## Judicial board accuses judge of 'blatant prejudice'

DALLAS (UPI)—The Texas Commission on Judicial Conduct has charged state district Judge Jack Hampton with violating judicial ethics and being "blatantly prejudiced" in his comments about two gay murder victims, it was revealed Thursday.

Hampton has been attacked by civil rights groups since Dec. 15 when he told the Dallas Times Herald he sentenced Richard Lee Bednarski, 18, to 30 years in prison rather than life because his two victims were homosexual.

Complaintr were filed with the commission and the Texas Supreme Court, but the state's highest court said Wednesday it lacked jurisdiction in the case.

The commission's inquiry opened Thursday with a pretrial conference before retired Appeals Judge Robert Murray of San Antonio, who was named by the Supreme Court to gather facts in the case.

Attorneys at the conference agreed to

make public the five-page text of charges sent to Hampton on March 31. Murray said he would hear testimony at a public hearing to be held possibly in the next two months.

The commission noted in the charges it is not investigating "the propriety of the sentence" given Bednarski or the lifestyle of the victims but Hampton's conduct.

The commission alleges that Hampton violated judicial rules by commenting on a pending case (the Bednarski case) while a motion for a new trial was pending, failed to conduct himself in a manner that promoted public confidence in an impartial judiciary and cast discredit upon the justice system.

The basis of the charges are the Times Herald story, an interview with the Associated Press and phone calls received at his office from the public.

The commission cited eight quotations from the Times Herald interview, including: "These two guys that got killed wouldn't have been killed if they

hadn't been cruising the streets picking up teenage boys."

The charge says Hampton's comments, "were so blatantly prejudiced in suggesting that the life of a prostitute or homosexual was of a lesser value than that of some other individual as to cast discredit upon the judiciary and the administration of justice. ..."

In the AP interview on Dec. 16, Hampton is quoted as saying, "The victims were homosexuals. They were out in the homosexual area picking up teenage boys. Had they not been out there trying to spread AIDS around, they'd still be alive today. I hope that's clear"

In the third instance, the commission said protest callers on Dec. 16 were referred by Hampton's office to a Dallas lawyer's office for a response and were told to "have a gay Christmas."

In regards to that incident, the commission charged, "The responses by your Court's personnel to the calls of protest ... were cavalier, disdainful and undignified."

Tom Doyal, an attorney for the Texas


Human Rights Foundation, told reporters the charges "appear to be the minimal that the commission could bring" in such a case. He said they should be sufficient to remove Hampton from office.

After the conference, officials of the Dallas Gay Alliance objected to Murray about the conduct of the proceeding. They thought it would be a public hearing, and the judge explained it was only intended to be a pretrial proceeding.

Alliance officials also said they could barely hear Murray or the lawyers talking before the bench during the 15-minute conference. They also complained about the slowness of the investigation and the fact one of Hampton's lawyer asked for more time because he had a vacation scheduled.

The commission will act as the prosecution in the trial proceeding, with lawyers for Hampton allowed to cross-examine witnesses. Murray said he would find out the "true facts" of the case and present them to the commission, which can dismiss the charges, censure the judge or remove him from office.



# UST awarded first PhD at 39th annual commencement

"Mary Hayden will make history at the University of St. Thomas when she receives her degree," said Dr. Joseph McFadden, president of the University of St. Thomas. "She will be the first student to receive a Ph.D from the University as the first graduate of our doctoral program in philosophy."

The University of St. Thomas, located in Montrose, will award its first doctoral degree at the 39th Annual Spring Commencement tonight, Friday, May 12, at 7:30 p.m. in Jerabeck Center, 4000 Mt. Vernon.

R. Mary Hayden successfully defended her dissertation on love last September to be the first graduate of the doctoral program in philosophy. "There's no doubt in anyone's mind she did a great job defending her dissertation," said Father Tom Russman, director of the Thomistic Center and chairman of the philosophy department.

