## Soviet ambassador expelled by Egypt

Cairo, Egypt (AP) — President Anwar Sadat's government expelled the Soviet ambassador to Cairo and six Soviet Embassy employees Tuesday, accusing them of plotting against Egypt by inciting Moslem-Christian strife. A Hungarian diplomat also was ordered out.

The move, taken by the Egyptian Cabinet and announced by the government news agency, appeared to be the most serious breach of Egyptian-Soviet relations since 1972 when Sadat expelled 17,000 Soviet advisors.

It followed Sadat's speech Monday night accusing the Soviet

Union of being involved "head-on" in the strife between Moslem fundamentalists and the Coptic Christian minority in Egypt and declaring that 12 of the 1,536 Egyptians arrested in connection with that strife had been Soviet-inspired.

Many of those arrested are Sadat's political foes.

A Cabinet statement carried by the official news agency said Ambassador Vladimir Polyakov and the others had 48 hours to leave Egypt. It also said a Hungarian diplomat had been ejected on charges of being "involved" in the religious

conflict in Egypt.

The Cabinet also ordered the closing of the Soviet military liaison bureau in Cairo and its Egyptian counterpart in Moscow, expelled two Soviet journalists, terminated contracts of Soviet advisors in Egypt and reduced the overall Soviet diplomatic presence here to match Egypt's in Moscow.

Egyptian Foreign Ministry sources said Egypt had about 10 diplomats in the Soviet capital. The Egyptian ambassador to Moscow, Samih Anwar, was appointed in late 1978, but he has never taken up his post in Moscow.

It also said they "coordinated with local leftist elements in Egypt, and with Arab countries opposed to Egypt's peace moves with Israel, to mount publicity campaigns defaming the regime achievements."

The Cabinet announcement said the Egyptian Foreign Ministry had "often" warned Soviet diplomats to adhere to the rules of diplomatic conduct in Egypt, and despite the advice and the expulsion of other diplomats previously, members of the mission in Cairo continued "their plot against the regime and the aspirations of Egypt."

The expulsion was the fourth reduction of the Soviet presence in Egypt in the past five years and came short of a total break in relations with the Kremlin, Egypt's leading protector during the rule of the late President Gamal Abdel Nasser.

The Cabinet, after studying relevant files on Soviet "movements" in Egypt, noted that the Soviets were "engaged in recruiting agents in Egypt...exploiting religious strife, and influencing the spread and escalation of the sectarian conflict," which has left 70 dead in the past year.

## Reagan denies Social Security cuts

Washington (AP) — President Reagan declared Tuesday that he has no plans to propose new cuts in Social Security this year and will not balance the federal budget "at the expense of those dependent" on the program.

Reagan, standing in a large white tent on the White House South Lawn during a reception for private citizens who lobbied for his tax and budget-cut program, said that "for those doubting Thomases" who questioned his resolve to fight for a

balanced budget, "I have a message: They're wrong. there will be no retreat."

Chief White House spokesman David R. Gergen had said earlier that Reagan will not propose new cuts in Social Security this year, but will consider the advice of several Republican senators that he try to trim other open-ended benefit programs, a spokesman said Tuesday.

Gergen's announcement followed a meeting between Reagan and Republican

congressional leaders at which a group of several senators, led by Majority Leader Howard H. Baker Jr., urged him to take another look at cutting the so-called entitlement programs.

The spokesman said Reagan "took under advisement" the senators' proposal that he try to cut other entitlement programs, which weren't named specifically but which include food stamps, welfare, unemployment, veterans' pensions, Medicaid and Medicare.

## Committee approves O'Connor

Washington (AP) — Sandra Day O'Connor won the 17-0 endorsement of the Senate Judiciary Committee on Tuesday, virtually assuring her confirmation as the first woman justice of the Supreme Court. The full Senate likely will vote Friday.

The 51-year-old Arizona appeals judge is to be sworn in late this month, in time to take her seat when the high

court starts its new term Oct. 5.

