## Bush blames lack of support for budget plan on analysts

Vice President George Bush blamed the nation's economic analysts for the public lack of confidence in President Reagan's economic programs at a press conference at the Houstonian Inn Saturday.

Bush was in Houston after a trip to Mexico, Detroit and Denver.

"There is almost uniform support by business for the president's program," Bush said. "Where the problems, where the confidence factor is, is in the analysts."

He said that criticism against Reagan's plan is not valid because the plan has not taken effect.

"When you're in a difficult situation in terms of interest rates, people want a quick fix. They want an easy answer. But the plan hasn't started yet. The tax cuts don't really take hold until Oct. 1 and then it is going to take time."

Bush expressed concern about the plan's success. "To have the program work, we're going to do what the president now is doing, make further cuts in terms of

getting this budget so that it will indeed be balanced in 1984," he said. "When those things happen, the whole level of confidence will go up."

Bush claimed that some of the economic indicators — the unemployment and inflation figures — are already showing positive signs. "So when the programs take hold, and I don't know how long it will take after the reductions, and when the administration is perceived as determined that it will get the additional cuts we have said all along, then I think that the confidence factor, in the market, in the analysts, will join the confidence that already exists in the overall business community," he said.

He stressed that the Wall Street financial analysts must understand the president is serious and determined in his plans, but "You're not going to see an instant solution to a problem that has taken two decades to get into. It's not going to happen overnight with a program that hasn't started yet."

Bush said the 250,000 demonstrators participating in the

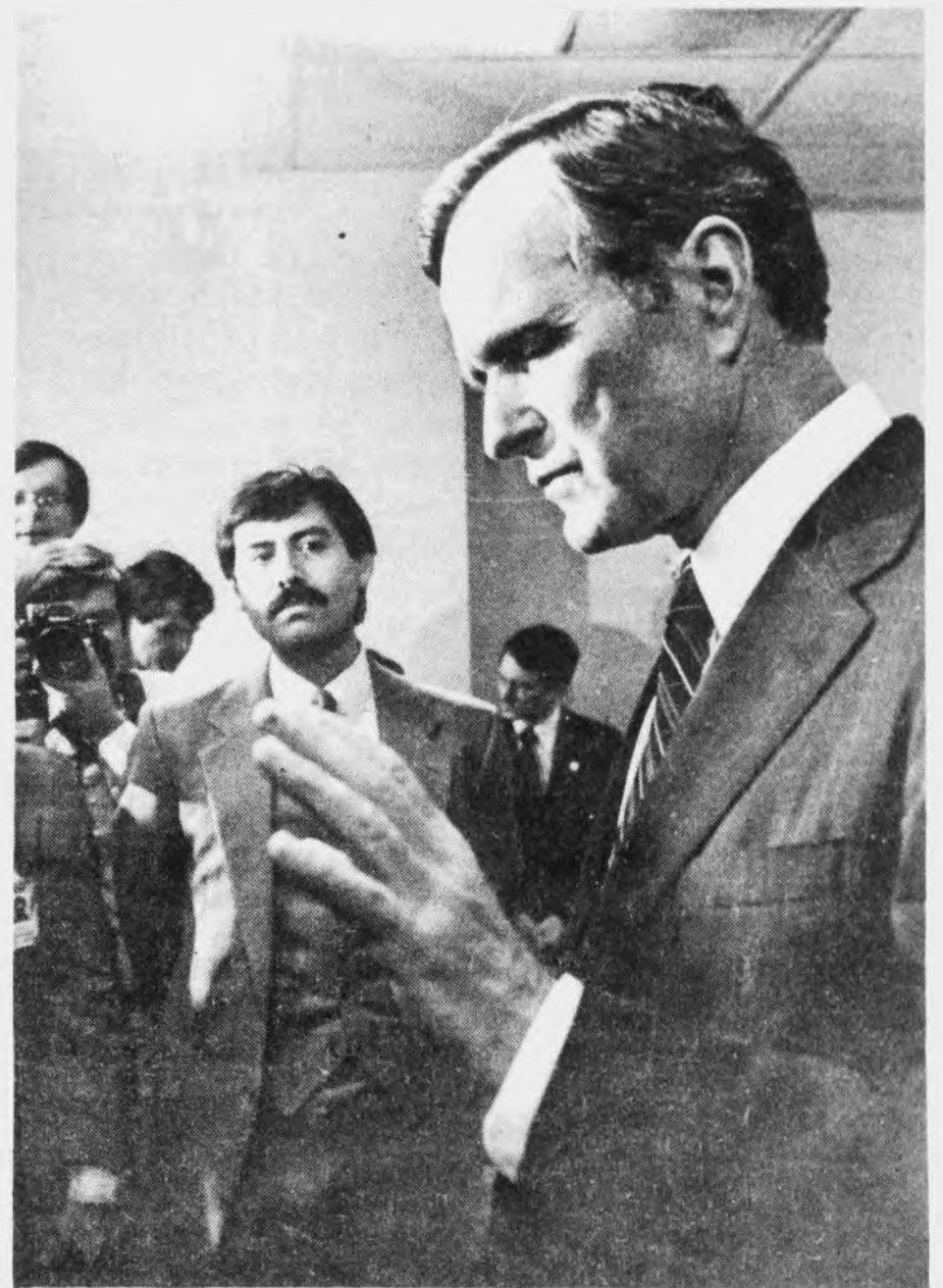
"Solidarity Day" march against cuts in social programs were exercising their rights. He said the demonstrators were part of the same group that opposed Reagan during his campaign.

