Dear President:-

The custom has been established, by the National American Woman Suffrage Association and it's affiliated organizations, of celebrating the first Saturday in the month of May as National Suffrage Day. It is hoped that more emphasis than ever before will be laid on the celebration of this day in Texas, this year, and that indoor and open air rallies will be held in every organized town in the state with speakers and banners and suffrage maps and the distribution of literature to interest people in our cause. Whenever it is not possible to have a person speak, try the "Voicless Speech" it is perfectly splendid and never fails to attract and make friends of large crowds where ever it is shown. It may be had from the National American Woman Suffrage Association, #171 Madison Ave. New York, for the sum of \$1.25.

Our work for the next two months should be toward getting the endorsement by the Democratic Party, both State and National, of Woman Suffrage. This is possible if we give our earnest co-operation to the plans formulated for this purpose, and to this end you are urged to have read and adopted, at all of the Suffrage Day rallies, resolutions asking the Democrats of Texas to do all in their power to secure the adoption of Suffrage planks in the platform of the State and National Democratic Parties. To be effective there should be three copies of the resolution, one for your local papers, one to be sent to Hon. Paul Waples, Ft Worth, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Democratic Party in Texas, and one to be sent to me for filing in the records of the Texas Woman Suffrage Association. The resolution should also be adopted formally by your organization and spread on the minutes, and an official letter to that effect sent out to the three above addresses.

We have placed your name on the program of the State Convention of the Texas Woman Suffrage Association for a report from your organization. Please bring, or in case you cannot come, send, a written report to be read. And please touch particularly on the above plan, on the delegations that have waited on the candidates from your District, the letters that have been written to candidates about the submission of the Woman Suffrage Amendment, the size of the membership of your club, plans for extension work and your plans for general propaganda, with special reference to financing your work. No report is to exceed a time limit of ten minutes.
