

## Houstonians to Speak at Paris AIDS Conference

Michael B. Wilson, M.Ed., president emeritus of the AIDS Foundation Houston, and Bill A. Scott, M.S.W., clinical director of the Montrose Counseling Center, will be representing Houston at an international conference in Paris, France, this month.

The two Houston representatives have been invited to make a presentation and assist in a workshop panel at the upcoming International Conference on AIDS 1986 being held at the Palais des Congress June 22-25. Wilson and Scott will be speaking on Houston's AIDS risk reduction program (i.e., disease prevention strategies) from 1982 to 1985. Houston's program has been recognized as an innovative forerunner of many similar programs now being emulated internationally.

Although controversial locally, Houston's "Play Safe" promotion campaign among the at-risk populations for AIDS showed a decrease in AIDS-related diseases among the high risk group.

Concurrent surveys demonstrated significant behavioral changes in the target populations.

Air fair to Paris, conference registration fees, and other expenses have been donated from various sources so that agency funds, which are limited, have not been used to finance the trip. No other educational or social service program will be impaired because of the decision to attend the conference and share Houston's successful experience with the world.

Dr. Peter W. A. Mansell of UT-M.D. Anderson Hospital will be attending the Paris conference also; he will be chairing a session on AIDS and cancer. Dr. Mansell, Houston's leading AIDS researcher, served on the planning committee which organized the Paris conference.

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



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

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# 'Brandi West' Found, Arrested

On Monday, June 16, John Clifford Youens, 32, known as "Brandi West," was arrested on a federal warrant for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. He is facing a murder charge in the slashing death of his roommate, Patrice Ann LeBlanc, 20.

Authorities said LeBlanc had been cut 31 times and repeatedly stabbed in what has been classified as a "rage" killing. Her body was then bound in a comforter and weighted with concrete blocks before being thrown into Lake Livingston, authorities said.

Youens maintains he is innocent of the murder.

Youens, known across Texas for his comic talents and female impersonation, could not be found by authorities the day after LeBlanc's remains were positively identified. A grand jury indictment was issued for Youens on May 14, more than a month later.

He had told authorities prior to his disappearance that he had not seen LeBlanc since mid-March when the two stayed at his parent's weekend retreat near Lake Livingston.

Authorities said that LeBlanc came to Houston from Lafayette, La., in 1984 and moved into Youens condominium on Cummins Lane the

following October in a platonic relationship. Authorities have theorized that Youens may have felt differently about the relationship.

Since Youens disappearance, officials were hampered in locating him because he could easily alter his appearance. A nationwide search then ensued on possible sightings of him in Dallas, New York, Los Angeles and other cities.

He was arrested at his parents' house in the 600 block of Bayland.

Justice of the Peace Mide Jeffrey in San Jacinto County arraigned Youens and set bond at \$200,000, Sheriff R.E. Brumley said.


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# AIDS Foundation Kicking Off Pledge Campaign

On June 20 the AIDS Foundation, Houston, kicks off its \$100,000 pledge campaign. Donors can contribute by using the pledge cards found in the community publications.

Foundation sponsors can commit their support at the pledge tables set up at area bars. The Friday, June 20 "kickoff" starts with the Galleon from 7:00 p.m. to midnight and with Mary's Lounge, naturally, from 9:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. At these two bars, tables will be marked by the Foundation's banner and will be staffed by trained Foundation volunteers.

The Foundation will gladly accept one-time contributions. For the donor's tax purposes receipts will be provided.

Ads run in the community papers will chart the rise of pledges to the \$100,000 mark. The campaign will run through August 31.

Of the total pledge goal, \$35,000 will be earmarked for education. Funds are needed to continue educational programs to target populations and to the general community. Special emphasis will be given to school and corporate educational

programs. Monies also will be used to disseminate information about AIDS related complex and health maintenance.

The remainder of the pledge goal, \$65,000, will be used for direct services to the Foundation's 150 clients, including the residence program at MacAdory House. To better serve those clients, the Foundation is trying to obtain low-income housing through an agreement with an apartment complex. In this way, more clients can be assisted with greater cost efficiency.