The University of St. Thomas was founded in 1947 by the Basilian Fathers, a congregation of Catholic priests devoted to teaching. In its 40 year history the University has graduated over 17,000 students and has maintained a strong commitment to a liberal arts curriculum.

## —HIV-positives wanted for test

Texas Woman's University, School of Nursing, is one of the leading research centers in the U.S. Several recent research projects have been funded and sequestered through NIH as well as the CDC. TWU has been acknowledged by its colleagues for its progressive and timely approach to research topic selection.

Currently TWU is engaged in a study that focuses on the Quality of Life of persons with HIV infection. The School of Nursing is interested in case management of persons with AIDS and any of its related problems. The information that can be gained from this study has a direct bearing on the many multi-dimensional approaches to managing HIV infection that health care providers can take. There are many similar studies published in other health related areas, such as cardiac care and cancer, but none have been done as it relates to HIV infection. It is interesting to note that health care professions are looking at AIDS and HIV infection from a long-term case management perspective. This study will facili-

tate this direction in HIV management.

TWU is requesting volunteers to fill out one demographic data sheet and three questionnaires. It will take you an estimated 30-45 minutes to complete the project. All information obtained is confidential and no individual will be able to be identified. There may be a few of you that will be requested to repeat the questionnaires within a few days of the original completion, but that's it, it's that simple. The information will be helpful to the community at large and your participation is encouraged.

If you are HIV positive, you are invited to participate. To volunteer as a subject for this study please contact Dr. Diane Ragsdale, R.N. Ed.D., at Texas Woman's University between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. at 794-2101. Data collection will occur later in May or possibly early June. Your help is being asked for folks, and it's really simple.



# Lawsuit against Dallas Parkland Hospital dismissed

DALLAS (UPI)—A federal judge May 4 dismissed a lawsuit filed against the county hospital's AIDS clinic by five people suffering from the deadly virus.

U.S. District Judge Barefoot Sanders denied the plaintiffs' request for class status and dismissed the lawsuit filed against Parkland Memorial Hospital in May 1988. In the suit, the plaintiffs and the Dallas Gay Alliance contended the hospital provided inadequate treatment for AIDS patients.

"We believe that opinion vindicates Parkland regarding all of the allegations which were brought by the Dallas Gay Alliance," the hospital said in a statement issued May 4.

"While this ruling is important in vindicating the position Parkland has taken throughout this case, we want to make it clear that the level of patient care we offer is neither affected by nor influenced by outside litigation such as this," the hospital said. "We remain committed to providing the highest level of patient care available to all patients who seek treatment at Parkland to the limits of our resources."

Dallas Gay Alliance spokesperson William Waybourn said the group was disappointed that the judge did not grant class status to the plaintiffs. Two of the five plaintiffs have died and two are very ill, he said.

Despite its dismissal, Waybourn said his group considers the lawsuit a success because Parkland's care for AIDS patients

has improved in the last year and the hospital is providing treatments that were previously withheld.

At the time the suit was filed, Parkland had only one doctor assigned to treat the hundreds of patients at the AIDS clinic, he said. The clinic is now staffed by two doctors and the hospital plans to add two more physicians by July.

Shortly after the suit was filed, 14th District Court Judge John Marshall ordered the hospital to provide aerosolized pentamidine therapy, which inhibits development of a deadly form of pneumonia that affect AIDS patients. The hospital had denied patients the drug because it was considered experimental.

The FDA recently recommended approval of the drug, Waybourn said.

Waybourn said the lawsuit saved taxpayers "hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Although aerosolized pentamidine therapy costs \$3,000 per year per patient, a bout of *Pneumocystis carinii* pneumonia can require a 10-day hospital stay at an estimated expense of \$15,000 and "patients were averaging two episodes per year per patient," he said.

Marshall also ordered Parkland to do away with its waiting list for the drug AZT. While not a cure for the immune system failure caused by AIDS, the drug is believed to keep the AIDS virus from replicating.


