## Parade to be 'Largest Ever'

Larry Bagneris, chair of the Gay Pride Week '85 Parade Committee, says this year's Gay Pride Week Parade will be the largest ever.

"In terms of participants, longest route, and expected crowds this will be our largest one," says an enthusiastic Bagneris.

The parade, which begins at Westheimer and Bagby at 5:30 p.m. Sunday, will include 56 units. There will be 15 professional and eight non-professional floats. Several marching groups and cars will join three bands. The bands include a Latin Band, a band from Dallas, as well as Houston's own Montrose Symphonic Band.

The parade proceeds west on Westheimer to Waughcrest (Charlie's Coffee Shop), to Waugh. It will continue along Waugh into Spotts Park (the corner of Waugh and Memorial).

At the conclusion of the parade, the Houston Gay Political Caucus will host a 10th Anniversary Celebration, "After Dark in the Park."

The Caucus is chartering buses, which will be parked at Mary's, for those wishing to ride to Spotts Park. After the celebration, each bus will return to different parts of Montrose to allow revelers to pick up cars or continue with the festivities.

## UofH Professor Predicts End of Sodomy Laws

Can a state make homosexual activity a crime?

The Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals will soon rule in a case challenging the 1979 Texas law which makes sodomy between persons of the same sex a crime. The Texas Human Rights Foundation, a gay group, won in the lower court, but a group of doctors "against the disease AIDS" persuaded the Potter County district attorney to appeal.

"Most of these laws eventually will be ruled unconstitutional," predicts University of Houston—University Park law professor G. Sidney Buchanan. "In this case, you have a violation of equal protection

because it applies only to same-sex couples."

Long before the courts heard many of the current sexual regulation cases, Buchanan was compiling a book detailing exactly how the courts would rule on this issue and other matters of sexual regulation. The book, *Morality, Sex and the Constitution: A Christian Perspective on the Power of Government to Regulate Private Sexual Conduct Between Consenting Adults*, was recently published by University Press of America.

Currently, 29 states and the District of Columbia have laws prohibiting at least some form of private sexual conduct

between consenting adults.

"The Supreme Court has not spoken conclusively on the issue of regulating sexual conduct," Buchanan says. "For example, a lower court upheld a Virginia law making sodomy a crime, and the Supreme Court upheld the law, but issued no explanatory opinion. The constitutional question thus remains: What does the right to privacy protect?"

Before starting his research on the subject, Buchanan surveyed 470 randomly-selected religious teachers and pastoral counselors nationwide to determine their feelings on the morality and legality of various types of sexual conduct. He found

## Winans Found Guilty

R. Foster Winans, a former *Wall Street Journal* reporter, was convicted Monday, June 24, of conspiracy, security fraud and wire and mail fraud by a federal judge in New York.

David Carpenter (Winans lover) and stockbroker Kenneth P. Felis were also convicted.

The convictions, which will be appealed, carry a maximum punishment of five years in prison.

From 1982 until March 1984, as a reporter for the *Journal*, Winans was a contributor to the column "Heard on the Street." Information reported in the column often affected the value of a stock and was used by brokers and investors in making investment decisions. Winans was accused of using information from upcoming columns for personal investments and selling tips to Peter N. Brant, then the top-earning stockbroker at Kidder, Peabody & Co.

Brant pleaded guilty last year to conspiracy and fraud charges and became the prosecution's key witness.

Felis was a close friend and associate of Brant.

According to Assistant U.S. Attorney Peter J. Romatowski, the scheme netted \$675,000 in trading profits of which \$31,000 was paid to Winans and Carpenter.

The key issue in the trial, which began in January and concluded in March, was whether the government can prosecute for a violation of employer's policy. The government contended that Winans broke the law because, as a journalist, he defrauded the *Journal*. Winans admitted that it was the practice to keep stories confidential but claims he was never informed of any official policy. Although Winans admits passing information to Brant, he said he would not have done it if he had known it was illegal.

Carpenter's defense was based on a claim that his homosexual relationship with Winans constituted a "spousal relationship" and that, although he endorsed checks deposited in the couples' joint checking account, he was not an active participant in the scheme.

Defense lawyer Don Buchwald contended that, in this case, no insider trading had taken place. Insider trading is when someone with access to sensitive information about a company—a lawyer, accountant, officer, etc.—uses that information for buying and selling stocks.

In the case of Winans, it was emphasized that information in Winans' column was already public information. The only secret was that the *Journal* was preparing to mention the company.

Romatowski argued that this distinction made no difference.

their attitudes were much more liberal than the dictates of their faiths, and, especially in the criminal area, the vast majority did not think sexual activity should be regulated by law.

Moreover, only 40% thought that premarital heterosexual activity was immoral, and 50% were tolerant of homosexual relations.

