## INDUSTRY REPRESENTATIVES READY FOR ANY DISASTER AFTER CIMA DRILL

Three representatives of the Refinery's Safety section attended the annual Channel Industries Mutual Aid (CIMA) drill at the nearby Tenneco Chemical Plant recently.

CIMA is an organization of industries and governmental agencies such as Shell's Refinery and Chemical Plant and the Coast Guard and Civil Defense which maintain personnel trained in fire fighting and emergency first aid procedure. It is a mutual aid society formed in 1955 to help any member organization cope with an emergency beyond the control of its own resources. An emergency radio network connecting members is maintained and used to issue and answer calls for assistance.

Fire crews from several member industries including J. B. Floyd, L. N. Mancuso and W. L. Carraway from the Refinery, demonstrated methods for fighting different fires. Water, dry powder, and chemical foam were used during the drill which also included a first aid demonstration. Fire trucks and other emergency equipment from numerous channel area industries and approximately 100 fire fighters were present.

## REFINERY, CHEMICAL PARTICIPATE IN DP FALL FESTIVAL WITH EXHIBIT



**STOUFFER INN SCHEDULED AS SECOND STRUCTURE FOR TIFFANY CENTRO**

A luxurious 600-room Stouffer Inn recently became the second major structure scheduled for Tiffany Centro, Shell's land development project at Kansas City. Plans for a commercial and banking facility were announced earlier.

The new inn, a high-rise structure to be built in two stages, will be located on a 13.5-acre site. A rooftop luxury restaurant and lounge, and large ballroom and meeting room facilities are included in the plans, which are scaled to accommodate convention groups of up to 1,000.

The 80-acre Tiffany Centro project, which was based on an economic study and projections by the Stanford Research Institute, will eventually include additional office buildings, a plaza, and other commercial facilities. It is located three miles south of the new \$240 million Kansas City International Airport, scheduled to open in mid 1972.


Tiffany Centro is sponsored by Plaza del Oro Corporation, a wholly owned subsidiary of Shell Oil Company.



**SHELL CREDIT CARDS TO BE REISSUED PROVIDING LIABILITY SAFEGUARDS**

This month Shell credit card holders will begin receiving new cards. The card has been redesigned and will contain two significant changes..A customer signature strip and an expiration date.

The signature strip conforms with federal legislation regarding the liability of cardholders for unauthorized purchases made with a lost or stolen card. Under the new law, the cardholder cannot be held liable for unauthorized purchases unless a signature strip is provided on the card. With the new Shell card, liability will remain at a maximum of \$50 for unauthorized purchases made prior to notification that the card is missing. Most major competitors have started, or will soon start, to issue new credit cards with similar signature identification.

The new expiration date will help in controlling bad debt and fraud losses. It also will help eliminate the large number of never-active cards and those reported lost or stolen but still in circulation.

Estimates are that six months may be required to completely reissue cards to Shell's several million accounts. New card expiration dates will vary upward from six months in order to maintain a smooth operation in Tulsa.
