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ORDER OF BUSINESS
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1. Call to Order by the Presiding Officer:

The meeting was called to order by Speaker of the Senate Michelle Palmer at 7:15 p.m.

2. Call of the Roll by the Secretary:

Senate Secretary Quynh Thai called the roll and the following senators were present: Bobbie Bowen, Shane Patrick Boyle, Aijaz Chaudary, Anthony Cheng, Vernita Hoyt, Randy Kirby, Carlos Morales, Amy Parks, Gregory Propes, Saud Qazi, Cipriano Romero, Kevin Soebbing, Crystal Wallace, Coy Wheeler, Jennifer Zuber.

The following senators were late: Jeff Fuller, Henry Gaw, Gavin Kaszynski.

The following senators were absent: Dina Abramson, Om Chawla, Reshma Patel, Brian Thompson, Greg Wassberg.

There were no senators excused.

The following Executive Cabinet members were present: Hilary Harmon, Kevin Jefferies, Mitch Rhodes, Jason Fuller.

The following university officials were present: Consuelo Trevino, Director of Campus Activities.

3. Reading and Approval of the Senate Journal from the Previous Meeting:

The Senate Journal was approved as corrected by the members.

4. Students Wishing to Address the Senate

Jerrald Alwais said that due to his failure to apply with the SA Election Code and his personal decision not to continue running, his name has been dropped off the ballot. He encouraged present senators and senatorial candidates to begin talking to students "a lot more" and to find out what student's concerns are. Mr. Alwais said that SA has "a lot of potential to do a lot of great work in representing the students." He said that "thus far the contact has been minimal" and that "as a student leader I see it as a shame to see that going on." Mr. Alwais encouraged election candidates not to talk about their own party but to talk about issues that concern students such as restructuring, crime, and parking. He said that "these issues need to be discussed now instead of after the election." Mr. Alwais thanked those members of SA who have served throughout the year for the work that they have done. He said that "a lot of great things happened." Mr. Alwais also thanked Kevin Jefferies and Mitch Rhodes for voicing UH's concerns and thoughts to the state legislature and bringing back state issues and concerns to the university. He said that "the work SA has done has been tremendous and for those about to step in here, you have a lot of work to do to keep up with what has already been done."

5. Special Reports:

Director of Finance Hilary Harmon reported that currently the SA's budget is \$49,192.29. She said that

she has submitted SA's SFAC budget. Ms. Harmon said that SFAC will review the proposal on Wednesday, Feb. 24 at 1:15 in the Regents Room. She said that she is currently working on being able to make available to the Senate an updated subcode balance of SA's budget. Ms. Harmon informed the Senate that she has been working with David Daniel because SA does not have an advisor as do most organizations.

Senator Romero asked if Director Harmon was making plans on how to allocate the \$16,552 carried over from the last fiscal year.

Director Harmon replied that she plans to take requests from the Senate on how to allocate that amount.

Senator Romero asked Director Harmon when she became aware of the amount carried over.

She replied that she became aware of the amount when she finished the SFAC budget.

Senator Romero asked if that amount was accounted for during the past five months.

Director Harmon said that it was accounted for as far as the FRS was concerned.

Senator Romero wanted to know the amount she requested from SFAC and how the request will compare with last year's request of \$93,595.

Director Harmon said that she did not have that information with her, but that the information is "all available" in the SA office. She said that she does have office hours for those interested in SA's budget and that senators are more than welcome to come and talk with her about it.