He denied the Reagan administration has turned its back on labor. "The door is wide open for the labor leaders to meet with the administration officials." Bush said Layne Kirkland, president of the AFL-CIO, opposed the administration's economic plans because he (Kirkland) was "stung by an election defeat. He could no longer control his rank and file."

Bush said he would support president's plan to sell AWAC missiles to the Saudi Arabian government if he was forced to exercise his tie-breaking vote in the Senate.

Bush and his wife Barbara, who sat next to him during the brief meeting, were in town for one day, before returning to Washington.

Bush expressed interest in the weekend college football schedule. As he left the conference, he asked about the Cougar's game against Miami.

## Advisors predict cuts will lead to 'social chaos'

Washington (AP)—A panel of outside advisers to federal poverty programs, in a blistering parting shot, said Sunday that President Reagan's economic policies and budget cuts could plunge the nation into "social chaos."

The lame duck National Advisory Council on Economic Opportunity predicted Sunday that Reagan's policies will substantially swell the ranks of American's 29.3 million poor as "those who hover just above the poverty level" fall below it.

"The results are predictable: more crime, physical and psychological illness, broken families, racial division and the potential for violence," the council declared in its 13th and final annual report.

The council, created in 1964 during Lyndon Johnson's war on poverty, will go out of business Oct. 1 when the Economic Opportunity Act expires and many health and social welfare programs are converted to block grants.

The chairman, Arthur I. Blaustein, charged that the Reagan administration, which "conjured up the specter of an 'economic Dunkirk' to gain support for its economic package ... is perpetuating a 'social Pearl Harbor.'"

Blaustein, director of a public interest law and planning center in Berkeley, Calif., said Reagan "has adopted a strategy of brinkmanship that could lead to social chaos."

In a letter with the 127-page report, Blaustein said the cuts "represent a severe setback to the poor as a whole, and in particular to the elderly, to women, to minorities and to the young."

The Census Bureau reports that 29.3 million Americans, or 13 percent of the population, were living below the official poverty line of \$8,414 for a nonfarm family of four.

About 678,000 welfare families will lose all or some of their Aid to Families with Dependent

Children welfare benefits next month as part of the Reagan budget cuts.

The council disputed the argument advanced by Martin Anderson, Reagan's chief domestic adviser, in a 1978 book, "Welfare," that the war on poverty was won.

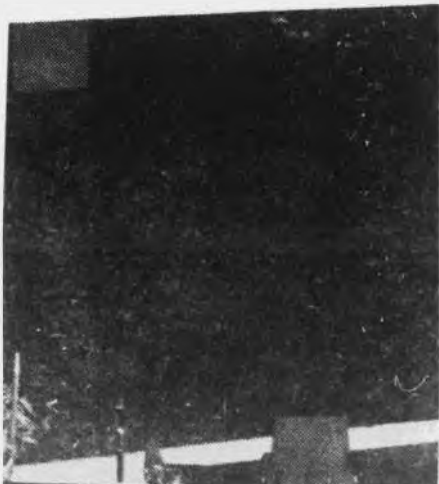
The council said that a number of poor Americans has dropped from 36 million in 1964, but the rate of 12 to 13 percent "has remained depressingly stable for over a decade."

