## Texas House narrowly approves AIDS insurance bill

AUSTIN (UPI)—In a narrow vote described by a lawmaker-doctor as an sign of lingering hysteria over the deadly AIDS virus, the Texas House Tuesday approved a proposal that would allow insurance companies to test policyholders for the virus while protecting rights to coverage.

Representatives tentatively endorsed on a 74-69 vote the bill by Rep. Mike McKinney, a Democratic physician from Centerville, that would allow insurance companies to test applicants for the virus, although they would specifically be prohibited from singling out certain groups of people or residents of certain areas for the testing.

And while the insurance companies could deny coverage based on a positive AIDS test, they could not drop before the expiration date of a policy an already covered person who tested positive for the virus.

"It's only a reasonable bill. I'm flabbergasted," McKinney said of the vote.

"You know why (the vote) was so close? Because it dealt with AIDS. I think what you see is that any attempt to do anything for AIDS is probably going to draw 69 votes. I just think that's a reaction and I

can't explain it. I don't understand it myself."

McKinney said he feels the bill does not do that much, and he fears the vote was an emotional one that signals a tough road for an omnibus AIDS package passed by the Senate Monday and on its way to the House.

"I'm not sure that it does all that much. It doesn't do enough to justify that much opposition, I can tell you that," McKinney said.

"I think it provides some insurance coverage and it provides the insurance agents the right to test. That's really about all it does. It's not that bias of a bill actually. I think the thing that's significant about it is it addresses AIDS as a real life problem.

The proposal, scheduled for final passage Wednesday, would issue rules already adopted by the State Board of Insurance to address AIDS-related issues.

It also would protect people already covered by health insurance from being dropped if they contract the virus, and would prohibit insurance companies from renegotiating group health contracts to exclude, specifically, a member who tests positive.

"People who tested positive for AIDS or HIV were getting dumped, and this ad-

dresses that," McKinney said. "It says you can't cancel them in the middle of a policy. If they've already paid the premium, you can't just say no thanks, we'll give you \$25 back on your premium and cancel your policy."

However, opponents argue the proposal would elevate to a special status above other terminal illnesses people with AIDS and mandate continued coverage of persons who test positive for the virus.

"This bill goes way beyond that. It mandates the coverage regardless of what the interpretation is out here. It is a back-door approach by the way that it is worded," said Rep. Gwyn Clarkston Shea, R-Irving.

Rep. Billy Clemons, D-Pollock, tried to amend the bill to make the rules applicable to all chronic and terminal illnesses, but withdrew it after Shea raised a point of order that would have killed it.

Clemons said that forced him to vote against the bill. He said he voted against the measure because it gives AIDS a special status, "and any terminal illness is serious."

Rep. Tony Goolsby, a Republican insurance agent from Dallas who also voted against the bill, said it also would force a hike in premium rates.

For too long many of us in the gay community have treated ourselves like second-class citizens because we feel alienated from the police. On one hand the police have historically invaded our bars and entrapped us in parks and bookstores, while on the other the police are supposed to protect us from the abuses of our enemies.

But times have changed, nearly twenty years after Stonewall. The police, if somewhat grudgingly, tolerate our bars (if, in fact, they are properly run), and those who, against good judgment and safe-sex practices, persist in the pursuit of public sex must then accept the consequences.

Drugs, primarily crack, are endangering our lives and our property. If there is anyone in Montrose who has not been affected by this epidemic, they should count themselves fortunate. It is time for us all to overcome our fear and distrust of the police and aid in combating this growing crisis. Crack houses are a threat to everyone within striking distance. Users are walking time bombs and we are their potential victims.

The gay community, individually and organizationally, must become involved. If we don't involve ourselves on the side of the angels we will be dragged into the gutter with the abusers. The police see the cost of this drug epidemic every day and they need to know that on this issue they have our full support.

The platitudes from Washington have been and are meaningless. Nancy Reagan's "Just Say No" didn't even start to speak to those who truly need help. And now George Bush sallies forth with all the understanding of a town meeting in Darien (a rich, isolated enclave of Anglo-Saxons in Bush's native New England).

In fact, just this week Bush unveiled his new crime-busting plan: More federal agents, federal prosecutors and prisons—a billion dollars worth of prisons. And how about that gun control—we won't let those crooks import clips for their automatic weapons. Yeh, and see how well we kept cocaine out of the country by a massive publicized war.

