We regret to announce that M. O. Sifford died suddenly at his home Saturday, January 16, of an apparent heart attack.

A native of Cherry Springs, Texas, Sifford was a resident of Houston all of his adult life. His Shell career covered over 35 years. He joined Shell at the Houston Refinery in July, 1929, as a Clerk and spent his entire career at the Refinery. At the time of his death, he was a Material Analyst in the Purchasing-Stores Department. He served in the Army Air Force from December, 1942 to October, 1945.

Mr. Sifford is survived by his wife, Mrs. Albertina Sifford. An expression of sympathy is extended to Mrs. Sifford by friends and employees of the Refinery.

The funeral was held at the Bethel Church of Christ at 3:00 p.m., Monday, January 18, 1965, and burial was in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Dividend and Interest Refund checks will not be mailed unless specifically requested.

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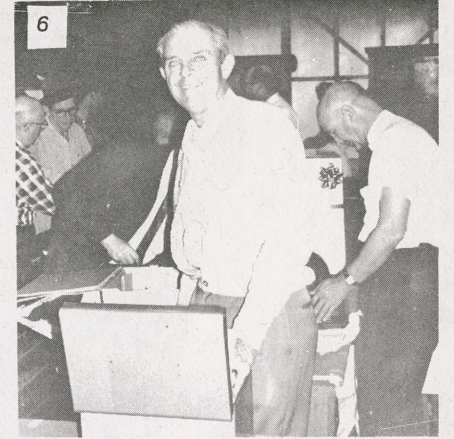
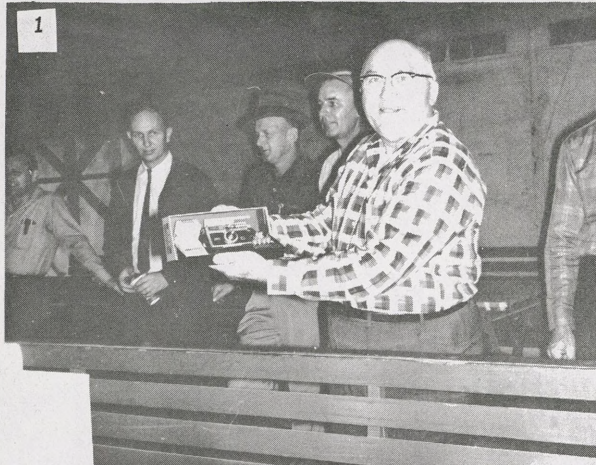
BRUNO STOLLEY NAMED TO SUCCEED D. B. HODGES AS VICE PRESIDENT

BRUNO STOLLEY will be nominated to become a Vice President of Shell Oil Company to succeed Mr. Hodges, effective February 1, 1965.

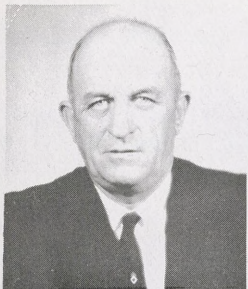

BRUNO STOLLEY (Cont'd.)

Dene Hodges, a native of Nebraska, attended the state university there and joined Shell in 1926 as a Clerk in the Ventura, California, oil fields. He was later transferred to the Martinez Refinery and then to Shell's Manufacturing Department at San Francisco. In 1940 he was assigned to New York as Manager of the Shipping and Supplies Department. Six years later he became General Manager of the Transportation and Supplies Department, and in 1947 was elected Vice President in charge of these activities.

During the war he was granted a leave of absence from Shell to serve as Associate Director of the Supply and Transportation Division of the Petroleum Administration for War. He served as a member of the Military Petroleum Advisory Board from May, 1947, to June, 1952. In 1951 he returned to government service for six months as Director of Supply and Transportation for the Petroleum Administration for Defense.

Mr. Hodges was honored with citations from the Petroleum Administration for War in 1944, the Petroleum Council in 1954.

Mr. and Mrs. Hodges plan to make their future home in La Jolla, California. The best wishes of their legions of friends both in Shell and the oil industry go with them.

Bruno Stolley, who holds a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from Tulane University, joined Shell Oil Company in 1930 as an Engineer at the Norco Refinery. In 1934 he transferred to the Houston Refinery as an Industrial Engineer, and two years later became an Assistant Chief Engineer at the Wood River Refinery. He was assigned to Head Office in 1946 as Assistant Manager of the Personnel Department. In 1949 he was named Manager of the Laboratories at Shell Development Company's Emeryville Research Center, and in 1955 became Manager of the Martinez Refinery. He accepted employment with BPM in The Hague in 1958 and joined Compañia Shell de Venezuela, Limited, as Director, Refining and Supplies, in 1959. He returned to Shell Oil Company as General Manager, Purchasing Stores, in 1962, and in 1963 was named General Manager, Transportation and Supplies, the position he holds at present.