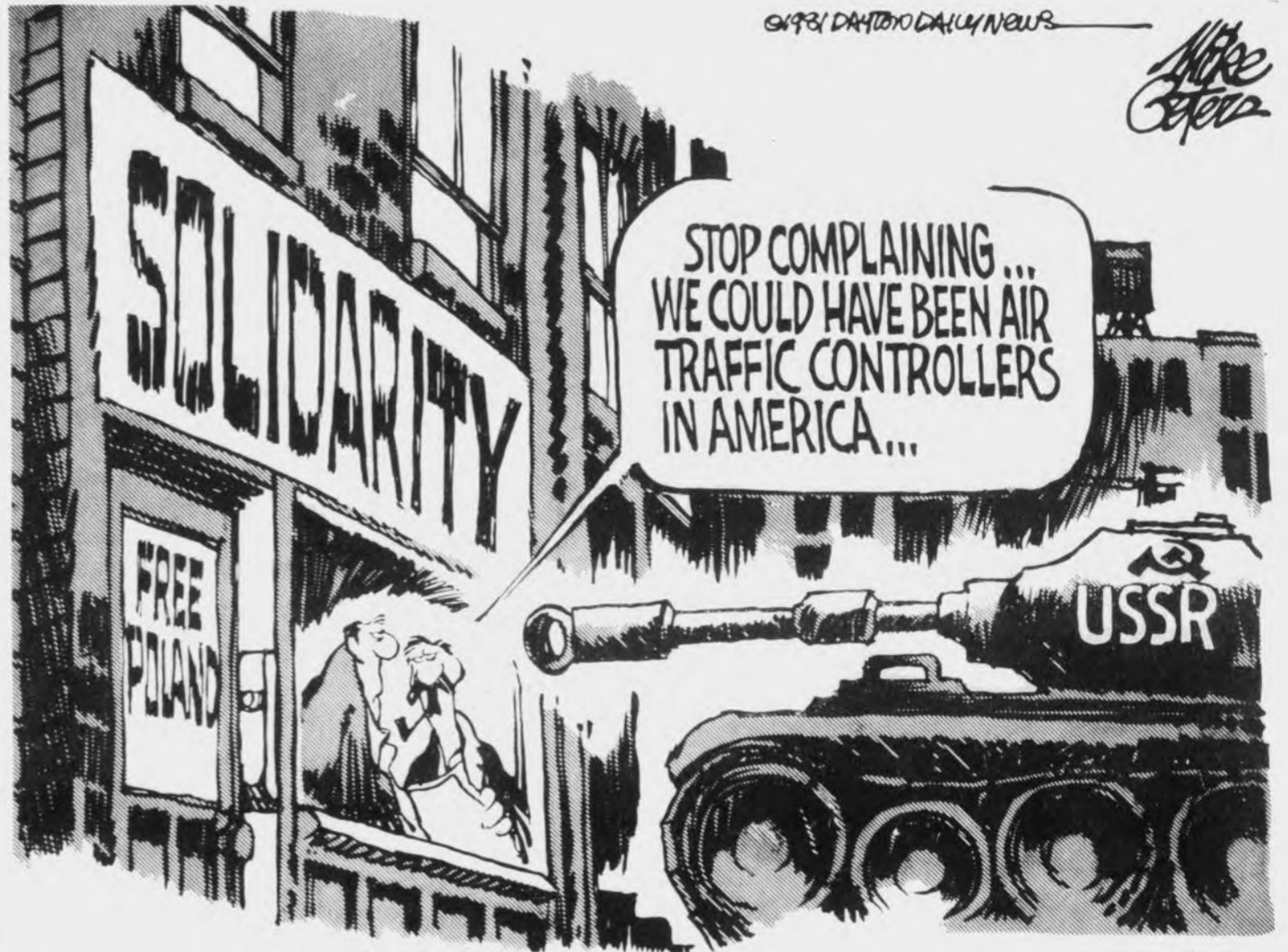
### A job not well done

If any of the residents of the new Cougar Place dormitories overslept for class during the last two weeks because their alarms didn't go off, they can thank the inept management of the Facilities Planning & Construction.

The residents have been subjected to two weeks of power blackouts because the electric lines which serve the dormitories had to be replaced. It seems the lines also served Robertson Stadium and couldn't stand the load of the new dorms.

Residents were not warned of the cutoffs — some of which lasted for over eight hours — and a schedule was not provided until four days before the work was scheduled to be completed. When the schedule finally appeared, it indicated the power would be cut off from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. — just when students' alarms would be going off.

The entire situation smacks of poor planning, both before construction and during the repairs. The problem with the lines should have been corrected before students were allowed to move in. Residents should have received notification of the repairs in time to take precautions. But then, that would be asking Facilities Planning & Construction to do its job properly, something it obviously doesn't know how to do.