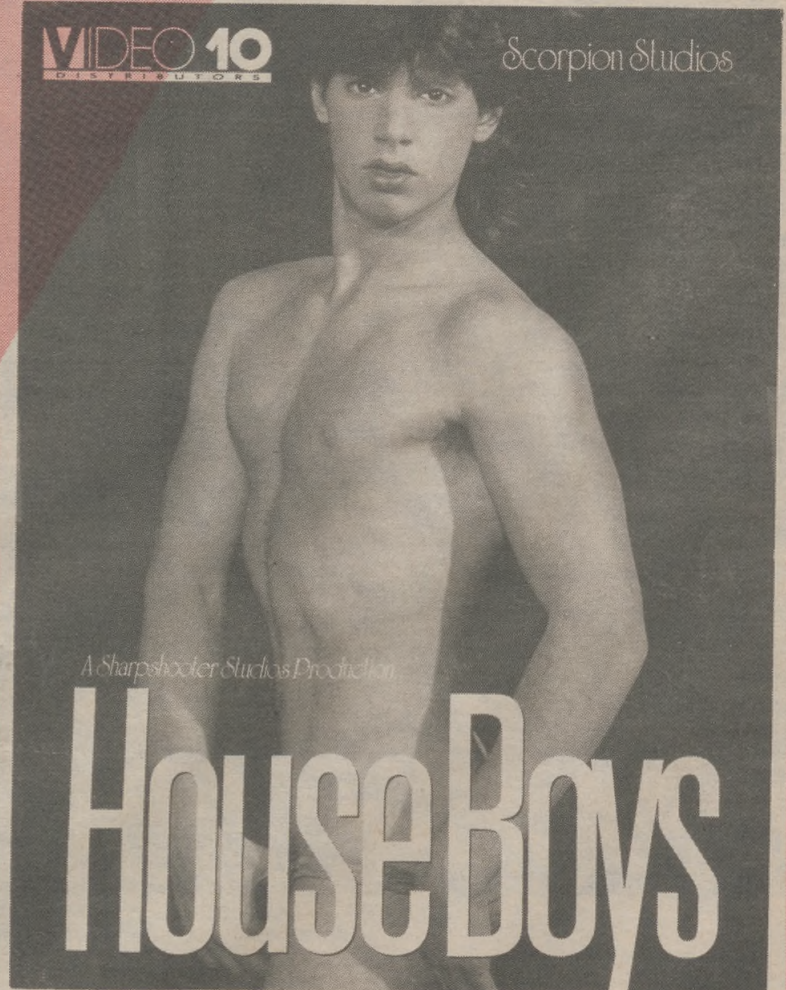
Now for all you loyal gay Republicans (surely you don't think we had forgotten you) out there who assured us Bush wasn't really fronting the Right (as in "right" to the camps all you HIV positive souls), this crime package, at Bush's request, comes to us directly from the Heritage Foundation, as in think tank of the Right, originator of much of the agenda for zapping the homosexual community with responsibility for AIDS (i.e. the current session of the Texas Legislature).

It was this Heritage Foundation that "suggested" to Bush that he emphasize prisons and police to take the heat off gun control. And it was Bush who appointed the most conservative member of the Reagan team (and that's saying a lot) to lead the war on drugs.

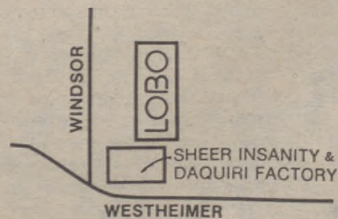
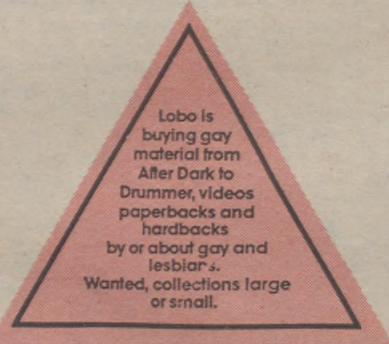
We don't have an answer to the crime crisis but it is also painfully obvious that neither does Bush. And while the President plays at leadership the Right continues on its merry way toward imposing its peculiar brand of morality and justice on all of us—and it allows little room for such niceties as the Bill of Rights. But that, gang, is another story.