In his book, Buchanan goes into detailed analysis of high court decisions and determines that, even though regulation of certain sexual activity may not be prudent in today's society, the state does have the power to protect the interests of children and the institution of marriage. He concludes that the state has the constitutional power to make adultery a crime

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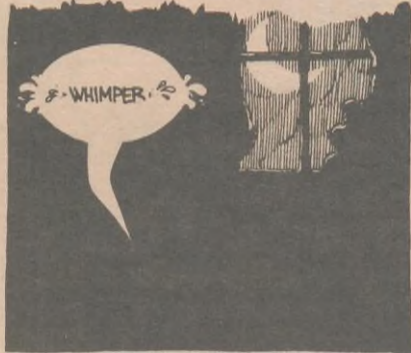
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## Police Seek Suspect in Stabbing

Houston Police Department homicide detectives are seeking a Latin male charged with attempted capital murder in connection with a stabbing which occurred Sunday, June 24.

Dennis Ray Houston, 25, of the 2400 block of Westheimer, was stabbed in the chest, abdomen, and head by a man believed to have accompanied him home from JR's, a Montrose bar on Pacific Street.

According to police reports, when the two arrived at Houston's home, an argument, reason unknown, ensued. The argument may have been about jewelry stolen from Houston, police speculated. Houston was stabbed three times.

Houston remains in Hermann Hospital in stable condition. He is expected to survive, police said.

The suspect fled the scene on foot and was still at-large Thursday. He was known to be a regular customer of Pacific Street bars.

## Pro Houston Founder to Challenge Hall

Richard H. Hite, the founder of Pro Houston, announced June 25 that he will oppose incumbent City Councilman Anthony Hall in the Nov. 5 city elections.

Hite said he founded Pro Houston about three and a half years ago to promote economic growth in the city. He said, as a candidate, he will continue to promote economic growth.

"Running for City Council is sort of a logical second step," Hite said.

He said Hall has not done enough to promote economic growth.

"I think that he is out of step with Houston," he said.

Hite also cited Hall's support of the recent anti-discrimination referendum as evidence that Hall does not think like the majority of Houstonians.

The new chairman of Pro Houston, Tom J. Fatjo Jr., is listed by the GPC as one of those who gave financial support to groups which opposed job protection rights for gay people. See commentary elsewhere this issue.)

Hite disclaimed any ties to mayoral candidate Louie Welch, but he said he has retained the services of Bob Heller, a political media consultant, who is also working for the Welch campaign.

He announced his campaign manager, Zoe Lawrence, formerly worked for U.S. Rep. Jack Fields.

In a related development, Houston businessman Mike Boylan announced that he was "very close" to running for Hall's seat.

and that it cannot be forced to recognize same-sex marriages.

By way of contrast, he concludes that the state lacks the constitutional power to make fornication and homosexual conduct a crime.

In the area of status and employment, Buchanan concludes that the state has the power to take sexual conduct outside of marriage negatively into account only when considering a person for those positions which would make him or her a role model for youth. Thus, it may take sexual conduct outside of marriage into account when making child custody and adoption decisions, he says.

In the area of public school teaching, Buchanan says a school district may legally discriminate against gays only for their activities, not their words.

"The recent Supreme Court decision (*National Gay Task Force vs. Oklahoma School Board*) may have alarmed many parents who think the decision authorizes teachers to openly advocate homosexuality in the public school classroom, and that is not the case," he says. "All it really means is that you cannot prohibit a person from advocating homosexuality or other sexual conduct outside of marriage in their off hours, because it violates our constitutional guarantee of free speech."

"However, if, for example, a high school teacher began advocating certain sexual activities to children in the classroom, and such advocacy was not part of the school's curriculum, that would have a direct bearing on a teacher's ability to perform his or her duties, and could serve as a permissible basis for dismissal."

In general, however, Buchanan argues that the state may concern itself legitimately with the "adulterous" aspect of a person's sexual activities when considering them for youth, role model statuses.

"Moving in a pro-government direction, I am open to the argument that the state has greater power in regulating access to status on the basis of adultery than on the basis of fornication or homosexual conduct," Buchanan writes, noting that an adulterer's willingness to inflict harm on a third party (the non-participating spouse) may reflect a character flaw that bears significantly on his or her ability to handle a wide range of state created roles.

However, in the adultery area, the competing interests of government and the applicant may be resolved best on a case-by-case basis, he adds.

## Group Asks AMA to Act on AIDS

Donal Gorman, R.N., and Thomas Mullin, co-chairs of the the group "Mobilization Against AIDS Research and Documentation Committee" recently launched an effort aimed at all the delegates at the American Medical Association Convention.

