COMPLEX MANAGER PRESENTS SHELL'S DONATION TO FURNISH DEER PARK AUDITORIUM

The Deer Park Manufacturing Complex donated \$3,500 to the Parks and Recreation Department of the City of Deer Park to furnish the auditorium of the city's new Civic Center being built at Dow Park.

The donation was in response to an appeal by the city to local business, industry and civic organizations to help furnish the

\$100,000 building. Other organizations have agreed to furnish various rooms in the center.

The new Civic Center is part of a continuing program to develop Deer Park's Dow Park. In addition to the new building, the project will ultimately include a botanical garden, swimming and wading pools, a picnic area, tennis courts, a

basketball pavillion, baseball and softball diamonds and a playground.

Construction of the Civic Center began in January and will be completed in July and opened for summer recreation programs. It will have five activity rooms, two meeting rooms, a kitchen, two game rooms, an exercise room and the auditorium, which will be named the Shell Auditorium. A plaque will be installed in the room to recognize Shell's contribution.

MISSION ROSARIO IMPORTANT ARCHEOLOGICAL SITE

In 1754, Franciscan priests seeking converts among the war-like Indian tribes of the Texas coast founded Mission Rosario on a small hilltop four miles southwest of what is now the town of Goliad.

The priests were in the territory of the Karankawas, and these Indians were so independent that in the first 10 years of the mission only one Indian was known to have accepted Christianity.

By the late 1790's Mission Rosario had been temporarily abandoned, then revitalized with new construction.

But evidently the priests there could not get support from the Spanish authorities for their work and by 1807 the mission was again abandoned.

The ruins of Mission Rosario are now part of Goliad State Park and the scene of archeological work the past two years.

Work at the seven-acre site included searching for former wall lines and defining more than 24 rooms known to have been inside the mission compound.

Some 19 rooms were partially excavated and thousands of artifacts recovered. Unfortunately, most of the artifacts and valuable field notes and drawings were lost during World War II. Recent investigations have revealed much information about the mission and its former inhabitants.

Archeological investigations of Mission Rosario ruins include laboratory analysis, cleaning and preservation of

artifacts and additional research.

After evaluation of research data, a preservation plan will be developed to determine future use and interpretative objectives of the site.

Presently, interpretative displays relative to Mission Rosario are found at nearby Goliad State Park.

So, when you're in that area, drop in and discover Rosario.




