Team Entries, Players, Coaches

(Names of players will be incomplete due to early release of brochure).

Alabama University—Coached by Dick Pride. Finished well in the Southern Intercollegiate last year and was 3rd in the SEC. Tom O'Mellia finished well individually in the Southern the past year. This will be Alabama's first year to play in the All-America.

Arizona State University—Coached by Fanny Markham. Champions of the Border Conference three of the past four years. Team will be led by Rex Wilsen, former State Amateur Champion of Arizona . . . and numerous other tournaments.

Baylor University—Coached by Odis Beck. Coach Beck says this will be one of his strongest teams. One of his players will be Bruce Bangart, the Waco City Champion. Ray Stoker and Adair Ratcliff are due to see plenty of action also. Baylor is always strong. They finished 10th in the All-America last year and 9th in the NCAA in 1960.

Florida State University—Coached by Bill Odeneal. This will be Florida State's first year to play in the All-America. They are always very tough. They finished 7th in the Southern last year and have finished very high in the NCAA several times. Two of their players that played well last year include Downing Gray and Dick Dunlap.

Florida University—Coached by Conrad Rehling. They won the Florida and Miami intercollegiates in 1960. Two members of their team will include All-American Frank Beard and Harry Root who went to the 5th round of the National Amateur in 1960. Frank won both the Miami and Florida Intercollegiate tournaments last year.

Florida will have one of the finest teams in the country this year. They were second in the SEC last year and fourth in the NCAA in 1960.

Hardin-Simmons University—Coached by Bill Scott. They won the Abilene Intercollegiates last year. The team will be led by one of the finest players in the country—Jerry Mobley. Jerry was third in qualifying for the NCAA in 1960 and lost a very close 1 up match to Deane Beman of Maryland the present National Amateur Champion. Gale Shed is due to get out of the service in time to join the team for this season play and should strengthen the team very much.

Houston University—Coached by Dave Williams. All-America and NCAA defending Champions. Team will be composed of Richard Crawford, Homero Blancas, Joel Goldstrand and Kermit Zarley. Babe Hiskey and Ron Weber are due to push the other four for the privilege of playing in this tournament. Richard Crawford has won the NCAA the past two years, the Colonial and Southern Amateur titles in 1959, the Tucker Intercollegiate in 1959 and finished 4th in the Houston Classic in 1960. Homero Blancas is the All-America defending Co-Champion, the Texas State Open Champion and the Houston City Champion. He finished 7th in the Southern, 3rd in the Border Olympics, 2nd in the Tucker and was a member of the NCAA championship team of 1960. Joel Goldstrand won the Tucker, was 3rd at Lake Charles, finished in a tie for fourth at the Southern, and was fifth in the Texas State Open in 1960. Kermit Zarley tied for third in the Tucker and tied for second in the Washington State Open in 1960. He won the National Hearst Junior title in 1958.

LSU—Mike Barbato has resigned as Coach of the team and has accepted a pro job at a country club in New Orleans. The team should be very strong this year despite the loss of one of their all time great players, Don Essig who graduated the past year. They set a new record in winning the SEC last year and also won the Southern very handily. They won by 10 shots over a very fine field. They also won the All-America Team Match Play, Low Four Ball, Low Two Ball and tied for the Individual

Championship the past year. Don Essig and Sam Carmichael won the Low Two Ball Championship the past two years. They had a wonderful team last year and would have had a very good chance to win the NCAA if they had played there. Three players on the team are due to play here again this year. They are Sam Carmichael, Howell Fraser, and Jacky O'Neil. Sam was low qualifier for the National Open in his section, won the Indiana Junior, Indiana State Amateur and the Indiana State Open in 1960. Howell Fraser won the 1959 Florida State Open, finished 7th in the All-America and tied for fourth in the Southern in 1960. He is one of the finest and most consistent players in the country. Jacky O'Neil won several tournaments this past summer and furnished the All-America with the most fantastic and crucial shot ever last year for his team to win the Team Match Play Championship. He held a wedge on the last hole for an eagle. It was a very dramatic shot which tournament followers down through the years will never forget. He was a very happy boy along with his teammates and Coach Mike. Jacky had to eagle the hole for his team to win and that he did.