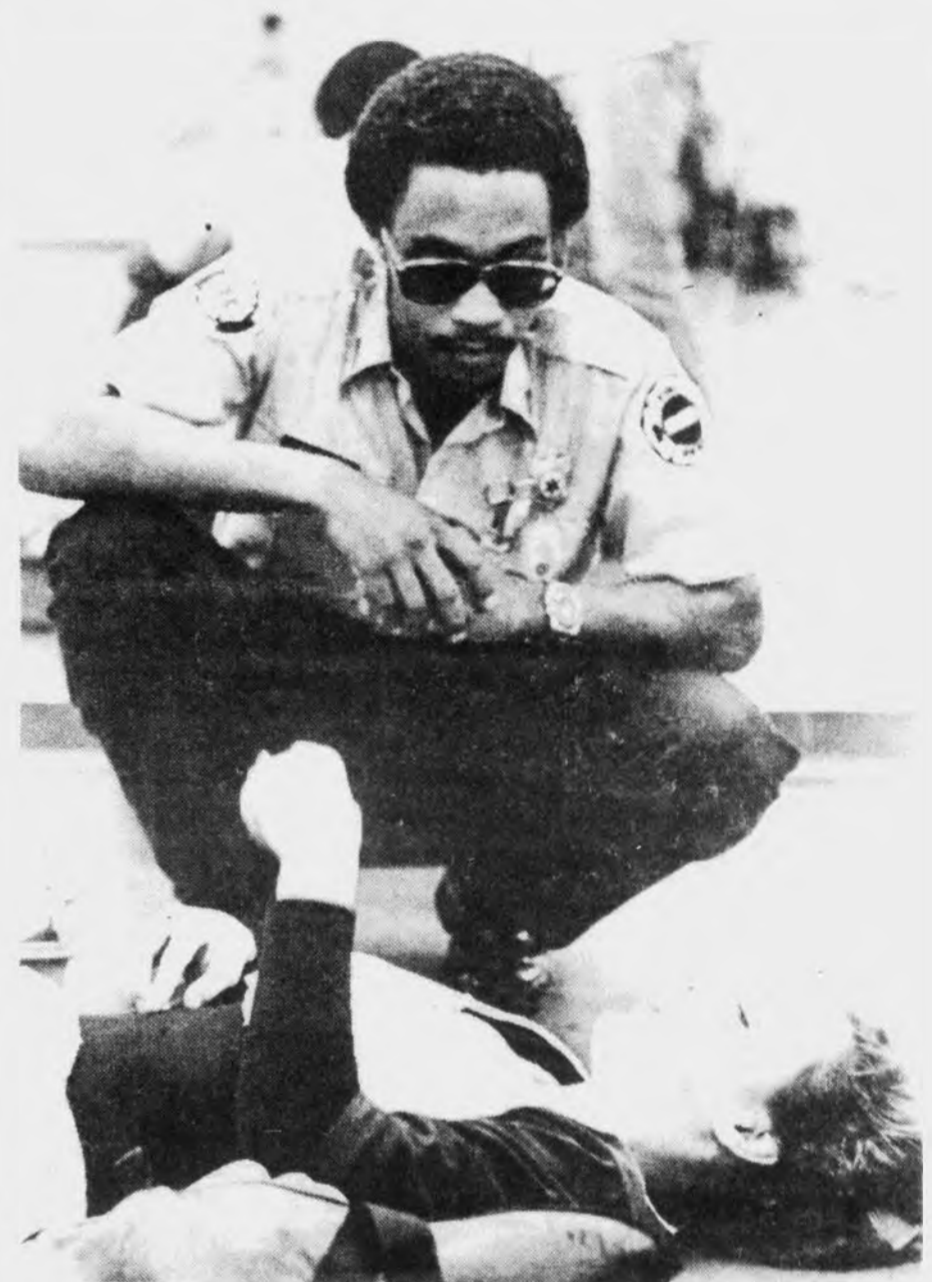
Sen. John East, R-N.C., who had said in advance he would support her nomination only if Mrs. O'Connor revealed her views on abortion, voted "yes."

