Lesbian and Gay Task Force forming in NOLA, community center set to open

New Orleans will soon join other major cities with the opening of a Lesbian and Gay Community Center at 816 Rampart St.

The center will serve a variety of functions including providing an information desk and phone line for services and events in the New Orleans area, a meeting space for groups and

organizations, and a positive resource area for the city.

A group of concerned citizens met Oct. 6 at the site on Rampart St. with the purpose of forming a task force charged with overseeing the opening of the center until the formation of a Board of Directors takes place. The temporary task force will continue meeting on Monday evenings at 7:00 p.m., all interested parties are invited to attend.

One of the first acts of the task force was to establish a "Wish List" of items needed to open and run the center on a day to day basis. Anyone interested in donating items should call Leo Watermeyer at (504) 529-2367; Joan Ladnier at (504) 566-0329, or Robert Brunet at (504) 523-1247.

Suggested donations are: Meeting table, folding chairs, desks and chairs, phones and answering machines, sofa, love seat, reading chairs, bookshelves

and other shelving, mini-fridge, old and new books and magazines about gay and lesbian issues, file cabinet, lamps, bathroom and kitchen supplies, bulletin board, plants, TV and VCR, stereo, ceiling fans, step stools, and rugs.

The Task Force and community center project are endorsed by The New Orleans Alliance of Pride; The Gay and Lesbian Business Association, and Louisiana Lesbian And Gay Political Action Committee.

Admission charge dropped for street vendor section of Westheimer Art Festival

The fall Westheimer Art Festival went on as usual—almost—in spite of a flap between a Montrose civic group coalition and Westheimer strip property owners over two weeks prior to the semi-annual event last weekend. Just two days before the Oct. 17-18 festival, the civic coalition agreed to drop its controversial admission charge under threat of legal action by group of 29 business and property owners.

Though not a gay event, the Art Festival has over the years become an extremely popular event in Houston's gay and lesbian community, in part because of its showiness and free-spirited, bohemian feel. The festival is held at what is considered the heart of the community, the Montrose area, once the city's magnet for the artistically centered and their pet oddities. The "official" festival, which began 20 years ago as a small art festival in the parking lot of what was then Liberty Bank, has moved to a strip of Lovett Street off and two adjacent lots on that block, bordered on the west by Montrose Boulevard.

Last month, a group of civic association members, in an attempt to create a management structure for the throng of independent vendors on Westheimer who traditionally have taken advantage of the timing of the Westheimer Colony Association's festival, incorporated as "The Original Westheimer Street Fest" and applied for a permit to close the street to traffic.

A controversy arose, however, over the group's plans to charge a \$1 admission to the area, and the group, mostly made up of members of the Near-town Association, was forced to drop their plan.

The Westheimer Colony charges a \$2 admission to its juried exhibit on Lovett, which this year included over 250 artists.

Many area business owners, who lease space on their property to the vendors, say the festival brings a peak business weekend. Others, however, said they agreed with the associations that the event needed some control.

On Sunday, those attending the festival also had mixed reactions: many were glad to see the toilet provisions, and some said they gave a donation to

the group. Others said they did not understand the presence of the association members.

Although the skies were overcast on Saturday, no rain fell on the two-day revel that saw little change, except for a few clusters of portable restrooms and numerous trash baskets provided by the neighborhood group on Westheimer. The "Street Fest" group said they had planned the charge to pay for improvements they provided to the festival area, including the toilets and trash cans.

Justice Dept recommends High Court uphold AIDS insurance discrimination ruling

U.S. Solicitor General Kenneth Starr announced last week that he will recommend to the U.S. Supreme Court that they uphold a lower court ruling allowing for reduction in insurance coverage of a former Houston music store worker from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000.

Although the original plaintiff in the case, John McGann of Houston, died in 1991, lawyers for his estate have continued the appellate process. Much attention has followed the most recent appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court seeking to overturn a Fifth Circuit ruling in favor of the employer. The case is considered to have impact not only in cases involving AIDS, but other diseases seen as having a high price tag, including cancer and Alzheimer's, according to Houston attorneys Helen Brattin and Donald Skipwith.

John McGann was employed at H&H Music, Houston, and was covered under

a company health plan with a \$1,000,000 cap. Five years after becoming employed by H&H, McGann came down with AIDS. H&H then dropped its health plan and established a self-insured plan with a cap for AIDS coverage at \$5,000. Subsequently, McGann's AIDS claims which already exceeded that amount were not covered.

McGann then filed suit. His case at the time was viewed as ideal by attorneys with the Lambda Legal Defense and Education fund, because he was covered at the time of his first AIDS claims. But a lower court sided with H&H, interpreting the federal Employee Retirement and Security Act to allow an employer to switch to a self-insured plan even if claims on previous coverage are pending.

McGann and his lawyers appealed. The case was argued before the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans after McGann's death. The panel of three judges hearing the case upheld the Texas court's ruling.

McGann's lawyers appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. The High Court asked the Solicitor General for the administration's opinion.

The Justice Department has recommended that the Supreme Court uphold the New Orleans' ruling by not hearing the case. The three judges on the Fifth Circuit panel and the Solicitor General were all appointed by either Presidents Reagan or Bush.

Jeff Campbell, director of the NO/AIDS Task Force, reacting to the administration position in New Orleans, said, "One of my concerns is now that law is clearly on the books."

"I think it just points to what kind of crises our nation's health care service is in," Campbell said, "and the need for insurance reform to protect people."

Suzanne Goldberg, an attorney employed by the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund in New York City, argued that H&H Music illegally retaliated against McGann in violation of the Employee Retirement Income

Security Act. "You can't have a clearer case of retaliation than what happened here, Goldberg said. Goldberg authored the Supreme Court petition.

In addition to Goldberg, Brattin and Skipwith, plaintiffs attorneys include Tom Stoddard, Paula Ettelbrick and Evan Wolfson of LLDEF.

Campbell noted, "Any company can now rule that heart disease or cancer can have a cap on it. Of course this probably won't happen if the wife of the owner has the disease. As long as you apply the cap to all diseases you are not discriminating."

Since the McGann case began moving through the courts, the Americans with Disabilities Act became law. It says companies cannot discriminate by changing pay and "other terms, conditions and privileges of employment." AIDS is covered by the Disabilities Act.

Lawyers, however, differ regarding the implications of the ADA in cases such as McGann's.

Blockbuster, the growing conglomerate of video, now wants to branch out into retailing music so they have apparently killed two birds with one stone--their entry into the music retail business and eliminated another competitor.

We have always believed in the theory that competition is good for businesses and consumers. But, also like many businessmen, we are usually less than excited by new competitors. And by the nature of LOBO's offerings we get competition from a variety of businesses, some gay but many straight owned.

To even the casual observer, LOBO is committed to the sale and rental of gay videos--we've been competing in this area for nearly twelve years. We know gay video as well or better than anyone else and we offer both for sale and for rent more titles--and more diverse offerings--than anyone else in Houston. Yet a straight-owned "adult" shop (a particular pet of *The Voice's* writer of Soap) claims in an ad (in another publication) to be the largest in this area. Well, what gay publication is going to get picky when the advertiser pays the bills. But if anyone is ever interested LOBO is ready and willing to compare numbers--videos and customers.

A few months ago a gay business existing in Dallas opened a store here in Houston and even before they got the door open they were advertising they are the "leading" gay and lesbian book store in Houston. Of course, "leading" can mean many things.

But aside from that this new addition to our community actually has helped us. Competition works because it sharpens all our efforts to meet the needs of the consumer, in this case the lesbian and gay shoppers. We have found ourselves working harder to offer a greater selection of books, finding bargains to pass on to our customers.

And the results have substantiate the axiom of competition: OUR business has increased since the advent of this latest competition. After twenty years in this business (we are, after the Oscar Wilde Memorial Bookshop on Christopher Street in Greenwich Village, the oldest gay bookstore in the country) we have learned to stay competitive. Four years ago we welcomed Inklings and continue to work with them in business and consider the owners, Pokey Anderson and Annise Parker, friends. For the same reasons we welcome Crossroads Market to our community.

And speaking of books, fall is a time for new titles flooding the stores. Madonna's "Sex" is due out this week and while not particularly a gay title we have been getting a lot of interest and LOBO will stock the book.

Another much awaited book is Armistead Maupin's newest, "Maybe the Moon," which is a departure from his "Tales of the City" series but the advance reviews have been raving. And this book is already available.



