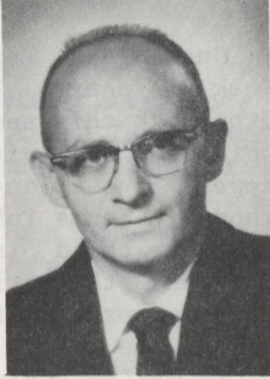

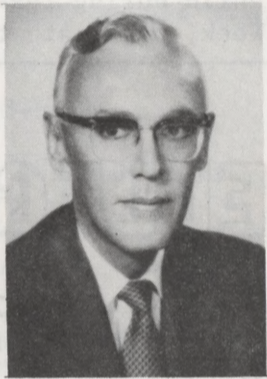

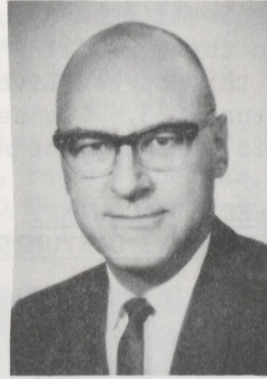

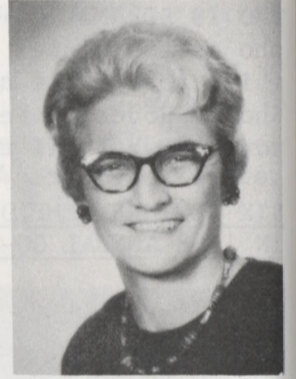

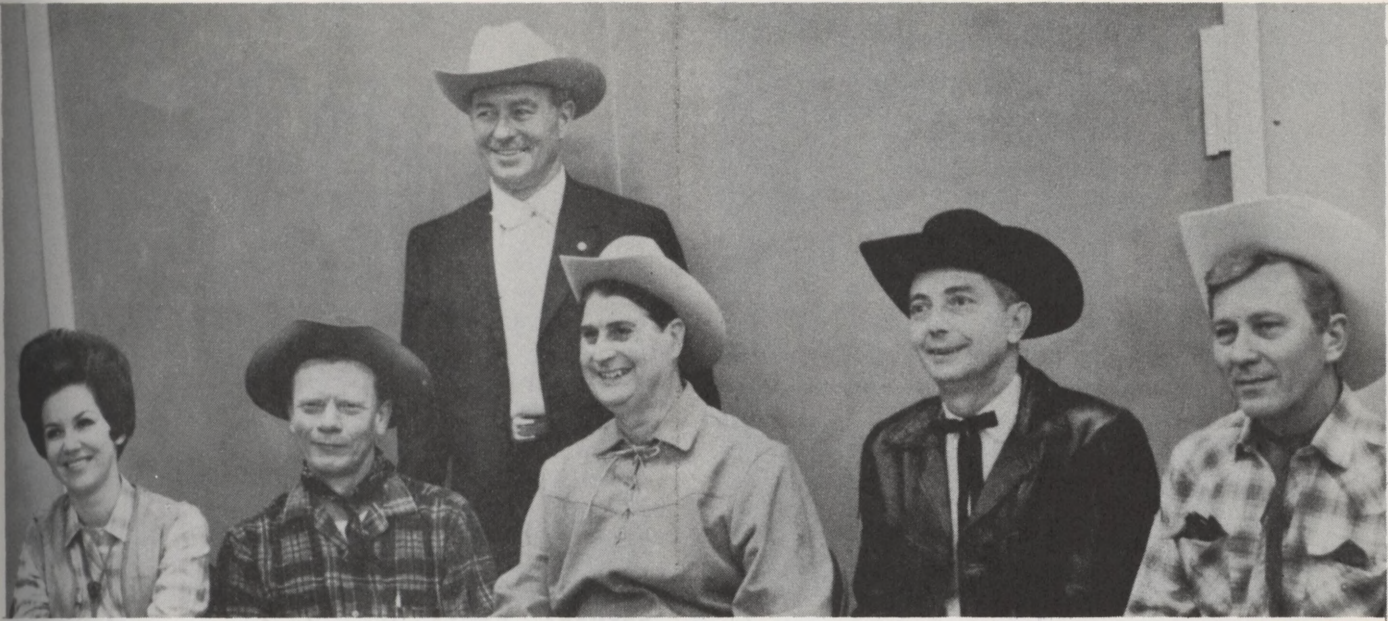

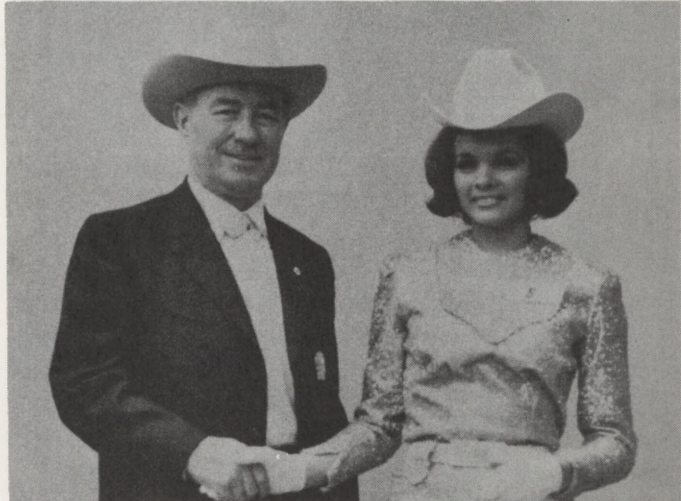

Instructions must be clear and your listener must understand.

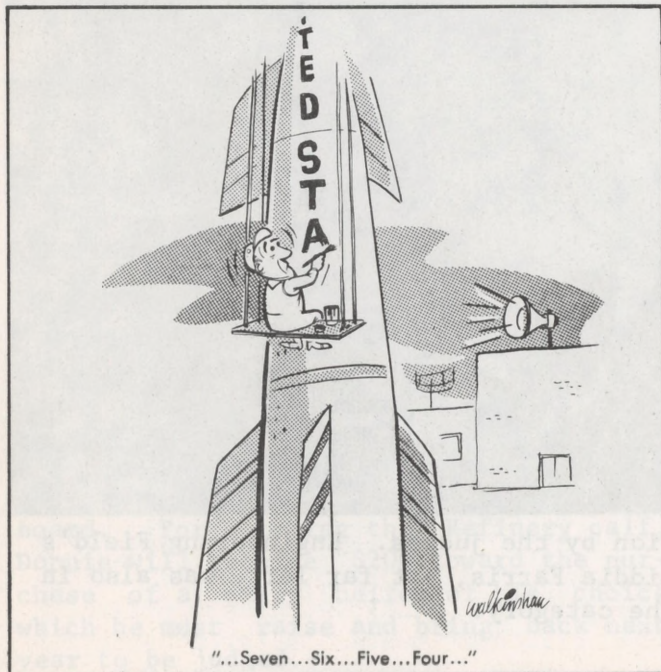
When you listen, try to hear what is being said. Pay close attention. Don't think up reasons or excuses before you understand the whole message.
