\$5 million of fund split among schools

Over \$5 million in royalties from a University of Houston endowment fund have been divided up between the campuses in the UH System and the System Administration, System President Charles E. Bishop said yesterday.

The royalties were generated by the Melrose-Thompson Fund, an oil lease fund similar to the \$3 billion Permanent University Fund drawn on by the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems. The lease was donated to UH when only the central campus existed.

The Board of Regents is responsible for distributing the royalties among the campuses.

The royalty funds will be used to augment state funds generated through formula funding, Bishop said.

"The source of this money is important, it allows for flexibility unlike the regular budget. Every major office on campus receives some funding. It has enabled us to do some of the things that we couldn't do before," Bishop said.

"The other funds are formula driven, they reduce everyone to the same level of mediocrity. We rely on this source of funds and gifts to do special things," he said.

The funds are under the direct command of the chancellors from each campus, but they do have to answer to the board, Bishop said.

The total allotment for the central campus is

\$2,570,000. The largest sums will go for academic computing and academic equipment needs. Each department will receive \$500,000.

Bishop explained that the \$500,000 in the Academic Computing fund is only to maintain and operate the

system. An additional \$535,000 has been set aside in the System Administration's fund to provide for the purchase of the software required.

Faculty Research and Other Creative Endeavors Program has been allotted \$400,000. "This is the money used to attract new and outstanding faculty, to provide for competitive salaries for them, and to create a conducive environment for them. In specialized areas such as science and engineering, it also means to have new and specialized lab equipment and to have good opportunities for upcoming positions," Bishop said.

Discretionary accounts of \$214,300 for the system and \$160,000 for the central campus have been set up to provide principal administrators on both levels with flexibility in assisting programs not covered fully by state funding, Bishop said.

A \$100,000 block has been designated for new course and curriculum development to improve existing courses and if necessary to provide for creditation of new courses. "This new feature keeps the university from going stale," explained Bishop.

The Honors Program and a new program set up for gifted students have been allotted \$300,000. It will be used to not only attract creative and intelligent students to the campus, but will also help recognize special accomplishments of the students, Bishop said.

The downtown campus will receive \$183,000, the Clear Lake Campus \$182,700 and the Victoria campus will get \$131,364.

Arm talks hinted at

Haig concludes first day of talks with Gromyko

United Nations (AP) — Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig, Jr. and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko met for more than four hours Wednesday and held what Haig called "frank and businesslike" discussions covering a broad range of U.S.-Soviet relations.

The two diplomats said they would issue a joint statement on arms control Thursday morning. They were expected to announce the date and place for the start of formal negotiations aimed at controlling deployment of medium-range nuclear weapons in Europe. The United States has

been said to favor mid-November in Geneva.

It was the highest-level meeting so far between officials of the Reagan administration and the Soviet leadership. Both men, relaxed and smiling, exchanged pleasantries and began the meeting at 2:05 p.m. EDT. Their talks ended shortly before 6:30 p.m.

State Department Spokesman Dean Fischer said Haig and Gromyko will meet again on Monday and that Haig would report to President Reagan by telephone on the talks.

"We discussed the broad principles surrounding U.S.-Soviet

relations," Haig said in the statement read by Fischer. "We touched on a number of international issues, and the discussions will be continued on Monday, Sept. 28."

Fischer declined to say what issues were discussed or if the Polish crisis was raised. Haig said before the meeting he would tell Gromyko the United States insisted the Soviets not intervene militarily in the Eastern-bloc communist nations, ravaged by labor and economic troubles.

Asked to characterize the talks, Fischer said they were "frank and businesslike." He said he was speaking for Haig.

Gromyko declined to talk with reporters as he left the U.S. Mission, saying only that a statement would be issued Thursday morning. Haig, who left 20 minutes after Gromyko, also did not talk to reporters. Fischer said the two men, smiling and chatting amiably at the start of the meeting, met for two hours and 50 minutes alone, and then met jointly with their advisers for one hour and 15 minutes.