### Laissez-faire and capitalism are one in same

To the Editor:

Talk about smearing concepts! What you call laissez-faire and what is laissez-faire are two different things. First, the true definition of laissez-faire is the same as that of capitalism; that is, an economic system based on private ownership of life and property (the prepositional phrase 'of life' is superfluous, but since many claim to own my life, I now find it necessary to include). The reason one now sees the term "laissez-faire capitalism" is because so many have smeared the concept "capitalism" that the adjective is necessary. Now you

are trying to smear the concept "laissez-faire".

First, about "tax breaks". Letting the rich do as they please is fine, but leaving the yoke on the middle-class and poor, you call that laissez-faire?! Sounds more like favoritism, which is to be expected, for the present governmental system of interest groups fighting other interest groups for a limited amount of resources and powers must lead to favoritism of one group or the other.

"Fiscal incentives" — wow, now a fancy phrase for subsidies. Subsidies must come from someone's pocket, however. It

would be superfluous to have it come from the rich, for they could just eliminate the middleman and keep it themselves, so it must again be the middle-class and poor who pay the subsidy.

"Fewer federal controls" — this is fine in itself, but a side-effect occurs because currently some laws now only exist as federal regulations. For example, it should be a law that one cannot injure another's arms, legs, lungs, or cars, to name a few articles in an individual's possession. Most of these are protected by law. Even now, an individual's lungs are only given limited protection,

and with talks of repealing the Clean Air Act, the protection will be lessened.

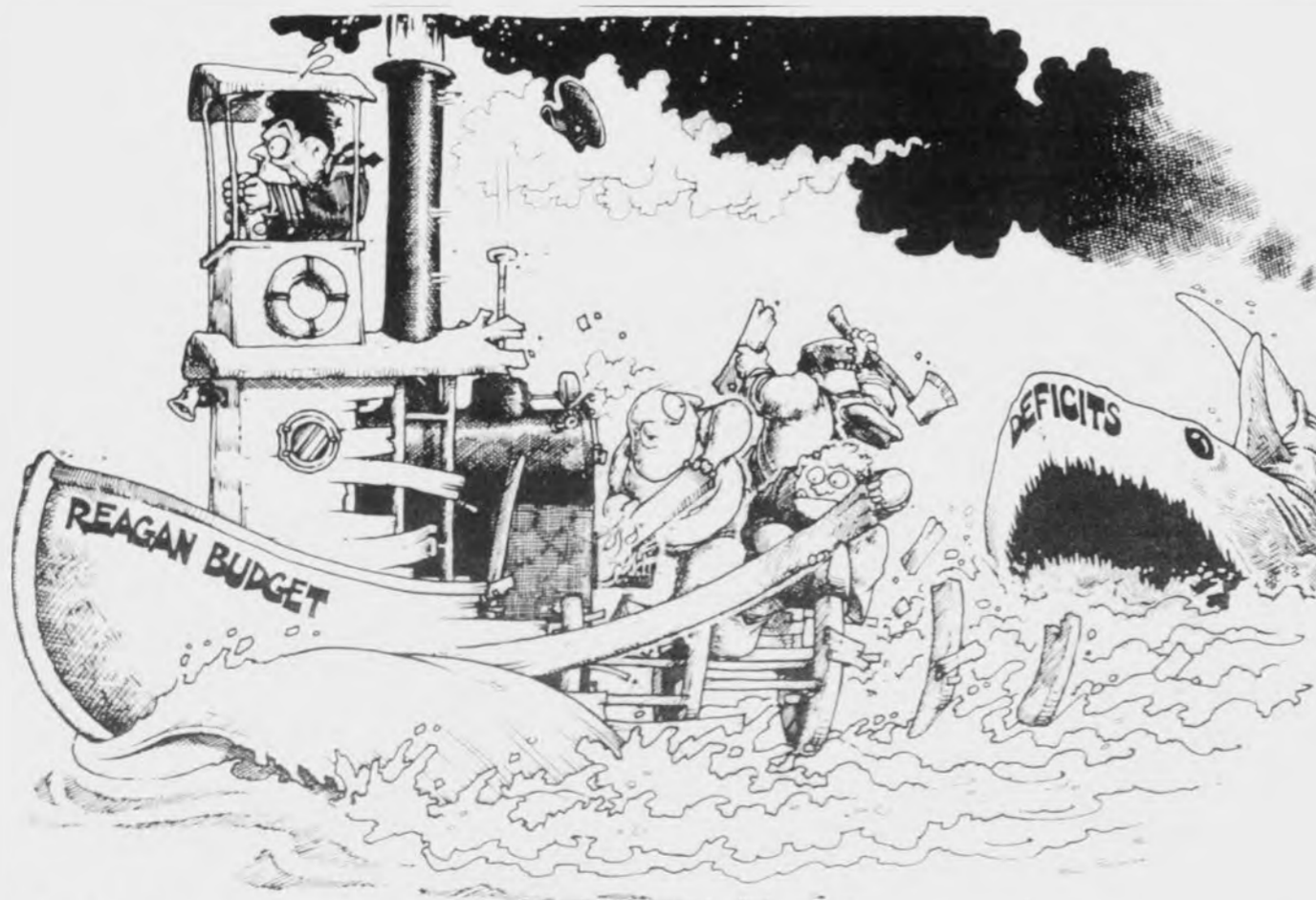
Now, to attack the last two points: laissez-faire causing the depression and your diatribe on tight-money policies. A cursory glance at Federal Reserve stats during the Twenties will tell one reason for the Depression, for the Fed followed an erratic course, sometimes inflating money immensely, other times cutting back sharply, and always at the wrong time.

