DUNHAM, MADDEN, TORRES, WILSON BEGIN NEW LIVES UPON RETIREMENT





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SHELL CHILDREN ELIGIBLE FOR 50 SHELL COMPANIES SCHOLARSHIPS

For the fourth year, the Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated, will sponsor 50 college scholarships for Shell children. The National Merit Scholarship Corporation will administer all phases of the program. Those eligible are children of regular full-time employees, retirees and deceased employees of Shell Oil Company (including Shell Chemical Company, Shell Development Company, and Shell Canadian Exploration Company) and Shell Pipe Line Corporation.

To be eligible for the 1972 competition, students must be either second-semester juniors or first-semester seniors as of February 1971, and at that time must take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The test will be given to some 750,000 students in more than 17,250 high schools that enroll about 95 percent of the nation's high school students.

The 1972 Shell Companies Scholarships, will be awarded to students completing private, public, or parochial secondary school in 1972 and entering college that same year. Winners will be chosen by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation on the basis of scholastic aptitude, leadership, and good citizenship. Awards are to be made in the late spring of 1972.

Each scholarship will be a four-year award, covering the undergraduate years. The amount will be based on an individual winner's financial needs. Maximum is \$1,500 a year for four years; minimum, \$500 a year.

Booklets setting forth details of the program and entry blanks are available on request. Employees should consult bulletin boards or contact their Employee Relations office for information as to where they may be obtained. Children of retirees or deceased employees should contact the Employee Relations office at any Company location.

Completed entry blanks for the 1972 Competition must be submitted to the Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated, Scholarship Competition, c/o 6th Floor, 1 Shell Plaza, Houston, Texas, by February 12, 1971.

The Shell Companies Scholarship program is in addition to the Shell Merit Scholarships, open to all high school students and the Shell Achievement Scholarships, offered to Negro high school students through the National Achievement Scholarship Program. All three programs are sponsored by the Shell Companies Foundation and administered by the National Merit Scholarship Competition.



SHELLSHAPE, CAR CARE CENTER, COMING TO 100 SERVICE STATIONS

Shellshape,* a new program which turns the service station into a mini car-care center, is coming to this area.

Successfully tested last year in Dayton, Ohio, the program is now being further tested at 100 Shell service stations, 25 of them in each Marketing Region.

Shellshape calls for \$25,000 worth of diagnostic equipment in one of a station's service bays. It enables a trained diagnostician to perform 118 different tests on almost every aspect of a car's engine and other parts in less than an hour.

The result is that the customer gets a diagnostic report of his car, broken down into what should be repaired immediately, what are the recommended repairs for current trouble-free driving, and what repairs will put the car in first class condition.

Men operating the diagnostic equipment receive 160 hours of training from Shellshape instructors.


The program is designed to bring in more business while making the service station a place for professional care of all automotive needs.


**MANN BECOMES SENIOR ENGINEER,

Dick, a graduate of Pennsylvania State University, holds an M.S. degree in chemical engineering. He joined Shell in 1968 as a Systems Analyst.