Another popular series in gay writing is the Men on Men series edited by the late George Stambolian, the latest of which he finished before his death, "Men on Men 4", which continues this series fine incorporation of diverse writings from both established and new writers. We always recommend this series as the best way to become acquainted with a range of gay writers and leading the reader to other writings.

A surprising bestseller is "Hello Darling, Are You Working?" by the actor Rupert Everett, recently profiled in the second issue of "Out," the newest general gay interest magazine. You may best remember Everett as the gay school boy in "Another Country" or in "The Comfort of Strangers." How to describe this adventure in camp--perhaps the opening: "By the time he was eight he

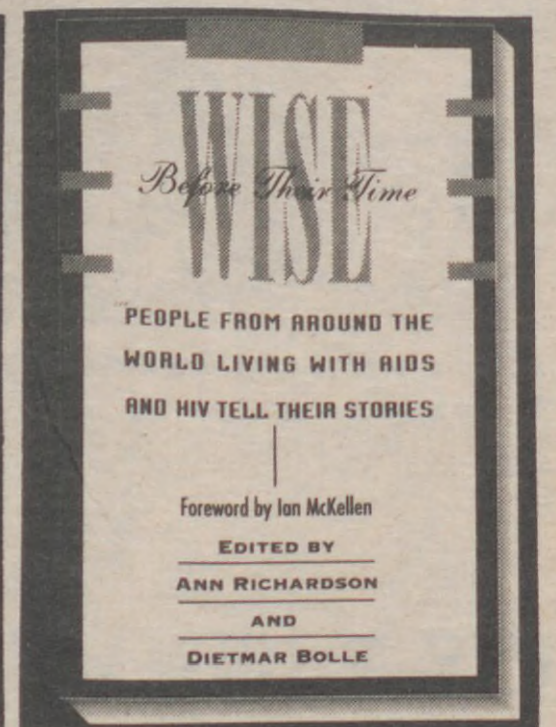
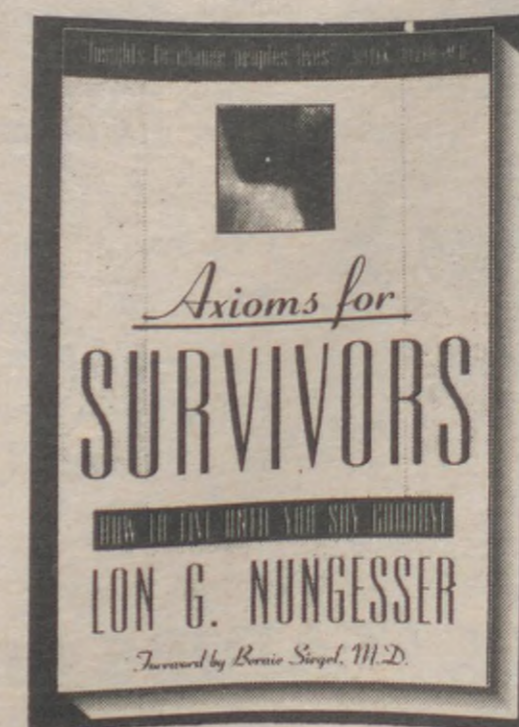
knew he would never be a great actress."

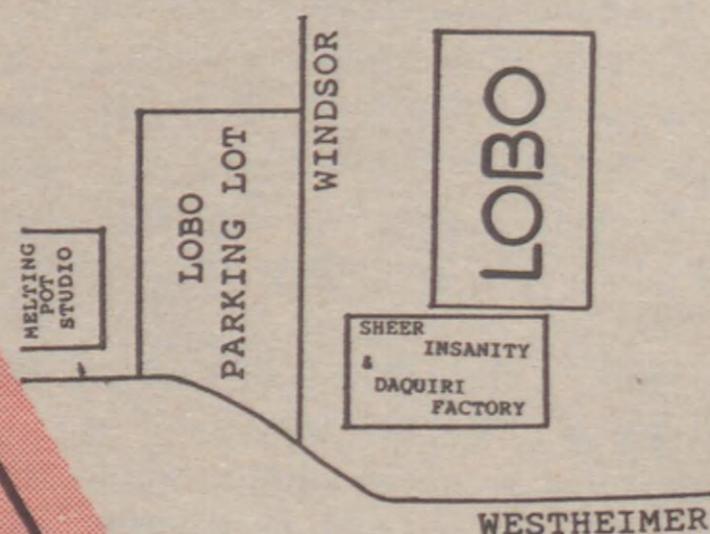

Fort Worth doctor with HIV now works to educate colleagues, fight hysteria

When Dr. Patricia Wetzel, attending physician of the HIV Unit at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth, learned a year ago that she herself had tested HIV seropositive, she went through a barrage of emotions. But, she insists there was no resentment, and no regrets for her career choice.

"Yes, I was angry that this had happened. I was upset that I had not insisted on maximum precautions for myself and those I worked with. But I never felt any resentment...and I was never sorry about becoming an HIV doctor," said Wetzel, in Houston this week to address a group of physicians and a local service provider group as a spokesperson for Caremark Inc

"I chose my job. In all of my training and through my residency, of all of the work I did, I found my work with HIV patients to be the most gratifying...I really felt that this was my calling. This was a choice I made with my eyes open," she said.

Dr. Wetzel, one of a handful of health care workers who have contracted HIV on the job, said she is dismayed at the "hysteria" that has surrounded the issue of HIV transmission in the health care setting. "First of all, we know that the risk of transmission from patient to health care worker is much, much greater than the other way around," she

said. "And yet so much of the attention and focus has been on the minute risk of transmission to patients by health care workers. I think it's unfortunate that people seem to have gotten so caught up in this area, when we need more focus the other way around.

"More importantly, though, I think everyone needs to look at the bigger picture," she said. "I personally believe that, except in extremely limited circumstances, the risk to health care providers (of contracting HIV from patients) is remotely small. We also desperately need health care for people with HIV. There should be a healthy amount of fear and respect, and attention and adherence to the precautions, but we should not let it grow into hysteria."

There are other problems associated with AIDS fears, she noted. Health care workers who want to stay on the job are

now faced with a "disincentive" for getting tested, for fear of discrimination and losing their jobs, according to Dr. Wetzel.

"I've talked to several (health care workers) who have said that, if they had an occupational exposure, they would not get tested," she said. "What I advocate, with time, is that health care workers should be encouraged to know their HIV status...if everyone insists on strict adherence to precautions against transmission, there should not be a need for hysteria." In most cases, however, she noted, hospitals and physicians are "very responsible," and there is still a degree of risk.

In September, 1991, while Dr. Wetzel, then director of a 10-bed, advanced AIDS inpatient care unit at the Fort Worth Hospital, was drawing blood from a patient, she received an acciden-

tal needle stick. Following the hospital's guidelines for occupational exposure, she was tested for HIV. Her first test was negative; a follow up test three months later was positive.

While Wetzel has continued her HIV practice, she said she has had to withdraw from her previous role—for emotional, rather than physical, reasons. "I returned in that (unit director) capacity, to sort of test the waters," she said. "But I found it difficult to handle, being with (patients) who were very advanced on the unit, dealing with death and dying on a daily basis," she said. "For the time being, anyway, I didn't think it was in my best emotional interest."

Wetzel, who in a press conference in March went public as an HIV-positive physician, now devotes much of her time to speaking engagements as a national representative for Caremark. On Monday, she addressed Body Positive Houston, a support group for HIV positive persons, and on Tuesday, she was guest speaker at a luncheon of Houston AIDS physicians at the Wyndham-Warwick Hotel.

Since stepping away from her other work, Dr. Wetzel has become a tireless AIDS researcher and educator, extensively promoting her view that "HIV positive people can lead normal, open and productive lives." She is 31 and lives in Fort Worth with her husband, Dr. Sirous Partovi, who she said has been completely supportive.

