



### Appeals court upholds CIA's dismissal of gay spy: Threat to national security

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Jan. 12 (AP)—The CIA's firing of a gay spy on grounds that he posed a threat to national security was upheld Tuesday by a federal appellate court.

A three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia said the Central Intelligence Agency had a legitimate concern about the spy's "trustworthiness in light of the fact that he hid information about his involvement in homosexual activity despite

suspecting or knowing that the agency considered such involvement to be a matter of security significance."

The appeals court overturned a federal judge's ruling that the spy, identified in court papers only by the fictitious name John Doe, was denied due process when then CIA Director William Casey fired him 1982.

Doe had joined the CIA in 1973 as a clerk-typist and had worked his way up to a covert job as an electronics technician, in which he was rated as an excellent agent.

Fearing that he might be fired, he told a CIA security official in Jan. 1982 that he was gay, that his family, neighbors and friends knew he was homosexual, but that he had never revealed any classified information to an unauthorized person.

He was placed on paid leave pending an investigation and was told in May he was being fired "in the interests of the United States." After the CIA rejected his appeal, Doe sued the agency in federal court, contending he was fired because he was gay.

When the case reached the Supreme Court six years later, the CIA denied having a blanket policy against homosexuals. But the Reagan administration contended that the CIA director had the discretion under the 1947 National Security Act to dismiss any employee deemed a security risk "without giving reasons."

The justices disagreed. They said courts could intervene if a CIA agent was denied equal protection and property rights under the Constitution. They sent the case back to lower courts.

### Man challenging Louisiana ban on oral sex: Lawyer says it targets gays

NEW ORLEANS, Saturday, Jan. 9 (AP)—A New Orleans man arrested last spring is challenging Louisiana's law against oral sex.

Lawyer John D. Rawls filed a motion Thursday, asking state Judge Calvin Johnson to declare Louisiana's sodomy law unconstitutional. The 187-year-old law includes a ban on oral sex.

The law carries a sentence of up to five years in prison for "unnatural carnal copulation." It applies to homosexuals and heterosexuals alike.

Rawls motion was filed on behalf of

Johnny L. Baxley, 49, who was charged after he allegedly offered to perform oral sex on a man and pay him \$20 to allow it. The man turned out to be an undercover police officer.

Orleans Parish District Attorney Harry Connick's office has declined comment until it presents a memo opposing Rawls' motion to Johnson on Jan. 27.

The judge is scheduled to rule March 1.

The statute has survived many legal challenges over the years. Rawls' twist is that it discriminates against homosexual men and women by outlawing their pri-

mary form of sexual intimacy.

Rawls paraded a dozen expert witnesses to the stand Thursday night—doctors, priests, sex therapists, sociologists and professors—who testified that oral sex is natural and commonplace today. Some said it is clinically recommended for couples suffering from sexual dysfunction.

Rawls charges that the law specifically targets homosexuals "because they feel they are breaking the law by engaging in sex while heterosexual couples function as though the law does not apply to them."

But if the law is meant to target homo-

sexuals, it has been tougher on prostitutes, who get arrested far more frequently on the charge, defense lawyers say.

Joseph Meyer Jr., a veteran public defender, said that when police arrest a prostitute and really want her off the street, they will book her with a crime against nature because prostitution is only a misdemeanor, punishable by fine rather than jail.

Ten years ago, Connick went to the Legislature and had the law amended so that solicitation of oral sex for compensation violates the statute.



**Colorado attorney general plans quick appeal of Amendment 2 ruling**

DENVER, Sunday, Jan. 17 (AP)—The Colorado attorney general's staff, wasting no time in appealing a Denver judge's decision to block Amendment 2, expects to present its argument to the Colorado Supreme Court on Tuesday.

Solicitor General Tim Tymkovich said Saturday that state lawyers were working through a three-day weekend so they can present the appeal to the supreme court at the earliest opportunity. The courts are closed Monday because of Martin Luther King Day.

Amendment 2, the new state constitutional provision that would erase laws protecting gays from discrimination, was to have taken effect last week. But it was put on hold Friday by Denver District Court Judge Jeff Bayless, who found a reasonable probability that the law will be ruled unconstitutional when its merits are considered at trial.