The diplomats, each dressed in a gray suit and seated on green sofas in the 11th floor office of U.S. Ambassador Jeane J. Kirkpatrick at the U.S. Mission, conversed in English in a brief session for photographers before the talks began.

Haig, greeting Gromyko at the elevator, said he had read Gromyko's biography Tuesday night. Taking note that this is the 25th year Gromyko has held his post, Haig referred to other foreign ministers across the street at the U.N. Headquarters by saying, "They've not got the experience you have."

Gromyko told Haig he started his service in the United States as a consul at the Soviet Embassy in 1939.

In Washington, a high-ranking Defense Department official said the United States may approach the Soviet Union within the next six months with proposals for limiting strategic weapons. Richard N. Perle, an assistant defense secretary, said that in any SALT talks the Reagan administration's aim would be to limit weapons within "broad categories" rather than producing a detailed agreement such as the SALT II pact.

Considering the harsh rhetoric the two nations have directed at each other in recent months, the

fact—that they were meeting at all was important in itself.

Each side accused the other Tuesday of trying to achieve military superiority and warned that the other would not get away with it.

In a letter Tuesday, Reagan told Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev that the United States would pay any price to keep the Soviets from gaining an advantage.

Gromyko said in a speech to the General Assembly that the United States was trying to ignite the arms race, and declared the Soviet Union would counter the effort.

But both sides also indicated a willingness to talk. Reagan said in his letter to Brezhnev he hoped for a "framework of mutual respect" with the Soviets based on the recognition of the legitimate interests of both nations.

Gromyko said the Soviets wanted "businesslike" relations with the United States, in a speech that was otherwise filled with denunciations of the Reagan administration's foreign policy.

French Foreign Minister Claude Cheysson, who also is attending the U.N. meeting, told a news conference Wednesday that Gromyko's speech was a response to a speech Haig delivered in Berlin two weeks ago that was highly critical of Soviet global behavior.

Cheysson also said he was encouraged that Haig stressed North-South economic issues in his speech to the assembly on Monday, rather than focusing on the U.S.-Soviet rivalry. Haig did say the Soviet and Vietnamese intervention in Afghanistan and Cambodia was a threat to the peace of all nations.

Movie's screening will combat racism

The International Committee Against Racism plans to picket the University Center today to protest Program Council's showing of "Birth of a Nation" scheduled for Sept. 29.

From the outset, PC intended to use the film, a Ku Klux Klan propaganda piece directed by D. W. Griffith, as the centerpiece for a panel discussion examining the problems of racism in today's society.

InCAR was one of the first groups approached to sit on the panel. Instead of participating, InCAR has decided to picket the UC and discourage students from attending the panel discussion.

If InCAR is really interested in fighting racism, it would support PC's efforts to fight racial hatred through the only effective weapon — education.

PC's panel and discussion period are meant to provide the type of educational experience that serves to counter the ignorance of racism. The screening of "Birth of a Nation" will provide a graphic example of this ignorance. It is not meant to rekindle the fires of racism as InCAR alleges.

Students and faculty should ignore the pickets and see the film for what it really is, blatant racist propaganda, then attend a discussion aimed at defeating racism by exposing it, not covering it up as InCAR advocates.

Thruster system hurt by spill

Cape Canaveral, Fla (AP) — A propellant spill that unglued nearly 300 thermal tiles on the space shuttle Columbia also leaked into the craft itself, increasing the possibility that the ship will have to undergo lengthy repairs, officials said Wednesday.

Moving the ship from its pad would delay the launch "in excess of a month" beyond the scheduled Oct. 9 date, said Shuttle Operations Director George Page.

"Project officials are deciding whether or not to roll the orbiter and move it to the Orbiter Processing Facility for repair," said a status report issued late Wednesday on the Tuesday accident.

A decision on whether to move the shuttle system or do the necessary repairs at the pad is expected by Friday, Page said.