New Mexico University—Coached by Dick McGuire. Champions of the Skyline Conference the past four years. Finished 5th in the All-America and 2nd in the Tucker last year. Their team will probably consist of Vic Kline, Paul Rost, Jim Abbott and Jerry Truax. Vic Kline finished in a tie for 8th in the All-America and in a tie for 6th in the Tucker last year. He is a wonderful player and has won several tournaments the past year and seems to be improving each year. Jerry Truax, Jim Abbot and Paul Rost are fine players which gives New Mexico a well balanced team.

North Texas State—Coached by Herb Ferrill. Coach Ferrill says his team will have much more depth this year and should be very strong. He is expecting wonderful things from Dick Smith who played very well last year in many tournaments. Dick won the fall school tournament. Elgie Seamster, a former Texas State High school champion will also be on hand and Frank Luke, Bill Garrett, John Kendzior, Jerry Holmes and Bobby Greenwood will be competing for the other two spots. North Texas finished 2nd in the Missouri Valley Conference, 3rd in the Southern and 6th in the All-America in 1960.

Oklahoma State—Coached by Labron Harris. Team was runner-up in the NCAA, 3rd in the All-America, 2nd in the Colorado College, won the Big Eight Championship setting a new record in 1960. This 1961 team should be the best team Oklahoma State has ever had in its history and that includes many many fine teams. The team will consist of the following players. Jim Wright, Labron Harris, Jr., Cotton Dunn, Dickie Cannon, Terry Wilcox and James Harris. Jim Wright has made the All-America Team the past two years, has won the Big Eight Championship the past two years, won the Colorado College

Championship in 1959, and was 1958 National Eisenhower Junior Champion. Labron Harris, Jr. won the Western Junior Championship, was semifinalist in Trans-Mississippi, tied for 2nd with Tommy Aaron for 72 holes of qualifying for the Western Amateur and tied for ninth in the qualifying for the NCAA in 1960. Dickie Cannon was runner-up for the Texas State Amateur in 1958, Terry Wilcox went to the fifth round of the National Amateur in 1959. James Harris has won numerous tournaments in Oklahoma the past four years. Cotton Dunn won the USGA National Junior championship in 1955.

Oklahoma University—Coached by Bob James. Team finished 2nd in the Oklahoma Intercollegiates and upset Oklahoma St. in a match in 1960. Team is improving fast and should give a fine account of themselves in this tournament.

Rice University—Coached by Jim Deal. Team improving each year and will be led by Dave Larson and Leigh Masterson. Dave and Leigh were runner-up in the Golfcrest 4 ball championship in 1960. They will probably play together this year and should be in contention for the Low Two Ball Championship.

SMU—Coached by Graham Ross. Coach Ross says his team will be improved over last year. Two of the members of the team will include Ross Teter and Jack Little. Both are very fine players and have won several tournaments.

Stephen F. Austin—Coached by Red Conkright. Team won the Ft. Worth Recreational Intercollegiates last year. This is one of the oldest collegiate tournaments in the country. Team will be led by Ray Brewer who has won several tournaments and has been a very consistent player for SFA for two years. This is the first time they have played in the tournament.

Texas A&M—Coached by Henry Ransom. Champions of the Southwest Conference, finished 5th in All-America and 6th in NCAA, and 2nd in Border Olympics in 1960. This should be the strongest team Texas A&M has ever had. They have plenty of depth and some real fine players. Their team will probably be made up of Billy Martindale, Dickie Duble, John Lively and Ralph Johnston. Billy Martindale was seventh in qualifying in the NCAA and has always finished high in the SWC and is former National Hearst Junior Champion. He also won the school tournament of 288 holes this fall . . . finishing 13 under par. Dickie Duble finished 2nd in the 288 holes of qualifying. He is a former Houston National Junior Champion. John Lively tied for the Southwest Conference in 1960, Ralph Johnston led the qualifying for the National Amateur sectional qualifying in New York City in 1960 and won the New York City Junior Championship in 1958 and 1959.

Texas Tech—Coached by Jay McClure. Team should be improved over last year. They are always strong. Team won the SWC in 1959 . . . and placed in the top ten in the NCAA in 1959 . . . and also won the West Texas Relays and Ft. Worth Recreational Championships in 1959. Team will be led by two members that have both won the New Mexico State Amateur Championship in years past. They are Chris Blocker and Don Nix. Chris was a member of the Texas Cup team in 1960.

