Dear Dr. Stewart:

Should I be admitted to the College of Optometry, it would most likely be a necessity that I include Clinical Optometry in my schedule, inasmuch as I am preparing for the Texas State Board in Optometry. As to other academic courses, I felt that a review of basic optometry courses would be most beneficial in my case.

It had not occurred to me that the clinic did not accept Negro patients. While a student at Chicago College of Optometry I never met with any embarrassing incidents in the clinic. But, being a native Texas and accustomed to Texas customs and traditions, I fully understand your concern as to what attitude white patients would have toward being examined by a Negro student. It could be so arranged, however, that I secure my own patients.

Any difficulty in adjusting to differences in routines and examination procedures which may be encountered, I shall be forced to eliminate in the least possible time so that unnecessary and important time is not wasted.

Dear Dr. Richardson:

I have discussed some of the problems which might be encountered, in the event that you are admitted to the College of Optometry as a special student, with Dr. Clanton W. Williams, Vice President. He has suggested that I write to you.

Here, frankly presented, are some of the problems:

1. We have found it difficult to work graduates of other schools into our clinical program. We have our own record forms, our own examination procedures, and our own clinical routines. Graduates of other schools have learned different ways of doing things, and they seem to be slow in adapting to our way. A great deal of time is wasted, and sometimes patients are inconvenienced and delayed because of this. Giving graduates of other institutions the same preparation that our own students receive prior to being assigned to the clinic would require their taking several courses taught during the second year in optometry.
2. The optometry clinic does not take negro patients. I am wondering what the attitude of white patients would be toward being examined by a negro student. While some might accept it without question, there would, in my opinion, be some who would not accept it, and a few who might cause a great deal of embarrassment to all concerned. This was a problem for the occasional negro student at Ohio State, and you perhaps encountered the same thing at the Chicago College of Optometry. At Ohio State it was not an easy problem to solve, and I understand that a negro student had to bring in most of his own patients.
3. Our academic standards are high, and some graduates of other institutions who have taken courses here have found it difficult to earn passing grades. Advanced courses often require the use of background material, the details of which are easily forgotten, and for which the special student does not want to spend time reviewing. It has been my experience that graduates who have failed to pass the Texas Board Examinations in Optometry might spend their time more profitably by studying some of the basic courses taught during the first two years of optometry.

I shall appreciate your consideration of these problems and your suggestions as to how they might be met, in your case.

Dear Dr. Gooden:

On behalf of the Board of Examiners in Optometry, I regret to inform you that you have failed to pass the examination given by the Board in Dallas, Texas, August 1-4, 1954.

This being the second examination you have failed since the adoption of the Board Rules and Regulations now in effect, let me call your attention to the following:

No applicant who has failed to pass both the first examination and the second examination as provided for in Article 4565 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas shall be permitted to again take an examination of the Board until he shall furnish to the Secretary of the Board satisfactory sworn evidence that he has satisfactorily completed a course of instruction equivalent to one full term of not less than four months duration at a College of Optometry approved and accredited by the Board since having failed the Board's second examination; provided, that upon making application to take a third examination after having completed the additional course of instruction as provided herein the applicant shall file with the Secretary of the Board a new application, on forms to be furnished by the Board, and pay a fee of Thirty-five Dollars (\$35) as in his first examination; and provided further, that no person shall again be permitted to take an examination of this Board after having failed to pass a third examination.

Thank you for your letter of April 26th in reply to correspondence expressing a desire to enroll at the University of Houston as a special graduate student in the College of Optometry.

I am enclosing the original copy of a letter received from the Texas State Board of Examiners in Optometry (that I wish returned) which, of itself, is explanatory as to my reason for wishing to enter the University of Houston for the Fall Semester, 1956. Dear Dr. Richardson:

In reply to correspondence between you and officials of the University of Houston and to assist you in your planning, the following information appears to be pertinent:

1. To date no Negro has been admitted to the University of Houston;
2. The matter is currently under serious study by the University and its Board of Regents;
3. It appears likely that integration at the graduate level will be preliminary to admission of undergraduate Negro students.

I understand that you are a graduate of an accredited college and desire to pursue refresher work here in Optometry (which, incidentally, we do not offer during the summer). If you still desire to enter as a special graduate student during the regular session, I would appreciate a personal letter to me setting forth your general qualifications, the courses you wish to pursue, and the date at which you wish to be admitted.

If there are several highly qualified graduate Negro students who would be willing to approach this delicate problem in a joint spirit of cooperation and finesse, it might be appropriate for them to meet with me personally to discuss the matter in some detail.

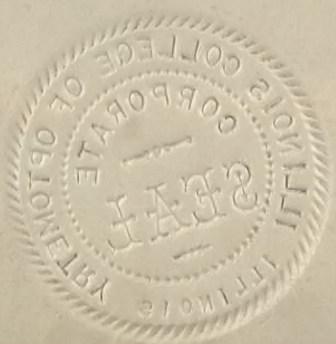