Lesbian-gay activists give Democratic candidates warm welcome in Louisiana

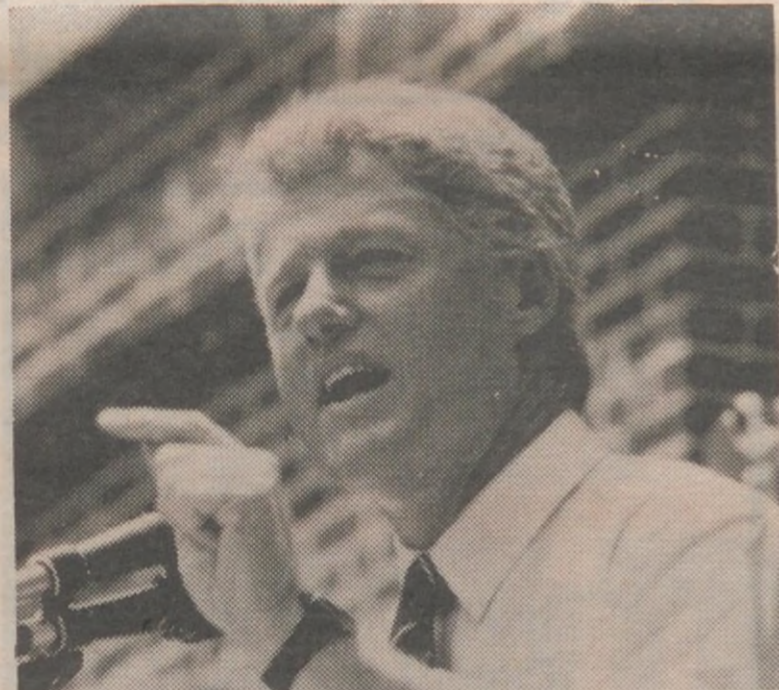

Clinton and Gore arrived in Baton

Rouge for a rally at the flag ship of the state's Black higher education system Southern University. Also addressing the crowd in Baton Rouge was Governor Edwin Edwards who has been noticeably and uncharacteristically absent from this year's presidential campaign.

Two buses crisscrossing the state, one led by New Orleans' U.S. Congressman William Jefferson and the Congressional Black Caucus, and another starting in Clinton, LA and carrying the state's Democratic US Senatorial delegation converged in Baton Rouge.

Joined by the candidates the buses drove to New Orleans for a rally at

predominantly Black Dillard University. Over 1,000 waited in the rain for the candidates to arrive more than an hour behind schedule.

At Woldenberg Park, overlooking the Mississippi River in the historic French Quarter, Gore did most of the talking because the top of the ticket was suffering from his persistent "candidate's throat."

A light rain fell earlier and the event scheduled for 7:00 p.m. got under way two hours late. The crowd swelled into the thousands by the time Clinton and Gore arrived. Clinton tossed out Mardi Gras doubloons and told the sympathetic crowd to keep their eye on the goal and not to relax until all the votes are counted.

On the local campaign trail, U.S. Congressman William Jefferson was in New Orleans last week with his aid John La Place. Recently, Jefferson and the House Black Caucus discussed the AIDS problem and met with the L.A. Laker's best known player Magic Johnson.

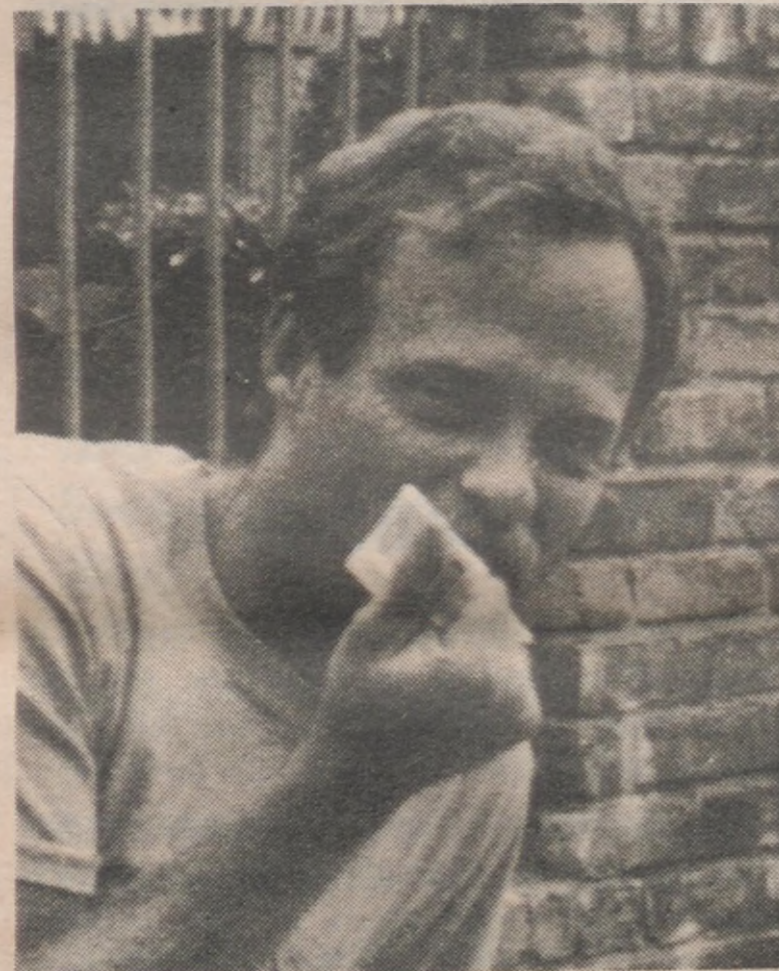

The myths, traditions and true roots of Halloween, as explained by a witch

Picture a full moon, deep in the country. The corn has been harvested and you are walking across an open field. Then in the distance you see a robed figure running across the field broom in hand. It is fall and the figure is a witch. A female in a dark dress that seems to be attempting to ride a broom. The truth is that sweeping the harvested field while wishing it good, is believed to bring out a much greater crop the next season. Halloween is the time of the year for costumes and fears and witches and things that go bump in the night. What does a real witch do on Halloween? Would you like to know? I am a witch, and I will tell you.

Halloween is a very old and ancient holiday. It is a holiday that celebrates the end of the witch's year, the harvest and the changes of cycles. The change from summer to winter and dark to light. The cycles that we each must live with day and night through out our lifetimes there are the things that Samhain (Halloween) deals with. The other cycle that the holiday celebrates death, as well as life. It is the time of the year when it is easy to communicate with

those who have gone before us, a time of the year when we can briefly see the unseen spirits that surround us all year long. Samhain is a time of year when the coven (or chosen family of the witch) comes together and dances and parties and shares the events of the past year and the plans of the year to come.

Witchcraft is a very old religion. It dates back thousands of years. It is growing in population in this country as people look to find a religion that takes them back to the earth. As they seek to find a religion that deals with all the experiences of their life. Witchcraft has never had any form of ceremony that deals with blood. The many myths and stories told about witches are often inventions of other religions to make the young afraid of Witchcraft. The Craft (as we refer to it) deals with nature and people. It celebrates being human and life. The ceremonies take place at the full moon. The original reason for this is less romantic than many would wish. Witchcraft was originally a religion of the poor. In many places it was against the law to practice the religion. The reason for this was that some religions attempted to commit genocide against

other religions. Witchcraft was only one of many religions that were against the law in those days. The poor people refused to let go of their old Gods and they would sneak into the woods at full moon (so they could see, this was before electricity) and pray and dance to the old Gods and Goddess. Many gays and lesbians are starting to turn to "Goddess" worship because it has a long and respected history of tolerance and love. Its foundation is one of sharing, not taking or forcing others to agree. Because of this many gays and lesbians can relate to it. They can also relate to the history of persecution and passive resistance of Goddess worship.

So how do we practice Samhain in this modern age? The coven(s) comes together around the full moon of October (or the 31st) and throws a party. Everyone brings food and drink. The table is spread out with every imaginable type of food. Then before anything is eaten or before one bottle of wine is opened, the coven get dressed (or go skyclad) in their special clothing. This can be robes or just rich costumes that make each person feel special. The coven then marches out into an open

field or the woods. There we lay out a cloth that will act as an altar to the Goddess. Upon this cloth we lay out food for those who have gone before and the unseen spirits. We offer a prayer to the Goddess and to the Gods. We invite all kind spirits who wish to join us to come into the circle of friendship. Each person says a prayer of meaning to them. We express our feelings for each other. We then say a Blessing for all those who have gone before. We close the circle and put out the candles. We talk about what has happened and we dream new dreams and make new plans. We celebrate being a family.

