Five from Complex pictured in report

How would it feel to get your picture in Shell's annual report?

Ask J.C. Tramel, Ruth Wood and Genevieve Ashlock, all operators at Utilities Distribution, or Jack Jackson and M. E. Reim of CPS. After being photographed last fall, they were all "stars" in this year's annual report.

Tramel, Wood and Ashlock were photographed monitoring Complex utilities operations on computers at the UCC while Jackson and Reim were pictured checking CPS operations.

Discussing how it feels to be pictured in the annual report, Tramel said, "I enjoyed doing it. I was happy that we got in for the UCC and the Complex. I'm glad they chose the Utilities Department."

He said many people let him know they saw his picture in the annual report. "Several came by my house with those things. I gave copies to all my family."

However, he pointed out it took a long time to take the photograph that was used in the report.


"The photographer was in there (the UCC) two and a half hours. It took a while to get the lighting right. He also moved everyone around to see what angle was best. But after he got us set, we didn't have to pose but about four-five minutes."

Enthusiastic about being in the report, Wood said, "I appreciated having my picture in there because my family is all in Wisconsin where there are no refineries. After seeing the picture, they have a better idea where I work and what I'm doing."

While the photographs were being taken at the UCC, she was in charge of operating the "mimic board" which normally flashes its lights only to show something is wrong with some of Utilities' equipment. But she recalled things were different when the photographer was at the UCC.

"The photographer would tell me when he was ready and I'd light up the whole board. That would never happen in a normal operation."

Ashlock pointed out the board's lights shown in the annual report photo normally flash only when the pressure, flow or temperature of DPMC steam lines register too high or too low. Other lights not shown in the photo reflect the status of the operation of Complex electric lines.

CIMA foam truck will help Complex firefighters

The Channel Industries Mutual Aid has acquired a 4,000-gallon tank truck which will increase the fire-fighting capabilities of not only the DPMC, but the other 79 members of CIMA as well.

Dick Frutiger, recording secretary of CIMA and superintendent, Safety and Industrial Hygiene at the DPMC, explained the acquisition of the large truck is significant because it means bulk quantities of chemical foam can now be quickly used against a fire by CIMA for the first time.

In the past, foam had to be transferred from drums to fire trucks and fire boats before it could be used to control a blaze. But because the new truck has a transfer pump on it, foam can go directly to fire-fighting units.

Frutiger said, "The old way took

considerable time and was much more cumbersome and difficult than using the truck to transfer foam. The use of the faster method will be important because in an emergency situation, every second counts."

The use of foam is preferred for fighting many kinds of petrochemical fires—such as those on concrete slabs, storage tanks and ponds.

The truck, which is owned by Arco, is available to any member of CIMA.


