Among those planning on attending is Eddie Sandifer, an official who is with the Mississippi Gay Alliance in Jackson, and who is also project director for the Gray (that's correct, gRay) Panthers of Jackson, an organization working for the betterment of senior citizens.

The Gay Archives of Texas, a project of the gay educational organization Interact/Houston, said it

would be sponsoring a video room Saturday, with continuous showings of gay films.

Coffeehouse 2 years old

Few surprises at McCoy's trial

The policeman accused in the killing of gay activist Fred Paez took the stand Thursday, Sept. 3, and revealed little additional information not already discussed prior to the trial.

Houston police officer Kevin McCoy, a four-year veteran, testified that he was not intoxicated on the night of the killing, June 28, 1980, and that Paez had struggled as he was being arrested, a struggle that, McCoy said, caused his pistol to accidentally discharge.

Gay leaders had earlier warned the community not to expect a guilty verdict.

McCoy, 26, was charged with negligent homicide in the killing of Paez, a misdemeanor case that is tried in felony court when the accused is a public official.

The trial began Tuesday, Sept. 1, after being postponed twice.

In other testimony, a Houston police training officer said the way McCoy handled the arrest, after Paez was said to have made a sexual advance at McCoy and officer S.A. Cain, was not necessarily the safest way to do it.

Training officer A.R. Skoczen said, "We try to teach them to do it the safest way ... but every situation is different."

According to the defense, after Paez was said to have groped McCoy, McCoy rapidly turned Paez around, put his gun to Paez's head and began to search him. Paez immediately struggled and the gun discharged, they said.

Prosecutor Brian Rains, an assistant district attorney, attempted to

show that McCoy was intoxicated. Witnesses, including Gay Political Caucus president Lee Harrington, testified that it was not in Paez's nature to make blatant sexual advances, as McCoy and Cain said he did.

The defense brought out though that Paez was a "police buff" and had two guns in his car at the time of his death—factors the defense thought disproved Paez's "non-aggressive" nature.

Viewing the court procedures were several dozen police officers, in uniform, as well as several Montrose community leaders. The presiding judge in the state district court was a visiting judge, Van Stovall.

Cain was with McCoy the night of the killing as McCoy was working an off duty job when Paez was said to driven by several times.

Cain testified that he had seven beers that evening and McCoy had five. They claimed this was not enough to intoxicate them.

Paez was an administrative assistant with GPC and had written a pamphlet on how to act when being arrested. He advised readers not to resist, even if the arrest was wrong.

Prosecuting attorney Rains said he expected the trial to last anywhere from a few days to a week.

The October 15, 1980 indictment says McCoy, "while under the influence of an alcoholic beverage, placed a cocked, loaded pistol against the head of (Paez) and as a result thereof said pistol dis-

charged," killing Paez.

Paez death came just during Gay Pride Week 1980 and prompted the wearing of black armbands at that year's Gay Pride Parade and the political rally in Spotts Park.

The misdemeanor charge is punishable by a year in prison and a \$2000 fine.

Judge clears way for challenge to Oklahoma anti-gay bill

OKLAHOMA CITY—A Federal judge last month denied a motion by the Oklahoma City Board of Education to dismiss a National Gay Task Force complaint, so this clears the way for a constitutional challenge to Oklahoma's anti-gay teacher bill, known as the Helm bill.

Federal Judge Luther B. Eubanks ordered the dismissal of the challenge to the suit August 4.

The law is a carbon copy of the Briggs' Initiative in California which was defeated by voters there in 1978. The bill disqualifies for public employment all homosexual teachers, as well as those non-gay persons who advocate gay rights.

NGTF is represented in this case by William Rogers of the Oklahoma Civil Liberties Union and Don Knutson of Gay Rights Advocates, a San Francisco based public interest law firm.

The case is scheduled to be tried on summary judgement early this winter.

Don't let the smoke get in your eyes



New Kinsey study on homosexuality

NEW YORK—A major new study of homosexuals by the Kinsey Institute for Sex Research has found little or no support for most of the traditional theories about the origins of homosexuality.

The main limitation of the new study is its methodology, relying as it does on memories of selected subjects as to their earliest sexual feelings, as well as on a statistical technique called Path Analysis that is subject to misuse.

