## New conservative government will affect gay rights movement

Right-wing conservatives hand-in-hand with fundamental religionists will have a major impact on the political tone of the country—an impact that will slow the gay rights movement at least for the next few years.

Liberal leaders, including some who were defeated in elections Nov. 4, are predicting—hoping—that the pendulum will soon swing left again after the country has had a taste of right-wing government.

Conservative Republican forces captured the White House and the U.S. Senate in the Nov. 4 election and made strong gains in the U.S. House. A coalition between conservative Democrats and newly-elected conservative Republicans gives the right wing complete control of the Executive and Legislative branches of the U.S. government. The third branch of government, the judicial, remains in liberal control for the time being, but retiring judges will be replaced by appointments from the White House.

What caused the right wing shift? How permanent and how extreme will its consequences be?

The "Moral Majority" and three other similar groups wasted no time after the voting in announcing their "hit list" for the 1982 elections and to tell those conservatives that were just put into office, "You better hew the line."

Vice-president elect George Bush, who was accepted but never embraced by the new political right, has become the first to counter their vocal threats with his own.

"I'm not intimidated by those who suggest I'd better hew the line. The hell with it," Bush said at a news conference in Houston Nov. 10.

"I don't need any advice from these people. They don't scare me a bit."

Reagan, however, responded differently. "I'm not going to separate myself from the people who elected us," he said.

Television evangelist Jerry Falwell is "those people." He expects the new President to "produce." Falwell is head of Moral Majority and proclaims what he calls a "pro-family" doctrine. There is no room for homosexuals in this doctrine.

Falwell claims the Republican election sweep marks the beginning of an overhaul of laws dealing with the group's pet projects: abortion, pornography, prayer in schools and gay rights.

What caused the new-right shift?

Dr. Andrew Miracle, a Texas Christian University anthropologist in Fort Worth, says, simply, the economy. People elected a conservative government for the sake of the economy, not for the sake of so-called moral issues.

Miracle said political activism by groups like Moral Majority stems from confusion between the problems of recession and inflation.

"The causes of the problems are complex and hard to understand. This is very frustrating," he told UPI.

In these frustrating times, people look for simple answers, he said. And these simple answers are amply supplied by the "Christian right."

"The fundamentalist are

saying, 'Do as we say, vote as we say, and God will look favorably on us and solve all of our problems,'" Miracle said.

The yearn for quick and easy answers by turning to "other worldly" solutions in time of great social stress is nothing new for society.

"During the 1930s the radio preachers were big. People were looking for answers during the depression and these people supplied them," he said.

How long will the new right hold power?

The most damaging blow to the new right will be an improved economy, said Miracle, adding that economic recovery will take away a lot of the frustration that is fueling interest in the groups.

The backlash against the mixture of religion and politics began prior to the election. Leaders of 13 major U.S. religious groups, including the United Church of Christ, United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and top officials from the Lutheran Council U.S.A., charged in October that those like Falwell were being "unfaithful to the fullness of the biblical witness."

"We do not simply disagree with their stance on particular items on their agenda," a joint statement said. "We find their selection of issues to be theologically and ethically inadequate."

Miracle adds that the backlash against the new right may include a demand that politically-active church groups—perhaps even all church groups—lose their tax-exempt status.

The Rev. Jimmy Allen, former head of the Southern Baptist Convention, the largest protestant religious organization in America, said just prior to the election, that this country's religious liberty is threatened by the new right's creation of a religious-political bloc vote.

## Air Force announces intention to appeal Matlovich case

WASHINGTON—The government has filed a notice of appeal to overturn a federal appeals court directive telling the Air Force to reinstate Leonard P. Matlovich despite his admitted homosexuality, an Air Force spokesman said Nov. 11, reported AP.

Matlovich, now 37 and living in San Francisco, was a decorated Vietnam veteran who was dismissed in 1975 after admitting his homosexuality in a letter to Secretary of the Air Force John McLucas.

U.S. District Court Judge Gerhard A. Gesell ruled Sept. 12 that the Air Force has confusing standards for dealing with gay people and ordered Matlovich reinstated and given back pay.

The Air Force's announcement comes on the heels, however, of a later ruling Oct. 24 by the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco granting another military service—the Navy—the right to discharge homosexual personnel.

The authority "to maintain the discipline of personnel in active service," the court said in that case, was the proper right of the Navy. The court also noted that other regulations on homosexuality give the the Navy "at least some flexibility" in making decisions on gay personnel.