This is what Samhain is like to a coven of witches. I doubt it matches the rich imagination of the fiction writer, but this is the celebration that our coven has been doing since the 1400's. So enjoy Halloween, enjoy our festive holiday. When you to a costume party this year, remember where the tradition came from and know that it has always been as much fun as it is today. As you walk down the dark, dark street during October remember that this is the time of the year when the wall between the worlds is the most thin, who knows what that shadow really is!

Houston Endowment grant helps Montrose Counseling Center buy new building

The Montrose Counseling Center, one of the longest surviving service provider institutions in Houston's gay and lesbian community, will move from the building it has occupied for over 14 years on Jan. 22.

The center, which has been the major tenant at 900 Lovett since 1978, will almost double its space in its new home at 701 Richmond. Representatives called the two-story office building recently purchased by the organization the Counseling Center's 15th anniversary present to itself.

Crews are scheduled to move the center's furnishings just a week before the entire 900 Lovett landmark is scheduled for demolition. The Lovett Street complex also currently houses the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus, and in the past has been home to an early version of Dirty Sally's nightclub and the office of State Rep. Debra Danburg.

The Richmond building's \$495,000 price tag looked more attractive next to a \$100,000 grant from the prestigious Houston Endowment, former owners of the Houston Chronicle, noted a center official.

"The Houston Endowment grant recognizes the major contributions gays and lesbians have made to Houston," said Ann Robison, executive director. "We are so proud of this grant. It will open many doors for the Montrose

Counseling Center."

Major contributions also were made by board member Steve Tarry and the estates of former board presidents Darrell Butler and Dwayne Wells, and former board member Robert Umstaddt.

Counseling Center staff and board

members toured the 13,000 square foot building last Saturday morning, Oct. 17.

"Fortunately, little renovation is needed," Robison said. The only area requiring major remodeling is the community meeting room, she said.

To help pay for the remodeling, the

counseling center is offering groups an annual meeting discount: \$250 in advance for 12 monthly meetings.

To fill the larger office space, the center offers a chance to donate items on its wish list, officials noted. The list includes: six and eight foot tables, stacking or folding chairs, desks, chairs and bookcases, sofas or love seats, full size refrigerator, decorative items such as fake plants, all art and historic gay/lesbian posters.

Volunteers also will be needed to help paint, plaster and install dry wall. To volunteer or donate items, call (713) 529-0037.

To keep pace with demand, the center recently added staff and has received a United Way grant for a mental health educator to coordinate outreach.

Montrose Counseling Center fees are based on ability to pay. In the first half of fiscal year 1992, more than 2700 individual therapy sessions were provided free of charge or at substantially reduced fees. In addition to individual and couples counseling, the non-profit center offers a full range of mental health services, including chemical dependency groups, women's and men's sexual abuse survivor groups, therapy groups, Men's and Women's Network, HIV/AIDS support groups, case management and home counseling. Question of gay marriage now before state Supreme Court in Hawaii

HONOLULU, Wednesday, Oct. 14 (AP)—The question of whether gay couples should legally be allowed to get married was put before the state Supreme Court Tuesday, and two justices appeared skeptical of the state's stand against legalizing same-sex unions.

Chief Appeals Court Judge James Burns, sitting in for Chief Justice Herman Lum, who excused himself without giving a reason, asked pointed questions of Deputy Attorney General Sonia Faust.

Faust argued that Dan Foley, the attorney for three gay couples challenging the state's ban on same-sex marriages, was taking the position that the Hawaii Constitution required the state

to issue marriage licenses to gay couples.

"They want you not to discriminate against them," Burns said when he challenged Faust's argument.

Burns and Associate Justice Steven Levinson both questioned how the case could be dismissed from Circuit Court without the state having to produce evidence to justify banning gay marriages.

The ruling was made by Judge Robert Klein, now on the Supreme Court. Klein withdrew from the case so he wouldn't have to rule on a ruling he made previously. Klein had issued his ruling without hearing any evidence.

Klein ruled last year that homosexual marriages aren't a fundamental right

under the state Constitution.

Foley argued Tuesday that the high court should declare gays have such a right under the Hawaii Constitution's broad protections of privacy rights. At the very least, he said the case should be sent back to the lower court for the state to produce evidence to justify the discrimination.

Faust argued that there aren't any court cases that say homosexuals should be protected from discrimination to enable them to get married. She also said legislators are entitled to prohibit such marriages based on morality or other reasons.

"I still don't understand what you're saying," Burns said. Levinson questioned how Klein's ruling could make

factual conclusions when no evidentiary hearing was held

"How could Judge Klein find fact in absence of any record whatsoever?" Levinson asked.

Two of the couples who filed the lawsuit—Ninia Baehr and Genora Dancel, Joseph Melillo and Patrick Lagon—sat in the front row of the packed gallery. Afterwards they said they consider themselves married, but want their marriages to be legally recognized to enable them to have the same rights and privileges enjoyed by other married couples.

Foley said he was encouraged by the hearing, but said there's no way of knowing which way the court will rule. The justices gave no indication on when a ruling would be issued.

THRF: organizations needed to sign briefs in support of 21.06 lawsuit

The Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF), the organization sponsoring the lawsuit challenging Section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code, is issuing a call to organizations throughout the state to sign on to amicus curiae or "friend of the court" briefs stating that the statute is unconstitutional.

The case, "Morales et al vs. the State of Texas," will be heard before the Texas Supreme Court on Jan. 5, 1993. The case was heard before 200th District Court Judge Paul Davis in December of 1990. Davis ruled that the statute violated the Texas Constitution. That decision was appealed to the Third District Court of Appeals in Austin by Attorney General Dan Morales. The appellate court upheld Davis' ruling in a unanimous decision, stating, "we can think of nothing more fundamentally private and

deserving of protection than sexual behavior between consenting adults in private...in short, the state cannot make the same conduct criminal when done by one (homosexuals), and innocent when done by another (heterosexuals)."

On May 8, 1992, Morales filed an application for writ of error to the Texas Supreme Court on behalf of the state "to complain of errors of law committed by the Court of Appeals in affirming the judgment of the trial court. The points of error the state alleges are as follows:

(Point of Error 1)—The Court of Appeals erred in holding that the trial court had jurisdiction and that the Respondents had standing to challenge the constitutionality of Section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code.

(Point of Error 2)—The Court of Appeals erred in overruling Petitioner's Point of Error No. 1 because respondents have no standing to challenge the

constitutionality of a criminal statute in a civil proceeding absent a showing that a vested property interest has been affected.

(Point of Error 3)—The Court of Appeals erred in holding that Section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code violates the right to privacy under the Texas Constitution.

(Point of Error 4)—The Court of Appeals erred in overruling Petitioner's Point of Error No. 2 and affirming the trial court's judgment declaring 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code unconstitutional and enjoining its enforcement.

At the appellate level, amicus briefs were filed on behalf of the plaintiffs by the American Psychological Association, the National Association of Social Workers, the Texas Chapter of Social Workers, the Texas Criminal Defense Attorneys, the Bay Area Lawyers, the American Jewish Congress and the Clark Read Foundation. THRF believes

that the amicus strategy played an integral role in obtaining the Third District Court's favorable ruling.

We were very fortunate to have so many organizations come forward with briefs at the appellate level. With the case going to the Texas Supreme Court, a concerted amicus strategy is essential.

THRF conceived the law suit challenging 21.06 and is paying all court costs and attorneys' fees in the case, which currently comes to \$60,000. Festival adds program: two film projects by Austinites will be screened

The Austin Gay and Lesbian Film Festival has announced an additional special program featuring videos by local residents, "Shadows: that which is cast to the side" and "Homo Hate in Houston: Gay Cable Network coverage of the Republican National Convention." The program will play at 12:00 noon on both Saturday, Oct. 24 and Saturday, Oct. 31.

"Shadows: that which is cast to the side" is a 45-minute narrative which blends a variety of film styles with poetry, performance art and dance to communicate a powerful and contemporary message about HIV/AIDS infection, denial and survival. Created with the goal of bringing the reality of AIDS within the African-American community to the screen, "Shadows" speaks in the language and style of the young, urban African-American population to portray issues which must be, yet have not been, addressed.

A local production, "Shadows" is based on the writings of Austin poet Sharon Bridgforth, an African-American who works as a counselor in sexually transmitted disease clinics, and is directed by Jana Birchum, an Austin film maker and photographer.

"Homo Hate in Houston: Gay Cable Network coverage of the RNC" is a 55-minute video including interviews on the convention floor with Pat Robertson and Phyllis Schlafly, coverage of the ACT UP demonstration/HPD confrontation and the experiences of Austin-based GCN journalist Beth Leibo.