Hugh Harris, a spokesman for the Kennedy Space Center, said a visual inspection in the orbiter's nose disclosed the contamination of the reaction control system.

But the extent of damage is unknown until a technician climbs into the system's pod and inspects it closely. That operation is to take place late Wednesday.

The system contains a group of thrusters which control the pitch and roll of the space plane during orbit and atmospheric re-entry.

"It's pretty sure that they are going to have to remove the pod," said Harris, following an hour-long telephone conference among officials and engineers of the various space centers around the country. "I don't think there's any doubt they're going to do it."

Harris said that the propellant, an oxidizer called nitrogen tetroxide, turns into nitric acid with the addition of water. Nitric acid is very corrosive to copper wires and other metals.

The adhesive that holds the silica-and-fiber tiles to the spacecraft's aluminum skin was destroyed by the propellant. Page said the tiles themselves, among

31,000 on the craft, were not damaged.

Some of the tiles fell off by themselves, others came free during inspection and a number were being pulled off to determine the extent of damage beneath them. By late Wednesday afternoon, 288 tiles were off the craft.

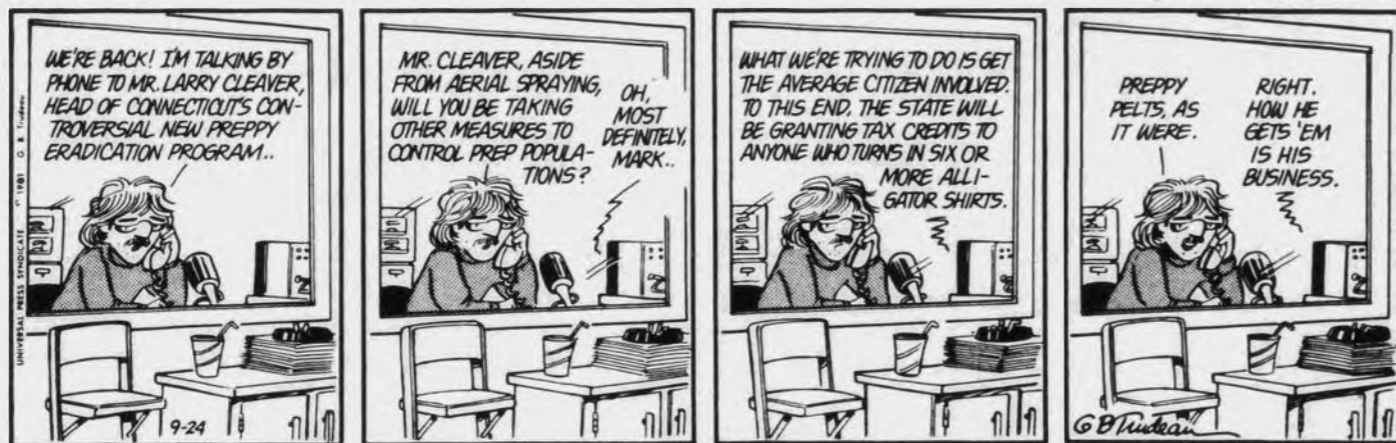
The tiles protect the shuttle against the high temperatures of re-entry into the atmosphere. They are individually sized, fitted and bonded onto 75 percent of the orbiter's external surface.

Page said that the fact that they are made of silica kept the highly acidic oxidizer from eating away at the tiles.

Much of the other work at the launch complex was at a stand still after the spill.

The accident was caused by a faulty valve or a seal on the ground fueling system leading to the servicing panel, said Mark Hess, a spokesman for the space center.