Texas University—Coached by Harvey Penick. Team is improving fast and will give a good account of themselves in this tournament. Team will be led by Terry Dill. Terry tied for the Southwest Conference Championship and was quarter-finalist in the NCAA in 1960.

Western Illinois—Coached by Harry Mussatto. Team won the N.A.I.A. championship in 1959. Team will be chosen from the following boys. Dave Huske, Pat McElwee, Lenny Fiocca, Raymond Barnhart, Bill Brick and Rich Myers. Dave Huske has won the Chicago Junior and the Illinois state high school championships. Lenny Fiocca finished very high in the National Jaycee championships in years past. Rich Myers holds the course record at the school. Raymond Barnhart was runner-up in the Illinois state high school championship in 1958. Bill Brick has finished high in the Conference the past two years.

Yale University—Coached by Al Wilson. Team won the Eastern Intercollegiates last year and has always been a great golf power since they won the first National Intercollegiate Championship in 1897. Their team will be led by Phil Lobstein who was a very outstanding junior player. Phil was semifinalist in the National USGA Junior Championship in 1957 and won the Texas Jaycee Championship the same year. This is the first year Yale University has played in the tournament.

Explanation of the Six Championships and Awards

TEAM MEDAL PLAY

Each member of the four man teams scores will be added up and the teams will be rated 1 through 20 as to which teams have the least number of strokes.

Award: The Houston Post's Marion Hiskey Trophy will go to the winning team.

TEAM MATCH PLAY

The 20 teams will qualify the first 18 holes to determine the Championship Flight, First Flight and 2nd Flight. The first eight teams in medal play will make up the Championship Flight, the next eight will make up the 1st Flight, the next four will make up the 2nd Flight. The Championship Flight and the First Flight will play regular 8 team brackets for the championship . . . and winners will play winners and losers play losers each day till places one through 8 are determined in each flight. The remaining four teams will play each other in a round robin with the total number of points determining the winner of the 2nd flight. The teams are rated 1 through 20 in Team Match Play.

Award: The Houston Chronicle's Fred Cobb Trophy is awarded to the winner of the Championship Flight. Other trophies will be awarded to the teams that win the other flights.

TEAM LOW FOUR BALL

This team championship is determined by the best ball of the four team members for 72 holes. The lowest score each member of the team has on a hole is the score that is counted for the team on that particular hole. Teams are rated 1 through 20.

Award: A beautiful trophy is awarded to the school that the team represents.

TEAM LOW TWO BALL

Each team has a number one team (1 and 2 men) and a number 2 team (3 and 4 men). Their low ball as a team over 72 holes determines the championship. Teams are rated 1 through 40.

Award: A beautiful trophy is awarded to the school that the winning team represents.

INDIVIDUAL

Each contestant plays 72 holes and the lowest score in medal play competition is the champion.

Award: The Austin-American Statesman's Morris Williams Jr. Trophy is awarded to the school that the Individual represents.

The Willie Maguire Trophy is awarded to the Individual to keep for himself.

The top four finishers will receive a trophy.

OVERALL

Points are given for the first 10 places in each of the championships listed above. The team that has the highest total points is the Championship Team of the Tournament and is called the Overall Champion. The teams are rated 1 through 20.

Awards: Teams 1 through 6 will receive a beautiful tray for the school's trophy case and the place they finish will be engraved on the tray.

Teams that finish in the top ten will receive 5 beautiful practice bags. Four for the players and one for the coach.

The following scoring system will be used for the Overall Championship. The points for the 1st ten places are as follows:

Team Match and Team Medal Play—25, 18, 12, 8, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1.

Team Low Four Ball—20, 15, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 3, 2, 1.

Team Low Two Ball and Individual Medal Play—18, 15, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 3, 2, 1.

MARION HISKEY AWARD

The Marion Hiskey Trophy is presented annually to the Team Medal Champion by the HOUSTON POST in honor of the late Marion Hiskey. Marion was one of America's outstanding collegiate golfers while at North Texas State from 1952 through 1954. He was killed in an Air Force plane crash in 1956.

