COMMUNITY COMES TO SEE BIOFILTER

Yesterday was something "extra special" for B. E. Norwood and the members of his Effluent Control Department. Their prize showpiece - the bio-filter - had her public debut.

Over 50 visitors from a guest list that included area school officials, county and state water and pollution representatives, members of the press, state representatives, and chambers of commerce members, came for a first-hand look at our new biological treating facilities.

Following a reception in the Refinery Cafeteria where they were welcomed by L. T. Wilson, Refinery Manager, the group boarded two chartered buses for a ride to the Channel-side site of the bio-filter.

There, Process Superintendent E. W. Reiley gave the group an explanation of the facilities and the flow process, then broke the group into four tour parties headed by Guides R. G. Schneider, C. A. Schaeffer, R. U. Brey, and R. L. Bryan. A part of the tour included an explanation by J. M. Martin of analytical equipment used at the biofilter.

After a buffet luncheon in the cafeteria, L. C. Burroughs, former Assistant Superintendent at the Houston Refinery, spoke to the group about the work being done throughout the industry on the problems of water and air pollution control. Burroughs spoke with authority - and from an informed position. Now retired from Shell, he serves as Secretary of the Committee for Disposal of Refinery Wastes for the American Petroleum Institute.

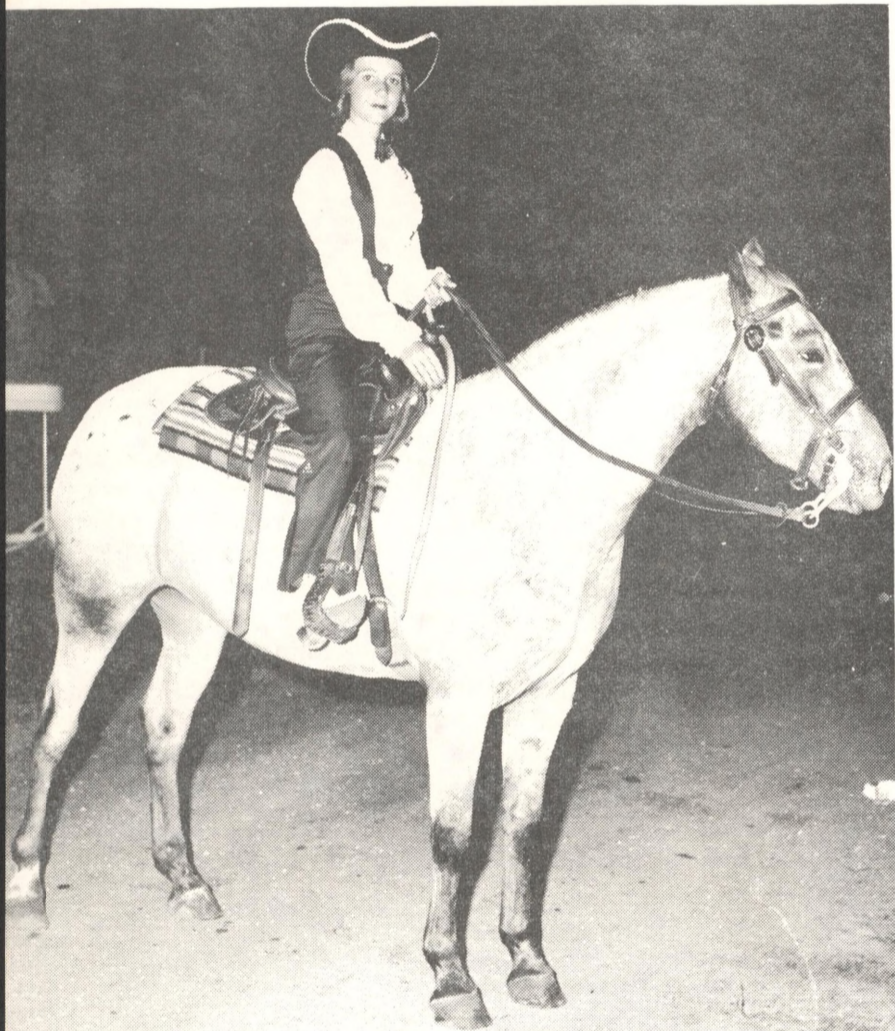