The lawsuit was filed after the Dallas Gay Alliance learned from Parkland officials that seven people had died while on the waiting list for AZT, Waybourn said.

He said his group will return to court if it finds that the level of care at Parkland is inadequate.

"What we were asking was for class certification so we could continue to monitor what has been going on in terms of health care delivery through the Parkland system," he said. "The judge has said that that is not necessarily. If, however, Parkland fails to do that ... we'll come back to court."

"I don't think there were any losers," he said. "Parkland won because it is now delivering better health care. We won because we wanted Parkland to address a major deficiency in health care issues."


"The real winners here are the AIDS patients, who now get better health care out of Parkland Hospital," he said. "Without this lawsuit I guarantee you it would have been more of the same."



Molly Ivins has been telling us for years how grossly incompetent our state representatives are but until we followed the AIDS bill currently deposited in a conference committee we never fully fathomed the depths of stupidity and blind ignorance of certain of its members.

Rep. Billy Clemons, Democrat of Pollok, sponsor of the omnibus AIDS legislation, while insisting on a public warning that homosexual conduct in Texas is illegal, pontificated that "you can't give birth to a homosexual, they have to be recruited."

Now, of course, self-ordained authority Clemons would not accept as valid the testimony of any gay person on this subject since, obviously, we are biased—straight people, per se, are not. Right. Regardless, let us testify that while we were 37 years old when we finally came out, we can, on reflection, state that we were aware of our interest in the same sex by the age of four.

And not Clemons or anyone else can convince us that a 4-year-old boy in a small midwestern town in 1940 "chose" a lifestyle, and most assuredly we were not recruited, then or later.

Unlike Mr. Clemons we have known a great many homosexuals and we have yet to meet a SINGLE ONE who claimed or acknowledged as having been recruited. (Is homosexuality so attractive that ANYONE can be so recruited?) We are endlessly amazed that certain persons on the political Right with a strong distaste for our community also consider themselves the only true authority on homosexuality.


The warning in question would note that homosexual conduct and intravenous drug use—the two major sources of AIDS transmission—are illegal in Texas. Rep. Brad Wright, Republican from Houston and chairman of the House Public Health Committee, agreeing with requiring this warning, noted "that (it) is a worthy goal" in helping steer youngsters from homosexuality and drug use. Perhaps we should also issue a warning that Texas institutions of learning may contribute to the forms of stupidity and ignorance displayed in Austin.

Such willful stupidity is criminal enough but these men seem to take a certain pride in their mental deficiencies. We can tolerate a stupid man as long as he is confined to embarrassing himself but these men extend their shortcomings to the entire State of Texas.

We can fully sympathize with Glenn Maxey and Ray Hill in their efforts to deal with the uneducated (or, in this case, the willfully under-educated). If we care at all about our rights we must become more visible and vocal—even those in the closet can find ways to express support if they truly have any interest in furthering all our rights.






## Lobbyist condemns city's effort for AIDS legislation

Rev. Chris C. Steele, former chair of the state's Interim Task Force on AIDS, said Thursday that if the Texas Legislature passes an inadequate AIDS bill before it adjourns in two weeks much of the blame can be laid at the doorstep of the Houston City Council and the Harris County commissioners.

Pointing out that Harris County and surrounding areas will carry the financial burden of providing health care for the fourth largest population of AIDS patients in the United States, Steele

said that she does not understand why Harris County governmental agencies are not lobbying for bills that would lessen the county's future tax loads.

"It is inconceivable," she said, "that the City of Houston has permitted its large delegation in Austin to give such low priority to AIDS legislation. The City has lobbyists in Austin, but they are doing nothing to back the bills that are so badly needed in this public health emergency."

At a press conference held in conjunction with the First Annual Houston Conference on AIDS in America, Steele said it appears that the legislature may

turn out a bill so bad that it would be worse than no bill at all. Not only is the amount of funds likely to be woefully inadequate, but punitive aspects of the bill, such as withholding funds from agencies dealing with people who engage in illegal activities, i. e. homosexuals and drug users, totally ignore the ethics and morality of supporting public health needs, she said.

