EMERGENCY HSM BENEFITS AMENDED

The Shell Hospital Surgical Medical Program provides, in case of accident, for payment up to \$500 for hospital emergency room charges billed by the hospital. However, the Program has not, in the past, covered charges for non-surgical treatment billed separately by an attending physician who is not on the hospital staff.

Effective July 1, 1967, the Program has been amended to permit separate payment of charges, up to a maximum of \$20, for treatment rendered by an outside physician where the hospital does not provide a staff physician for emergency room treatment. Surgery charges, if any, will continue to be covered under the Surgical Schedule.





SHELL OIL COMPANY TO DRILL MILLION DOLLAR DEEP WILDCAT WELL IN HILL COUNTY

Shell Oil Company has announced that drilling will begin soon on a deep wildcat test well in Hill County. Site of the proposed well is about two miles south of Hubbard, Texas, in the Stephen Grenwell Survey Abstract 337.

Expected to cost more than a million dollars, the well will be drilled on a large acre lease block acquired by Shell following extensive seismic work in the area.

Named the Mrs. E. W. Barrett No. 1, the Paleozoic wildcat test will be drilled to a depth of approximately 15,000 feet.