The convention began June 16 in Chicago.

They said the purpose of the education effort is to sensitize doctors to the vital national needs concerning what Gorman called "the number one health crisis in America."

Gorman and Mullin pointed out that there is no coordinated national effort which can effectively educate the medical profession, and the AMA should lead the way in doing this. Mobilization has begun the effort by producing videotapes and written materials which are available to doctors from Mobilization's library.

At the AMA convention, the delegates were asked to adopt a resolution similar to that adopted by the California Medical Association calling for a national directory of physicians who treat people with AIDS and people with AIDS-related conditions.

The AMA was also asked to support measures requiring state governments to pay medical insurance premiums for people who contract AIDS or AIDS-related conditions. Gorman pointed out that paying these insurance premiums will eventually save state and local governments a large amount of money, since the private insurance carriers will have to pay the medical expenses of the people involved, so long as the premiums are paid.

If the premiums are not paid, and the policies lapse, the private insurance companies are "off-the-hook."

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## Mayor Escalates War on Sex Businesses

Houston Mayor Kathy Whitmire said Wednesday that the city's legal department has been "dragging their feet" in the drafting of an ordinance aimed at curbing the spread of adult bookstores and movie houses in the city.

Whitmire said she instructed the department to proceed with the drafting of the ordinance, which she said should be ready for council action in two weeks.

The ordinance, proposed by Councilman Ben Reyes, seeks to regulate the location of sexually-oriented businesses.

"The Legal Department has been dragging their feet on it," Whitmire said.

"Sometimes the Legal Department tries to protect us more than we need to be protected," she said.

Whitmire announced the existence of an internal memo, circulated within the legal department, which recommended not moving forward on the ordinance.

"From the standpoint of my administration we're prepared to move forward on any ordinances that will help us reduce the number of sexually-oriented businesses in the city," Whitmire said.

Whitmire added she plans to meet with Police Chief Lee Brown and representatives of the Houston Police vice squad Friday to discuss how the existing laws against obscenity can be enforced.

## New Orleans Mayor Issues Anti-Discrimination Order

On June 21 New Orleans Mayor Ernest N. Morial issued an official policy memorandum clearly stating that the City of New Orleans does not discriminate against gay men and lesbians in city employment and the provision of all city services.

The statement said in part, "No city agency or department shall discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation against any individual in the provision of any services or benefits by such city agency or department."

No city agency or department shall discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation against any individual in any matter pertaining to employment by the City, including, but not limited to, hiring, promotion, tenure, recruitment and compensation."

The Louisiana Gay Political Action Caucus (LAGPAC) had first requested such a policy from Morial in May, 1981. Since that time, LAGPAC officials have had numerous meetings and discussions with members of the Morial administration to urge the mayor to make clear his practice of non-discrimination based on sexual orientation.

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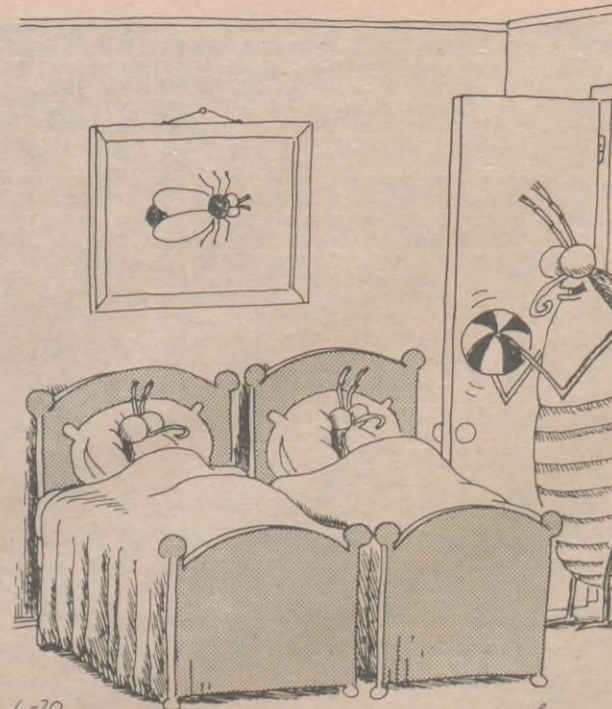

## Human Rights Campaign Fund To Honor Donahue, Steinem, and Lambda Legal Defense

The Human Rights Campaign Fund recently announced that television host Phil Donahue, publisher Gloria Steinem and the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund will all be honored at its annual New York dinner in the fall.

Phil Donahue, who hosts a nationally-syndicated television show focusing on contemporary issues, will receive the second annual Arthur Bell Award. Donahue was chosen because of the positive way he presents gay and lesbian issues on his television program, said the organizers.