In her testimony, O'Connor expressed personal "repugnance" to abortion and said she wouldn't have one, but declined to provide any

legal opinion of the 1973 decision.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C. and the committee chairman, said O'Connor had demonstrated during her testimony all of the "good qualities" needed to become a good Supreme Court justice.

Thurmond said a confirmation vote in the full Senate probably would be scheduled for Friday.

## Organizational funding system changes

There is a new procedure for the allocation of student service fees to campus organizations this school year.

Last spring, the Student Service Fee Planning and Allocation Committee enacted the new system for the dispensing of the fees given yearly to the Students' Association, Program Council, and the Council of Ethnic Organizations to fund campus organizations. How this money is distributed has gone through procedural and philosophical changes.

Bonnie White, a member of the of the SSFPAC that drew up the

new procedure, said the changes came about, "Mainly because there wasn't enough consistency or communication between the organizations that distributed Student Service Fee money."

White explained a potential result of the lack of communication: organizations could request and receive funds for the same activity or operating expense from all three sources at once. White also pointed out that organizations would sometimes, "Get a big 'run-around.' They'd go to Program Council, Program Council would tell them to go to SA, SA would tell them to go to CEO, CEO would tell them to go to Program Council and so on..."

According to White, fund requests are now centrally handled by the Student Activities Office. All organizations are required to fill out the same form. Request forms must be submitted for each event and should be turned in for consideration several weeks prior to the event. The organization must state on the form whether they are requesting funds from SA, PC, CEO or any combination of the three. If approved by the Assistant Coordinator for Campus Activities, a copy of the form goes to the group (s) being solicited (now called trustee) for approval. The organization then has a hearing with the trustee to receive approval or denial of the request.

White said this method, "Promoted more fiscal accountability from campus organizations. It makes organizations think a little more about their budget."

White said the changes in funding philosophy were enacted, "because much of the money tended to go for general operating expenses. We decided that since this was money provided by the entire student body, we wanted more of a possibility that the money would benefit most students."

Students' Association Senate Speaker Robert Lusk said, "In the past, organizations were provided funds for a variety of purposes,

many of which served only the members of the organization. For example, postage for an organization news-letter or the cost of making letter head stationary. In the new process, the philosophy is to insure that the entire student body benefits, not just the members of a select group. Such as, the upcoming Pre Law Society's Mayoral Candidates forum which will benefit the Pre-Law Society and the student voter as well."

The new form requires that the organization estimate the attendance of the planned event, state to whom the program is targeted and explain how the program will benefit the University community.

The Board of Regents unveiled Monday their plan to make this campus great.

