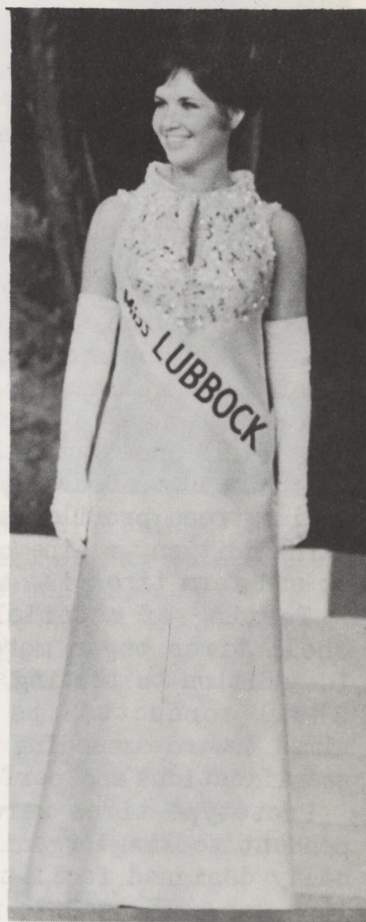

MISS TEXAS PAGEANT INVITES PEGGY KINCANNON, ENGINEER'S DAUGHTER, TO PERFORM AT CONTEST

Peggy Kincannon, first-runner-up in the 1969 Miss Texas contest, is readying for another pageant. This time she will appear as a guest performer at the 1970 Miss Texas pageant in Fort Worth, July 9-12.

The daughter of C. B. Kincannon, Senior Engineer, Technological, talented Peggy is the former Miss Lubbock. She was recently cited by Lubbock Jaycees and the Chamber of Commerce for being an outstanding diplomat for their city. At the end of her reign, she received a certificate of merit for her work in representing the city in different activities across the state and in the Miss Texas Pageant, a preliminary step in the Miss America contest. In addition, she received a large hand-painted color photo of herself.

The new line includes five grades of passenger car tires:

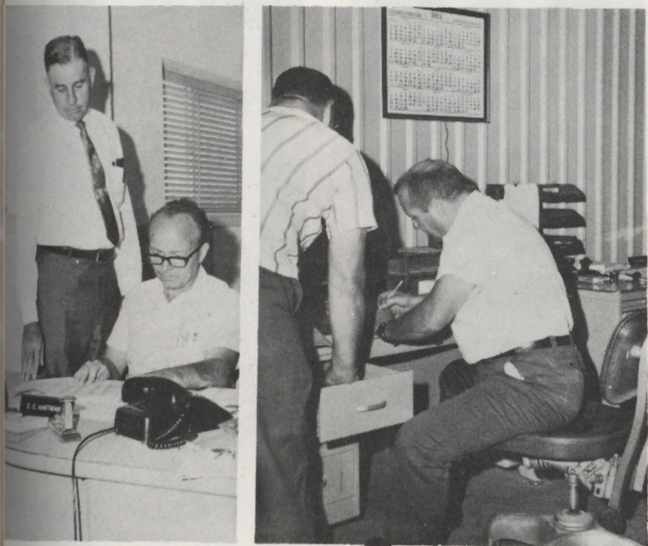
o Super Shell HP 40, a high-performance wide oval. It features two bias belts of heavy fiber glass cord and two full plies of strong polyester cord.

o Super Shell Premium 30, a cool-running tire featuring four-ply polyester cord. It has 8,400 traction edges and the deepest tread in the line.

o Shellmiler, a quality-tread tire featuring four-ply nylon cord construction, a flexible shoulder rib for longer tread life, and concave molding to reduce heat buildup.

o Shellrider, a low cost tire featuring four-ply nylon cord construction, a special tread design for good traction and handling on curves, and deep tread for good mileage.

o Shell Snowshoe, the line's snow tire, which features four-ply nylon construction, a wide tread profile, and concave molding.

In addition, a line of Shell-branded truck and farm tires is available.

Testing of materials and design of the Shell tires began more than two years ago. In addition to testing by tire fabricators, Shell conducted its own testing program aimed toward exceeding current Federal tire specifications and performance standards.

