AS HOUSTON LIVESTOCK SHOW VICE-PRESIDENT





As a convenience to Houston Refiners and their families, the "fine print" about the Shell Safe Driver Awards program for employees is given at the left below. Remember, that there are two awards programs--one for employees and one for the public. The main thing to keep in mind is that employees must send their entries to the special address: P. O. Box 12 D, Mount Vernon, New York 10559. Rules for the public program are below the right, so Refiners will be informed about that program and therefore will be able to answer questions about the contest.

**SHELL SAFE DRIVER AWARDS  
OFFICIAL RULES**

**EMPLOYEES AWARDS**

1. Only employees of Shell Oil, its affiliates and subsidiaries in the United States and their immediate families are eligible to participate. This means you (employee), your spouse, children, parents, brothers and sisters living in the same household. If your children, parents, brothers and sisters live in another household they may only enter the main program (General Public Awards).
2. Shell pensioners are NOT eligible for the employees awards program. They must enter the main awards (General Public Awards) program.
3. Employees and those in the employee category, must live in the United States and hold a valid U.S. driving license.
4. Because the awards are made for safe driving, winners must not have had any accidents or moving violations from May 23, 1967, until the announcement of the awards. In other words, if you have had an accident or a moving violation between May 23, 1967, and the time the award winners are announced, you will NOT be eligible to win the award.
5. AWARDS FOR EMPLOYEES ARE AS FOLLOWS: First place award for employees will be a brand-new 1968 Mercury Cougar. Second Award will be \$1,000 in cash. There will be 400 awards of \$5 each. These awards are void where prohibited, taxed to sponsor, or restricted by law.
6. All awards will be doubled if any winners have taken the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course prior to the drawing.
7. To enter the employee awards program, you may send in a Safe Driving Pledge available at any Shell dealer, or you may use the test form from Shell's National Drivers Test TV program. You must, however, send the pledges or forms to the special address below:

They cannot be deposited at Shell service stations.
8. Entries must be postmarked by August 1, 1967, and received by the judges no later than August 7, 1967. Award winners will be notified by mail no later than September 30, 1967.
9. Winners will be selected by random drawing by the Reuben H. Donnelley Corporation, official judges, and their selection will be final. Awards will be made to qualified winners on the basis of position drawn. Only one award per person.

**GENERAL PUBLIC AWARDS**

1. Shell Oil Company Safe Driver Awards are open to all licensed automobile drivers living in the U.S.A.
2. All applications for the Shell Safe Driver Awards must be submitted on official Safe Driver Pledge forms obtainable from your local Shell Dealer. Or, simply sign your name and address on your answer sheet used in taking the 1967 National Drivers Test on CBS Television (May 23 in most areas). The answer sheet can be the official form available in newspapers or from various other sources or a plain piece of paper.
3. Your signed answer sheet or official Safe Driver Pledge form may be given to your local Shell Dealer for forwarding to the Safe Driver Award Headquarters, or you may mail your answer sheet or pledge form yourself to Shell Safe Driver Awards, P. O. Box 40F, Mount Vernon, New York 10559. Applications must be postmarked by August 1, 1967, and received by the official judges no later than August 7, 1967.
4. To be eligible to receive an award, you must have driven safely with no record of an accident or moving traffic violation since May 23, 1967.
5. Winners will be selected by random drawing by the Reuben H. Donnelley Corporation, official judges, and their selection will be final. Awards will be made to qualified winners on the basis of position drawn. Only one award per person. Qualified award winners will be notified by mail no later than September 30, 1967.
6. Awards to qualified winners will be as follows:  
GRAND AWARD - \$10,000 Cash  
Next 20 Awards - 1968 Mercury Cougar  
Next 10,000 Awards - \$5 Cash  
In addition, if a qualified winner has successfully completed the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course, he will receive double the award.
8. Shell Safe Driver Awards are void wherever prohibited, taxed to sponsor or restricted by law. Employees of Shell Oil Company, its subsidiary and affiliated companies, its advertising agencies, or The Reuben H. Donnelley Corporation and their families are not eligible to win. No purchase of any kind is required to win a Shell Safe Driver Award. Winners are liable for any applicable taxes. All entries become the property of Shell Oil Company and cannot be returned.

**Blender, Radio or Wrenches Offered To Shell Oil Credit Card Customers**

Shell Oil Company's first 1967 promotional credit card mailing has recently gone to almost three million card holders. As in past mailings, which have proven extremely successful, name brand items of high value are being offered to credit card customers.

Shell employees with a credit card will receive a colorful brochure describing a Ram Wrench Set. This is a 33-piece socket, open and box wrench set. The total cost is \$21.89.

Following the procedure set last year, Shell employees are welcome to order the merchandise by processing a regular order card, although they are not eligible for prizes offered in the sweepstakes contest described in the mailing.

In addition to the regular Wrench Set credit card mailing, two other offerings are being mailed. These items may also be purchased by Shell employees. One item is the Hamilton Beach Electric Cookbook Blender that was offered to Shell employees last fall. The appliance has two speeds, carries a five-year guarantee, and comes with a 50-page recipe book. It costs \$17.52.

Also being offered is a Longines Symphonette World-Traveler four-band (AM, FM, marine and short wave), 15-transistor portable radio. An AC-DC adapter is available as an option. The radio costs \$42.46, the adapter is \$5.00.

SOMETHING FOR THE LADIES: FONDUE

Do you know the national dish of Switzerland? Answer: Fondue. No wonder that the Swiss - who love a cozy, intimate atmosphere - have selected Fondue as their national dish. It is known as the meal of friendship "par excellence".

The following recipe for Fondue was submitted by one of the Refinery gals who returned not too long ago from a trip to Switzerland. She thought that perhaps some of the other Refinery ladies and wives might be interested.

Items needed: Saucepan with a handle, made in earthenware or in enameled cast-iron or steel; an alcohol stove (burner) with an adjustable flame. Optional - Fondue forks with insulated handles and very sharp prongs.

Recipe: Proportions per person - 6-7 oz. Swiss cheese either grated or cut into thin strips. 6-8 oz. white bread cut into cubes; 1/6 of a pint of dry white wine; 1 teaspoon lemon juice; 1 clove of garlic; 2 teaspoons of cornstarch; 1 jigger of kirsch or some other hard liquor; spices: pepper, nutmeg, paprika, as desired. Rub clove of garlic on inside of saucepan; pour in wine and lemon juice and heat with strong flame until mixture is hot; add cheese, stirring all the time with a wooden spoon. When this mixture starts to cook, add the cornstarch which should be diluted in jigger of kirsch or other liquid. Let cook for another 2 or 3 minutes. Season as desired with the spices. It is then ready for your guests to take a piece of the cubed bread on the prong of their fork and dip it into the thick, creamy substance.

There is a Golden Rule when eating Fondue: The person who drops a piece of bread into the Fondue has to present a bottle to the company or has to organize the next Fondue evening. Ladies have to pay for their clumsiness by giving a kiss to all the other guests.




