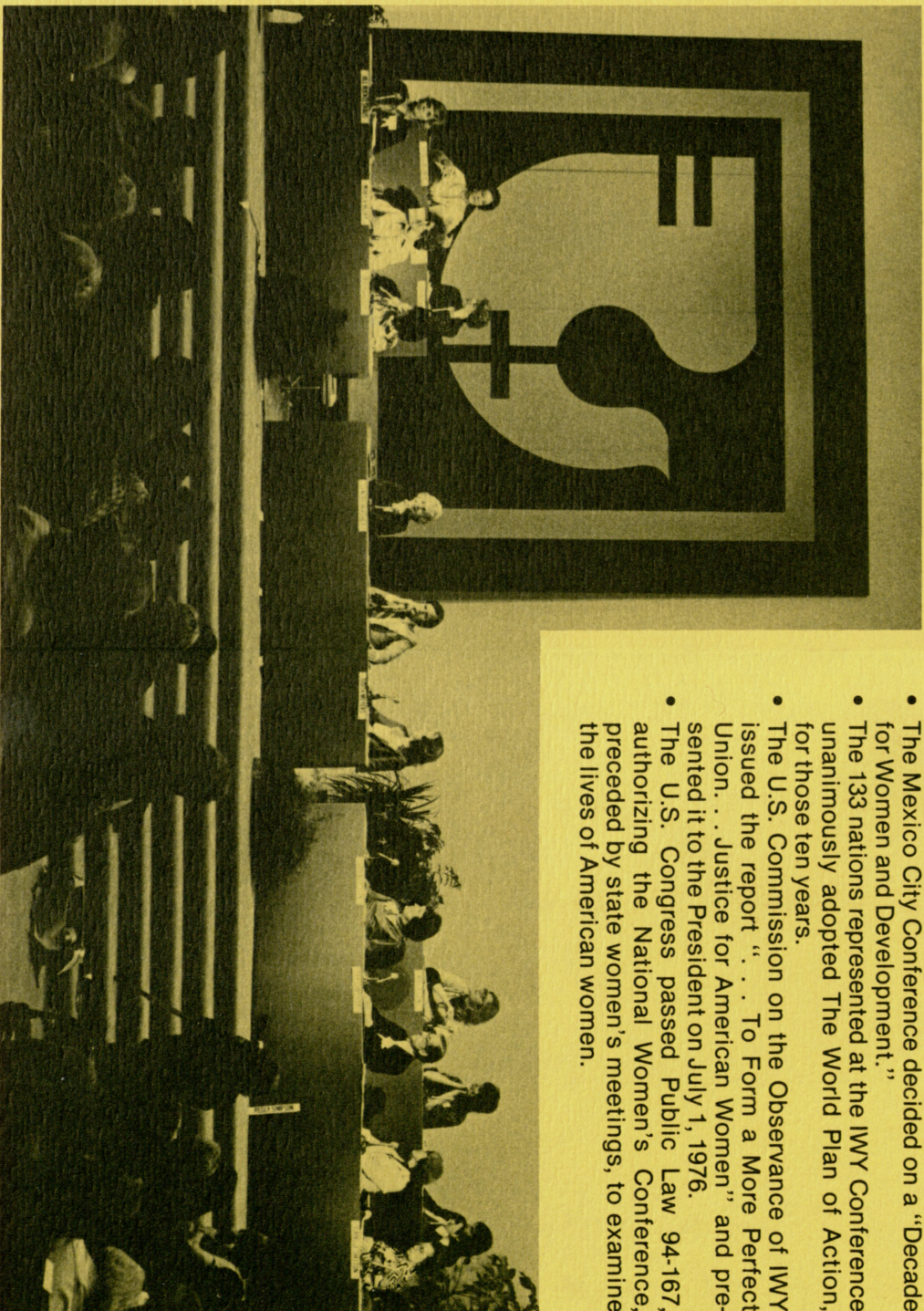

after IWY, what?

- International Women's Year, 1975, is over. But the work toward individual human rights as men and women has only just begun.
- The Mexico City Conference decided on a "Decade for Women and Development."
 - The 133 nations represented at the IWY Conference unanimously adopted The World Plan of Action, for those ten years.
 - The U.S. Commission on the Observance of IWY issued the report "... To Form a More Perfect Union. . . Justice for American Women" and presented it to the President on July 1, 1976.
 - The U.S. Congress passed Public Law 94-167, authorizing the National Women's Conference, preceded by state women's meetings, to examine the lives of American women.

Why a Meeting? Every state is having a women's meeting this summer, leading up to the National Women's Conference in Houston Nov. 18-21. The meetings were authorized by Congress in 1975 as a grass roots method of evaluating the status of women. The result will be a report to the President and to Congress outlining barriers that still prevent many women from making their fullest contributions to American life.

Notes on Voting:

Voters at the Texas Women's Meeting will elect 58 delegates to the National Women's Conference. Nominees must give prior consent to be a candidate. The delegates elected must reflect the balanced representation principle required by Congress in Public Law 94-167:

- 1) Representatives of local, state, regional and national institutions, agencies, organizations, unions, associations, publications, and other groups which work to advance the rights of women, and
- 2) members of the general public, with special emphasis on low-income women, members of diverse racial, ethnic and religious groups and women of all ages.

Voters will also consider resolutions on public policies as they affect women. Resolutions may originate in workshops and reaction groups and from the Texas IWY Coordinating Committee. All motions must be in writing.

What to Wear:

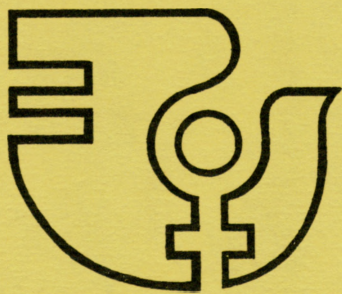
Comfortable shoes, such as sandals or sneakers, for walking between buildings on campus. Casual wear, such as sundresses, with light jackets for air conditioned rooms.

Workshops and Reaction Groups

Workshops are planned to meet the diverse needs of Texas women. Topics include areas such as employment, credit, health, education, child care, low-income women, and rural women. Workshops will be led by experts in the field and will provide opportunities for information and discussion. Reaction groups will provide a forum for hearing the concerns of Texas women on whatever topics they choose, within broad subject areas.