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# Gay and lesbian museum of history opens in NYC

The Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center, located at 208 W. 13th Street in Manhattan, announces the founding of the first museum in the United States devoted to lesbian and gay history. It will be called the National Museum of Lesbian and Gay History.

"This is a crucial step in preserving our heritage," says Executive Director Richard D. Burns, who convened a six-member committee that is coordinating the organization of the museum.

The Center is acquiring a substantial portion of the International Gay History Archive, a major collection amassed over ten years by John Hammond and Bruce Eves. It includes periodicals, books and memorabilia.

## -National lobby days

Constituents who support gay and lesbian civil rights will lobby members of Congress at home district offices across the country for the first time in the four-year history of the National Lobby Days for

Lesbian and Gay Rights. The National Lobby Days focus on the lesbian and gay rights agenda in Congress and are organized by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF).

## -Right to Privacy activities

A national organizing campaign is underway to commemorate the third anniversary, on June 30, 1989, of the Supreme Court's decision in Bowers vs. Hardwick. The campaign, called the National Day of Mourning for the Right to Privacy, is organized by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) Privacy Project and CRY OUT!, Pittsburgh's lesbian/gay action group.

The Supreme Court in Hardwick upheld Georgia's sodomy law declaring that the constitutional right to privacy did not extend to sexual conduct between gay men and lesbians. Twenty-five states and the District of Columbia still have anti-gay sodomy laws in place.

"The National Day of Mourning is a grassroots education and action campaign designed to focus gay and lesbian energy on the importance of repealing sodomy laws, which render us criminal in half the states in this country," said Sue Hyde, Director of the NGLTF Privacy Project, which works for the repeal of sodomy laws. "We want to support and energize activists working in states with sodomy laws, as well as to encourage those of us living in free states to stay involved."

## -NGLTF conference

Continuing the innovative programming that characterized its annual conference last year, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) announced that its Creating Change conference for grassroots activists and gay and lesbian organizations will feature keynote addresses by three leading gay activists, a demonstration calling for an end to discrimination against gay men and lesbians in the military, and a day-long institute on fundraising. The NGLTF Creating Change conference will be held from Nov. 9-12, 1989 in the greater Washington area at the Holiday Inn, Bethesda (5 Metro stops from Dupont Circle). The Fund For Human Dignity, a national organization encouraging and providing better information about gay and lesbian lives, has announced the award of a \$5000 grant to the National Public Radio News and Information Fund. The award marks the first time a gay service organization has assumed sponsorship of nationwide news programming.

The grant will help underwrite reporting during the month of June on NPR's award-winning "All Things Considered" and "Morning Edition," which are broadcast daily on more than 300 public radio stations throughout the United States. June 1989 marks the 20th anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion, considered the beginning of the modern gay movement.

## -HRCF's picks Tim McFeeley

Boston activist, attorney and fundraiser, Tim McFeeley has been named new Executive Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF). McFeeley, who has a distinguished record of advocacy for gay and lesbian civil rights in New England, succeeds Victor J. Basile as executive director of the nation's largest gay, lesbian and AIDS political group.

"I'm extremely excited about leading HRCF and representing America's lesbians and gay men in our nation's capital," said McFeeley. "It's the beginning of HRCF's second decade of service and the 20th anniversary of Stonewall. Now is the time for our community to move into the future with a powerful mandate for political and social change."

## -Gay cops in Arizona

Taking the high road after a threatened law suit by the National Gay Rights Advocates, the Arizona Attorney General said gay men and women must be permitted to apply for positions at the Arizona Department of Public Safety (ADPS). The controversy began when an applicant, Michael Guston, was presented with a list of questions he would be asked about homosexuality while being strapped to a lie detector machine. Applicants who indicated a pattern of homosexual behavior or who engaged in a homosexual act in the last two years would not be hired.

Leonard Graff, NGRA Legal Director said, "The Attorney General is to be congratulated for putting a quick end to this nonsense. These questions are an offensive invasion of personal privacy. Moreover, virtually all sex is illegal in Arizona. Thus, it violates the Equal Protection clause of the constitution to exclude only gay people from the highway patrol."

## -'Purple Circuit'

The Purple Circuit, a directory listing gay and lesbian theater companies, independent producers, and kindred spirits who welcome the production of quality gay and lesbian theater, has been published for the 20th anniversary of Stonewall as a joint venture between Artists Confronting AIDS (Michael Kearns and James Carroll Pickett) and Bill Kaiser who compiled and edited the directory.