Gerald Hagan, Manager of Parking and Transportation Services, said that the number of permits that Parking and Transportation issues depends on the availability of spaces. He said that the key issue involved in the availability of spaces is schedules determined by the turnover in the student lot in comparison with the number of spaces available on campus. Mr. Hagan said that they survey the parking lots to determine how many vehicles are in the parking lot versus how many spaces are available. In counting vehicles they look at all vehicles in all lots on a typical week every hour of the day and determine how many spaces are in the lots compared to the number of vehicles in the lot. He said that most lots adjacent to the intercourse of the campus are usually over capacity. Mr. Hagan said that if they were to take some vehicles from those lots to the economy lots, there would currently be enough spaces on campus to satisfy demand. He said that the problem is that they do not have enough convenient parking spaces compared to the number of students who want them. Mr. Hagan said that the SA bill targets at a one permit per space, and if they were to issue this then only 11,000 permits would be issued. He said that they have issued permits at a ratio of 2.2 to 1 during the Fall semester and a ratio of 2.1 to 1 in the Spring semester due to the new parking lots. Mr. Hagan said that they do have enough spaces during peak periods to accompany all students with the 2.1 to 1 ratio. He said that they advise that students use the economy lots. Mr. Hagan said that they also provide students with the option to downgrade within 21 days the permit is issued, if the student is not getting the space that he/she paid for due to over-capacity during the peak hours. He said that parking garages have always been the solution to the problem. But since Parking and Transportation does not get state funds to support any of their activities, they would have to pass the costs to the students. He said that "parking garages seems to be the answer when the time comes." Mr. Hagan said that if they put one garage up then everyone including those that do not use it will have to pay the cost.

Student Regent Rhodes asked how the 21 day, option is advertised.

Mr. Hagan said that it is advertised in the class schedules as well as in the student handbook. He said that a newsletter is also attached to all mailout of permits.

Senator Soebbing asked if Parking and Transportation sees any more additional parking lots in the future.

Mr. Hagan said that they are always looking for an options. He said that as a result of SA participation and the surveys, they have added 600 spaces. Mr. Hagan said that there are other areas of land that they are looking at. He said that one thing that they are concern about are laws now mandating the limitation of numbers of vehicles arriving on any facilities. Mr. Hagan said that he is unsure how that law will impact the university.

Lastly, Mr. Hagan said that he would like to encourage SA to participate more in the Parking Advisory Board. He said that that is where policies and programs are developed and changed. Mr. Hagan said that this department does not make policies they just implement them.

Student Regent, Mitch Rhodes gave a report on the Board of Regents meeting of last Wednesday. He informed the Senate that he and the SA presidents were able to give speeches to the Board concerning the Student Regent bill proposed. Regent Rhodes said that the speeches were very well received.

He said that the Board of Regents only meets six times a year and he has asked them if they would allow students to come forth and make presentations to the Board at two of those meeting; one before the start of administration and one at the end.

Regent Rhodes informed the Senate that housing across McDonalds' and all the way down Scott street will be remove and replace with the new athletics facilities.

He also informed the Senate that the UH Board of Regents will be providing free legal counsel three SA officers at UH Downtown being sued by students for their inability to properly representing the students. Regent Rhodes said that this goes to show that the Board is very supportive of the students. Regent Rhodes said that if there are any questions or concerns about what occur in the meeting there will be minutes of the meeting provided in the Senate office.

6. Two Minute Speeches by the Members:

Senator Morales said that he met with the dean from the College of HFAC last week and that it was a great experience. He encouraged all senators to do the same. Senator Morales said that the meeting was "great." He said that the dean outlined some of his concerns with the university's funding. Senator Morales reported that the HFAC's dean has created a campaign to get funding for the school. He asked that those interested in the further details of the meeting talk with him.

Senator Romero asked to suspend the rules so that he may address the Senate about his concern with a cartoon published in the Daily Cougar. A copy of his speech is attached to the minutes.

Senator Bowen in response to Senator Romero's speech said that the cartoon is on an editorial page and is stated under a 40 pts. "opinion." She said that "it may not be my opinion," but that she believes in the 1st Amendment. Senator Bowen said that the cartoon is expressed as an opinion not fact.

Senator Hoyt updated the Senate on her college town hall meeting. She said that the group is excited about opening the lines of communications between the deans and the students. Senator Hoyt encouraged other senators to meet with their deans. She said that it is "well-worth a try."

