President's Fund Exceeds '70 Goal

President's Fund Co-chairmen, Larry Fultz LLB '52 and Bill Morse, Jr. LLB '62, have announced that the 1970 campaign has exceeded its goal by more than 14%. "We set an ambitious goal for ourselves of \$60,000, and thanks to a highly successful November Telefund which raised \$22,000 in cash and pledges we were able to exceed that goal by more than \$8,000," Fultz commented. Co-chairman Bill Morse, Jr. added that the number of contributors as well as the amount of the average gift were up from last year also. "The number of alumni who pledged or contributed increased from 2,429 in 1969 to 2,660 in 1970. The average amount contributed or pledged increased from \$24.91 to \$25.82."

General Eugene J. Mincks headed

up the Telefund component of the 1970 campaign which raised \$19,450 more than the 1969 Telefund and over \$4,000 more than any Telefund in the history of the campaign. "We were fortunate to have many dedicated alumni who devoted much time and energy to make the Telefund the success that it was," Mincks said.

Both Fultz and Morse have agreed to serve as co-chairmen for the 1971 campaign and have indicated that they are pleased to see University of Houston alumni becoming active supporters of academic excellence at their alma mater. "At most other Universities in the country alumni are the mainstay of support. We are hopeful that the increase we have seen this year will be exceeded in 1971 and that our alumni will continue to take a greater interest in the University." "The unit chairmen for the 1971 campaign are all active alumni who have served the Alumni Federation and the University well in the past. Our Special Gifts Chairman is Ernie Schneider BBA '49. Ernie served in the Special Gifts unit in 1970 and was personally responsible for contributions exceeding \$1,000," Fultz said. "If we can get him to tell his secret for success to the Special Gifts workers this year the results should be quite impressive," Fultz added.

"Roy Phillips, Jr. has agreed to serve as Telefund Chairman. Roy was very active in the 1970 Telefund and hopes to improve on last year's record. General Mincks has agreed to serve as Campaign Advisor for 1971," Morse commented.