Steele, along with Lt. Gov. William P. Hobby and House Speaker Gib D. Lewis, were to receive The First Annual Humanitarian Awards at a dinner Thursday evening at the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

## Tom Cate is acting head of new AIDS clinic

An infectious disease specialist who has been working with AIDS patients since 1983 has been appointed acting medical director of the new AIDS clinic on Thomas Street.

This was announced by the Harris County Hospital District.


Dr. Tom Cate, 54, succeeds Dr. Robert Awe in being responsible for obtaining physicians to man the clinic and monitoring the service given to PWAs. He is on the faculty of Baylor College of Medicine which by contract handles clinical duties of county medical facilities.

Cate received his M.D. from Vanderbilt University Medical School in 1959 and since then has done research and patient care in respiratory virus infections at Columbia Presbyterian Hospital in New York, the National Institutes of Health, Barnes Hospital in St. Louis and Duke University Medical Center. He came to Houston in 1975.

In Houston, Cate has done research at Baylor College of Medicine and been involved clinically with patients at Ben Taub and Jefferson Davis hospitals.

"My job will be a little different from Dr. Awe's," Cate said. "He has been especially active in seeing that things function smoothly at Jeff Davis and there have been many problems there. At the Thomas Street clinic, we hope to set up the program so that it runs smoothly from the beginning. I shall be more involved in arranging for Baylor physicians to cover the longer hours we shall be available to PWAs. Our clinic will be open five mornings a week instead of one morning and one afternoon a week. I shall be point man for problems. Dr. Awe will continue to do clinical service at the new clinic."

Cate and his staff, along with the staff of the AIDS Alliance, move to the new clinic on May 22.

## House approves realtors bill

AUSTIN (UPI)—The Texas House, without debate, Wednesday tentatively endorsed a bill that would exempt realtors from legal liability for failing to ask for or tell if previous occupants of a residence were infected with the AIDS virus.

The proposal, by Rep. Debra Danburg, D-Houston, would protect real estate agents from the "sue if you do, sue if you don't," status many currently face, Danburg said.

If given final passage in the House and Senate and signed into law, realtors would not have to disclose any information on the AIDS status of current or former occupants of a residence unless specifically asked in writing by a prospective buyer or tenant.

The measure was scheduled for final passage in the House Thursday.

# Gay rights group files complaint against lobbyists

AUSTIN, Texas (UPI)—The director of the Lesbian-Gay Rights Lobby of Texas Tuesday filed a criminal complaint against two lobbyists, accusing them of deliberately misleading legislators about bills on AIDS and the rights of homosexuals.

Glen Maxey said he filed the Class A misdemeanor complaint against Gene Antonio of Dallas and Susan Weddington of San Antonio with the Travis County district attorney and county attorney.

Maxey said the lobbyists have distributed untruthful flyers, memos and "smear sheets" and he said Antonio and Weddington did not register as lobbyists and representatives of the American Health and Human Rights Coalition, Inc., and Texans For Better Health, respectively.

Maxey said some lawmakers have apparently been swayed by the arguments of Antonio and Weddington, noting the rejection by the Texas House last week of a

"hate crime" bill and a decision Monday by the joint House-Senate budget conference committee to slash funding for AIDS programs.

"You would think that elected

state representatives would be able to see through this sham, but unfortunately not," he said. "Some members of the House have bought this garbage and are now basing their votes on it."

Rep. Steve Wolens, D-Dallas, the sponsor of the hate crime bill, has also filed a complaint against Weddington with the secretary of state's office over her failure to register as a lobbyist.

The district attorney and county attorney's office said they are reviewing Maxey's complaint.

Neither Antonio nor Weddington were immediately available for comment.

Maxey called Antonio a "charlatan and demagogue of the first order," and said he "has no credentials."

"He makes his living writing books and going on radio talk shows with half-baked theories that AIDS is a government plot, that mosquitoes can transmit it and that every person with AIDS has a case of dementia that makes them into a threat to those

around them," he said.