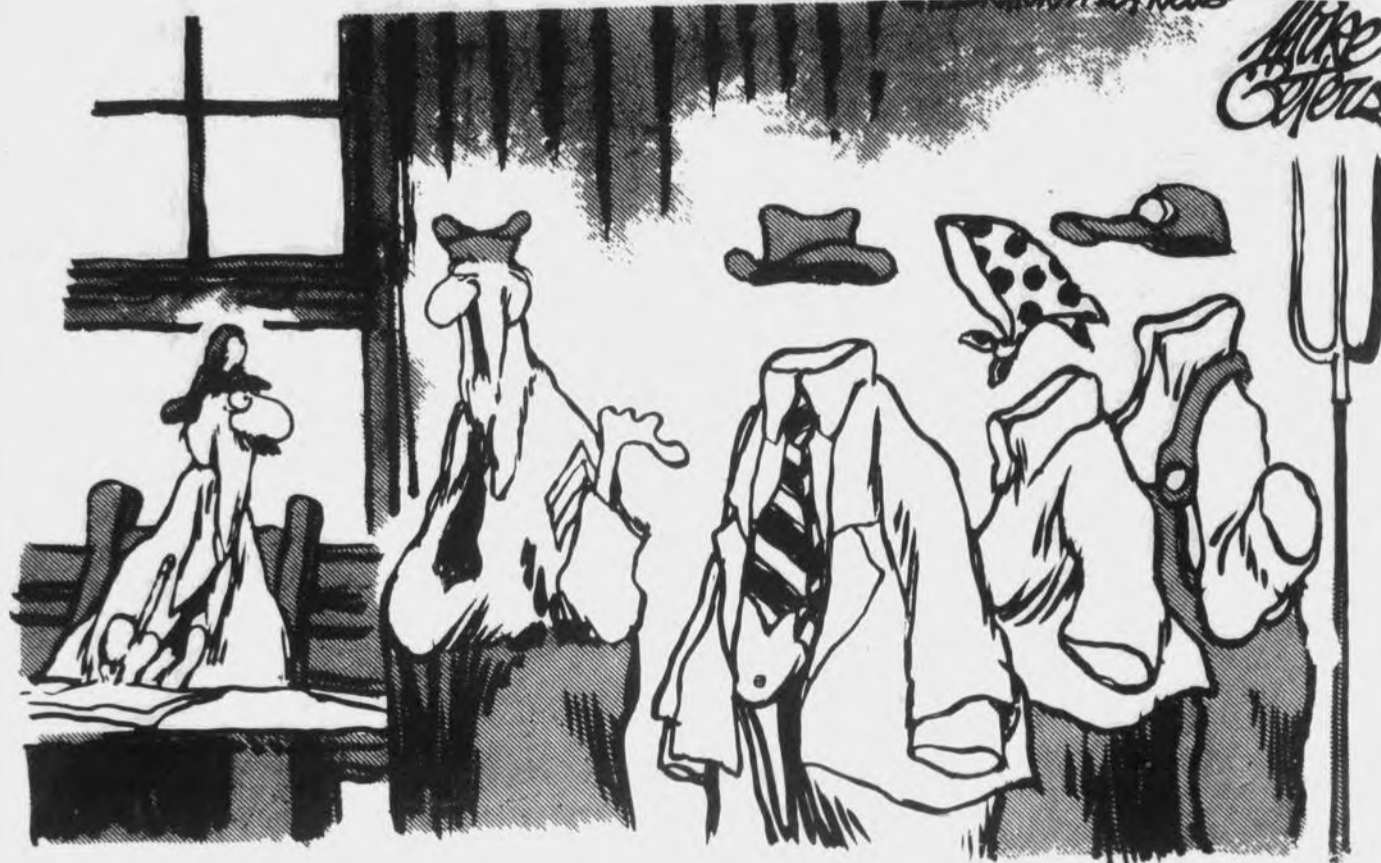

"Do you know what I am?" she asked.