Leibo was arrested while reporting on the convention floor. She was charged with assaulting a police officer when,

during an attempt by police to make Leibo and a colleague leave the floor, she insisted on their rights as press to be there. Leibo will be present to answer questions after the screening.

Former director rejoins GMHC; 'Hair Wars,' 'Undead in Concert' benefit shows

John-Michael Albert, who is taking over the helm of the Gay Men's Chorus of Houston, can hardly be called the group's "new" conductor and artistic director. Albert is a six year veteran and long-time booster of the chorus, formerly the Montrose Singers.

Albert said he started in September of 1981 and continued with the group until the fall of 1987. For much of that time, he conducted the Singers, leading them through both a peak in the early 80's and a slump in the post-referendum, AIDS era creative deflation period of 1985-87.

"After I left, I stayed in touch (with the group). I've also always stayed involved with music," said Albert, who has sung professionally with the Bach Society. He is also a composer.

In 1990, Albert appeared as a guest soloist with the group at their annual winter concert, where he premiered a song he had composed about the holidays. That song (since titled "A Season for Lovers") won the composers' contest at this year's Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses (GALA) conference, held in Denver.

Albert was in fact the group's third selection to replace resigned

director Beau Cain, and he says the members talked him into coming back. The conductor the group had chosen first wound up having to move to Austin, and the second to be picked had to decline because of a surge in his business, Albert explained.

The decision to come back was easy, however, in part because of recent changes in the group's focus and structure, he said. "I think they're really moving in the right direction now, especially since they're becoming a non-profit organization...they've got a strong board now, and I really like the strong gay identification (of the name change). I think it's important."

Albert said he will now concentrate on eliminating "the things that divide (a chorus) both musically and (in) attitude," as well as sharpening and snapping up the sound of the voices as a unified instrument. "A chorus is, after all, one instrument, not several," he emphasized.

The group is still recruiting new members, he noted. "A lot of people are intimidated by performing groups. We're about welcoming people, if they can carry a tune in a bucket. In a volunteer chorus, you have people of many different skill levels, and you keep working, and you have to have a positive

attitude," Albert said.

Two UCLA fraternities suspended pending songbook investigation

LOS ANGELES, Friday, Oct. 16 (AP)—Two UCLA fraternities were banned from homecoming and other campus activities until hearings are held to determine whether their songbooks are racist, sexist and anti-gay, an official said.

The ban applies to the Theta Xi and Sigma Pi fraternities at the University of California, Los Angeles, said UCLA spok-

espersion Olivia Cervantes on Thursday.

The ban took effect Tuesday, and hearing dates have not been set, she said.

Presidents of Sigma Pi and Theta Xi can choose a hearing conducted by peers or by university administrators, Ms. Cervantes said.

"The possible outcome could be a complete disassociation from the university—

meaning they're gone," she said.

An investigation began when October editions of a UCLA magazine published excerpts of the Theta Xi chapter's songbook, which described sex with a Mexican prostitute and described rival fraternity members as "faggots."

Allen Yarnell, assistant vice chancellor for student and campus life, called the lyr-

ics "ugly, sexist, racist and homophobic." Theta Xi's national organization suspended its UCLA chapter.

University officials learned about graphic lyrics in Sigma Pi's songbook soon afterward, Ms. Cervantes said.

Theta Xi chapter president Mark Buckhantz said his chapter's songbook hadn't been used for more than a year because some members found it offensive.

Houstonian gains national note with campy cable cooking show in N.Y.

How did an everyday "ham" from Houston parlay the usually unrelated skills of cooking and drag into TV notoriety in New York City and a mention in the pages of the November issue "Vanity Fair?" One who asks Kevin Hasson, also known as Ruby Stone, isn't likely to get much of an answer; Ruby says she doesn't really know.

"Shhh! If we keep talking about it, it might stop," says Hasson, a New York flight attendant when he isn't on Access Cable in the Big Apple as Ruby, a character he created to crash a Houston party years ago. He is vigilant of his new found fifteen minutes of fame.

"I was on (the air) for four years before anyone ever contacted me," he explains.

Hasson's cooking show, "Come and Get It," has broken not only the barrier between Public Access and "real TV" by attracting a serious following, it has also attracted the attention of talk show hosts and benefit organizers. And now, he notes, the high point: Stone is mentioned in Vanity Fair's feature article on drag screen performers in the grand company of the likes of Dame Edna,

Divine, and "Uncle Miltie."

He said he met comic and talk show host Joan Rivers at a benefit for the Gay and Lesbian Center of New York, and that he has talked to people about appearing on various national shows, though no deal has been made. "I'm getting asked to do a lot of benefits and things," he says.

On Monday, he was preparing for such an appearance, a benefit for Oregon's "No on 9" campaign during which he claimed he would cook "Pat Robertson."

"I'm gonna make soup, so I'll need a bone. He doesn't have a backbone, so I can't use that...his head is all bone, but too much fat...I've looked below his waist,

and there's not a sign of a bone there..." The "wiggled out" recipe gives an idea of the banter on Stone's show, but while some in the television audience "catch" it, many do not.

Hasson says the show, in the beginning, was a joke. "I had this idea, I'd get in drag a do this on the Access Channel."

He had always loved to cook and—in his own words—was "born a drag queen"—but had no professional experience at either prior to the show. He cooked for personal satisfaction and for friends, he said, and he did drag for fun, says Hasson, noting that one of his must-do trips home to Houston each year is for "The Garden Party—I love it!"

"When I realized the response—and that people also accepted this as a serious cooking show, I was shocked." He was also surprised that apparently not everyone realizes he is a man. "I still find that amusing...I mean, I'm really not that convincing," he says.

What has surprised him the most is the show's diverse following. "I get such varied letters."

In honor of the Vanity Fair article—which describes him as "a stubbled beauty who serves up high-cholesterol treats," Hasson says he devoted a show to Texas-style cholesterol packers, including chicken fried steak with cream gravy and mashed potatoes. He was a bit miffed with the characterization of his recipes. "If they would have watched more often, they would know that I always have an alternative to the high cholesterol things," says Hasson, whose intonation fluctuates so often it's difficult to tell when he's serious.

Ruby now has a cookbook out, available only through the mail and advertised, usually by word of mouth ("Of course, you can't sell anything on Public Access, you know.") She donates the proceeds to area HIV/AIDS charities.

'The Will Rogers Follies' brings Broadway to the Houston Music Hall

The biggest Broadway musical of 1991 is coming to Houston. "The Will Rogers Follies," which one Tony awards galore—Best Musical, Best Direction, Best Score, Best Choreography, Best Lighting and Best Sound—and which was named Best Musical by the Drama Desk and the New York Drama Critics' Circle, is being presented in the Music Hall from Oct. 27th-Nov. 8th as part of the 1992-93 NationsBank Houston Broadway Series.

Reprising their roles from the original Broadway run, for the touring production of this musical extravaganza, are veteran actor Keith Carradine, in the title role, and Dee Hoty as Mrs. Will Rogers. Joining the stage stars from the Broadway production is Houstonian Tommy Tune, who serves as both director and choreographer.

This unabashedly optimistic and distinctly American musical combines two of the best known American icons—Will Rogers and Florenz Ziegfeld—by showcasing Rogers' life in a manner perfected by the great showman Ziegfeld.

Rogers, who is probably the best-loved American entertainer ever and certainly its most popular folk hero, was the top box office attraction in the world. He dined with five different presidents, had a daily newspaper column carried in over 350 publications, was the most requested public speaker and highest paid radio personality of his day, and he accomplished it all with a down-home, common sense affability that has become a permanent part of the American psyche.

Ziegfeld was America's premier theatrical producer during the early part of the century. His musical revue, "The Ziegfeld Follies," ran from 1907-1927 and included dozens of entertainers who

would later rise to greater fame. Among them were Rogers, Fannie Brice, Eddie Cantor, Marion Davies, Irene Dunne, W.C. Fields, Paulette Goddard and Burt Williams. His shows featured beautiful women, lavish costumes and extravagant sets and left an indelible mark on live theater in general and Vaudeville in particular.

The combination of Rogers' home-spun humor and Ziegfeld's opulence employed by the shows creative forces makes "The Will Rogers Follies" an irresistible delight. And no wonder, the artists who pooled their talents to bring this show to the stage stand as one of the strongest Broadway teams in years.

