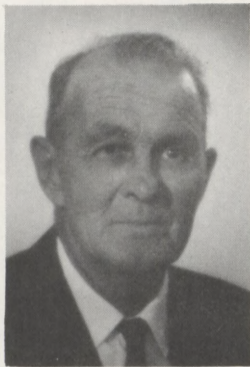


B. H. MILSTEAD AND J. H. HINTON RETIRE

INDUSTRY TERMINAL EXPANSION

The fast-growing manufacturing industry centered around Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, will be provided next year with a new, convenient supply of hydrocarbon solvents. This will be realized by the expansion of Shell Chemical Company's present facilities at Industry, located 30 miles down the Ohio River from Pittsburgh.

For more than 10 years, chemical intermediates and ketone and alcohol solvents handled by the Industrial Chemicals Division have been available at Industry.

Storage for 11 hydrocarbon solvent ingredients marketed by the Petrochemicals Division will be added. The expanded terminal will also have a modern Shell-designed product blender for combining basic solvents into many products tailored to particular needs.

Compartmented tank trucks and tank cars will speed product distribution to industries in western Pennsylvania, western New York, eastern and central Ohio and West Virginia, west of the Appalachians. Among products supplied will be toluene, xylene, mineral spirits and a full line of naphthas.

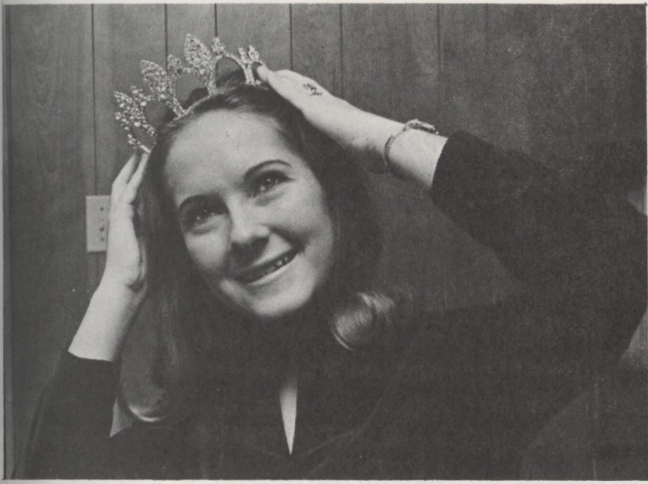

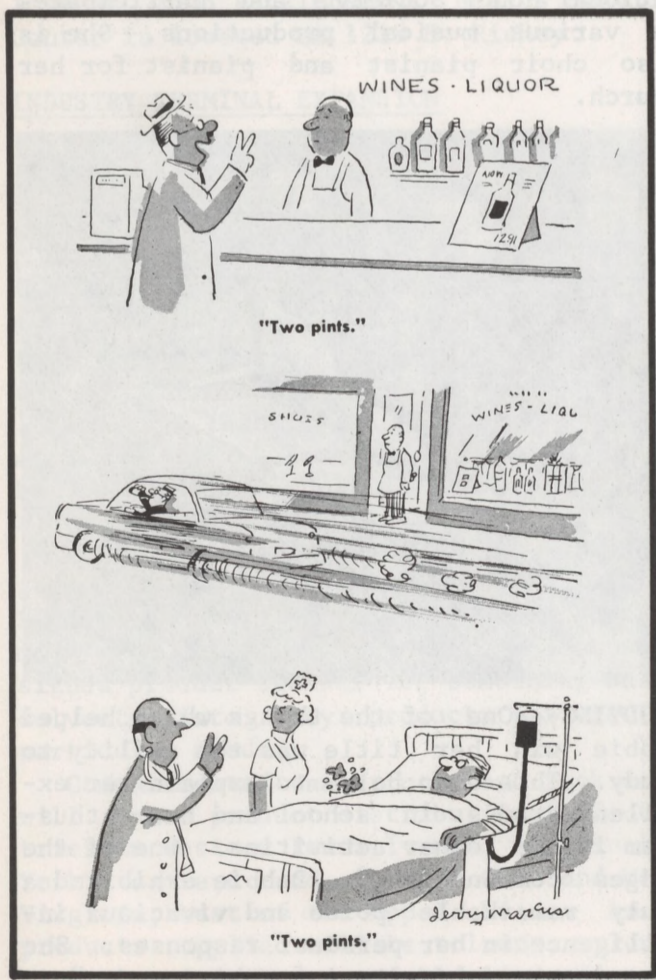
REFINERY PENSIONER B. JAQUES DIES;
