




J. F. ZRUBEK TRANSFERS TO HEAD OFFICE



TEN REASONS FOR MEASLES IMMUNIZATION



Of the 20 million children who have never had measles, take any ten - and you've got ten good reasons for measles immunization.

The illustration above suggests statistically what will happen if a vaccine isn't used. Sooner or later, almost everyone gets measles. And each one who does, according to the U. S. Public Health Service, runs a 1-in-1,000 chance of getting measles encephalitis, or inflammation of the brain.

One of every ten measles encephalitis victims dies. A higher percentage suffer permanent brain injury, with mental retardation and sight, hearing, and behavioral problems.

There are other measles complications, including pneumonia, but danger of encephalitis alone makes physicians wonder why parents subject their children to such a risk.

At a recent national conference of the United Cerebral Palsy Associations in Los Angeles, John M. Adams, M.D., professor of pediatrics at the University of California Medical School, said: "I don't understand this indifference to measles. You wouldn't take that kind of risk in an airplane. And I doubt if you would drive on the freeways with those odds."

Luther L. Terry, M.D., surgeon general of the U.S. Public Health Service, has pointed out that last year nearly 500 American children died from measles. Measles causes more deaths annually than any other infectious disease of childhood.

Noting that safe measles vaccines are now available, Dr. Terry said: "I urge all parents of children who have not had measles to see their physicians or health departments about measles vaccination without delay. Let's immunize the children of America against their enemy, measles."

The course was designed to serve as an introduction for the beginner and a review for others so they would be better qualified to do design problems.

Lesson material covering simple stresses, Hooke's Law, temperature effect on steel, torsion, beams, columns, etc., and the AISC Handbook were used in the course somewhat like a correspondence course. Approximately six hours of the student's own time was required for each lesson.