FRED COBB TROPHY

The Fred Cobb Trophy is presented annually to the Team Match Play Champion by the HOUSTON CHRONICLE in honor of the late Fred Cobb. He was golf coach of four national championship teams at North Texas State College.

MORRIS WILLIAMS, JR. TROPHY

The Morris Williams, Jr., Trophy is given annually to the school that the individual champion represents by the AUSTIN AMERICAN STATESMAN. It is given in honor of the late Morris Williams, Jr., who was an outstanding player at the University of Texas.

WILLIE MAGUIRE TROPHY

The Willie Maguire Trophy is given to the Individual Champion. It is given in honor of the late Willie Maguire who was Head Professional at Houston Country Club for many years and made many outstanding contributions to golf in this area.

Collegiate Golf Notes

An All-America All Time Team based on past performances in this tournament would include this six man team. JACKY CUPIT—Won in '58, 2nd in '59 4th in '60; DON ESSIG—9th in '58, 1st in '59, tied for 1st in '60; JIM HISKEY—4th in '56, 1st in '57, 3rd in '58; REX BAXTER—3rd in '56, 2nd in '57; WALLY BRADLEY—1st in '55; and JIM MANGUM—1st in '56.

Despite the number of great players who have played in this tournament, only eight players have shot par or better for four rounds. They include: Jim Mangum, L.S.U.; Kirby Attwell, Texas; John Garrett, Rice; Juan Estrada, North Texas; and Jim Hiskey, Rex Baxter, Wally Bradley, and Frank Wharton of Houston.

The college golfer is somewhat unique when compared to other members of athletic teams. He has to supply his own golf balls, golf clubs, shoes, uniform (some schools have started furnishing them shirts and caps now), provide his own transportation to and from the golf course, his work outs often last for five or six hours . . . and most of the times he doesn't have a coach telling him he HAS to do this or that.

The All-America is always played during the week before Easter Sunday so team members will miss a minimum of school.

Junior golf is really growing these days and one of the reasons is improvement of college golf programs. Kids are looking forward to the day when they will get a chance to go to some university and play on the golf team.

Pine Forest Country Club, located just off North Shepherd in Houston, was built in 1946. Dudley Bell is the host pro and has been since the club's opening.

The four top finishers in this year's individual play will be invited to play in 1961 Texas Open and will be exempt from qualifying.

Plans are being made for an All-America Golf Sweetheart contest. Twenty girls representing twenty organizations from the U. of H. will be nominated. Each girl will serve as hostess for one of the teams. The Sweetheart will be selected by the student body and announced the last day of the tournament.

Mr. Loy Holman, sports writer of the Colorado Springs Gazette Telegraph newspaper should get the 1960 Golf Prognosticator Award of the year. After the first day of play of the NCAA Individual Championship play . . . he predicted . . . Jack Nicklaus, who had just finished 2nd in the National Open four days previous, would get beat in an early round. He said Deane Beman, the 1959 British Amateur Champion and present National Amateur Champion would go to the semifinals and there he would get beat by Richard Crawford. He also predicted that Richard Crawford would then go ahead and win the tournament. Four predictions and they all came to pass . . . and in a match play tournament. This has got to be a record . . . and Mr. Loy Holman should get all the awards . . . for prognostications.

The article is safely pasted in a scrapbook for it will

be hard for anyone to believe it without seeing it with the date of the paper next to his column . . . and to add a little more drama to the predictions . . . Richard was 6 down with 17 holes to play in the finals and still won.

The finish of the Team match play finals in the All-America last year was the most exciting and best golf that you could ever want to see. It surpassed the great golf seen in 1955 when North Texas and Houston went down to the wire for the championship. On that occasion there were 7 birdies and one par on Number 18, and the match ended in a tie for the Match Play Championship and Houston won on Medal Play. Last year there were 6 birdies, one par and one eagle . . . and oh what an eagle. Jacky O'Neil of LSU held a wedge . . . and his team won over Houston 3½ to 2½. A birdie would have given Houston a tie with LSU and Houston would have won on the Medal Play.

Although the team championships are very exciting . . . the Individual Championship should prove very exciting. There are at least 60 players entered that are fully capable of winning the Individual title. With the entry of this exceptional group of wonderful players . . . keen competition should prevail which should please the players and the spectators.

For the first time this year plans are being made to have bleachers and concession stands available for the convenience of the galleries.