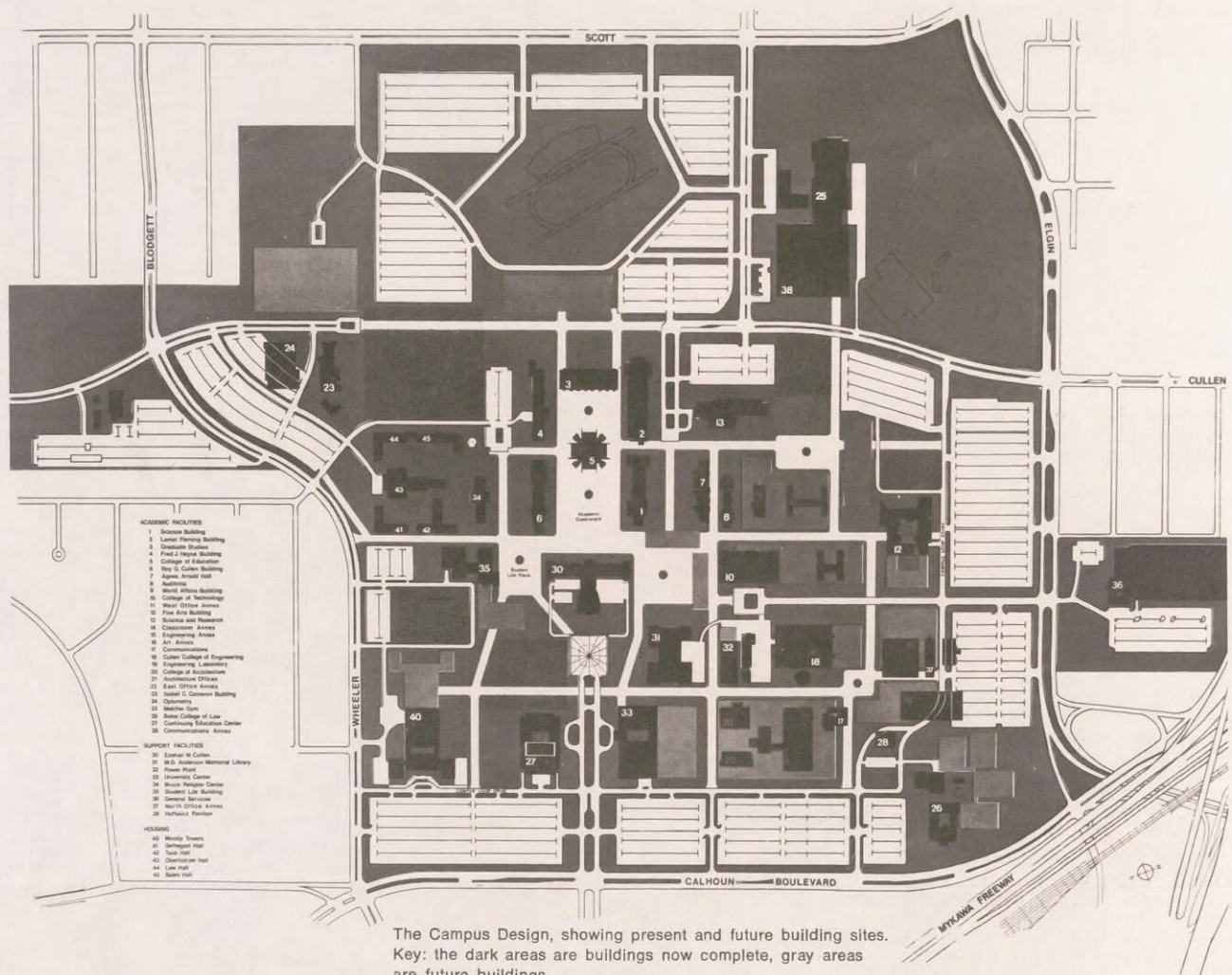

Campus Planning for the Seventies

The plan for the growth and development of the main campus of the University in the decade of the seventies is one of flexibility. Although definitive in its scope, the plan contains ample allowance for change and the incorporation of those ideas that will evolve in the educational and environmental program. While the plan must provide for the needs of the University as a whole, it must also stress the importance and dignity of the individual. Educational excellence in an optimum learning environment at a level of the individual, his group, and his University is the focus of this study and the challenge to the University and its planners.

The ever present construction projects on campus are elements of a plan for growth and change determined collectively by the Board of Regents, the administration, the faculty, the students and the professional staff of the Department of Facilities Planning and Construction. Each proposal is also considered in relation to its impact and purpose with the campus plan, the immediate University neighborhood and the greater Houston metropolitan area.

The 1960-70 period was a decade of rapid change on the University of Houston campus. As enrollment dou-

bled from 11,448 in 1960 to nearly 25,000 in 1970, twenty major new buildings were either completed or under construction, and more than \$65 million was spent on new facilities. From 1966 to 1970—in a single four year period—new buildings added to campus totaled almost two million square feet, nearly doubling the available space. Expansion of study programs extending through doctoral study created the need for a variety of facilities on the 306 acre main campus. Preparation of a comprehensive campus plan was initiated by the Board of Regents in 1965, and several recommendations contained in that plan have been realized. Responsibility for guiding the physical planning and construction of campus facilities rests with the Department of Facilities Planning and Construction, under the Vice-President, Facilities Planning and Operations, Coulson Tough. Divisions within this department include architectural services, campus planning, equipment planning, facilities programming, and construction management.

The traditional campus master plan was a picture to be copied, a fixed image, such as the original plan for the University of Houston conceived in the thirties. Static images do not

exist in planning an institution changing as rapidly as the University today.

Land Use

The foundation for the campus development is in the land use plan. It indicates the relative location of activity centers and locates desirable groupings of activities. The Ezekiel W. Cullen (administration) building and the M. D. Anderson Memorial library occupy a central location on the campus, easily accessible from other campus facilities.

To the south, toward Wheeler Street, student-oriented activities have been grouped—the Student Life Building, residence halls, recreational facilities, the A. D. Bruce Religion Center, the Health Center, and the Alumni Federation Offices.