Senator Fuller said that "in the past couple of months ever since Senator Romero has come into office, he has lambasted the current Director of Finance, Hilary Harmon." He said that Ms. Harmon came into office at the end of Judith McKinney' term. Senator Fuller said that previously before Ms. McKinney was Senator Romero. He informed the Senate that due to a Washington internship offered to Senator Romero while he was serving as Director of Finance, Mr. Romero left the job as director. He said that as a result the former director (Ms. McKinney) was not trained to the full extent that she should have been. Senator Fuller said that due to the fact that Ms. McKinney was not fully trained it has "rubbed off" on the current Director of Finance. He questioned why Senator Romero consistently brings these financial questions to the Senate floor. Senator Fuller said that "Senator Romero could have of have easily walked in and addressed Ms. Harmon personally."

Senator Romero responded by saying that he has met with Ms. Harmon personally on several occasions. He said that Ms. Harmon said that "no other senators have come to me." He said that he told her that he has "mentioned it on the Senate floor to ask senators to ask these financial questions and is sorry that no other senators have asked but he has questions about it." Senator Romero said that SA has \$93,000 and that the SA president is "totally responsible for the management of \$93,000. He said that the Director of Finance is not in the position to make financial decisions of how to spend the money. Senator Romero said that the decisions come from the president and that "this president (Rusty Hruska) has not been on the Director of Finance to tell the Senate what it needs to know." He said that SA needs to be financially responsible and accountable. Senator Romero said that "it would be an embarrassment and disgrace of this organization to mismanage \$93,000" of money, student's money that are not accountable for to this point. He said that "this is a horrible state of affairs and that I know many students that feel the same and that's why I have been representing them and their interest by making SA more accountable."

7. Report of the President:

SA President Rusty Hruska was not in attendance, but his report was given by Student Regent Rhodes.

The report stated the following:

I have asked President Pickering to speak at the March 8 or 22 meeting. I have asked him to give a State of the University Address. I am drafting a letter to the president requesting a full report on the university's current inability to collect bad debts and what efforts are being made to correct this very serious problem.

We will kick-off our letter writing campaign on Wednesday, Feb.24. It is very important that the state legislature understands that their constituents at the UH are aware of those issues that will effect higher education. I hope everyone will support this effort by taking an active role in this campaign. The legislative reception in Austin was quite successful. About forty students were in attendance and around 200 people attended.

I am going to present a list of issues that are important to the student body at the next UPPC meeting March 1. If you have any recommendations please contact me ASAP.

My report to the Board of Regents was quite successful. As Mitch has said before I hope we will continue to have such an opportunity to express student concerns to this board.

Frontier Fiesta is coming along quite well. This truly is going to be a great event and very important to our efforts in working with all members of this university to work together to enhance the campus community.

I will be meeting with the faculty Senate President latter this week to improve faculty and student relations and build rapport.

8. Report of the Vice President:

Speaker Palmer informed the Senate that the SA budget proposal goes before SFAC on Wednesday and that there is a public forum section right before lunch for those interested. Lastly, she encouraged the Senate to attend the presidential debate held on Wednesday at 1:00p.m. in the World Affairs Lounge.

b) Motions on Committee Bypass

Senator Wheeler moved to bypass the nomination of Brian Hanby to the University Hearing Board, seconded by Senator Fuller.

Senator Wheeler said that Senator Fuller, Senator boyle and he did interview Mr. Hanby, but did not meet quorum to pass him out of committee with a committee recommendation. He said that they did pass him out of committee with personal recommendations.

The motion to bypass committee passed.

Senator Fuller said that Mr. Hanby has been involved with the student government before and knows what the University Hearing Board does.

After a vote the Senate approved the nomination.

Senator Romero moved to bypass SAB29018: A STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION BILL ACCEPTING THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SA COMMISSION ON PRESIDENTIAL DEBATES, seconded by Senator Gaw.

Senator Fuller yielded the floor to Mr. Alwais. Mr. Alwais said that if there is an opening on the election panel then he would like to submit his name for the panel.

