SAFE DRIVER AWARDS ANNOUNCED; SIX HOUSTON REFINERY EMPLOYEES WIN

The top winners in the Shell Employee Safe Driver Award Program were announced.

Mrs. Joyce C. McCormick, wife of R. E. McCormick of the New Orleans Data Center, is winner of the first award, a 1968 Mercury Cougar automobile.

T. G. Pitts of the Columbia District of the Southern Marketing Region, is winner of the second award, \$1,000 in cash.

Six Houston Refinery employees and an employee wife were among the 400 winners of \$5 each. The six are B. E. Daniels, Locomotive Operator - Dispatching; W. E. Carrington, Machinist No. 1, Engineering Field; Russell J. Holecek, Group Leader, Research; C. F. Magee, Operator No. 1, Utilities; A. M. Yannazzo, Interviewer, P&IR; and Camella Tesoro, wife of J. Tesoro, Sr. Clerk, Engineering Services.

More than 14,000 employees participated in the program which was set up last Spring following announcement of a national safe driver award program in which employees were not eligible to participate. Employees and their families became eligible for awards by sending in a Safe Driving Pledge. Winners of the awards had to be accident free from May 23, 1967, until the announcement of the awards. Any winners who have taken the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course will have their awards doubled.

GASOLINE TAXES CONTINUE TO RISE

Motorists will pay at least 64 million dollars more this year in gasoline taxes as the result of another round of state-level increases. The National Highway Users Conference has reported increases in several states so far, and pending increases in others. These new increases are in marked contrast to gasoline prices, which are about the same as they were--before taxes--a decade ago.

Most of the increased taxes have affected motorists in the Western states. Washington has increased its levy from 7.5 to nine cents a gallon, becoming the state with the highest gasoline tax. Montana's gasoline tax went from six to 6.5 cents a gallon; New Mexico increased its levy from six to seven cents; Wyoming from five to six cents; Connecticut from six to seven cents; Illinois from five to six cents; and Minnesota from six to seven cents.

Virtual certainties are an increase in Michigan and a measure before the Texas Legislature that will authorize municipalities to levy separate taxes of up to five cents a gallon more. The present Texas State gasoline tax is five cents a gallon, one of the nation's lowest.