Maxey said there are apparently no members of Weddington's group, Texans For Better Health, and that the office suite listed on her literature is a rented postal box in a strip shopping center in San Antonio.

"This Susan Weddington has no credentials," he said. "I question if there is even a group behind this misguided woman."

Maxey said Antonio and Weddington have tried to connect bills on AIDS, disability and non-discrimination based on sexual orientation.

"Requiring wheel chair ramps to hotels does not grant civil rights to homosexuals," he said. "It does not grant special rights or legalize pedophilia, incest or bestiality. Yet in (their) publication, the Texans for Better Health attempt to do so."

Maxey said he is not interested in seeing Antonio or Weddington actively prosecuted, but he wants them to "cease and desist" in giving misleading and inflammatory information to legislators.



## Gay rights advocate claims 'deal' cut on AIDS spending

AUSTIN (UPI)—The chief lobbyist for Texas gays and lesbians Tuesday accused House and Senate budget conferees of striking a "deal" to slash spending on AIDS services.

"I never expected in my wildest dreams that the Texas Legislature would listen to a few misguided individuals..." said Glen Maxey, director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby. "It's a bafflement to me how this Legislature has knee-jerked."

The Senate version of the budget had assign \$34 million for AIDS programs in fiscal 1990-91, while the House appropriated \$23.9 million. But the conferees Monday trimmed it to \$18.4 million.

Maxey said he believes the money was taken from AIDS programs for other specific but unidentified areas of the budget.

"What deal was cut, why that happened and where that extra money has gone, we don't know," he said. "I'm fearful that in a rush to save money for higher education or public education or other

kinds of things, perhaps we have made people with AIDS expendable in this process. Some kind of deal was cut. It was clear that money was saved for something else."

Rep. Jim Rudd, chairman of the House budget conferees, said spending had to be trimmed from the overall budget to avert a tax hike.

"We (House and Senate) had both poured a lot of money into it," he said. "As a result of that we felt we could subtract some of that money and we've still given them more than they probably can spend."

But Maxey said the conference committee working out differences between the House and Senate over the budget agreed to reduced spending on AIDS after it was suggested the money might go to gay rights groups.

"For legislators to be so homophobic to think that because a gay man or lesbian who works for an agency is going to benefit from money... I'm sorry to say in this state there's not a single AIDS serv-

ice organization that didn't have its roots in the gay community because the public health system didn't react to this epidemic," he said.

And Maxey warned that if the Legislature does not address the AIDS problem in this session, it will have to deal with it in 1991 when the number of cases in Texas will have grown from 6000 to 30,000.

"We can't ask the gay community to educate the world," he said. "We have to take care of our own. We have no time to be doing the AIDS program for the larger community because we're too busy taking care of the sick and the dying."

But Maxey predicted Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis will help restore some of the funding and see that a separate and responsible omnibus AIDS bill is passed.

"I think Lieutenant Governor Hobby and Speaker Lewis started this session on the right note and will end it on the right note," he said. "I don't think demagoguery is going to be the final answer in Texas on AIDS."

Maxey said he expects to see a "rational" compromise between the House and Senate over the AIDS bill.

A rewritten bill pending in the House extends criminal laws that outlaw homosexual acts to include people with AIDS. It would allow courts and parole boards to consider the disease as an issue in sentencing and parole.

The House bill does not allow funding to promote homosexual conduct.

The Senate version, hailed by AIDS activists as a "rational compromise" between public health and law enforcement concerns, was expected to clear the upper chamber this past week.

Maxey said the Senate AIDS bill covers policy for grants, confidentiality, non-discrimination, insurance and testing.

"It has a tremendous amount of education," he said. "We're going to have a rational AIDS policy. Clearly, the leadership carrying these bills... in my opinion, would kill the whole program if it turns into a police state kind of thing."