Tommy Tune marks his seventh Broadway show as director or choreographer or both with "Follies." He delivers high-spirited flair in his directing and razzle-dazzle tapping in his choreography and with this show continues a

remarkable string of Broadway successes that includes "the Best Little Whorehouse in Texas," "My One and only," "Nine" and "Grand Hotel."

The composer is Cy Coleman, who is probably the only artist still creating music comparable to the great show tunes and pop songs that prevailed from the end of World I to just after World War II. He has some classic hits such as "Hey, Look Me Over," "If My Friends Could See Me Now" and "Big Spender" that pulse with a cool, jazzy style overlaid on sophisticated, but still accessible, melodies. Unlike "City of Angels," another current Broadway hit for which he composed the score, the music for "Follies" is not intellectual highbrow, rather its brassy and earthy and perfect for the show.

Lyricists Betty Comden and Adolph Green are the longest running partnership in Broadway history. They've craf-

ted simple, endearing lyrics for shows like "On the Town" and "Peter Pan" as well as individual songs like "New York, New York" and "The Party's Over." This unpretentious style continues with "Follies" as best exemplified by the show's theme song, "I Never Met a Man I Didn't Like." The lyrics in part say, "If you don't expect too much/There's a certain human touch/Homo sapiens has got/Other animals have not..." These uncomplicated, reaffirming words ideally underscore Rogers sunny opinion of people.

Librettist Peter Stone, who has also penned "1776" and "Woman of the Year," launched the Will Rogers project in 1987, and it was he who approached the others. Stone's admiration for Rogers dates to his childhood when his father would read Rogers' column in the newspaper at the family breakfast table. These fond family memories were reinforced when Stone's father, a Hollywood producer, took the boy and his brother to meet Rogers in a studio set. "I remember his face very clearly, nice and crinkly," Stone remarked in a Vogue magazine interview. "Three months later he died in a plane crash. My parents were devastated. ...But that was the hold Will Rogers had on people's lives." Stone, apparently, among them.

Associate director Phil Oesterman refers to the selection of Keith Carradine for the lead role as "instantaneous recognition. He didn't have to say a word." This spontaneous and unanimous reaction from the creative team could be hailed as an act of perfect casting. Howard Kissel of the "New York Daily News" wrote: "It's hard to think of any recent Broadway performer with so much natural charm." Perhaps even no one since Will Rogers.

"The Will Rogers Follies" has been called "the musical audiences have really been waiting for." Well, the wait is over for Houston.

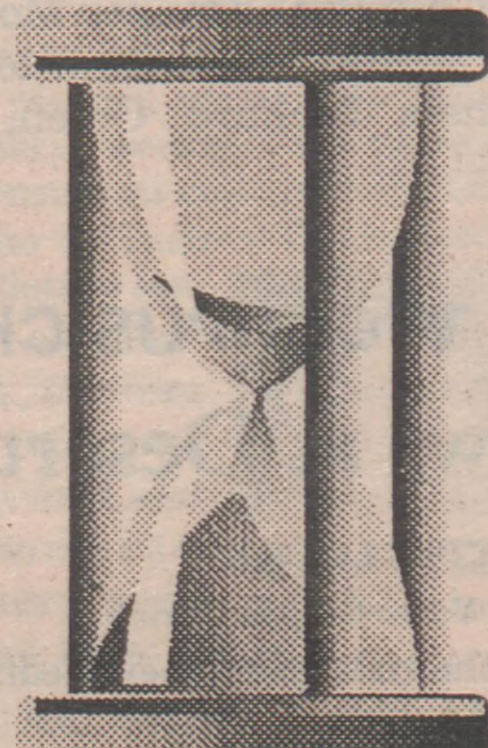

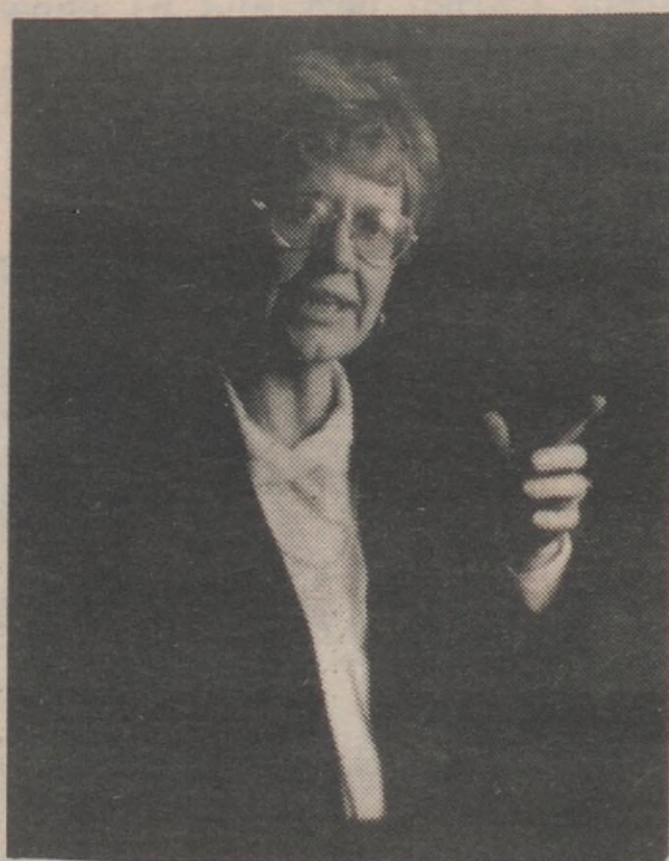

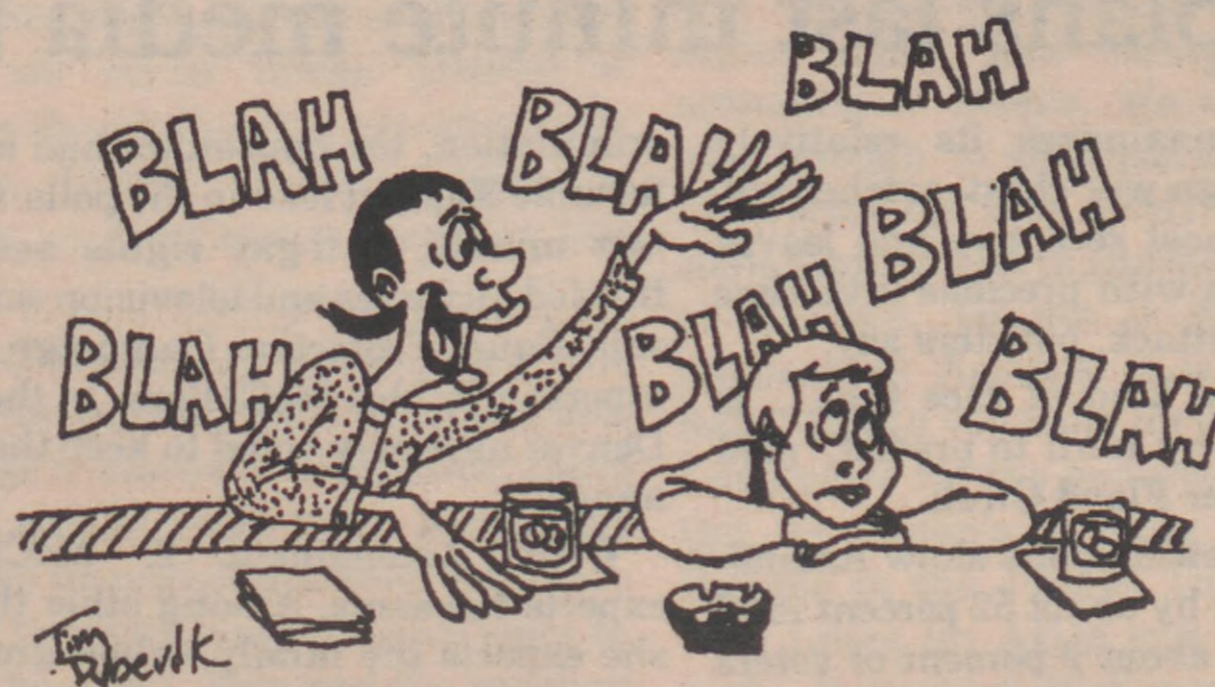

Family values group plans last minute media blitz in Colorado

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Saturday, Oct. 17 (AP)—Backers of Amendment 2, the ballot proposal that would prohibit laws to protect gays, lesbians and bisexuals from discrimination, plan a last minute blitz before the Nov. 3 election day.