The centroid of academic activity is presently near Agnes Arnold Hall, and with the addition of the College of Education Building and the Graduate Studies Building in the academic quadrangle, this area will become the most intensively used academic area on campus.

The buildings most frequently used by the public—the Hofheinz Pavilion, the University Center, the Continuing Education Center (proposed), and the Fine Arts Building (under construction)—have been located on the pe-

riphery of the central campus for convenient public access. Entrance 1, from Calhoun street will be given emphasis as the formal entrance to the campus.

The Landscape

Trees, shade, fountains, sculpture, good lighting. These are elements of the program to create useful, comfortable, and beautiful outdoor spaces. The Academic Quadrangle project will contain these elements and is but one of a proposed network of outdoor spaces consisting of plazas, pedestrian malls, and smaller courtyards. Already complete is the Student Life Plaza in an area which once was a creekbed fronting the old Cougar Den. Now it is a beautiful area of pools, a fountain, trees and careful landscaping. Several areas of the campus, such as the wooded area on Cullen and Wheeler have been designated as parks and will be left in their natural state. The periphery of the campus has been extensively landscaped in recent years with shrubs, hedges and flowers that enhance every approach to the campus.

Excellence in Architecture

Modern architecture has been the characteristic campus mode and uniformity is achieved without conformity to one design by using basic color ranges of exterior materials. The Bates College of Law is one of several examples of outstanding designs that has received awards as an innovative, imaginative and highly functional teaching unit. Agnes Arnold Hall, a seven-story general classroom building for the liberal arts has also been cited for awards in architecture and design, and buildings like the twin seventeen story dormitories that house

some 1,600 students, the University Center, the new Education Building, the beautiful and functional Hofheinz Pavilion, and the highly functional Science and Research Building are among the finest of such facilities on any university or college campus today.

Resources

During the fall of 1970 more than \$31 million in building projects were in the planning, programming, or construction stages. Construction projects totaling \$16 million were in progress. Funds for construction come from these sources: construction bonds financed through the student building use fee and taxes provided for in the Texas Constitution, federal grants and loans, and private contributions.

Branch Campuses

The Texas Coordinating Board has recommended an enrollment ceiling of 30,000 students for the University of Houston main campus and has recom-

mended the establishment of two branch campuses, one of which will be located in the Clear Lake area near the NASA-Manned Spacecraft Center on a 334 acre site owned by the University. The site for the second branch campus has not been selected. In addition, the University has established a graduate center adjacent to the proposed branch campus to serve the NASA-Clear Lake-Galveston Bay area, scheduled to open in the fall of 1975.

Distinctive Details

In addition to the major physical elements, the University has adopted a standard "graphic vocabulary" to identify the University whenever its name or seal is printed. These designs have been incorporated into a system of outdoor graphics which identifies the University at the edges of the campus. The graphic program also includes building identification, interior building graphics, exterior and interior directories and other directional information, and printed material distributed by the University. In accordance with the emphasis on the Calhoun street entrance 1 as the main entry to the campus, a \$10,000 Gatehouse and Information Center has been completed near the entry to allow any visitor easy access to obtain any information aid, or locations he desires without leaving his car.

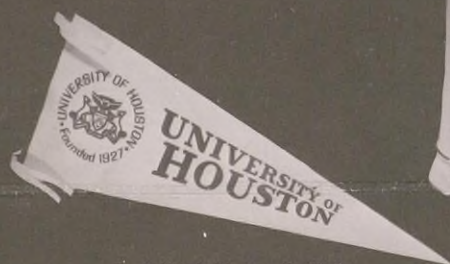

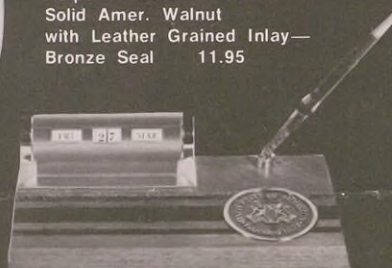
