

We feel it fitting on this first occasion for the National Collegiate golf tournament to be held in the state of Texas that special tribute be paid a man whose tireless efforts helped popularize the sport of golf in the colleges and universities of our nation, the late Fred Cobb of North Texas State College.

Golf enthusiasts throughout the country mourned his death in the early spring, shortly after the season began.

His record as golf coach at North Texas State is a remarkable one. Cobb began building the Eagles as a national power in college golf shortly after World War II. After a 13th place finish in 1947, the Eagles took tenth place in 1948. Then they began a string of four consecutive national team titles that was not broken until last summer when the Eagles finished fifth by a narrow five strokes behind champion Stanford in a closely matched team competition.


During his tenure at North Texas State, Cobb developed many splendid golfers. Achieving the greatest fame

was Bill Maxwell, who won the National Amateur title while still a student in 1951. Joe Conrad, a teammate of Maxwell's, was state amateur champion of Texas, and there were many more standout performers who came under the guidance of this man who so greatly loved the game of golf. The present squad, entered in the tournament at Brae Burn, is the last group of "Fred Cobb's boys." Now ably directed by Herb Ferrill of the North Texas athletic staff, such stars as Marion Hiskey (semi-finalist in the National Collegiate last year), Ray Ferguson, Stan Mosel, Benny Castloo, Max Wilkinson, and A. J. Triggs started the campaign under Cobb.


Veteran N.C.A.A. golf committee chairman Ted Payerse ably summarizes a tribute with these words: "Fred Cobb was in the national collegiate golf picture for many years. He was an officer in the National Golf Coaches Association over a long period, and president of that group in 1952. ## The Defending Champs

In 1953 Stanford University annexed its sixth national Collegiate golf championship in history, and its fourth clear-cut title since the NCAA became the tournament sponsor in 1939. In breaking North Texas' four consecutive championships, Stanford became the leader in team championships since NCAA sponsorship, with four titles (1939, 41, 46, and 53) and a co-championship (tied L.S.U. in 1942).

The Maxwell Team Trophy was returned to Stanford after a seven year absence by these individual performances: Grant Spaeth 71-68—139; Warren Dailey 71-70—141; Fred Brown 74-73—147; Stewart Ledbetter 77-74—151.

Stanford's team total of 578 was two strokes better than North Carolina's 580. Other team scores in the closest of all NCAA Golf Championships were L.S.U. 581, Oklahoma A&M 582, and North Texas 583.

Stroking his putter and irons with smooth precision, rugged Earl Moeller of St. Louis, representing Oklahoma A&M, won the individual championship of the 56th annual NCAA golf tournament with a 3 and 2 decision over William Williamson of North Carolina. Moeller had advanced to the finals with a 1-up win over William Penn (Texas) in the semi-finals, following a 5-4 victory over Louis Woodworth (Northwestern) in the quarterfinal round.

# The Championship Course

(Description by D. G. Williams, University of Houston Golf Coach)

No. 1  
Par 4 425 Yards  
Dogleg to left; bayou to left and front of large green; fairway sandtrap on right about 230 yards from tee; sandtrap to right of green; trees on left and right near bayou.

No. 2  
Par 3 171 Yards  
Bayou in front of green and parallel on left; trees on both sides of fairway and over green; sandtrap to right of green.

No. 3  
Par 4 382 Yards  
Dogleg to left; trees on left; sandtraps on right and left of green.

No. 4  
Par 5 534 Yards  
Straightaway; out of bounds on left; trees on right; bayou about 75 yards in front and to left of green.

No. 5  
Par 4 392 Yards  
Dogleg to right; out of bounds and fairway sandtrap on left; deep sandtraps on left on right of green.

No. 6  
Par 4 422 Yards  
Bayous on left and back of green; Deep traps on left and right side of green.

No. 7  
Par 3 138 Yards  
Trees on both sides of fairway; bayous on left and over green; sandtraps on both sides of green.

No. 8  
Par 4 355 Yards  
Slight dogleg to right; out of bounds on left and over green; sandtraps on both sides of green; trees on right.

No. 9  
Par 5 510 Yards  
Parallel out of bounds on left; fairway traps about 200 yards on right, 230 yards on left and 70 yards from the green on the right; deep trap to left of green.

No. 10  
Par 4 379 Yards  
Parallel street to left but not out of bounds; fairway traps about 200 yards on right; sandtraps on both sides of greens.

No. 11  
Par 3 213 Yards  
Out of bounds on left; lake on right; shrubbery about ten yards over green.

No. 12  
Par 4 377 Yards  
Parallel ditch and out of bounds on left; lake and fairway trap on right; extra long narrow green with sandtraps on right and left.

No. 13  
Par 4 370 Yards  
Ditch and out bounds on left; bayous in front and to left of green; trees on both sides converge near the bayou in front of green; deep sandtrap to right of green.

No. 14  
Par 5 483 Yards  
Out of bounds on left; fairway sandtrap 235 yards on left, and lake on right; trees on right side of fairway 130 yards from green; deep sandtrap to right of green.

No. 15  
Par 4 377 Yards  
Slight dogleg to right; trees on left and right; deep sandtraps in front and to the right of green; trees 15 yards over green.

No. 16  
Par 3 202 Yards  
Trees on right and bayou on left of very narrow fairway; deep sandtraps in front and to right of green; trees 10 yards over green.

No. 17  
Par 5 541 Yards  
Trees on both sides of fairway and lake to the left; fairway sandtrap on right about 160 yards and 140 yards; sandtrap to right of green.

No. 18  
Par 4 415 Yards  
Lake about 200 yards on left of fairway that can be driven with about 240 yards carry; fairway sandtrap about 30 yards from green on the right; sandtrap to right of green; bayous over the green and to the left.

Sunday, June 20—There will be an EAST-WEST Exhibition Best Ball Match starting at 1:00 by a selected group of stars representing each section. There will be a Driving Contest starting at 4:00 p.m. Each school limited to one representative.

## NUMBER OF QUALIFIERS

The 64 lowest scores for the 36 holes of qualifying play shall be eligible for the match play rounds. Any tie for the lowest score shall be decided by an 18-hole playoff at the convenience of those tied. Any ties for the last place or places in the championship flight shall be decided by a hole-by-hole play-off.