Tymkovich said the Supreme Court justices are bound by law to review Bayless' ruling if an appeal is made. He does not, however, expect a quick ruling.

The high court, Tymkovich said, probably will establish a schedule to accept written briefs and then hear oral arguments in late spring or early summer. He said a ruling probably will not come until late fall.

In his ruling Bayless sidestepped a key state argument, Tymkovich said, giving the attorney general's staff hopes of prevailing on appeal.

Specifically, he said, the state presented compelling evidence that gays should not be treated as a protected class of people. Tymkovich pointed out that homosexuals have never been recognized by the U.S. Supreme Court, federal appellate courts or Congress as a group that deserves heightened protection from discrimination.

"They (gays and lesbians) are not a suspect class," said Tymkovich. "There are only a few groups that have been able to achieve that status."

Federal law outlaws discrimination on the basis of race, national origin,

religion, gender, age and handicap. But legal experts say the state faces major obstacles in gaining implementation of the law.

When Bayless put Amendment 2 on hold, he tipped his hand, lawyers say. "The judge is predisposed to recognizing homosexuals and lesbians as minorities," said Tim McMillen, executive director of the non-profit Rocky Mountain Family Council, which has been monitoring Amendment 2. "I think it's going to be very, very difficult for the state to win."

Gene Nichol, dean of the University of Colorado Law School, said when the case comes back to Bayless for trial, the state will have to meet a standard of proof that "is rarely met in American constitutional law. For my money, that means the state is going to have a very difficult time defending Amendment 2 before Bayless."

Because of Bayless' ruling, gay rights laws in Aspen, Boulder and Denver

remain in effect. Amendment 2, approved by 53 percent of Colorado voters in the November election, would repeal those laws. In addition, the amendment would prohibit the state or other Colorado cities from passing laws to protect gays from discrimination.

Tymkovich and Gregg Kay, first assistant attorney general, met with Gov. Roy Romer and Attorney General Gale Norton shortly after Bayless issued his ruling Friday. They decided an immediate appeal to the Supreme Court was necessary because of the way Bayless framed the case.

Bayless ruled that, through Amendment 2, the state appears to sanction "private biases" against gays and bisexuals. He said it would do so by not allowing homosexuals avenues of redress and complaint through normal channels, including the courts, when they become targets of bigotry in housing, employment and public accommodations.

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





**Civil rights for homosexuals has good chance in Washington, backers say**

OLYMPIA, Thursday, Jan. 14 (AP)—A ban on discrimination against gays and lesbians in Washington has a solid chance at the Legislature this year after more than a decade of failure, proponents said.

Rep. Cal Anderson, D-Seattle, said Wednesday he will introduce a measure, probably by Friday, giving homosexuals the same protections against discrimination now covering people based on religion, race, sex, ethnic origin and disability.

Anderson and Ed Murray, president

of the Privacy Fund lobbying for the law, said they aren't worried the measure will provoke an anti-gay initiative like one that recently failed in Oregon after a bruising political fight.

"Those people are rattling their swords anyway," Anderson said. "To not go forward now that we have a chance of winning this battle would be tantamount to going back to the closet."

Murray said "put simply, the best defense is a good offense." He said the measure, facing a Democratic Legislature and governor after years of opposition in the formerly Republican Senate, "has the best shot of any year."

Gov. Mike Lowry told his first news conference as governor Wednesday that the legislation is needed.

"We need to drive a wooden stake through the ugly heart of discrimination and bigotry," Lowry said. He also signed his first executive order, which contained a section banning discrimination against homosexuals by state government.

Sen. Bob McCaslin, R-Spokane, among longtime foes of the proposal, contended the public does not want the measure, which has failed at more than a dozen past Legislatures.

"I think they (gays) have every right that I have. I don't think they should have special privileges. I don't think they need it," he said.

Anderson, the Legislature's only openly gay member, strongly disagreed.

"There is so much hate out there. I get calls every week from people all over the state who are being discriminated against in jobs, in housing, who are being fired, not hired," he said.

"I think this year we have a Legislature that is very different. It is far more representative of the community as a whole, and I think they'll pass this bill," he said.