## City to hold meetings on revitalizing Montrose

Officials of the Inner City Revitalization Program from the Houston City Department of Planning and Development have called an open meeting for Thursday, May 18, at the Metropolitan Multi-Service Center on W. Gray to receive input from local residents about the problems and needs of inner-city neighborhoods, including Montrose.

The meeting is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. at 1475 W. Gray. Special invitations have gone out to leaders of civic associations not only in Montrose but also Sunset Terrace, South Main and Montclair. The public is invited.


The Dept. of Planning and Development has embarked on an ambitious program to revitalize inner-city neigh-

borhoods. The plan will examine existing conditions, identify problems and opportunities and outline strategies for improvement and conservation in the areas of housing, economic development and public services.

The process of developing strategy begins with a land use survey. This is followed by data collecting about population, housing, circulation/transit, utilities, community facilities, businesses and industry.

Said John Touchet, planner for Montrose and nearby areas:

"We are actively seeking the in-pur of residents throughout the planning process and again when we have put together an initial sketch plan. Residents can also comment on the final plan."

# Charges against Burroughs Wellcome protesters dismissed

DURHAM, N.C. (UPI)—The Burroughs Wellcome company dropped charges May 4 against four men who chained themselves to furniture at the company's offices to protest the high cost of AZT, an AIDS-fighting drug manufactured by the pharmaceutical company.

The men are members of a New York group called ACT UP, or AIDS Coalition To Unleash Power. The group paid \$9,180 to Burroughs Wellcome for damages caused during the disturbance April 25, said spokesperson Jay Blotcher.

"We felt that the restitution was the appropriate remedy in this situation," said Kathy Bartlett, a spokeswoman for the company. "We want to put this brief incident behind us and concentrate our energies on the research and development we do day to day."

"This was a mutual agreement between their attorneys and the company," she said. "It was done with the consent and approval of the District Attorney's Office. We certainly don't condone this type of activity."

Blotcher said the four men did not enter the offices with the intention to damage property.

"Our main objectives are to have effective drugs available to people with AIDS and to make it accessible at a reasonable cost," Blotcher said. "As shown before, we will do anything to achieve those two objectives."

When asked if that included a similar demonstration, Blotcher said, "That remains to be seen."


The men are Blane Mosley, 26, Lee Arsenault, 41, and Peter Staley, 28, all of New York; and James McGrath, 32, of Providence, R.I. Blotcher said Arsenault has acquired immune deficiency syndrome and Staley has an AIDS-related condition.

The drug originally cost \$10,000 per year for an effective dose. The cost was lowered to \$8,000 in Dec. 1987. The company has provided 30 million doses of the drug for clinical testing and has given \$5 million to a federal program that repays AZT users who cannot afford the drug, Bartlett said.

Stewart Fisher, the Durham attorney for the activists, said he was pleased with the agreement.

"I feel like they accomplished what they wanted to accomplish," Fisher said.

Bartlett said a large window, a wall and a door were damaged in the incident.



## Alley honors Colleen Dewhurst

# 'Where's Dick?' among the fine arts events in May

May promises to be another busy month filled with theatrical goodies, so this week I'll briefly discuss what's happenin' on many of Houston's stages.

Probably the most exciting news this month is the world premiere presentation of "Where's Dick?," a comic opera that will be presented free this month at Miller Theater, in Hermann Park. This is the 17th consecutive year the Houston Grand Opera has presented Spring Opera Festival productions in the outdoor theater.

"Where's Dick?" is described by HGO as "an alternative opera set on Christmas Eve in a corrupt metropolis riddled with cheap crooks. The story follows Junior, a bumbling junior detective, in his search for his missing hero, Dick. The plot follows him through a series of comic strip-like adventures in a world completely populated by cheap crooks and thugs (based on characters of our own era)."