The Foundation continues to see an increased demand for cost of living assistance. The pledge campaign hopefully will help provide the financial resources to meet these demands.

Curtis Dickson, the Foundation's executive director, commenting on the pledge campaign said, "Our goal is to service all 150 of our clients in the greatest capacity that we can and to continue our educational programs as well. With the lack of United Way funding and the reduction of our FOCUSS percentage to 35%, I appeal to the community to pledge its support."



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# Insurance Regulators' Task Force Condemns Anti-Gay Discrimination

The National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) has taken an important step towards banning anti-gay discrimination by insurance companies. Responding to the efforts of National Gay Rights Advocates and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the NAIC's AIDS Advisory Committee has recommended a national prohibition against anti-gay insurance discrimination.

The guidelines were based on a proposal drawn up earlier by NGRA attorney and committee member Benjamin Schatz.

Mr. Schatz, director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project, said that "the recommendations forbid both discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and other methods that insurance companies have used to screen out gay men. Thus, insurance companies can't use one's marital status, zip code, gender or beneficiary as a pretext for anti-gay discrimination."

NGRA Executive Director Jean O'Leary said: "This is an important move, and a tribute to the strength

of the gay and lesbian community. It is especially impressive that the committee was unanimous in its opposition to discrimination."

The NAIC, American's organization of state insurance regulators, formed its AIDS Advisory Committee in February, 1986, to help formulate national policy on AIDS-related insurance issues. Committee members include insurance commissioners, representatives of major insurance companies and gay community leaders Benjamin Schatz and Jeffrey Levi.

Levi, executive director of NGLTF, said: "We will continue to work with the committee on such issues as discrimination, confidentiality and HTLV-III antibody testing."

Representatives from community organizations were there to discuss in detail each particular event in this year's schedule, including the parade and Spotts Park rally.

In addition to the gay media, television and radio stations attended. Larry Bagneris, veteran of Gay Pride Week planning in the past, once again has moved into the position of parade coordinator, a spot position vacated last week by Tony Vega.

Bagneris said he has now closed the parade to any additional entries. He said that there are now over 50 entries in this year's parade.

All persons with entries in the event are required to attend a parade meeting this Wednesday, 7:30pm, at the Dignity Center, he said.


NA is a non-profit fellowship or society of men and women for whom drugs had become a major problem.

"We are recovered addicts who meet regularly to help each other stay clean. The meeting in question is the only gay/lesbian NA meeting in metropolitan Houston," stated a press release.

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## Finances Was Main Topic at HOBO Meeting

On Wednesday, June 18, the Houston Organization of Bar Owners (BOAT) held their June meeting at "Just" Marion and Lynns, with the main topic being the present financial woes of the Bar Owners Association of Texas (BOAT).

"Member bars of BOAT who pay their dues late are partially responsible for the current crisis," said Alan Pierce, HOBO president. In addition to an annual fee of \$300 to become a member of the organization, bar owners commit themselves to monthly dues of .005% of gross sales as reported to TABC.

The funds are used to keep the group able to pay, among other expenses, lobbyist Bettie Naylor.

Ms. Naylor has made great strides in the past to keep legislation down that could potentially damage the barowners business, they said. Usual monthly expenses can run as much as \$5000 per month.

BOAT's financial woes were compounded last week when Frank Caven of Caven enterprises pulled out of the group at a directors meeting in Corpus Cristi. Caven owns nine bars in the state of Texas, predominantly high-volume businesses and cited an "inadequate return on his investment" and stating that such a small percentage of bars were carrying the load for all.

In regular business HOBO decided to offer a reward of \$500 to anyone for the arrest and conviction of the person(s) involved in the arson that occurred at Michael's on Westheimer last month, and a \$100 reward for the arrest of the persons responsible for mugging Bill Brown last week on Pacific Street.

The suspects in the mugging were Hispanic, in their 20, and on bicycles.

Plans are also progressing for the Pacific Street Carnival to be held this fall on the 700 and 800 blocks of Pacific. All plans and petitions are being submitted to the City of Houston for approval. The event is to be, as one member put it, "like the Art Festival, but with more class."