Monetary inflation inevitably leads to price increases, and it must be stopped. However, you

are welcome to debate whether this should be achieved gradually or immediately.

And a final note. You are correct about "supply-side dung," for the supply-siders think that a rich class is created by fiat, or favoritism, when in reality it is those who are intelligent, hard-working, and ambitious who will get rich and stay rich, provided they live in a society based on laissez-faire. Of course, he can still become rich in any society, but he must struggle with those whose hands are in the public dole, or join them.

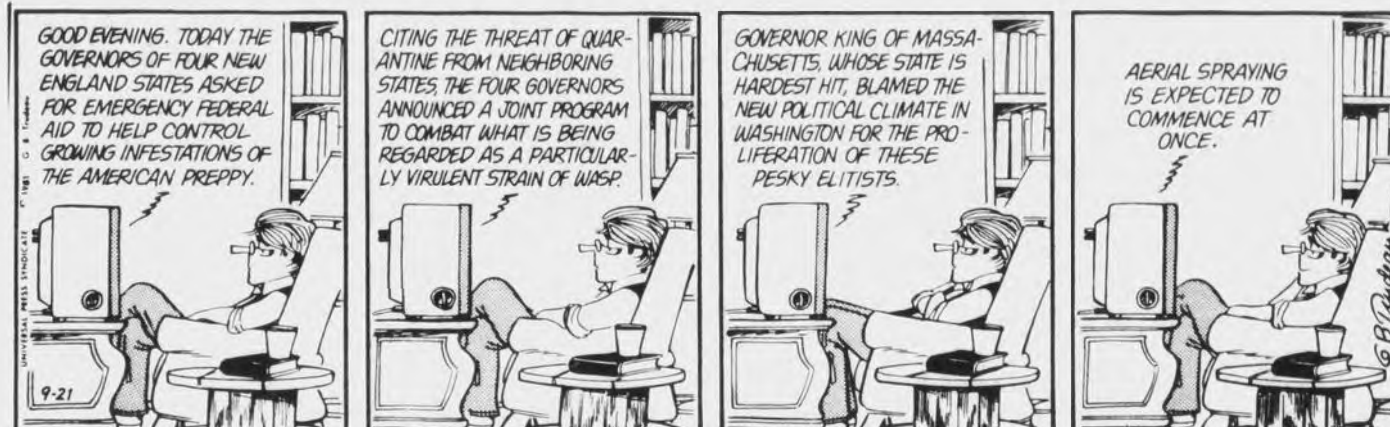

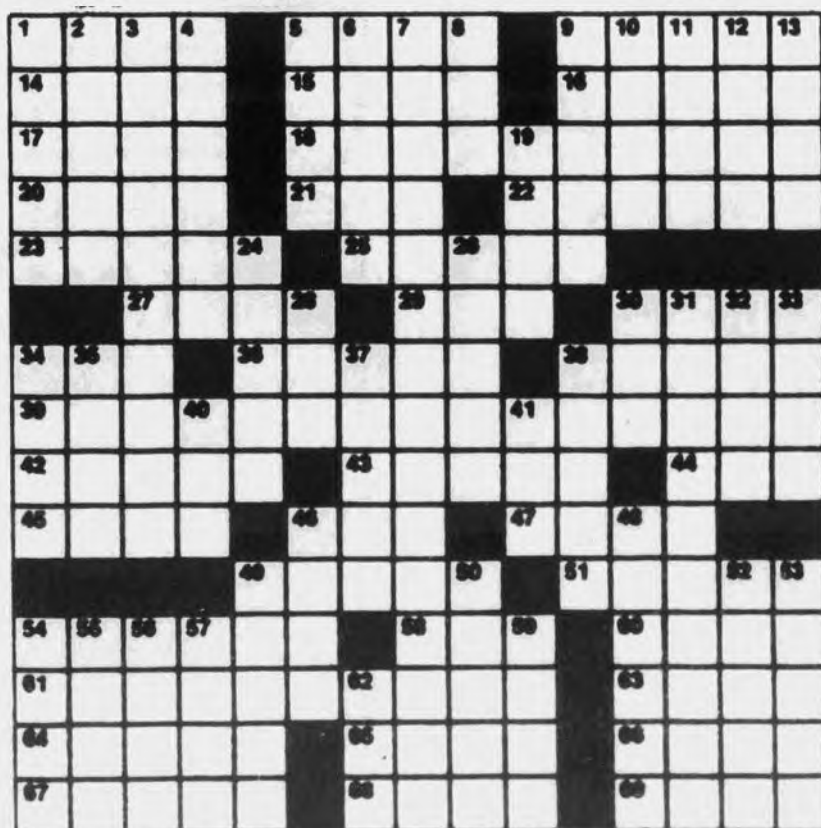
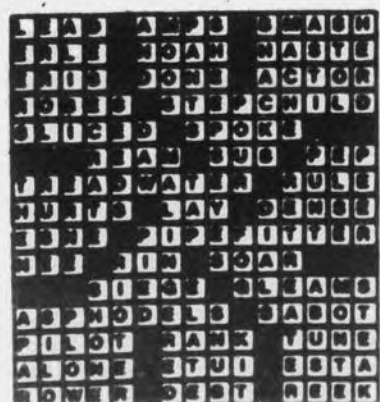

McMillian hurt

## Coogs kicked out of Miami

The Cougars lost more than a football game Saturday night. The Cougars probably lost their starting quarterback for the season, sophomore Audrey McMillian.

McMillian suffered a possible separation of his right shoulder in the third quarter of action in UH's 12-7 loss to the Miami Hurricanes in the Orange Bowl Saturday night. If X-rays taken this evening prove positive, McMillian would endure another season on the sidelines. He experienced a season-ending separation to his left shoulder against Arkansas in 1980. McMillian has felt this pain before and for him it's a bad dream revisited.

"I know it is separated since almost the same thing happened to me last year," McMillian said. "I knew it was separated as soon as I got up from underneath the pile.

"This is really terrible, having to start all over again. I guess this will be my red shirt year. Maybe this is just a bad dream like the Miami game was."

The loss of McMillian would mean sophomore Lionel Wilson will move into the number one spot, with sophomore redshirt Gerry Dickens as his backup. Wilson saw limited action in two games last season. He had none of his two passes caught and he rushed for 96 yards on 19 carries.

