
ANNUAL CREDIT UNION MEETING

LOST TIME INJURY AGAIN STOPS SAFETY SIGN

A lost time injury Friday has stopped the Safety Sign once again.

The incident occurred in mid-afternoon in an operating area. The employee was taking a propane sample using a metal cylinder. The propane flashed - possibly from static electricity and caused first and second degree

burns to the man's hands, neck, wrists, and head. After an overnight stay in the hospital, he was allowed to go home where he is expected to remain for a 2-3 week period of recuperation.

Once again, we have been fortunate that the severity of the injury was not as serious

HERE'S PROCEDURE FOR USING CHEMICAL PLANT NORTH ENTRANCE

A guard is on duty each normal workday, Monday through Friday, at the North Gate to the Chemical Plant from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. During the times when this gate is unattended, anyone desiring entrance to the Plant should contact the Main Gatehouse at the Chemical Plant by using the telephone on the North side of the North fence just East of the gate. This is a direct telephone connection and does not require dialing.