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
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

**A new kind of rubber is lubricated with a germ-killing solution—does it work on AIDS?**

Most medical experts feel that rubbers offer some protection against all sexually transmitted diseases. You are probably referring to nonoxynol-9, which is used to prevent conception by killing sperm. In laboratory tests, it has been shown to kill the HTLV-III virus. It has not

yet been tested in people to see if it has the same effect. It is felt that these new rubbers don't do any harm, but the amount of protection they offer is uncertain. They are certainly not a substitute for safe sex practices!

**If I test positive on the AIDS test, when will I start getting sick?**

First of all, the test you are referring to (HTLV-III/LAV) is not a test for AIDS. It can only tell if you have antibodies to the AIDS virus. If you have been exposed to the AIDS virus, you will develop antibodies. This does not mean that you will ever get AIDS.

Conservative estimates are that up to 10% of people who get positive results on the AIDS antibody test will go on to develop AIDS. Which means that around 90% of all the people tested positive for the AIDS antibody have not developed AIDS as of this time. But keep in mind that at this time, it is assumed that those who test positive to the AIDS antibody (even if they do not have AIDS) are infectious carriers of the virus.

At this time it appears that most of the people who do get sick do so within 18-24 months, although longer periods have been documented.

# What's the Purpose of the Westheimer 'Police Station'

Dear Councilman Greanias:

There appears to be a misconception in the gay community about the nature of the police community service center on Westheimer. It seems to be very busy in the evenings. I have often seen several police cars parked there. I understand, though, that the facility is neither a substation nor a dispatch center. Please explain the difference.

The murder of Marion Pantzer and the rash of unsolved bar robberies have seriously concerned the community. What is the purpose of having a gathering place for police officers in the center of Montrose if our police protection is not improved?

Dear Ms. Parker:

The murder of Marion Pantzer was a hard blow for all of us. The death also provided a shocking reminder of the need for police protection in the Montrose. Therefore, I appreciate the opportunity you have given me to explain the role of the Montrose Community Service Center.

The Montrose Community Service Center, located at Crocker and Westheimer just across from Tila's, was established through neighborhood efforts to promote a better working relationship between the community and the police department. The intent of the storefront police station is not so much to provide more on-the-street officers, but to provide a place in the community where the public can receive non-emergency assistance.

All the services available through the Community Services Division of the Police Department—such as rape prevention courses, burglary prevention instruction and neighborhood watch program information—are available at the storefront station. Also available are personnel to assist in the filing of accident reports. By providing these services at the Community Service Center, officers are freed up for patrol functions and dispatchers are kept available for the taking of emergency calls.

As you note, a storefront police station is not a substation. A substation is a regional police office to which all officers in the particular district report for roll call at the start, and where they check out at the close of each shift. Although substations have jail cells, prisoners are not taken there except in unusual situations, usually involving manpower shortages. For the most part, people arrested by the police are taken downtown to 61 Riesner Street.

A storefront is also not a dispatch center. Police are dispatched from a central office located, again, at 61 Riesner Street. Police are not supposed to wait either at a substation or a storefront police station for calls. Instead, once they have reported in at the start of a shift, they are supposed to be out on patrol, receiving dispatch calls on their car radios.

Although the role of the storefront police station is therefore quite different from that of a substation or the central office dispatch center, it remains a busy place. Between December 17, 1985, when the Montrose storefront opened, and April 30, 1986, 506 incident reports, including accident reports, were filed. There were 1,106 visits by citizens seeking information. Approximately 516 community service presentations were made to different groups throughout the community. Over 51,000 citizens participated in presentations given by police based at the storefront station before schools, civic clubs and other organizations.

This record of achievement is impressive. More important, in talking with some of the officers who work at or have come in contact with the Montrose storefront police station, it is clear that this office is having a positive effect on the way many police view Montrose and the gay community. Through the daily contact encouraged by the storefront environment, many police are becoming more aware that gays are no different from anyone else in their desire for a safe, secure city. Some are also becoming aware of, and sensitive to, some of the special security concerns among the gay community.