The award honors Arthur Bell, a journalist and a founder of the modern gay and lesbian civil rights movement, and is given for outstanding contributions to gay and lesbian culture.

Last year's Award went to film historian Vito Russo.

Gloria Steinem and the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund are each receiving the Robert Livingston Human Rights Award. Steinem, founder and publisher of *Ms. Magazine*, is a leading feminist and longtime supporter of equal rights for gays and lesbians. Lambda is a non-profit legal organization handling a broad spectrum of cases relating to gay and lesbian issues.

The Award honors the life of Robert Livingston, a writer, publisher and theatrical producer, who was also the first openly gay member of the New York City Human Rights Commission. At the same time, he was a member of Sen. Daniel P. Moynihan's (D-NY) staff, and a leader in involving gays and lesbians in the political arena.

Past recipients of the Award include, Judy Goldsmith, president of the National Organization for Women; Bella Abzug, president of Women USA; Congressman Henry Waxman (D-CA), and the Gay Men's Health Crisis.

The annual gala is held at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel to benefit the Human Rights Campaign Fund. The Campaign Fund is a political action committee supporting House and Senate candidates who favor gay and lesbian civil rights. The dinner will be Wednesday, October 9.

## Gay/Lesbian Health Conference Postponed

The Seventh National Lesbian/Gay Health Conference and Fourth National AIDS Forum, originally scheduled for June 28-30, 1985, in Washington, D.C., has been postponed to spring 1986. The announcement was made by Caitlin Ryan, president of the National Lesbian and Gay Health Foundation, on behalf of the Foundation's board of directors.

The board at its May 4 meeting in Washington had approved several changes in conference plans, including shifting the date from June to early fall 1985. The shift in dates was made after acknowledging that the original dates conflicted with a number of local gay pride observances.

The proposed September date was later changed to spring of next year.

The foundation's board is expected to announce revised dates and plans for the conference following its July 20 meeting in New York. It is expected that the conference will be held in Washington, D.C.

## Few Take AIDS Test

The AIDS antibody testing program begun by the city earlier this month has been highly unsuccessful according to Montrose Clinic manager Tom Audette.

So far less than a dozen people a week have come in for the test. This low turnout is largely due to the publicity directed to the gay community and bisexual people warning against the test for fear of reprisals. Audette said the gay community got the message loud and clear that the test might be used as a means to discriminate by employers or others.

The Montrose Clinic is not being swamped with gay men, bisexuals or drug users—those in the high risk group. Audette said they are getting about a 50/50 ratio of high risk/no risk people in for the test. Sixty percent of last week's tests were positive but that does not mean those people necessarily have AIDS. It simply indicates those people have been exposed to the AIDS virus.

The state funded HTLV-III tests were originally implemented by the city health department to screen the blood banks for contaminated blood and stop the barage of people donating blood just to receive the AIDS test. The Montrose Clinic is currently the only facility administering the AIDS test and will continue through July 24.

## Legal Group Also Sues on Behalf of Bereaved Lover

### NGRA Takes Action Against Major Defense Contractor

Raytheon Company, a major defense contractor, has become the first company in California to be tried for discriminating against an employee who had AIDS.

Last year Raytheon put John Chadbourne on an involuntary and indefinite medical leave. Chadbourne's doctor said he was able to work and was not contagious. However, Raytheon told Chadbourne he couldn't return to work until he could show that there was a cure for AIDS.

Chadbourne has since died but National Gay Rights Advocates is pursuing his case. Leonard Graff, NGRA legal director, said, "The cause of action is based on the law that bars employers from discriminating based on physical handicap. We are asking the Fair Employment and Housing Commission to rule that that provision covers people with AIDS."

NGRA, the San Francisco-based public interest law firm, has intervened in the case on behalf of Chadbourne's estate.


Jean O'Leary, NGRA executive director, said, "We are putting employers on notice in this state. They cannot mistreat someone with AIDS and then get away with it because the employee dies." O'Leary commented further that Chadbourne's claims accrue to his estate and when Raytheon is forced to pay that will set a new precedent which will act as a deterrent to other employers.

The case was presented before the commission in Los Angeles June 18-20.

NGRA has also filed a brief with the California Court of Appeals in a suit for loss of "consortium" (marital companionship). The plaintiff in the lawsuit is James Crabtree. His lover of 10 years, Jack Allen, was stabbed by an assailant and died in Crabtree's arms.

According to Graff, "There is no question that if Crabtree and Allen had been lawfully married, Crabtree would be able to sue for loss of consortium. Of course they were not married because no state permits same sex marriages."