## MAC Board plans to sell building

The Board of Trustees of the Montrose Activity Center decided at a board meeting Oct. 29 to try and sell the organization's building at 1423 Holman, according to an announcement from the group.

The Board said it anticipates it will take several months to find a buyer and complete the transaction. The sale of the building will provide the organization with funds to "fulfill expanded goals," the group said.

Property values have risen in the area since the organization purchased the building several years ago.

The building is located slightly out of the Montrose area but was considered a good investment at the time of purchase because of the anticipated rising property values.

"This decision (to sell the building) was part of the Board's evaluation of MAC's current situation and its immediate goal of broadening community support for the organization.

## Civil libertarian defends "excessive" police actions

WASHINGTON — Complaints to the federal government's Community Relations Service about excessive use of force by policemen almost doubled in the past year, the service said.

But college professor Gary Sykes, who left his classroom last spring for a taste of life as a policeman, announced this month that he defends the type of police actions he once criticized as a civil libertarian.

During fiscal 1980, which ended Sept. 30, the Community Relations Service said it received 249 complaints charging excessive police force—a 93% increase over the previous year. The organization said 63% of the complaints came from blacks, 32% from Hispanics, 4% from American Indians and the remaining 1% from whites. No breakdown was released as to how many of the complainers were gay.

"Policemen live with a

constant sense of personal danger," Sykes, now a criminal justice professor of the Superior branch of the University of Wisconsin, told UPI. "I read about it, but I didn't know how strong it could be until I experienced it."

While teaching at a Kentucky university before moving to Superior, Sykes served on the State Board of the Kentucky Civil Liberties Union as "an outside critic of some police actions where force was used."

"I'm an inside defender of many police actions that I as a member of the Civil Liberties Board might have formerly raised a question about," said Sykes, 36, who joined the police force fulltime, but has returned to teaching.

Sykes, who has a doctorate in political science, said his duties as a patrolman included answering complaints about barking dogs, breaking up bar fights, chasing burglars and comforting battered wives.

"Even in a bar fight, there's always a gun present," he said. "If you lose control of the situation, you know there's a chance someone will grab your arms and take your gun."

"So you do whatever is necessary to control a person—grab their hair, clothing, whatever. That justifies what may look to some like excessive force."

Sykes said that before he became a policeman, he thought most people in trouble were victims of circumstances and would respond to reason rather than force.

"I still believe that," he said, "but I found out there are people who take an expression of concern or empathy as a sign of weakness. There are people so prone to violence that the only way to deal with them is with violence."

Sykes has become critical of lawyers and judges.

"Because we fear police officers might make a mistake or abuse their powers, we have imposed complex rules governing even simple arrests," he said. "Many officers feel unable to do what they're sworn to do because of the complexities of the law and because those laws are in a constant state of change."

"As long as lawyers and judges continue to play technical games, try to distort those rules to their own best advantage, the public safety is in danger by those who lack the sensitivity to treat other people as people," he said.

## Rumors fly on Anita's new romance

MONTGOMERY, Ala.—Alabama industrialist Larry Striplin says he and retired anti-gay crusader Anita Bryant have no immediate plans to marry and they remain close friends, news services reported Nov. 12.

Striplin criticized earlier press coverage of their relationship, saying, "The national news services have bothered her to no end. If half the people from the media that bothered her would live the life she lives, the world would be a better place."

Bryant separated from first husband and business manager Bob Green earlier this year in Miami and moved to Oklahoma, claiming her religious ministry had been misused by Green.

**Local media-monitoring group forming**

"The media has a major role in shaping what society views as normal and acceptable. The media often reflects very traditional views and presents those outside the mainstream of suburban society as less than desirable or simply non-existent," says William J. Jackson, who along with Pam Jones, have announced they will form a news media relations group.

The organization will be called Lesbian and Gay Media Advocates of Houston, Jackson said.

"We're forming to monitor the representation of lesbians and gay men in the media and to respond, letting the media know how we feel about that portrayal," he said, adding that one task of the group will be to increase the visibility of gay people in

local Houston publications and on broadcast stations.

Another goal of the group, Jackson said, will be "to assure that we are accurately shown as taking part in every segment of life: working in the business world, living in the inner city and the suburbs, having many of the same goals and frustrations as others."

The organizers said they will encourage gay people to write letters to local publications and broadcast stations. Organization members may also pay personal visits to media outlets to discuss needs.


