The Cares

Langnau aids paraplegics, quadraplegics

A stint in the Navy during the Vietnam War left Greg Langnau, a senior receiving clerk, with a strong desire to help acute paraplegics and quadraplegics.

He explained, "I had a couple of buddies who got hurt pretty badly (during the war). I saw what can happen to someone who's unable to fully take care of himself. I asked myself if there wasn't something I could do."

Langnau found out what he could do after joining the Deer Park Jaycees in 1973—a year after he first started working at the DPMC. He began working to improve the plight of persons who lost use of their limbs, serving on the board of the Texas Jaycees Hospital Foundation.

Recently named chairman of this board, he works closely with Jaycees across the state raising funds for better services at the Texas Jaycee Campus of Victoria College at Gonzales—a two-year school that emphasizes care and education of acute paraplegics and quadraplegics.

Langnau, who recently was named one of Texas Jaycees' outstanding state chairmen, said most students at Gonzales are unable to seek an education in a regular university because "they can't take care of themselves."

The Jaycee campus—which is believed to be the only school of its kind in the Free World—cooperates with Warm Springs Gonzales Foundation Hospital to provide needed health care, with Victoria College providing all needed educational assistance except instructors.

Operating out of a building leased from the Warm Springs foundation, the school provides education for 38 students at a time—some from as far away as Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Langnau feels the school meets a special need for paraplegics and quadraplegics—many of whom would have to otherwise be confined in a hospital. "Sitting around a hospital for two years getting used to a new body has to have a very negative impact on

your mind. Almost everything you need alone has to be done by somebody else. Now, we can give 38 persons a year a chance to do something to help themselves."

But the operation of the school is not cheap, costing Texas Jaycees \$80,000 a year.

Much of this funding now comes from foundations—such as Shell Companies Foundation, Inc. Representing the foundation, Doris O'Connor, Shell senior vice president, recently presented the Jaycees' hospital foundation with a \$2,000 check—the second such check given by Shell to the group at the suggestion of the DPMC. Shell was the first outside organization to give to the school, which has operated for eight years.

Only a small amount of the school's funding comes from the government—state housing allotments of \$126 per month per student.

Jaycees provide about half the school's funding each year. For example, \$1 of the annual dues paid by each of Texas' 18,000 Jaycees goes to

the school.

Langnau said the Jaycees were hard-pressed for funds the first five years the school operated. "We couldn't pay our bills. Everything was against us."

But fund-raising efforts have recently been so successful that the Jaycees

have already raised \$30,000 for the school's 1981 budget.

However, Langnau said more funds are needed for the future. He explained Jaycees have a chance to buy a building from the Warm Springs foundation, which was once used to rehabilitate polio victims. It has been virtually abandoned since foundation operations were moved to a new wing.

He said the new facility will enable the school to more than double its capacity—from 38 students to 80. Langnau added the new space will fill a major need "because we have to turn away twice as many students as we accept because there's not enough room."

But the new facility will be costly because \$600,000 is needed just to refurbish the building to meet federal standards for care of the handicapped.

Langnau, a former president of Deer Park Jaycees, indicated Texas Jaycees are confident they can raise the money, having set a deadline of next April 1 to do so. He stressed the Jaycees will raise the money without any government assistance.

"We could do like a lot of people and apply for a federal grant to take the taxpayers' money. But we want to do it on our own."



Physician sought to replace Davis

Efforts are now under way by the Medical Department to find a physician to replace Dr. Miles Davis, the DPMC's former assistant medical director who resigned to enter private practice with the Houstonian Medical Center.

Dr. David Miller, DPMC medical director, said every possible step is being taken to replace Davis with a qualified physician in the shortest possible time. In the meantime, Miller will continue to provide medical care to Complex employees with the assistance of Dr. Bob Marnoy, a Shell regional medical director who has been assigned temporarily to the Complex.

But because Marnoy will be going through orientation procedures, Miller advised Complex employees who need other than emergency treatment by a doctor to try and visit the dispensary in the mornings—in order to avoid possible long lines in the afternoon. But rapid, comprehensive medical care will continue to be provided at the DPMC as in the past.

5-month record ends at DPMC North

The current DPMC North safety record stopped at 1.3 million safe hours Friday, May 30, when an instrument man received a laceration and a broken arm at the Hydrogen Plant. This is the first disabling injury at DPMC North since last Dec. 31.

Congratulations

Congratulations to the personnel at BD-HT, the North Treaters and Catalytic Cracking for achieving new safety records.

BD-HT achieved four years without a disabling injury on May 11, with the North Treaters making it to three safe years on May 23. Catalytic Cracking achieved the five-year safety mark on June 2.