Colorado for Family Values, the Colorado Springs-based group that sponsored the amendment, plans to air its first prime-time television commercials Monday.

Amendment 2's opponents, who have already had commercials running for several weeks, say they also plan to step up their campaign.

In waiting until the last minute, Fam-

ily Values maximizes its relatively small campaign war chest, catches voters at their most receptive and leaves the opposition with precious little time for a counterattack, pollsters say.

"This is the kind of race that ... is going to be very hard to predict," said Denver pollster Floyd Ciruli.

Recent statewide polls show Amendment 2 failing by about 52 percent to 39 percent, with about 9 percent of voters undecided. That's little comfort to the Equal Protection Campaign, the group fighting the measure.

Two years ago, when Denver voters had to decide whether to repeal a city ordinance that protects gays from dis-

crimination, the opposition had a comfortable 30-point lead in the polls. At the last minute, anti-gay rights activists flooded airwaves and television screens, said Equal Protection Campaign spokesperson Bobbie McCallum. In the end, Denver narrowly voted to keep the ordinance.

With Amendment 2, McCallum expects the same. Among other things, she expects the family values group to air graphic and sensational footage of a gay pride parade in San Francisco.

Will Perkins of Colorado For Family Values said his group "has a variety of things we will be presenting."

"The intent of all our media is to make

the public aware of the facts," he said.

But McCallum said a recent Family Values campaign brochure is a taste of the distortion that could come in the next 2 1/2 weeks.

Says the brochure:

"In Laguna Beach, Calif., a city with one of the country's largest gay communities and strongest gay rights ordinances, a 3-year-old boy entered a public park restroom. Three grown gay men were engaging in group sex, right there in the bathroom! When he ran out to his mother, crying and upset, she attempted to file a complaint with the Laguna Beach Police Department. Their reply: With a gay rights ordinance in place, there was nothing they could do."

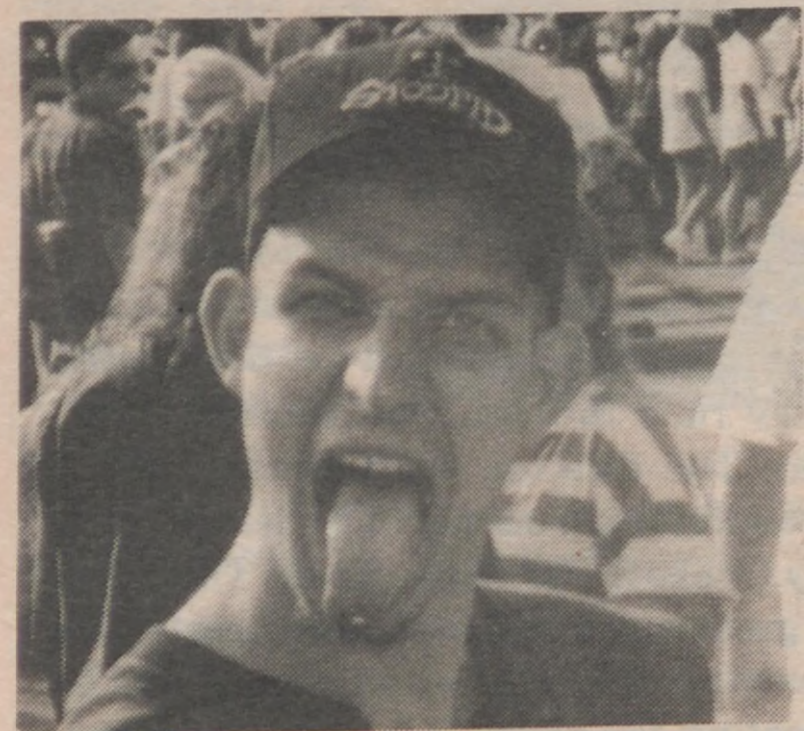

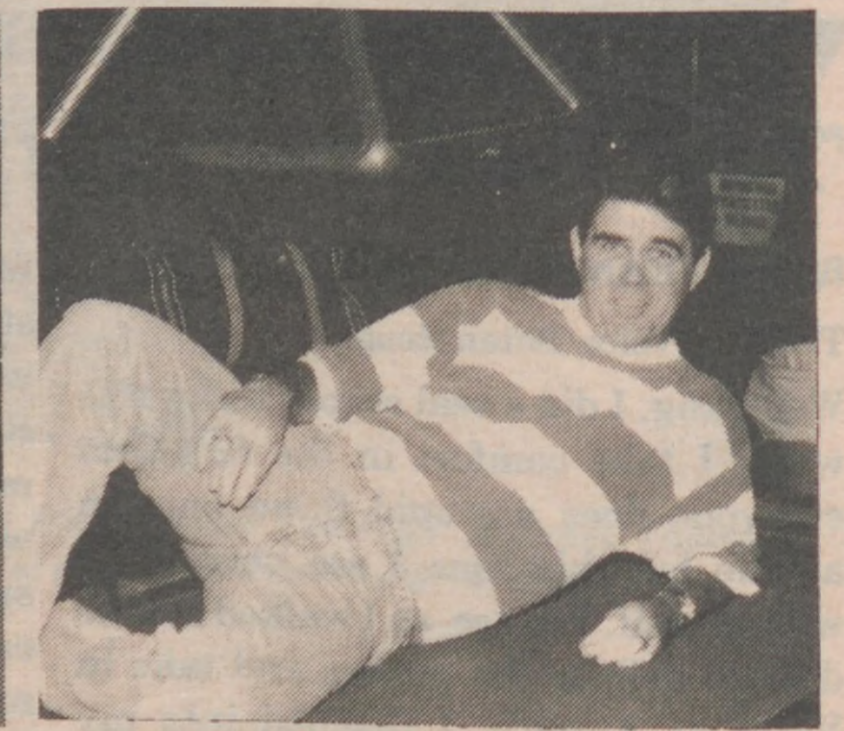

Christian league shelves anti-gay petition drive in Portland, Maine

SOUTH PORTLAND, Maine, Saturday, Oct. 17 (AP)—Leaders of Maine's Christian Civic League voted Saturday to put off launching a petition drive aimed at requiring voter approval of any gay rights measure passed by state lawmakers.

The decision by league directors comes just more than two weeks before Portland holds a municipal referendum on an ordinance that would ban discrimination against homosexuals in employment, housing, credit and public

leaders still believe their bid to make voter ratification a prerequisite of any gay rights law is legal and that the league will prevail in court.

"So the option for us is very much alive," Wyman said.

But he also noted that, given petition filing deadlines and the expectation that the court will not take up the matter until some time next year, the board's decision means that there will be no referendum on the issue in 1993.

As its annual convention continued,

the conservative church group kicked off a new Campaign for Our Children, modeled after an advertising effort promoting sexual abstinence among children in Maryland.

The executive director of the Maryland drive, Hal Donofrio, was invited to address the league's convention dinner at the Sheraton Tara Hotel.

Supporters credit the Maryland initiative for contributing to a significant decrease in teen pregnancies and abortions in that state.