To give a feel for the zaniness of this opera, here's a descriptive list of the characters:

**JUNIOR:** Our detective...searching for Dick (Tracy, presumably). While chasing crooks on the subway, Junior meets and marries:

**FATE SPRITELY:** The eternal victim, she always carries a bridal veil in her purse just in case. She is captured as a ritual sacrifice for:

**BABY SNOWFLAKE:** A terrifying albino gorilla (a soprano in an ape suit). Every crook in the underworld trembles at her rage. Baby Snowflake is served virgin flesh by:

**THE TARNISH BROTHERS, STERLING & STAINLESS:** The pinstriped pawnbrokers of the underworld.

**CHIEF BLOWHARD & THE MOUTH:** The Punch and Judy of justice. A brutal lady police chief and a grotesque judge with a huge slurping mouth.

**REV. J.J. NEWRIGHT & SISTER IMMACULA:** Their "simple solution" to all who don't like the way the world is put together is to saw the complainers in half with their giant totemic saw and exchange their bottom halves. Their new temple of simplicity will be atop a tower being built by:

**STUMP TOWER:** The midget master builder who is knocking down half the city and rebuilding it in his own name. He is lowered on to the scene via a wrecking ball while smoking a fat stogie.

**MA PADDLE & SANTA:** A mean old granny with a paddle and a sadist in a Santa suit who stock their orphanage with brats like:

**LITTLE WILLIE:** A ventriloquist dummy whose mommy is:

**MRS. HEIMLICH:** A glamorous society mother who wants to buy a new kid, a "sporty model" she can bring to the club, and finally:

**BOLDFACE HEADLINES:** A living newspaper in Kabuki robes of black & white newspaper headlines. He alone knows the whereabouts of Dick, but he's not talking.

To see how these characters interrelate, stay tuned here for more on this comic treat, then head out for one or more of the eight performances of "Where's Dick?" scheduled between May 24 and June 3. Free tix available the day of the show.

Another wonderful comedy reviewed here a couple of weeks ago, "Wilde West," playing at Main Street Theater, has been extended for eleven performances, May 13-29. The play, a fantasy that pits British wit Oscar Wilde against western outlaws Jesse James and Belle Starr, has received unanimously rave reviews for its buoyant staging, genuine laughs and superb performances.

Houston actor, Paul Hope, recently seen



# Under pressure, Parkway Athletic Club shutting the doors

"We tried. We didn't succeed. There's nothing else to do."

With these words, Ron Pappa, manager of the Parkway Athletic Club, announced the closing for good of the community workout facility on Rosine Street.

It was long in coming, but not a surprise, just a disappointment, according to Pappa.

The gym was opened in 1986 by Mark Schmidt, who died of AIDS in Feb. 1988, leaving the club with large debts consisting mostly of unpaid rents and taxes.

The new owners were unaware of these debts, but were determined to pay them off when they discovered what was owed.

The major creditor was the FSLIC, a government agency which had taken over the property when its previous owners went bankrupt and leased the 37,500 square foot building to Schmidt.

The cost of operating the club was about \$18,000 a month, if rent was included. The new owners, hoping to negotiate the sale of the building from FSLIC, did not pay the rent of \$5,000 a month either.

Despite help from friends and exten-

sive promotion, the club could make no more than \$11,000 a month, not enough to stay in business. Membership was increased to 350, although many of these were month-to-month members who paid no initiation fee, thus leaving the club with limited assets.

Near the end of last month, FSLIC gave the club notice that it must settle all accounts or vacate the premises. FSLIC said it had a buyer for the property and would only sell the property on a total cash basis, something the club was unable to handle. Simultaneously, FSLIC took possession of the \$30-35,000 worth of gym equipment, leaving the Club with

nothing.

Facing unemployment are two fulltime and two part-time attendants, plus the manager. "We don't plan to open another gym," said Pappa. "I'm really going to miss the place. We wanted to do so much and mean so much to the community. It just wasn't to be."

Members will be refunded whatever is owed to them, Pappa said, and he is working with the YMCA and others to transfer membership to other gyms.

The gym closes May 15. One tenant, the People With AIDS Coalition, has been given until May 31 to vacate. It is seeking other space.