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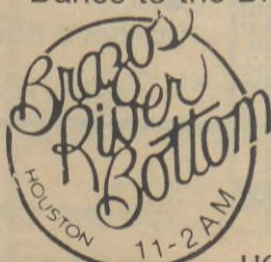

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# 'Cocoon' and 'St. Elmo's Fire' Are Hot Summer Hits

After a month filled with Bonds, Rambos, and Goonies, moviegoers will be thrilled with two high-caliber films opening on area screens.

*St. Elmo's Fire* brings together some of Hollywood's finest new actors in a poignant but realistic look at post-college life. Facing choices in relationships, careers, and friendships, seven friends face the real world (and each other) in a compelling drama full of love, anger, and fear.

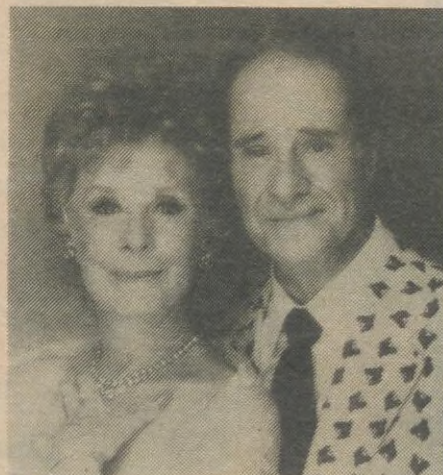
The second film is the much-awaited *Cocoon* directed by Ron Howard (*Splash*) and featuring a delightful group of Hollywood's older actors. Essentially a further exploration from the visitors in *Close Encounters of a Third Kind*, the film dazzles the audience with vivid special effects surrounding an imaginative and lively cast. *Cocoon* could well turn out to be the *E.T.* hit of 1985.

## □ *St. Elmo's Fire*

Somewhere between the teenagers of *The Breakfast Club* and the yuppies of *The Big Chill* lie a group of young people facing the world fresh out of college. There are many decisions to make and realities to face, and the young men and women in *St. Elmo's Fire* are obviously having a tough time deciding their course.

The refreshing thing about this outstanding new film is that it takes its characters seriously, and each individual becomes a person we really care about. With an emphasis on goals, commitments, and romantic conflicts, we grow with the individuals instead of merely watching actors perform roles.

At the top of the priority list of "things that need to be adjusted in life" are personal relationships. Billy (Rob Lowe) is

married with a kid, but still messes around with the ladies. Alex and Leslie (Judd Nelson and Ally Sheedy) are living together, but one is afraid of marriage as the other

prods. Kirbo (Emilio Estevez) rampantly chases an older woman from his past, while Wendy (Mare Winningham) pines after Billy.

The relationships are fragile, and you can almost feel the cracks developing as conflicts test each of them. The characters are constantly embarrassing themselves or others in their attempts to understand their problems, and we watch knowingly and hope for the best.

One of the most interesting men in the film is Kevin (Andrew McCarthy) who seems to have no interest in girls. Pursuing a writing career, he watches the others and keeps his sexual and personal desires to himself (much to the chagrin of his friends). Cynical about life and love, but inwardly unsure about his own emotions, Kevin is an imaginative and charming person to keep an eye on throughout the film.

The most fascinating woman is definitely Jules (Demi Moore), a flashy up-and-coming type thrust into a hectic executive world. Surrounding herself with a lush apartment and lots of clothes and jewelry, she screens herself into a world she can't afford or handle. Flitting from man to man and forcing herself into an imaginary, adult world, Jules becomes a harried individual who we realize is way out of her league.

As writer/director Joel Schumacher explains, "When we look back on our 20's, we see that a lot of the incredible drama we went through was self created." This group tries to stay together, but they are headed out in so many directions that they don't click anymore. The old love interests, the career goals that have changed, and the new decisions that must be made create dramatic turmoil that threatens the security of the group.

If the film has any failings, it is in the



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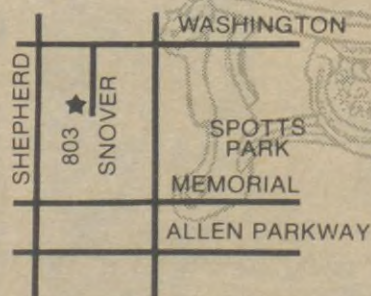
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Andrew McCarthy and Demi Moore compare notes on life in the "real" world after college in "St. Elmo's Fire"

development of some characters like Kirbo (who seems more like a silly teenager) and the parents (who are very vague representations). But you really can't trifle over a film as touching and heartfelt as *St. Elmo's Fire*. This is a movie you'll want to see several times, and it will definitely be high on my best of the year list. With a superb cast (especially Andrew McCarthy, Demi Moore, and Mare Winingham), this film deserves to be a hot summer hit.

