## AGENCY TOUR EXPLAINED USE OF UF CAMPAIGN MONEY TO SOLICITORS

"We'd like to tell you what we did with your money" is a theme demonstrated this year by the United Fund.

For the first time, solicitors from the Houston Refinery, who were selected by a lottery, saw firsthand what the UF did with the money we contributed last year during a tour of three agencies last week.

Nineteen men and women from Shell visited the Lighthouse for the Blind, the Center for the Retarded and the Cerebral Palsy Center.

At the Lighthouse the group saw how blind adults become self-sufficient and self-supporting by overcoming their handicaps with special training and working in jobs at the center. The clients there learn to use braille equipment necessary for communicating and they learn to operate many of the machines and miscellaneous equipment in the workshop. Blind personnel at the Lighthouse help the center fulfill work contracts such as medical transcription projects, packaging jobs and other worthwhile jobs.

Since the Lighthouse sells many of its products and services, it is almost self-supporting but must depend on the United Fund for 18 percent of its budget.

The Center for the Retarded, housed in modern buildings, most constructed with donations from prominent families, is adjacent to the Lighthouse and receives 18 percent of its budget from the Fund. The workshop, where graduates of the center are employed, provides a source of income for the agency. This agency not only provides instruction to enable the retardates to get along in the world, but also special medical and dental care as well as instruction for the parents.

In the workshop employees learn to become useful and responsible by performing jobs while earning money. The workshop fills contracts for many companies in the area and also turns out many attractive and useful products. After training in the workshop, many of the students are placed in jobs in the community.

Eighty-five percent of the \$200,000 budget for the Cerebral Palsy Center comes from the United Fund. Other funds come from the patients, but most cannot afford to pay the full amount.

Cerebral Palsy is a condition caused by damage to the brain, usually at birth. Cerebral refers to the brain and palsy to the lack of control over the muscles. Additional causes can be from physical injury or diseases.

The final judging will be carried out during the week of the show and awards attached to the works. Winners will be notified by telephone. Crating and shipping of the three prize winning works to the International Exhibition will be handled by the Art Club.

Artists will be allowed to sell their works during the show independently of the Club.

Works may be submitted to One Shell Plaza, Room 1536 from Tuesday, December 26, 1972 to Tuesday, January 2, 1973, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Entry and release forms may be obtained from the chairman and co-chairman. Pictures must be removed from the Bank of the Southwest on Saturday, January 13 between 9 and 12 noon.


### MTM RESEARCH LAB FAMILIES TURN OUT FOR SHRIMP BOIL IN GALVESTON

### BANG PERFECTS TALENT, WINS BEST OF CLASS IN GEM AND MINERAL SHOW

A few years ago when E. L. Bang, Instrumentman No. 1, Engineering Field, became interested in lapidary arts, he set his sights on the master's class and is now progressing toward that goal.

No longer a novice, even though he says he has a lot more work to do, Bang walked off with best of class in the cabochon, faceted material and flatwork category of the recent Gem and Mineral Show.

With an 84 rating, he ranked well above the required minimum 80 points for a blue ribbon. The case he submitted included 11 cabochon stones, which have a dome-type finish including simulated quartz, agate, and petrified wood; 12 faceted stones of quartz and topaz; and two geodes for the flatwork requirement.

Next year he hopes to get at least 90 points to qualify for a blue ribbon in the master's class.

Most of the patients at the center range in age from six months to 10-12 years old since they are brought to the center when the disorder is first detected. Each patient is given greater independence in everyday living through development of physical and academic skills within his range of capability. The center's program is designed to integrate continuous therapy with educational stimulation. Speech, occupa-

tional and physical therapies are provided under medical supervision.

Through the Center's efforts, children are taught to do many of the things we take for granted such as walking and talking.

After the tour ended the solicitors came away with their own impressions of the agencies. One solicitor said he had no idea before of the wonderful job that the instructors perform at the agencies. Another was amazed by the dedicated efforts of both the students and instructors. Still another said, "You know, I've always given before, but now that I've seen what they do with the money, I'm going to try to give a little more."