The motion to bypass committee passed.

Senator Propes said that the bill specifies having two debates. He asked why SA is only having one.

Senator Romero said that when he wrote the bill he was being unrealistic about putting two debates within a week and three days. Senator Romero said that the candidate seminars did not end until the end of last week and that one debate with three candidates is sufficient.

Senator boyle asked if it was too late to add to the bill a place for "questions from the audience."

Senator Romero said that that would be up to the Senate. He said that the Election Commission did discuss that issue and decided that the forum format would not be controllable when it comes limiting the time the students has to ask the questions, what kind of questions it would be and how it should be debated. Senator Romero said that with a more formal debate format with a panel of questioners would be more appropriate and easier.

Senator Fuller yielded the floor to Regents Rhodes. Regent Rhodes said that he was one of the people that moderated the SA debates last year. He said that it was regulated by asking the audience to write down questions and giving it to the panel of questioners to decide if wanted to ask the questions.

Senator Romero said that the commission did meet quorum and passed the bill unanimously with one abstention. He informed the Senate that Director Fuller was also apart of the format formulation and that he also offered the equal opportunity to Senator boyle, who declined.

Senator boyle said that the reason why he declined is because he felt that "candidates had no place in determining the format of the debate and that it was for the students and not for the candidates."

Senator Fuller moved to add a friendly amendment to the bill changing 3.5 minutes maximum to 3 and half.

Senator Romero informed the Senate that the questioners will also be drawing their positions on the panel.

After a Senate vote the bill passed.

Senator Kasyznski moved to bypass committee on SAR29010: A STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION RESOLUTION ENDORSING FRONTIER FIESTA, seconded by Senator Fuller.

The motion to bypass committee passed.

Speaker Palmer asked a point of inquire. She asked that by endorsing the bill will SA be giving money. Senator Fuller said that the endorsement does not contain money.

Senator Romero said that even though this is a resolution it does not mean that it cannot be violate. He said that the resolution also gives a "go" to executive branch to spend money. Senator Romero said that this is a consideration that should be taken into effect.

Senator Kasyznski yielded the floor to Director Fuller. Mr. Fuller said that he thinks that President Hruska's intent was that SA support Frontier Fiesta as a school spirit event. He said that as far as financial support he does not think that that was President Hruska's intent.

Senator Morales yielded the floor to Regent Rhodes. Mr. Rhodes informed the Senate on the definition of a Senate resolution. He said that the resolution would have to be in the form of a bill in order for SA to spend money.

Senator Romero said that in passing the resolution the Senate is giving its opinion that it is going to support Frontier Fiesta. He said that "we are dealing with a lot of evasive about what we will endorse." Senator Romero said that "we are allowing a possibility of abuse of misinterpretation."

Senator Propes said that the resolution simply represents an idea that SA is in favor of the concept and its execution and does not give the impression that the resolution allows distribution of funds.

Senator Wheeler moved to bypass SAR29006: A STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE HOSTING OF THE TEXAS STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION FALL 1993 CONFERENCE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON, seconded by Senator Kasyznski.

The motion to bypass committee passed.

Senator Cheng yielded the floor to Director Fuller. Mr. Fuller said that he authored the legislation after attending the University of Texas Conference in Austin. He said that by hosting it UH would gain exposure on the state level and that as far as funding everyone pays for themselves.

Senator Fuller said that "UH did once sponsor something like this in 1989." He said that to his understanding "it went quite well."

Senator Romero stated that "financially it was bust."

After a Senate vote the resolution passed.

Senator Romero moved to bypass SR29006: A STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION SENATE RESOLUTION DECLARING ITS DISMAY WITH THE UH DEBT COLLECTION SYSTEM, seconded by Senator Gaw.

The motion to bypass committee passed.

Senator Romero said that it was important for SA to have some responds to the scandal about the debt collection system. He said that the resolutions offers reasons for SA to be dishearten about the situation and also offers SA's corporation in finding a solution to the problem.