Against Miami Saturday, Wilson had one pass complete in six tries for ten yards, caught by sophomore flanker David Roberson in UH's final drive of the fourth quarter. Wilson, after being sacked by tackle Lester

Williams, had his next pass intercepted by Miami defensive back Fred Marion, who returned it 27 yards.

Head Coach Bill Yeoman, though, thinks Wilson will make an easy transition into the Cougar starting lineup.

"Lionel will be fine," Yeoman said. "He made a few mistakes against Miami, but what do you expect when a youngster has only been exposed to nineteen plays prior to this season? Lionel has always worked hard at practice and now he will get his chance to see how well he listens in practice. He has a strong arm and the desire runs at the same level."

It was the defense who showed a crowd of 32,586 Miami fans what desire was all about. The Hurricanes, led by safety Fred Marion and tackle Lester Williams, shut the Cougar veer down. Marion intercepted two passes and recovered one fumble while Williams was in on 15 tackles.

The Cougars couldn't put the ball into the endzone, the first time the UH offense failed to score a point since Oct. 22, 1977, when Arkansas shut out UH 34-0.

The Cougars lone score came when junior right cornerback Reggie Vonner intercepted a third-quarter Jim Kelly pass and returned it 40 yards for the touchdown. Vonner is the first Cougar defensive back to run back an interception for a touchdown since Robert Giblin returned one 51 yards against Colorado State, Nov. 11, 1972.

Miami's score could have been higher, but UH's defense was tough against a potentially dangerous team. The Hurricanes were limited to a net 84 yards on the ground and eight first downs.

Kelly, who used Miami's Sept. 12th open date to recover from a severe calf bruise sustained in the Florida game two weeks ago, had two of his 19 passes intercepted (the other by junior left cornerback Butch LaCroix), with seven passes finding receivers for 105 yards.