□ *Cocoon*

In a movie market aimed at the younger generation, it's always refreshing when a filmmaker takes a risk by using older actors as stars. *Going in Style* succeeded by utilizing Art Carney, Lee Strasberg, and George Burns. Now director Ron Howard has dipped into the pot of golden-agers for his fantasy delight called *Cocoon*.

The cast reads like an ensemble for *That's Entertainment* with the distinguished Don Ameche, Broadway couple Hume Cronyn and Jessica Tandy (*The Gin Game*) and hooper Given Verden (*Damn Yankees*).

Other old professionals include Maureen Stapleton, Jack Gilford, Wilford Brimley (*Country, The Natural*), and Herta Ware (*2010*). They are all utterly fantastic, and really make *Cocoon* much more than an effects-laden replica of *Close Encounters*.

All of our senior citizens are living out their days in a Florida community when a strange phenomenon hits the menfolk. After an illegal dip in a deserted estate's pool, three old codgers suddenly become Spring chickens. Ailments disappear, limbs are sprightly again, and wives suddenly find their husbands romantically stalking them again. It's a lush fountain of youth in their own backyard.

But what of these huge, cocoon-like objects on the bottom of the pool? And this polite but strange group of people who have rented the estate and are harvesting the giant pods off the ocean floor? They look normal, but ... oh my God, they're pulling the skin off their faces and ...

Well, it's not giving too much away to say that they are aliens that look a lot like the gentle people at the end of *Close Encounters*. For earthly appearances, they are beautiful (Kitty), suave (Walter), and quietly handsome (Pillsbury). We don't get to know them too well, but it really makes them all the more mysterious.

The closest confrontation comes between fishing boat owner Steve Guttenburg (*Police Academy*) and Kitty (played by Raquel's daughter Tahnee Welch). Guttenburg takes his alien passengers quite lightly, but feels compelled to seduce the lovely lady. In the end, he gets much more than he bargained for with an encounter

that nearly blows all of his fuses.

*Cocoon* is so lively and entertaining that it's hard to find much to speak ill of. Still, its basic storyline is very weak with hardly a thread to hold on to that's feasible. The special effects are splashy but not overwhelming enough to be pretentious. The strength of the movie lies in its beloved characters that reach out so warmly to the audience.

We watch as the old-timers start to see life in a new way, take risks, and regain self-consciousness. A youngster (Barret Oliver from *D.A.R.Y.L.*) must learn to understand what aging means, and the aliens learn about trust and affection. The messages are simple, and like the beloved *E.T.* this film spreads joy across all generations. *Cocoon* is the summer treat for everyone—the movie that *Goonies* wanted to be, but wasn't.



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# Few Risks on Fantasy Street

Can I assume that you have been to Andrea Modisett's Risky Business at least once? If not, run. Don't walk. Get there quickly. You will discover something fairly unique in Houston.

While most of the other theaters seem to feel that a play must be deeply meaningful to be of any true value, Risky Business has only one virtue in mind: entertainment. If it isn't fun, they don't do it. They at least strive for, as Georges puts it in *La Cage*, "Only champagne from now till the finale." They usually make it, too.

Now, if you have seen them strut their stuff, you'll be happy to hear they've opened a new show, *Fantasy Street*. And this one is not just a carbon copy of their successful formula.

That is obvious from the moment you walk in the door. There is a set! More than just curtains and glitz, this one actually represents an idealized corner of an apartment building.

This show is definitely set elsewhere. Their other shows so far, even *Around the World in 80 Ways*, quite honestly happened on that stage in front of the audience. Now the performers are on that street or in some character's fantasies.

It used to be that if a new sequence was starting they'd just announce it or black out the lights and let you figure it out for yourself. This time out everything is tied together by a tape-recorded radio deejay.

The live performers talk to the audience a lot less than they used to. I got the feeling a bald person sitting on the aisle might even be safe from teasing.

And there is such a thing as too much of a good thing. Thankfully, it shouldn't be too hard to trim. There are too, too many puns in the aquadrama. All three songs in the musical star medley come from the same musical, where they are sung in the same order to tell the same story. Forget it.

They are at their best when doing original Art Yelton/ Randall Jobe songs such as "Now She's Gone" ("I flounder, but I lobster."). Or when they pull songs from five different places for the barnyard operetta or Little Red Riding-hooded Pig. Or when Debbie Boily starts out "Somewhere That's Green."

Randall does "Mommy Dearest." Sexy and talented Paul Polk keeps coming at you from all sides. Paula Abbot gets to dance again. And, they've got a new dancer this time out. David Barte is excel-

lent but will sparkle more when he's developed a little more confidence.

Really, to complain too much is like saying Dom Perignon might have had an off vintage.

