The average cost, including commissions, per share of Shell stock purchased during February was \$66.776.

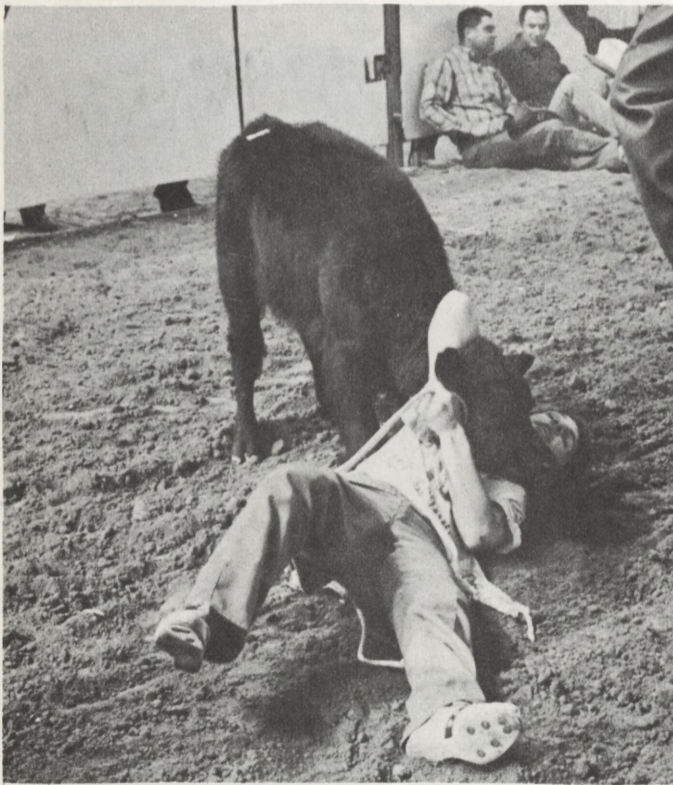

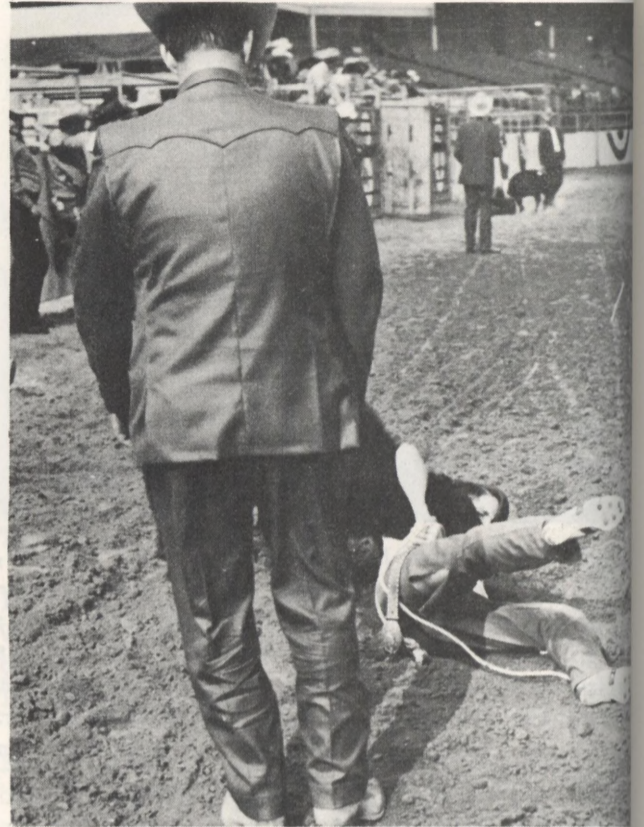

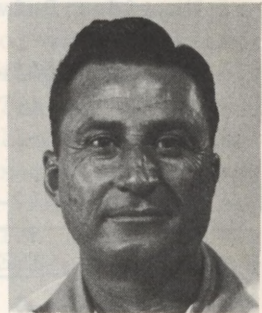

The calves are sponsored by firms and individuals, and Houston Refinery sponsors two calves every year.