Miami's running attack was also stifled. Fullback Chris Hobbs could only get 38 yards, halfback Smokey Roan 22 and halfback Mark Rush 15.

"Our offensive line got their backsides whipped by a very good Houston defense," Hurricane Head Coach Howard Schnellenberger said. "Our offense was inept. Jim Kelly did not have an outstanding game."

There was one player Schnellenberger could not complain about and that was senior place kicker Dan Miller. The soccer-style kicker gave the Miami crowd its only offensive thrill and the Hurricanes their only points for the evening as he booted four field goals of 44, 50, 34 and 32 yards. Miller's display made him Miami's career scoring leader with 186 points. He is also the Cougar's first opponent to make more than three field goals in a game against UH.

The Cougars also have a place kicker, but junior Jeff Shaffer, bothered by a thigh bruise in his kicking leg the last five weeks, had an off night. He missed attempts from 46 and 48 yards out.

Yeoman is hoping the Cougars will take what they learned in the Miami game and apply it in their next contest, with Utah State in the Astrodome Sept. 26.

"If our youngsters up front on offense can keep the gum in the middle of their mouths, we will be fine."

# Southwest Conference roundup

**Texas 23, North Texas 10:** The Longhorns grounded out a 23-0 lead before the half on sophomore John Walker's 26-yard touchdown run, A.J. "Jam" Jones' two TD runs of one yard each and a 22-yard field goal by Raul Allegre. North Texas came back with a third-quarter Lonnie Green 42-yard field goal and a touchdown on Shaw Thompson's three-yard pass to Pete Harvey in the fourth-quarter. Jones carried 22 times for 105 yards and Walker ran for 79 yards on 19 carries. Texas defensive tackle Kenneth Sims was in on 15 tackles and helped in four sacks of North Texas quarterback Thompson. North Texas had minus-17 yards rushing, with Thompson completing 12 of 41 passes for 180 yards and two interceptions, mainly to Harvey who caught seven passes for 136 yards.

**SMU 59, Grambling 27:** Mustang back Eric Dickerson earned his fifth consecutive 100-yard game, gaining 142 yards and four touchdowns on 20 carries. His touchdown total tied a school record. His partner-in-crime, Craig James, totaled 104 yards and two touchdowns on 21 carries. He also caught two passes for 19 yards, which placed him fifth on the SMU total career yardage list with 2,034 yards. Grambling quarterback Skippy Ezell had four passes picked off, with one of them leading to a first-quarter score. Grambling's two lost fumbles resulted in SMU touchdowns.

**Arkansas 38, Northwestern 7:** Arkansas ran the Wildcats down with six Razorbacks rushing a total of 70 times for 423 yards. Junior Gary Anderson collected 111 yards on 14 carries. Anderson's 21-yard punt return to the Wildcat 48 led to Jessie Clark running in three yards for Arkansas first score on its first

possession. Wildcat quarterback Mike Kerrigan engineered a 78-yard drive that ended with Kerrigan hitting split end Steve Bogan with a four-yard scoring pass.

**Baylor 28, Louisiana Tech 21:** Bears halfback Walter Abercrombie scored two touchdowns and quarterback Jay Jeffrey threw 67 yards for another to give Baylor its win over the Bulldogs. Tech quarterback Matt Dunigan connected 29 of 53 passes for 307 yards, two touchdowns and one interception to taunt the Baylor defense.

**Texas Tech 28, New Mexico 21:** Red Raiders quarterback Ron Reeves scored one touchdown himself, passed for another and twice sent Anthony Hutchinson over the Lobo goal to give Tech its first win of the season. Hutchinson scored on runs of 19 and 23 yards, as he recorded his second straight 100-yard-plus rushing performance. Lobo quarterback Robin Gabriel shot second-half touchdown passes to flanker Jerry Apodaca and Mark Biren. Gabriel was 25 of 42 with one interception for 341 yards.

**TCU 38, UTA 16:** TCU quarterback Steve Stamp completed five touchdown passes, setting a SWC record. He finished the night with 17 completions in 22 attempts for 306 yards. Three of his touchdown tosses went to flanker Phillip Epps, the other two were received by split end Stanley Washington. UTA quarterback Scott Logan managed to connect on 11 passes for 230 yards, including a 30-yard touchdown throw to tight end Darryl Lewis.

**Boston College 13, Texas A&M 12:** The Aggies blew a chance to win when a 27-yard field goal attempt by David Hardy went

awry. Center Jim DeSilva snapped high and inside to holder Kyle Stuard who was covered by Boston College defenders before he could set the ball. Another Aggie opportunity fizzled out with an Eagle interception. A&M's Johnny Hector had six receptions for 63 yards and gained 56 on 12 carries.