Janet Williams Adderly is a scintillating vamp. She's a Roman candle made out of chinchilla. You might remember her from *Around the World?* Now she's joined four other dy-no-mite ladies to do *A ... My Name is Alice* downstairs at the Alley.

*Alice* is a mostly musical revue edited by Joan Micklin Silver and Julianne Boyd. They solicited material from nearly 100 authors and songwriters. 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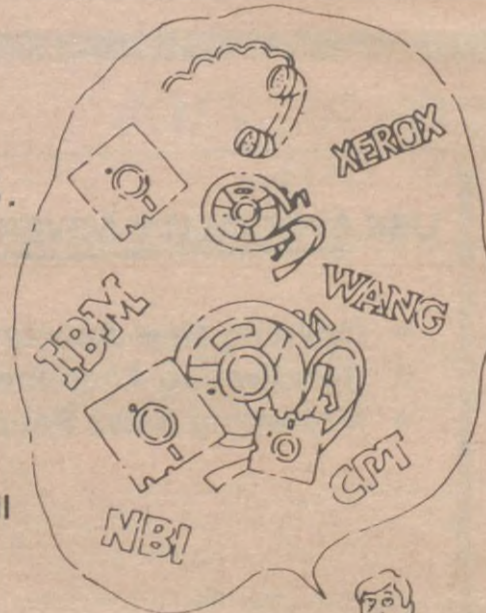
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woman. It has no axe to grind, particularly. It's not out to give male chauvanist pigs guilt pangs. It celebrates as much as it criticizes.

By going in depth into the full spectrum of the specific—womanhood—it finds the universal. Without many changes, it could easily be about what it's like to be gay, for example.

It's difficult to stage a revue in the round. You have to keep inventing reasons for people to keep turning. Dialogue is easier, but when it's time for people to just stand there and sing, director Charles Abbott generally carries it off in high style.

He's taken five super-strong female performers and blended them into a cohesive unit without ever losing their individual edges. You'll laugh a lot, but you'll also cry a little.

Karla Burns is a tremendous black lady with a silken voice. She doesn't mind pointing up her heft for laughs, but that's far from being the only way she gets them. Remember her Lily in TUTS' *Cabin in the Sky*?

Marijane Vandivier has a somewhat quirky voice with a fine musical-comedy edge to it. It beautifully matches her oddball wit and excellent timing. She was last year's Miss Hannigan.

Peggy Ann Byers and Chesley An Santoro brought me to tears with their quiet 11:00 song, "Don't Forget. Call Me in the Morning."

Another number, the hilarious "Honey-pot," shows a singer specializing in suggestive lyrics being "helped" by a psychologist. As the healer clinically forces her to face her sexual desires not only head-on but also explicitly in medical terms, we can see this faux honesty forcing out the lady's art. We laugh and applaud when she snaps back to it. This proves you don't have to slide into self-important seriousness to be deeply meaningful.



# Milton Resnick is Major Living Artist of Our Time

Milton Resnick: Paintings 1945-1985 is currently on view at the Contemporary Arts Museum at 5216 Montrose. Dates for the exhibition are June 21 through August 11. Admission is free. The Resnick exhibition is worthy of more than one trip down Montrose Boulevard, for Milton Resnick is a major living artist of our time.

The exhibition consists of 53 paintings representing Resnick's career from 1945 to 1985. Three different periods of accomplishment can be seen in this exhibition. To say that Resnick had only three changes in his work is untrue, but one can divide the paintings represented into three "major" periods of development.

Resnick's earlier works represented are small and more understandable than his later work. And yet these small, more readable paintings are less powerful. These paintings from c. 1945-1949 are fine examples of Resnick's search for the ultimate "Modern Art."

Resnick said that "... modern art in the 1930's meant receiving a package from across the sea." The package included new ways of using form, space, line, color, etc. During this period, Resnick along with his

contemporaries, Jackson Pollack, Hans Hofman and Willem de Kooning would struggle to create a unique and modern American art of their own.

In the second major period we clearly see a transition in thought, Resnick's canvasses become larger and his forms become less definite. Paintings dating from c. 1955-1962 have less concrete form. These paintings are lyrical and a bit delicate. For a very short time color takes center stage but is quickly given less importance. Paint becomes everything.

The last stage represented is Resnick's most faithful. Form and color are no longer of any necessary importance. The weight, volume and movement of paint on the canvas is important. Gallons and gallons of paint are used for Resnick's new larger canvasses. These paintings take on a darker textured surface. Rosenquist said "Milton Resnick's work is fierce, poetic and full of energy." Resnick's Edna series: Edna I through Edna V is the most remarkable, complete lesson in colored texture. Layer upon layer of paint almost seem to move. These most recent paintings are indeed products of Milton Resnick's accumulated sensibility.



