UNITED FUND COMMITTEE SETS REFINERY GOAL AT \$41,000 FOR 1973 CAMPAIGN

The United Fund committee has set the goal for the 1973 Refinery campaign at \$41,000, a 7.9 per cent increase over last year's goal per employee.

Last year the Refinery raised \$47,000. The MTM Research Lab--Houston employees will contribute as part of the Research complex and will therefore not be included in the Refinery solicitation.

Chairmen Jack Cox and Hank Krebs will lead the committee in taking the campaign to the employees. In an innovative move, the committee has voted to hold an agency tour for solicitors who will be selected on a lottery basis. Details on the tour will be announced at a later date.

Committee members, who will be eager to help the solicitors and answer questions on the drive or the United Fund, include Joe Allen, Hershall Arnett, Marvin Benton, Bryant Briscoe, Don Chrismer, Ray Crawford, Wayne Dawson, Grover Dunn, Jim Fitzgerald, John Kindla, and Josie Ochoa.

The United Fund raises 38% of all voluntarily given monies in Harris County for health, welfare and character building services. The Fund is locally organized, controlled and administered by responsible civic leadership to spend money wisely and

where it is most needed. Money raised supports only the operating expenses of its agencies. Capital fund drives for building and remodeling are permitted after approval by the Fund. Agencies may sell products where the purchaser receives full value for his money.

When the United Fund was organized 50 years ago, it eliminated individual campaigns held by the agencies. Today, 43 agencies receive support from the Fund. One united campaign costs only 3% while separate drives can cost 10% to 50% of the money raised. Total operating and campaign costs of the Fund are only 7.8%, so that 92 cents of every dollar donated goes directly to the agencies.

The Harris County 1973 goal is \$10,800,000.

Newton K. Hoverstock, vice president & general manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, will head the Harris County UF campaign. In explaining the higher goal, he said that the "money gap" between the amount raised and the amount needed is continuing to widen. "Our goal of nearly \$11 million may seem like a staggering amount--until you consider the number of people served by the various UF agencies," he said.

HOW TO TELL IF A TORNADO IS NEAR

Think a tornado is coming?

Your television picture tube can readily warn you if one is near--even without tuning in to the weather report.

Here's how it works:

When a tornado possibility exists, tune your TV set to channel 13, darken the screen to the threshold of blackness, then switch to channel 2.

If the screen is white, or starts to turn white, head for shelter. A tornado is within 20 miles.

If horizontal white streaks show up across the screen on channel 2 and gradually widen, a dangerous storm is in the offing and you should seek safety immediately, since tornadoes often spawn from isolated violent thunderstorms.

An outside antenna is not necessary, but is said to expand the range of detection. Discovery of the method is credited to Newton Weller of West Des Moines, Iowa.


PENSIONER RAYMOND DIED AUGUST 9

William F. "Yankee" Raymond, pensioner, died Wednesday, August 9.


He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ruth M. Raymond, 10942 Invierno, Houston.