The Purple Circuit has listings from Anchorage to Atlanta as well as England and Canada. It creates a network for playwrights, producers, theater artists and audiences to discover each other. Artists Confronting AIDS was founded in 1984 to encourage artists who address the AIDS crisis and support Persons with AIDS who wish to express themselves artistically.

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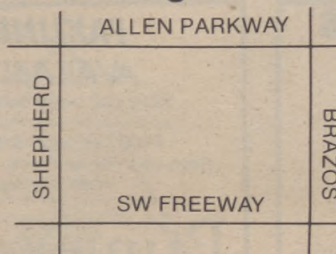


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# Thanks and requests for help from local groups

The Montrose Clinic wishes to publicly thank the AIDS Foundation, Houston, for their generosity and support by having loaned the Clinic \$15,000 to help with operating costs until CDC funding was received from the City Health Department.

The AIDS Foundation made a short-term, interest-free loan to the Clinic in February to help offset operating costs while the Clinic awaited approval and receipt of CDC funding. "We were in a pretty desperate situation," reported Dr. Richard Grimes, Chairperson of the Montrose Clinic. "We were running out of funds, but did not wish to discontinue our AIDS programs to the community while we waited for the City to begin our funding."

CDC funding was finally approved and the first check received by the Montrose Clinic in April. "Thanks to

the AIDS Foundation and two other organizations, we did not have to close our doors," said Dr. Grimes. In addition to the loan from AFH, the Montrose Clinic also received a \$45,000 loan from the United Way AIDS Trouble Fund and a \$10,000 donation from the Westheimer Colony Art Association. Between the three organizations and the continued donations and fees received by the Clinic, a vital service to the community was maintained.

"I think it's great when the community organizations come together to help each other," Grimes said. "We hear so much about the disharmony; it's nice to let the public know that we can and do cooperate, too."

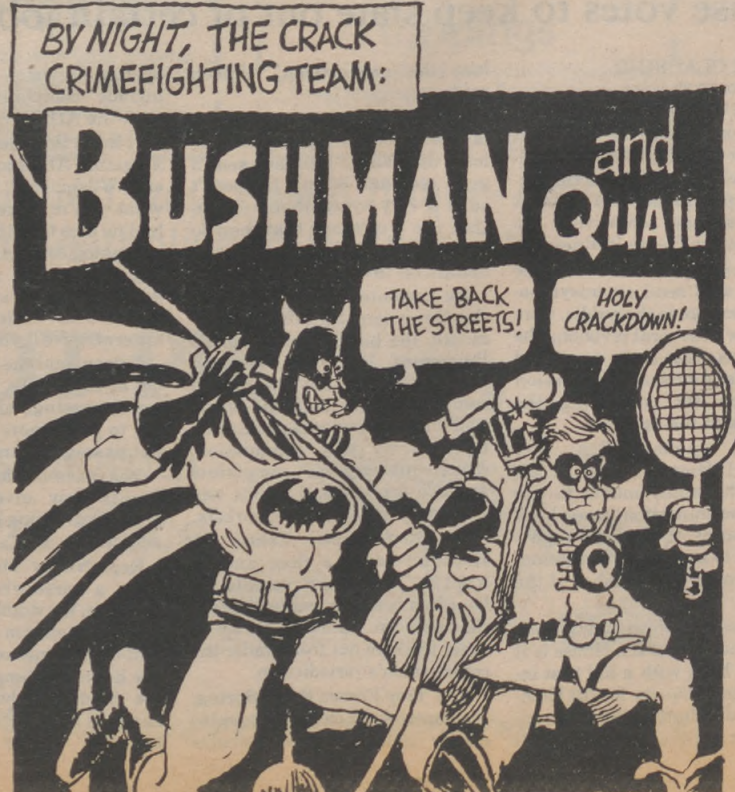

The record and movie both will come out June 23. All the music is performed by Prince, except a duet with Sheena Easton.