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# Re-Releases, New Titles, Put New Life in Gay Literature

Many commentators have recently been bemoaning the fact that gay books are doomed. There have been many opinion pieces published indicating that big New York houses are moving away from gay fiction, especially. Sometimes there have been strange and sinister pronouncements of corporate interference.

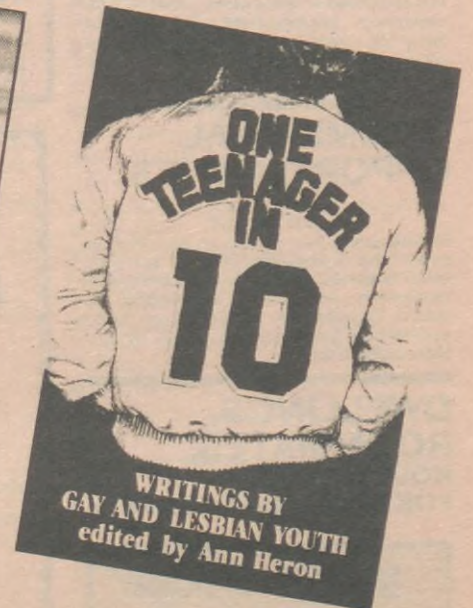
Evidently many people have been too fast to accept a negative analysis of the situation. It's as though they wanted to believe that the worst is going to happen. The reality is that publishing is a business, not the benign cultural institution that many would like to see it as. If publishers can make a profit, the works will go to press.

One of the most common examples of the idea that the corporate overlords of publishing were out to eliminate gay books from the marketplace has been the withdrawal of Avon Books from the gay publishing scene. Avon's owned by the huge Hearst Corporation. "Ah-ha!" they said, "Hearst wants to cancel gay literature."

The reality is that one of the most powerful openly gay editors in the business left Avon a while back. Bob Wyatt is now editorial director for Ballantine Books and, a year later, his influence is being seen in that company.

There's more proof that it wasn't a corporate decision involved. Hearst also owns Arbor House, another large publisher that has begun to do a significant amount of gay publishing. It's most recent book is a reprint of the classic *The Gallery* by John Holmes Burns. Praised as one of the most powerful novels to come out of the Second World War, *The Gallery* recreates the lives of a company of American soldi-

ers in Naples during the American occupation of Italy.

The novel includes the very first bar scenes ever captured in American literature. It is also a book that deals with the sexual needs and motivations of its characters in something less than a completely negative manner. The book is vibrant, full of rich color and brilliant characterizations.

Why would Arbor House be able to publish a book that its sister company, Avon, allowed to go out of print? Because Arbor House has learned its lessons from the gay publishing houses that are proving themselves to be successful. The gay houses have universally turned to "trade paperback" formats. These large books can be

manufactured and distributed more cheaply and can earn a profit on smaller sales than are possible for the mass market "pocketbooks."

The move to trade paperback publishing for gay works, a format that works extremely well for thriving gay bookstores, hasn't been isolated to Arbor House. St. Martin's, long a major publisher of gay books, is using it as well. They will reissue *The Jack Wrangler Story* (\$7.95) this summer. This porn star's autobiography can get you just as aroused in softcover as it did in cloth.

NAL is the house that's really moved in this direction. They have an entire line of trade paperback books with gay themes. Their most recent release is *A Smile in His Lifetime* by Joseph Hansen (\$7.95).

Hansen is best known for the Joseph Brandstetter detective series (again in trade paperback, this time at Holt, Rinehart and Winston).

Fans have often been disturbed when Hansen leaves that genre and attempts a "big novel" such as this one. *A Smile in His Lifetime* is probably an autobiographical work about a gay novelist whose love life is hardly a role model for the modern gay male. There is too much self-hatred in the work to make a contemporary reader feel good. But the craft of the professional writer is very clear, the pathos of the aging gay man who's missed out on the better things in life is all too real.

The vitality of trade paper also makes it possible for new publishers to enter the field with gay books more easily. Hoping to turn themselves into Alyson Publications or Sea Horse Presses, numerous companies have been coming on the scene with reprints of lost gay works or else with original titles.

Seeker Press is the most recent. The new publisher is located at 1020 Carol Drive, West Hollywood, CA 90096. It's begun its operation with a new volume of the classic gay novel *Finistere* (\$8.95). *Finistere* is a typically tragic novel of gay life from the early days of gay life. Written by Fritz Peters and occasionally published earlier, *Finistere* is not going to be a book beloved by the gay liberation movement either. But it is an invaluable document of our early lives.

Now that so many companies are discovering a format that will allow them to publish gay works well and profitably, we're most likely to see more, not fewer, gay titles in the stores very soon.