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





## Rhode Island governor announces order extending protection to gays

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Monday, Jan. 18 (AP)—Gov. Bruce Sundlun today announced an affirmative action policy that extends protection to state workers who are gay.

The executive order "will establish in no uncertain terms that this administration will actively fight against discrimination on the basis of race, color, sex, age, religion, sexual orientation or disability," Sundlun said.

Sundlun announced the order to coincide with the commemoration of Martin Luther King's birthday.

"I can think of no more fitting day than ... the day when we honor one of the greatest human rights leaders of all time," Sundlun said.

"It is my hope that my first executive order of my second term will set the stage for elevating human rights, tolerance for

diversity and affirmative action reform throughout the state," he said.

Sundlun's order goes beyond one issued by former Gov. Edward DiPrete, Sundlun spokesperson Barbara Cottam said.

The order prohibits discrimination in pay, layoffs and recalls, transfers, promotions and demotions, work assignments, leave, training, appointments and discipline.

"Deliberate or persistent violation of the

affirmative action policy set forth herein may result in the withdrawal of state support or involvement in a project, and-or debarment from further state involvement," Sundlun said.

The order also creates an Executive Committee for Affirmative Action that will advise the governor and have the power to summon the heads of state government departments to report on affirmative action.

### Another statewide coalition being formed to combat Colorado's Amendment 2

DENVER, Thursday, Jan. 7 (AP)—A group of civic, business and gay and lesbian leaders have announced the formation of another group that seeks to repeal Amendment 2.

The statewide coalition, called Colorado Alliance to Restore Equality, was formed Wednesday to "undo Amendment 2 by legal and political action and to undo the harm Amendment 2 has

caused to Colorado," according to a prepared release.

"CARE believes that Amendment 2 is divisive and destructive. It legalizes discrimination, which most Coloradans oppose," the statement said.

The group is voluntary and open to any individuals and organizations.

Membership includes representatives

from the gay and lesbian community, businesses, religious organizations, cities and towns, civil rights, arts and entertainment and tourism.

A steering committee for the group will be formed next week, said Lisa Bell, a spokesperson for the group.

CARE will work with the Colorado Human Rights Coalition and will assist

in the first Colorado Human Rights Summit on Sunday, Bell said.

In addition to legal help, CARE plans on community education and fundraising for repeal of the measure.

Amendment 2, passed in November, bans anti-discrimination laws for gays, lesbians and bisexuals. It also repealed gay rights laws in Denver, Boulder and Aspen.

### Air Force colonel testifies he expected privacy on computer data service

SAN ANGELO, Texas, Thursday, Jan. 7 (AP)—Col. James A. Maxwell Jr., accused of sending pornographic messages by electronic mail, testified Thursday he expected complete privacy on the computer data service.

The third day of the pre-trial court-martial continued with defense attempts to prove Maxwell's privacy was violated.

Maxwell, 48, was removed from command of the Goodfellow Air Force Base training center last summer when military authorities charged him with distributing pornography and homosexual materials through his home computer. He also

is accused of writing obscene messages to a male lieutenant.

Maxwell has denied the charges.

Maxwell testified Thursday he thought employees of America Online Inc. could not and would not read the electronic mail he sent to others.

If the case comes to trial next month, Maxwell's testimony cannot be used.

The military judge, Col. Donald Weir of Randolph Air Force Base, is expected to announce Jan. 18 whether he has decided to throw out any of the six charges against Maxwell.

Also Thursday, defense attorneys questioned whether the vice commander for Goodfellow's training center had sufficient knowledge June 13 to issue a warrant to search Maxwell's quarters.

Col. Kenton D. McHenry II testified he tried to give Maxwell the benefit of the doubt but ultimately found probable cause to approve the search.

Agents with the Air Force Office of Special Investigations gave McHenry "an affidavit from the FBI, clearly labeled documents and samples of the kinds of things they were looking for," McHenry said. "I took a long time looking at it.


"This was not something I took very lightly. Col. Maxwell was my commanding officer and my friend."

The FBI in Dec. 1991 began searching the electronic mail sent by 88 users of America Online. Company executives called the FBI when one user sent an executive some samples of sexually explicit messages.

According to testimony this week, Maxwell's user name, "Reddel" was among those listed as a receiver on the pornography sample, according to testimony.