Prototype tires were tested by an independent testing organization on scientifically designed facilities. The Shell tire line was subjected to more than eight million miles of indoor wheel and outdoor road and track tests. Tests were also made in temperature-controlled laboratories where the most advanced tire-testing equipment is used.

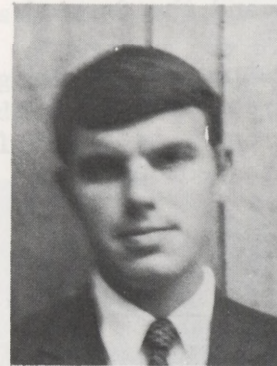

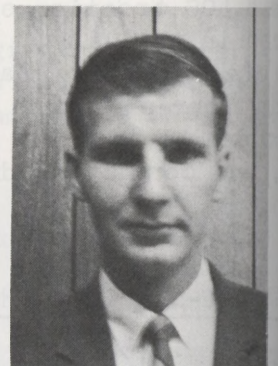
A senior secondary education major at Texas Tech, Peggy has done several television commercials at a station in Lubbock. Many of her friends also ask her to sing at their weddings.

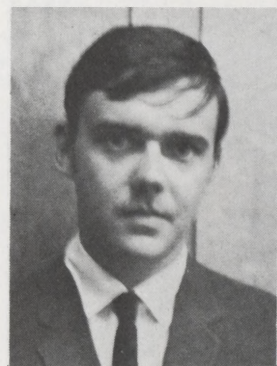

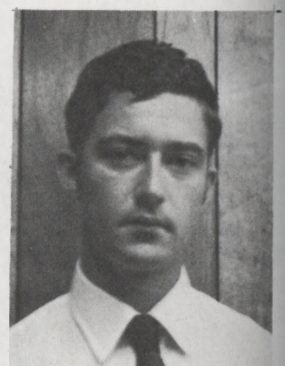

15,000 ITEMS NOW HOUSED UNDER ONE ROOF IN PURCHASING-STORES' NEW WAREHOUSE BUILDING

Parts and equipment for general refinery operation, numbering about 15,000 items, are now located under one roof in the new Purchasing-Stores Warehouse.

Upon the move March 1, warehouse items including direct charge and capital account material, were consolidated and transferred from six different locations around the plant.

E. W. Herrington, Material Control Supervisor, said that any warehouse item can now be found in the 33,000 square-foot building or in the material yard.

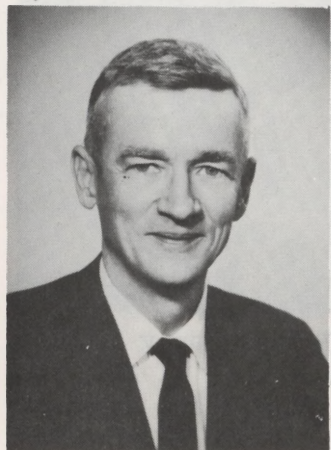
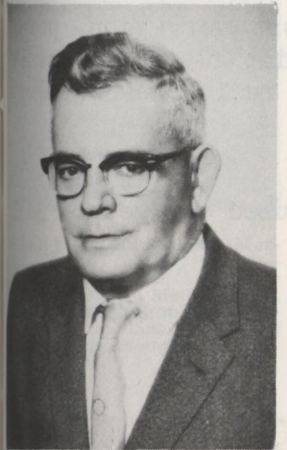
"This new building is not only cool, but comfortable," said Herrington. The major warehouse section was formerly located in an older facility west of the automotive section.

The new building also has two recessed loading docks a few feet below ground level for easier loading and unloading from trucks and two ground level docks.



SPACIOUS BUILDING--The new Warehouse has 33,000 feet for Refinery equipment.

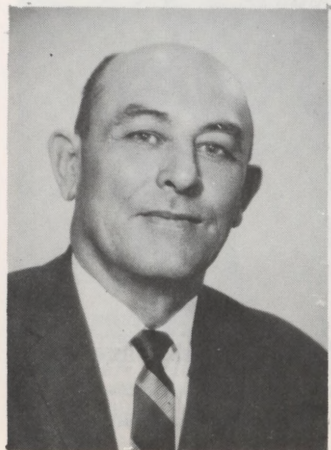