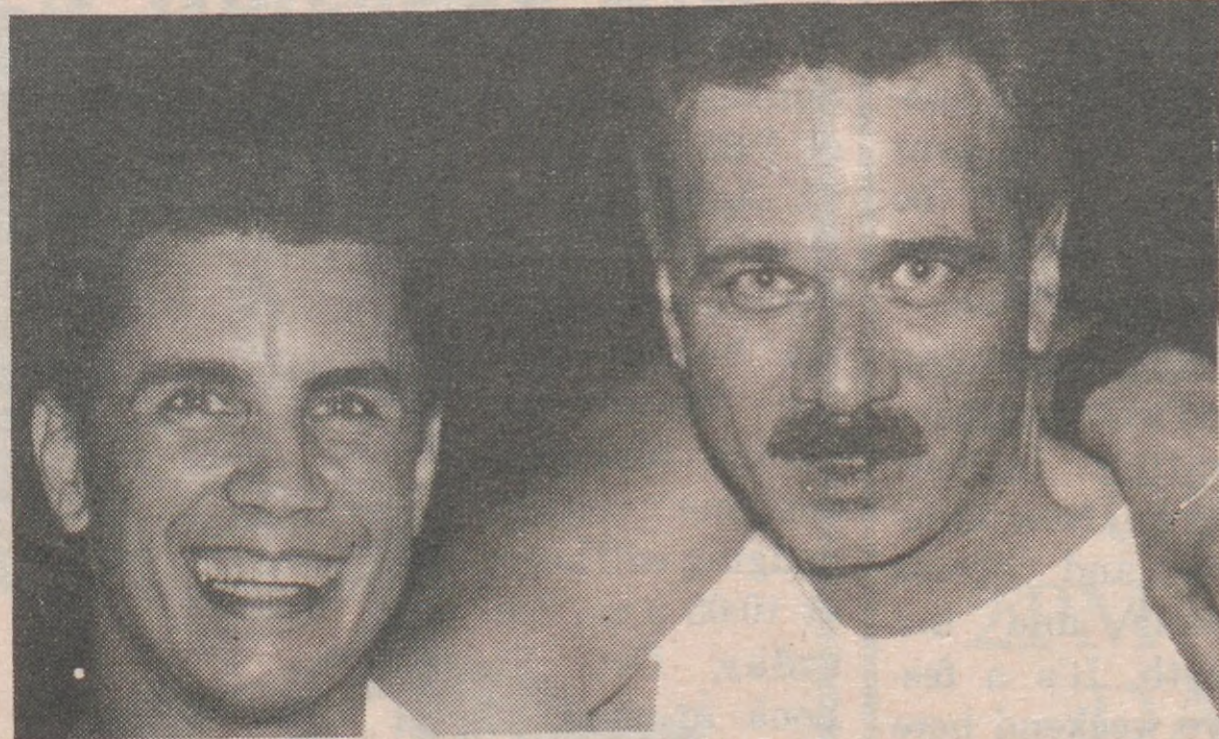

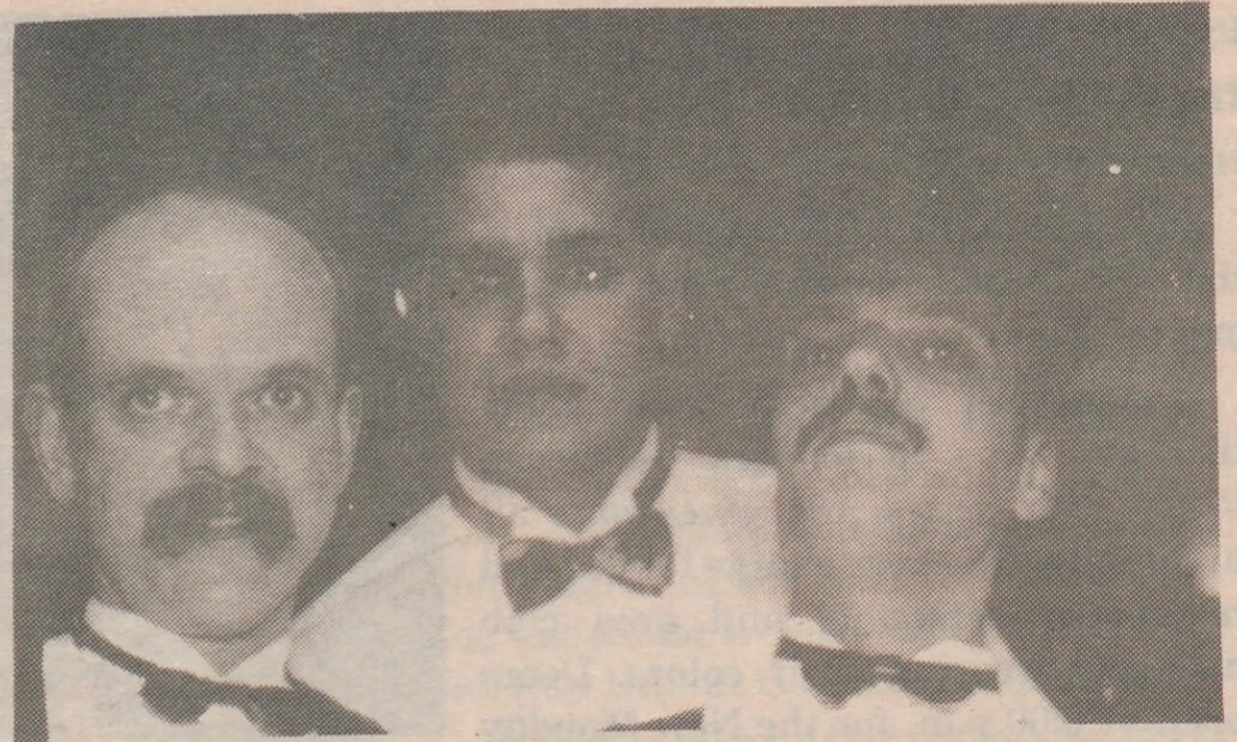

Oregon Governor Booth Gardner speaks out against anti-gay measure

PORTLAND, Ore., Monday, Oct. 19 (AP)—Washington Gov. Booth Gardner has denounced an Oregon initiative that would declare homosexuality perverse and abnormal.

The Democratic governor predicted that Oregon would lose substantial international trade if the measure passed.

"There are serious economic consequences to this," Gardner said Sunday. "I think it would have a very negative effect. The people with whom we trade are very sensitive to discrimination."

The governor and eight Seattle City Council members were in Portland Sun-

day for the Chamber of Commerce's annual leadership conference.

Gardner said overseas trade partners would watch carefully for the social and legal instability that opponents predict the measure would bring.

Measure 9 would amend the Oregon state constitution to remove civil rights protections based on sexual preference. It would require schools to teach youths that homosexuality, pedophilia and sadism are unnatural and perverse.

Seattle City Attorney Mark Sidran, a prosecutor for 15 years, said the measure could lead to "hate crimes" against homosexuals.

The measure's wording, he said, does not make homosexuality illegal but gives it the appearance of a crime because it's placed alongside pedophilia, which is illegal.

"If this passes, a message of hate will unleash physical violence against gays and lesbians solely because of that status. It will be terrible," he said.

"Who is going to be next?" asked City Councilwoman Martha Choe. "Will it be me, just because I am an Asian woman? When does it stop?"

Councilwoman Sherry Harris, a lesbian, said the measure is "one of the most malicious pieces of hate legislation

that has ever been proposed through the initiative process."

Anne Levinson, legal counsel to Seattle Mayor Norm Rice and a lesbian, recalled the discrimination faced by members of her family because their Jewish faith.

"Twenty-five years later, I'm being told the same thing—people don't know me, but they hate me," she said. "I don't want to be hated for those I choose to love."

Seattle voters in 1978 turned down a measure to remove homosexuals from protection under the city's fair-employment ordinance.

Male bed and breakfast that sparked controversy in Kentucky now open

RUSSELLVILLE, Ky., Saturday, Oct. 17 (AP)—A gay couple has opened a bed-and-breakfast inn here despite hostility from residents who said they were outraged that homosexuals would be welcome.

James Turner, who owns the retreat with James Cates, said Saturday the Stone Mountain Estate passed its health inspection Wednesday and is now taking reservations.

Turner said the inn has had no customers or inquiries since opening.

"Let's put it this way, if you were planning to go to Beirut, would you go?" he

joked.

After the two men announced their plans several weeks ago, they found effigies hanging from trees along the drive, received obscene phone calls and death threats. They hired additional security guards.

Representatives of the American Civil Liberties Union held a news conference Monday and urged local law enforcement officers to respond to the hostilities. Turner said since then, other citizens have expressed their backing.

"Since the ACLU meeting, we've gotten a lot more support. We haven't had

any more threats or obscene phone calls. We've even had some neighbors come and visit," Turner said.

Turner said one thing that helped was a call tracing system that began to identify where some of the obscene phone calls were originating.

Turner said he was surprised the inn passed inspection "because word on the street was we would not. An inspection that was supposed to take 30 minutes to one hour took three hours. They went through here with a fine-tooth comb."

Turner said a Louisville television station and "others that knew about the

laws regulating bed and breakfasts" observed the inspection. "They knew they were being watched, otherwise we would never have gotten the permit."

The inn is now patrolled by 24-hour security.

"Anyone who came here would be safe," Turner said.

He said so far, he and Cates are relying on word of mouth and news stories to bring in customers. He said the money the two had to spend to provide security ate up their advertising budget. "But we're open. Come see us," he said.