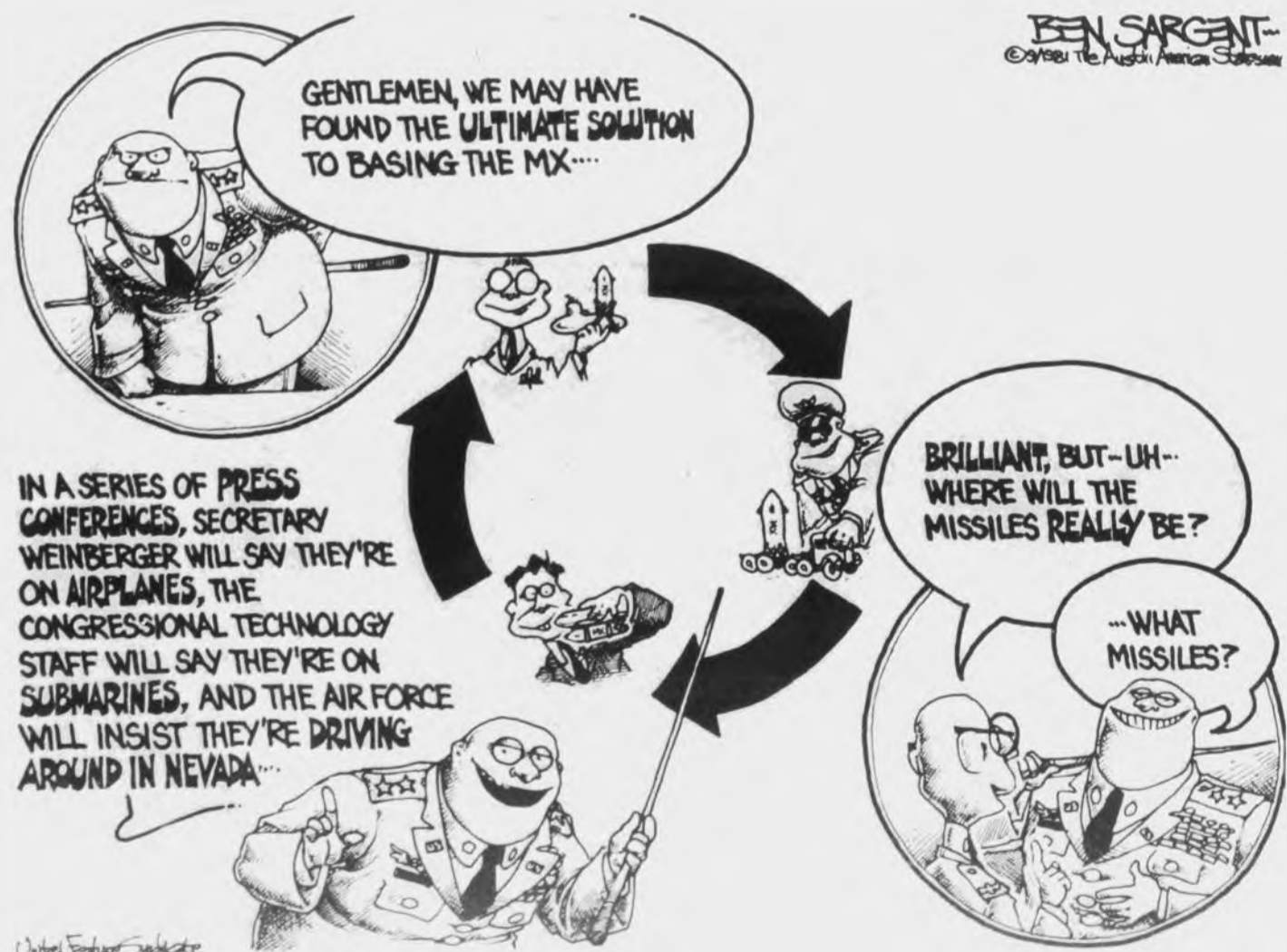
"A prostitute," I said.

I hate New Orleans.