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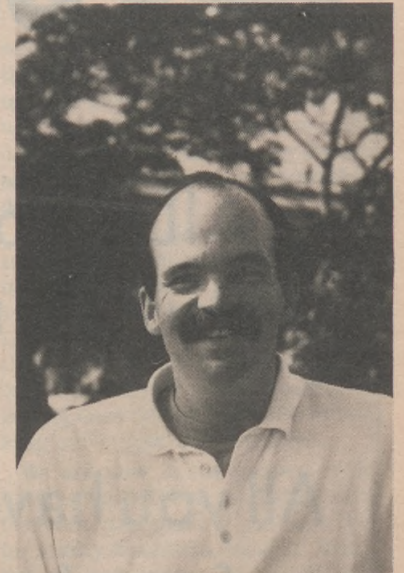

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# Kellogg shareholders stunned by speech from gay stockholder

The 800 Kellogg cereal company shareholders assembled in Battle Creek, Michigan April 28 couldn't believe their ears when 70-year-old shareholder Joseph Norton of Albany, New York rose, announced that he was a relative of the original Kellogg family, added that he was a gay male, and then chastised the corporation for its 1988 use of a Nut 'N Honey Crunch TV commercial that gay activists say promoted violence against the gay and lesbian community.

"Some of us gay males have been rather upset by this commercial," Norton said. "We believe the company should be opposed to pulling a gun on anyone's head for any reason."

The ad, which finished its TV run last October, featured a group of cowboys who drew guns on their trail cook after he told them there was "nuttin' honey" for breakfast—a play on the cereal's name, Nut 'N Honey.

Gay activists—in particular Chicago's Coalition Against Media/Marketing Prejudice (CAAMP)—have argued

that the commercial implies that one man calling another "honey" is cause for violence. Kellogg has repeatedly said it doesn't understand or share CAAMP's interpretation of the ad.

After Norton's four minute presentation—which elicited a small round of applause—Kellogg CEO Bill LaMothe responded in detail to gay concerns.

"The company does not believe in vio-

lence," he said. "The (ad) campaign was a fun campaign using the term 'nuttin' honey' and it got great popular support. You gave the ad an interpretation which, after reviewing it, we still couldn't share."

LaMothe then played for shareholders the newest Nut 'N Honey TV ad, which steers clear of anything to which minorities might take offense.

"Kellogg's is committed to providing accurate images in our commercials in a wholesome setting," LaMothe assured. "We can be proud of the wholesomeness of our advertising over the years." The shareholders applauded loudly.

LaMothe then turned to Norton and said, "We are sorry you don't share our views and frankly, Sir, we don't share yours." The auditorium burst into applause.

At a press conference following the shareholders meeting, however, LaMothe said Norton's remarks, along with last year's disruption of the shareholder's meeting by CAAMP's Rick Garcia, has raised his consciousness.

"When you go through these experiences, we have to be sure we keep broadening our viewpoint," he said. "When the noise level reaches a certain point, then perhaps that's a noise level we have to address... We've talked internally about the need to filter this learning experience to bring broader and better judgment... in dealing with the diverse consumers we have around the world!"

Norton, CAAMP activists, and members of the Michigan Organization for Human Rights say they will return to Kellogg next year with several new gay shareholders.

"I still disapprove of this ad and I shall try to introduce a shareholder's resolution about this again next year," Norton said. Kellogg refused to entertain Norton's resolution concerning treatment of minorities in commercials this year, arguing that Securities and Exchange Commission law allowed them to omit it.

Norton's Aunt Nellie was the niece of W.K. Kellogg, the founder of the cereal giant.