Researchers Dr. Alan Bell, Martin S. Weinberg, and Sue Kiefer Hammersmith concluded that homosexual orientation does not seem to emerge, as is the popular belief, because parents affect the child's sexual orientation. Rather they think that homosexual orientation usually emerges from a deep-seated predisposition, possibly biological in origin, that first appears as a failure to conform to society's stereotype of what it means to be a boy or a girl.

Bell said he expected the report to be condemned by both sides—"by the radical gays, for even looking into the subject, and by the analysts who may say we're trying to paint a glowing picture of homosexuality."

The study of nearly 1500 people indicates that parents' role in a child's sexual orientation has been "grossly exaggerated" as have theories that homosexuality results from a lack of heterosexual opportunities or from traumatic heterosexual experiences.

The report at one point says: "You may supply your sons with footballs and your daughters with dolls, but no one can guarantee that they will enjoy them. In short, to concerned parents we cannot recommend anything beyond the care, sympathy, and devotion that good parents presumably lavish on all their children anyway."

The study notes that gender non-conformity does not necessarily signal future homosexuality. One-fourth of the heterosexual men were non-conforming as youngsters, and only one-third of the heterosexual women described themselves as "highly feminine" in childhood.

Perhaps the researchers' most stereotype-shaking conclusion was the following:

"Homosexuality is as deeply ingrained as heterosexuality" and behavioral and social differences between prehomosexuals "reflect or express, rather than cause," their eventual sexual preference.

Some findings:

Those who eventually became exclusive homosexuals did not have fewer heterosexual dating experiences, nor were they more likely to have been traumatized by an early heterosexual experience or seduced by an older homosexual. Rather, the main difference was that homosexuals were less likely to have enjoyed their youthful heterosexual encounters.

Prehomosexual boys felt and acted "different" from other boys and thus felt isolated from their peers.

Homosexual feelings almost always preceded homosexual activity by several years. For males, the urges often emerged before the teen years.



Gays still face bias but image has changed

LOS ANGELES—In what comes as less of a surprise to gay people than to non-gays, a report by a group of psychologists reveals that the position of homosexuals in American society still subjects them to discrimination in housing, employment, military service, and many other social spheres.

According to the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues, the stereotype of the homosexual has changed in the past five years, but the image that remains is still negative.

The public used to perceive homosexuals as "dark, shadowy creatures on skid row who are weak and spineless" and now they are perceived as "strong, assertive businessmen who all live on Nob Hill surrounded by chandeliers," said William Paul, a member of the study group, which presented its findings at the 87th annual American Psychological Association convention in Los Angeles.

The 22-member panel was organized four years ago.

Among the panel's findings were the following:

- Major advances have been made in passing laws to protect homosexuals in the last ten years.
- Public attitudes are steadily becoming more positive.
- However, violent attacks on gays are

increasing, and the upsurge of anti-gay campaigns pose a threat to their full acceptance in society.

Spokesman Paul said that "psychological warfare propaganda is being used in present campaigns against gay people. We are in the midst of a hate campaign and this isn't simply a vestige of the past."

The results of this panel's study are considerably different from the recent Kinsey one. The psychologists' panel said that homosexuality seems to be a mixture of biology and the demands of evolution.

"There is no valid basis in biology for regarding homosexuality as a disease, as maladaptive or as unnatural," said James Weinrich, who directed the biology division of the study group. IGNA



Lesbian judge appointed

SAN FRANCISCO—The nation's first openly-lesbian judge has been appointed to the Municipal Court of San Francisco by Gov. Jerry Brown.

Mary Morgan, a prominent gay rights attorney, was appointed to replace Judge Raymond Arata, who was elevated to Superior Court.

Ms. Morgan was quoted by reporter Randy Shilts in *The San Francisco Chronicle*: "I think it's absolutely a step forward for the gay and lesbian community. I think it's important to have more lesbians and gays visible in our society so people can see there's not an enormous difference between us and we don't have anything to fear from each other."

Brown appointed the first openly-gay male judge two years ago.

The press release announcing Morgan's appointment made no mention of her sexual orientation.

In her application for the judgeship, Morgan said that she has lived in a stable relationship with another woman for five years. She also noted that two-thirds of her clients are women, many of them gay women.

She will earn \$57,231 per year as a Municipal Judge.