**Missouri 42, Rice 10:** Seven Rice turnovers led to three Missouri touchdowns. Quarterback Mike Hyde plucked the Owls apart, completing 17 of 21 passes for 225 yards and four touchdowns in less than one half of work. Rice was unable to execute, except for a safety and a one-yard toss from quarterback Michael Calhoun to Hosea Fortune for Rice's first touchdown of the season. Calhoun completed 10 of 15 passes for 104 yards and three interceptions.

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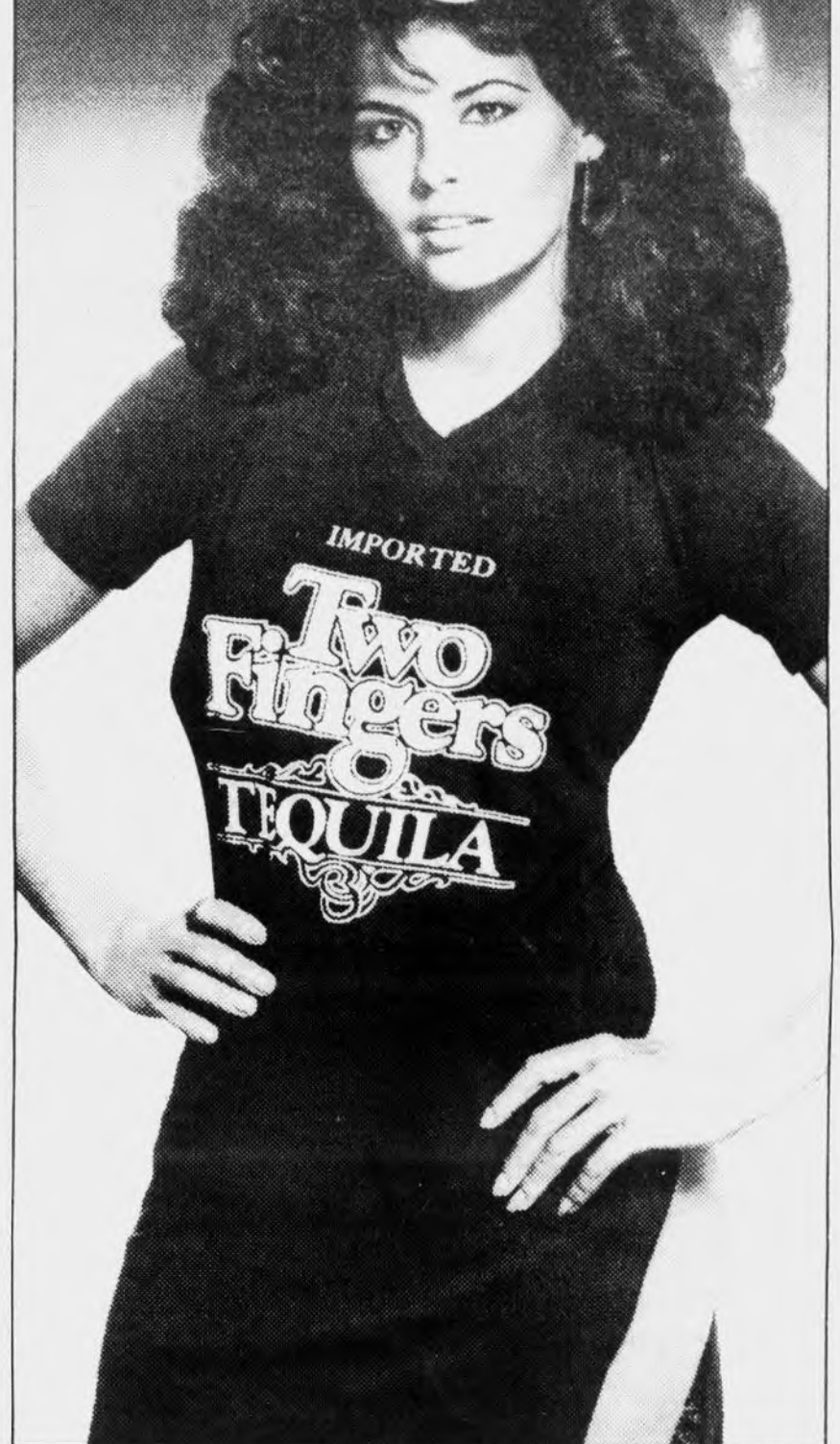