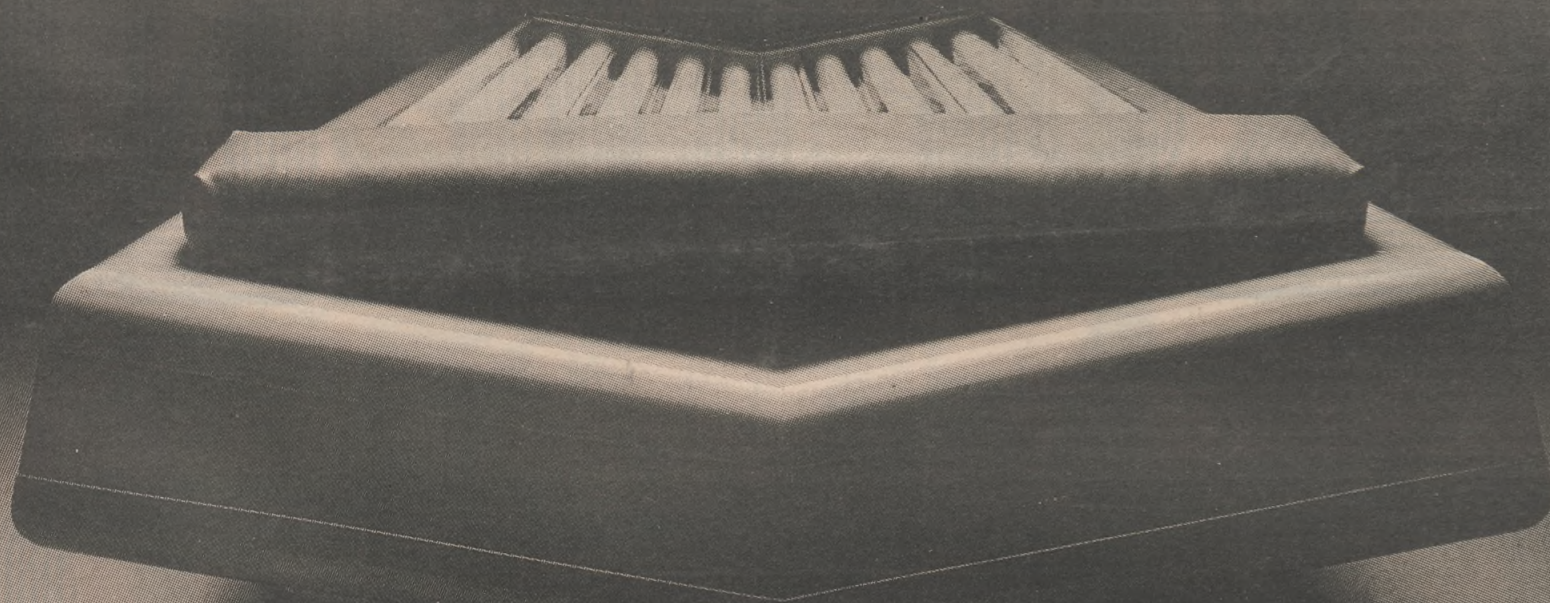

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# Senate adopts AIDS bill that outlaws discrimination

AUSTIN, Texas (UPI)—The Texas Senate adopted a comprehensive AIDS bill Monday that would outlaw discrimination against victims of the epidemic, but the measure faces changes by House members who have taken a more punitive approach to the deadly disease.

The Senate bill, sponsored by Sens. Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena, and Craig Washington, D-Houston, was praised by gay and civil rights activists as a rational response to the public health menace of AIDS, which has claimed the lives of more than 4000 Texans so far.

"If this is any indication of the direction that our state is going to take, we just might have a chance of getting out from behind the eight ball," said The Rev. Chris Steele of Houston, who chaired an interim task force on AIDS that made many of the legislative recommendations.

Glen Maxey, director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas, said the

state had developed for the first time a comprehensive blueprint to deal with AIDS and the virus that causes it.

"We are very pleased, as is I think every public health group, ranging from the Texas Medical Association, the hospitals, the public hospitals, that this bill in the Senate is the rational response to a public health epidemic," Maxey said.

"It is a foundation that the Legislature should continue on as we go to the House and to the conference committee on what a good, rational public policy will be," he said.

The bill would provide about \$18 million for three main areas. Brooks said 50 percent of the funds would go to treatment programs, including those that would provide the AIDS-fighting drug AZT. The remainder would be divided evenly between education and prevention programs and counseling and testing.

The bill states that people who have AIDS or HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, have the same rights under state

law as other people with disabilities. It would also provide confidentiality and prohibit discrimination in real estate transactions and insurance coverage.

"We're very pleased that the Senate adopted the sentence that simply says that people with AIDS and HIV have the same rights and privileges of any other person under Texas law and that they are protected the same way any other person with a disability is protected," Maxey said.

According to the Texas Department of Health, 6547 AIDS cases have been diagnosed in Texas as of May 5. Of that number, 4008, 61 percent, have died. It is projected that 30,000 cases will be diagnosed by the end of 1991, resulting in 18,000 deaths.

Under the worst case scenario, up to 1.5 million Texans could be infected with HIV by 1991, the department says.

Brooks, chairman of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, said lawmakers must address one of the major problems associated with the dis-

ease—public fear and misunderstanding.

"The most difficult part of this problem is the hysteria, the unbridled fear," he said.