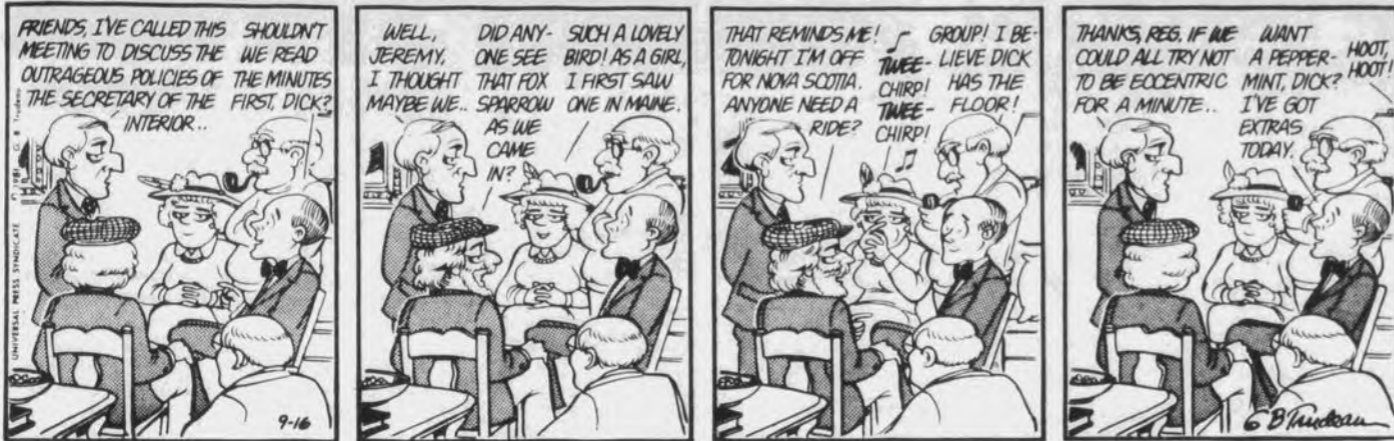

# Astronauts prepared for flight

Space Center, Houston (AP) — The two astronauts who will take America's space shuttle on its second flight next month said Tuesday they still don't fully understand a shock wave problem that slightly damaged the spaceship on its first trip.

But Joe Engle and Dick Truly said they were confident the "overpressure" problem would not affect plans for the next launch of the spaceship Columbia, set for Oct. 9 at 7:30 a.m. EDT.

Engle and Truly, who addressed news reporters in a final news conference before they will

become the first Americans in history to fly a used spacecraft, plan to stay in orbit five days — two days longer than Columbia's first trip last April.

"We probably do not fully understand the overpressure problem," said Engle. "It doesn't lend itself to a very clean analytical solution."

The problem occurred as the shuttle was launched on its maiden space voyage, but it was not discovered until months later. Engineers found that a shock wave lasting one-tenth of a second

had traveled the length of the spaceship.

It bent four struts supporting two forward fuel tanks and moved wing surfaces that supposedly were locked. It was caused, they said, by more than expected pressure from air that expanded when the ship's two solid rocket boosters ignited.

Engle said engineers had devised two systems to reduce the shock waves on the second launch — one using water to absorb the vibrations and the other using steel plates.

