While other college students take it easy this summer, six students are preparing for the future—by participating in a summer technical jobs program at DPMC.

The six, all engineering students, are Brenda Auzenne and Sylvia Obregon, both from University of Texas, Dwayne Johnson from Prairie View A&M and Vince Jolley, Renaldo Rodriguez and Leo Flores, all from University of Houston.

Each began working a three-month stint here in June, learning firsthand about engineering by working both in offices and in the field.

But each one is different, bringing varied backgrounds and skills with them to the Complex.


Brenda, a senior, hails from Baytown. A chemical engineering student, she's no stranger to the petrochemical business, having previously worked three summers in an engineering-related job at the nearby Exxon refinery. Like Sylvia, Vince, Renaldo and Leo, she received a Shell scholarship to attend college on the basis of such things as her grades and participation in extracurricular activities.

She is located at Process Engineering East, working primarily on computer programs which simulate unit operations in a search to improve efficiency and reduce costs.

Sylvia, a junior, comes from the South Texas town of Mission. A mechanical engineering student, she previously worked as an assistant at University of Texas Aerospace Engineering Department and is currently assigned to Inspection Records.

mechanical engineering student, he's working in Plant Engineering, helping keep an eye on potential production problems at various units.

Vince, a Crockett native, has lived in Houston for several years. Following in the footsteps of two brothers, he's studying mechanical engineering. A sophomore, he's assigned to Mechanical-Graphics—where his main job is drawing diagrams of overhead

pipe racks.

A sophomore, Renaldo also is from Houston. An electrical engineering student, he's working at Process Control-Electrical.

This is the second summer Leo has worked at DPMC—at the Quality Control Lab. A chemical engineering student, the Houston resident is mainly involved in chemical analysis.

Most of the students studied engineering because they were encouraged to do so by counselors or teachers. They are also intrigued by the challenges and opportunities they feel engineering offers.

For example, Brenda said, "I partially decided to enter engineering because a lot of teachers said I should try it. But I also wanted the challenge—I thought it might be a hard curriculum."

Enthusiastic about their new jobs, the students like working at the DPMC—mainly because it gives them a chance to get engineering work experience.

Brenda explained, "I enjoy what I'm doing this summer. I'm not really an engineer yet, but they give me engineering jobs. That's why I like it. Also, people here are really nice."

Renaldo said, "I like it a lot. There's so many things going on and there's a lot to learn."

But Leo's single comment about his job seems to best sum up all the students' feelings about their work experiences at the DPMC. "I love it—absolutely."