Not everything is perfect, though. The tragic shooting of Marion Pantzer and the problems that were encountered in getting police help that night reminds us that there is still a lot of work to be done. No doubt you saw the recent stories in the daily newspapers about the number of calls not being answered by the dispatch division due to manpower shortages. During the current budget review process, one of the key questions to the police department will be how it plans to remedy this serious personnel problem.

In addition, we want to find out whether the mayor's proposed budget, if adopted, would divert

more officers out of Montrose. We are also working on some complaints we have received about individual service-related problems experienced at the storefront office, as well as ongoing concerns that have been expressed about the number of police cars parked at the storefront from time to time.

At the same time, however, the great majority of police officers are working hard. Having spoken with several officers involved in the investigation of Marion's death, I know of the energy and commitment that went into that investigation. I am sure that many of those officers were frustrated by their inability, for reasons of security, not to discuss their efforts publicly. But all of us have the satisfaction of knowing that one suspect has been apprehended and that HPD is on the trail of the other.

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

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# Paul Green's 'Symphonic Dramas' are Large Scale Historic Pageants

Forty nine years ago, Paul Green wrote the first of what he called his "symphonic dramas," *The Lost Colony*. These are large scale historic pageants. In their heyday, there were 20 of them scattered across the country. Unfortunately that number has dwindled down to six being produced this year. Fortunately, we are in reasonable driving distance of two of them.

*Texas*, up in Palo Duro Canyon, tells of the effect on the settlers on the coming of the railroad. Of the three that I have seen, it has the best special effects.

*The Lone Star*, on Galveston Island about 10 minutes drive west from Stewart Beach, details the Texan war of independence from Mexico. It has the most full-bodied, well-rounded characterizations of all of them. Our founding fathers were a fascinating, cantankerous lot and they have been caught in action by a master playwright. (Green won the Pulitzer for *In Abraham's Bosom*, one of his indoor dramas.)

Starting with the 1983 season, this show had all new music and

lyrics by Mark Janas. It is played by the London Symphony and is reminiscent of another composer who used that orchestra, John Williams. Like William's music, this score captures the full fury of war in every optimistic romantic way. The only song I know of by Williams, "Can You Read My Mind?" is however a horrible embarrassment.

Not so with Jana's songs. "Sound the Call," my favorite, is rousing; "Liberty" is inspiring and "Gone to Texas," though a little long-winded, is especially playful.

There is only one flaw in this production, but it is a major one. Director Denton tries too hard to lighten up the proceedings. The action-adventure story gets padded and diluted with extraneous matter.

The opening number is the only chance for singing and dancing before the war begins. It's also important for introducing the non-historical characters. But the narrator is correct when he says 15 minutes into the play, "Now at the beginning of our story," Yockley has done some judicious cutting in this number but much more needs to be done. Some of what got cut gets reinserted at the top of act two

where it makes absolutely no sense whatsoever and nearly ruins the collective mood.

Then after pounding relentlessly toward it for so long, the battle of San Jacinto is played for laughs. From a cosmic point of view, seeing a rag tag fleeing bunch of yahoos so swiftly defeat the pride of Santa Annas regulars probably was funny. It makes sense for the Mexicans to shrug off the first few shots as stray sharpshooters. And no one knows what happened between the first volleys and the end of the battle. Yet I sincerely doubt that any Mexican was decapitated by his own grand piano. Fight director Michael Cantrell should blush—he's too good to let that one get through.

At the same time, Yockey's treatment of the serious parts was so good that I might feel this schizophrenic approach might have been forced upon him, perhaps by producer James Stocker.

There are three black powder cannons, five horses and around one hundred people in the cast. There are forty one with names to them. This is a vast panorama. I am only going to name a few of those without whom this evening wouldn't have the excitement it certainly does have: Yockey (he also stars as Sam Houston), Steven Horn, Ann H. Forgy, John Preston, Julie Griffin, Tony Kiener, Brenda Chassey, John Jones, Lester Purry, Robert Hart, Carol VanCleeve, Gene Ogle, Dominic Abney, Joseph Hupp, Janie Jordan, and Richard Crowell (who falls from the top of the Alamo).

Aside from Jarre, this is the best way I've seen to celebrate the sesquicentennial. Three Cheers.

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