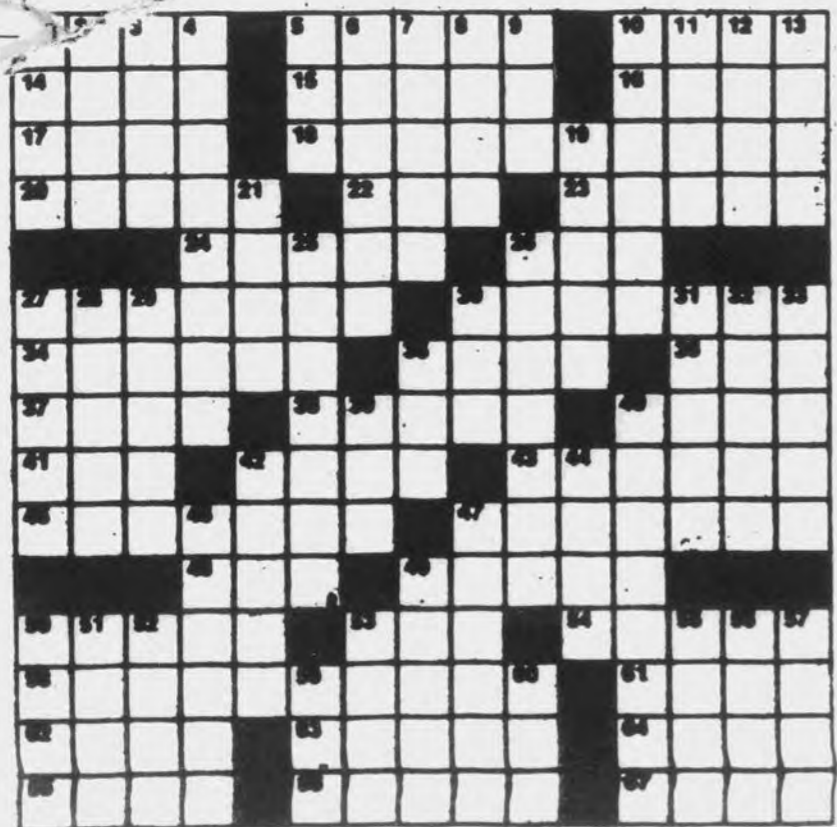

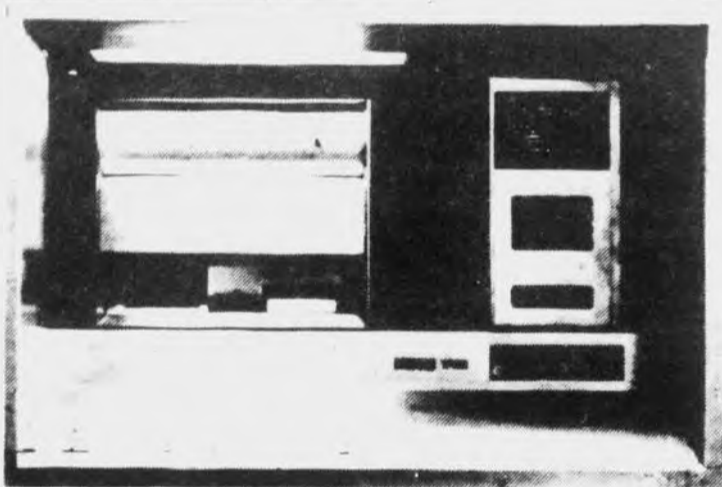

## Cougar Notes

### Classified special

**Football:** The Cougars took last Saturday off and UPI wasn't impressed. UH was ranked 18th by the wire service since the season's start, but with the Cougars resting on the 12th and upsets popular that day, the Cougars found themselves ignored when the weekly polls were released Monday evening. Miami-Florida, who the Coogs play next and who also had an open date Saturday, is now ranked by both UPI and AP. The Hurricanes remain in the 16th spot on AP's poll, but are now ranked 15th by the UPI's Board of Coaches for the first time this season. Texas, with its 31-3 blasting of Rice, cruised into the sixth spot in both polls and made the Longhorns the only SWC team regarded by either.

Senior defensive end Leo Truss made quite an impact in the Coogs win over New Mexico Sept. 5. The 21-year-old native of Lincoln, Ala. had six unassisted tackles, shared in another, and recovered a Lobos fumble early in the game. For his effort he was picked as Mutual Radio's player of the game. "I wanted to play real well against New Mexico," Truss said. "I had eighteen relatives who drove to the game in a convoy from Talladega, Alabama to see me play. I just wanted to show them the progress I have made since I left home." Truss said that the Miami game will test what improvement he and the other Coogs have made in practice between games. "We'll be up for this game. We know Miami is good. We've seen the films and we have a good idea of what we have to do defensively and offensively in order to win."

Ronny Peacock, UH defensive back coach, says the Coog defense has been working on its execution during practice. "We've been tightening up some spots," Peacock said.

**Golf:** UH won its eighth SWC Fall Golf Tournament title Tuesday at the Columbia Lakes Country Club in West Columbia. Junior Mike Neece turned in a 72 to lead the Coogs to a six-man, two-day team total of 668. Texas placed second with 671. "The kids played real well," Coach Dave Williams said. "I'm proud of them and I'm really enthused about this season. We do have some growing up to do and I know we can play better. It was the first time under fire for many of the boys."

The Cougars have won 347 team or individual tournament crowns, including 13 NCAA titles and seven SWC spring championships.