Supporters of the Senate AIDS bill say the House version, which was still in committee, has been re-written to satisfy conservatives who want to take a more punitive approach to the disease, which has mostly affected gay men.

"The House committee has taken a criminal justice approach to the issue," Brooks said. "That's not doing anything at all about prevention, education and treatment. We're going to have to look at it from the health care side."

Steele said she was concerned that the House bill, as it is now written, could actually prevent needed services from getting to the people who are the most at risk.

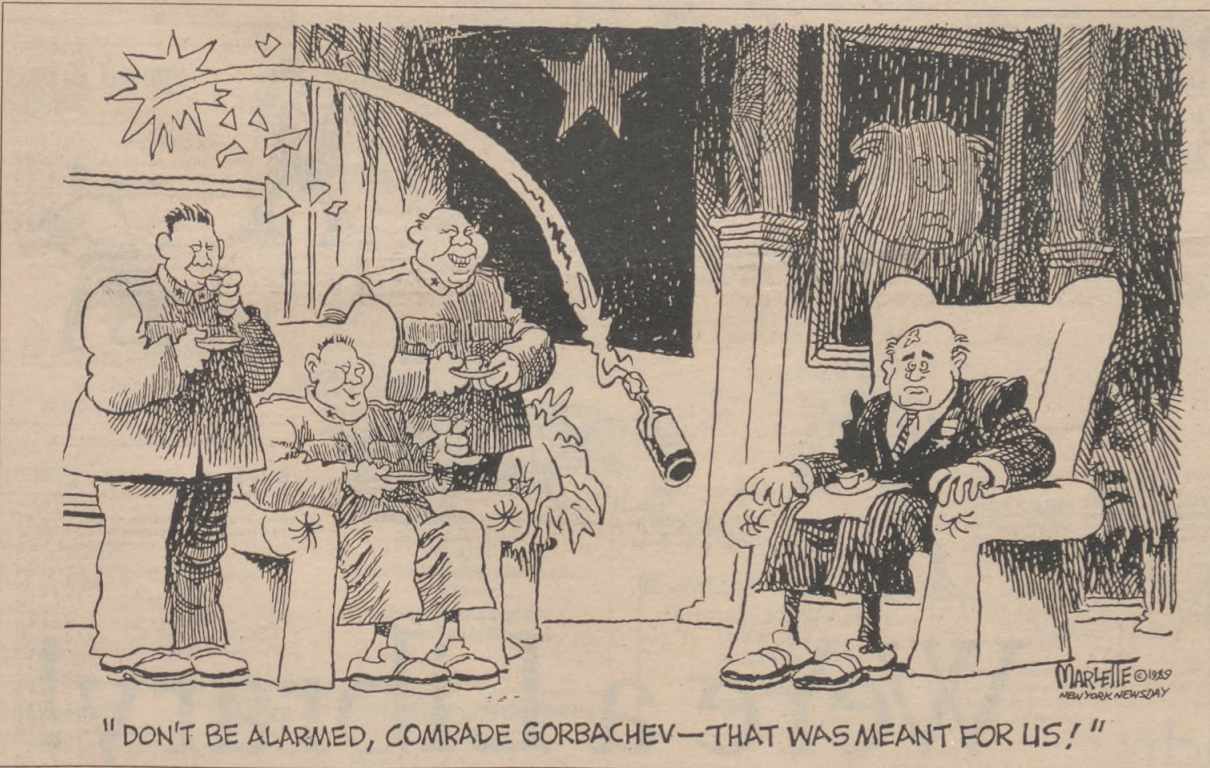
"It just seems to me that out of the many, many very serious concerns that we have with respect to controlling this epidemic, there is a disproportionate preoccupation with the criminal aspects of this as opposed to the fact that it is a public health emergency that requires informed, medically, scientifically accurate response."

Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, one of three senators who voted against the bill, said the measure did not go far enough. Green said he wanted more mandatory testing, especially for prisoners.

The Senate bill does provide criminal sanctions for people who knowingly spread the AIDS virus to someone else, and it allows mandatory testing for people who expose their bodily fluids to policemen, firemen, corrections officials and emergency medical service personnel.

Maxey said lawmakers in the House have not negotiated their bill as was done in the Senate.

"We sat around the table and we talked about the public health crisis and worked out language to deal with all the issues. We've not had that opportunity on the House side to do it in that same manner," he said. "Hopefully we will in the next few weeks."