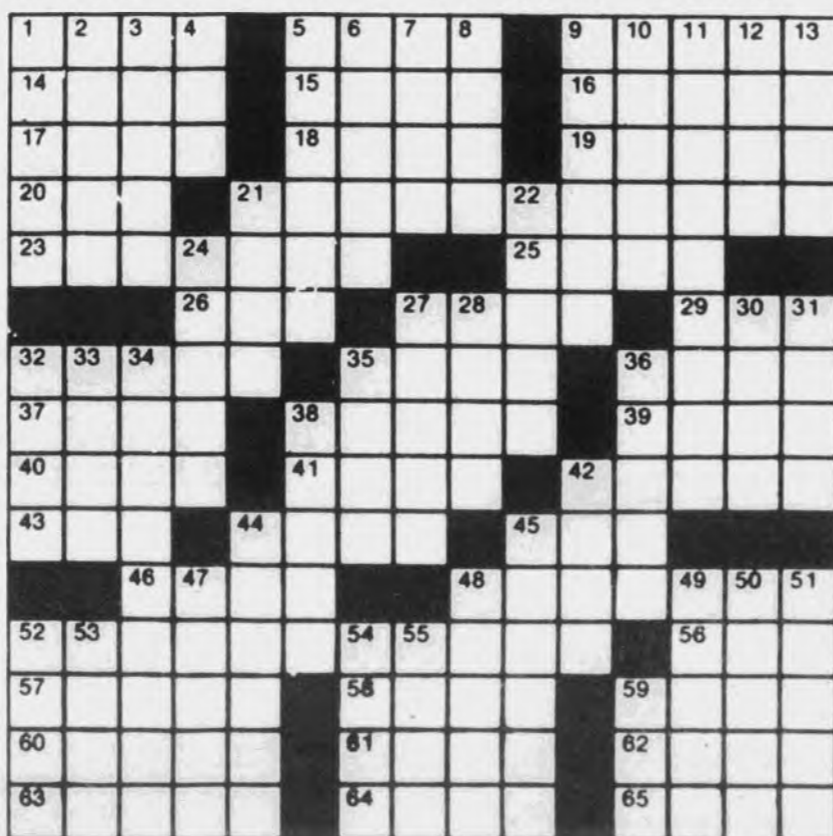

Wilson gets the snap

Lionel Wilson (pictured left) says he's ready for the snap of the ball.

The 19-year-old sophomore earned starting quarterback duties for the Cougars when Audrey McMillian was lost for the year with a separated right shoulder, received in last week's Miami-Florida game.

Wilson's first task is to try to lead the Cougars to a win over the Utah State Aggies in the Astrodome Saturday night. After a week of mapping out strategy for the contest, the 6-foot-1, 206-pounder feels he and the Cougars will be ready for the chore.

"I feel no real pressure," Wilson said. "We're going to try and run them down. We will be running our same basic offense."

The man who will snap the ball to Wilson is junior center Billy Kidd. He says he's also ready for the Aggies.

"We expect them to stunt a lot," Kidd said. "We're concentrating on the run and we'll pass only if we can't run. We

think we've seen enough in the films to know what to expect."

Last week's 12-7 loss to Miami left the Cougars a quiet group after the game, but if linebacker and team captain Grady Turner has his way, the Cougars could be dancing in the streets if they win.

"This is a game with which we will revive ourselves," Turner said. "We hated to lose, but it makes us feel more cautious and we'll put forth more effort."

How much more effort can one expect from a defense that has in this young season limited opponents to 134 yards rushing and 267 yards passing? A little more, according to right cornerback Reggie Vonner.

"We've put in a lot of work in our pass defense," says Vonner.

The Aggies, though, are also formidable against the rush, allowing just 163 yards in three games. They have given up 610 yards passing while snatching 10 interceptions. Their offense has totaled 665 yards in compiling a 2-1 record.

The Aggies' quarterback, Chico Canales, won't be playing because of a back injury.

UH ticket books on sale

Butler said that since the UH-University of Texas home football game on Nov. 7 is sold out, the purchase of an additional coupon book by students will be the best way to obtain another ticket for the game. Oct. 19-22 has been set as the coupon-exchange dates for that contest.

Butler added that those students wanting to add their tickets to existing bloc-seating organizations for UH's Oct. 3 game with Baylor in the 'Dome have until Sept. 25 to do so.

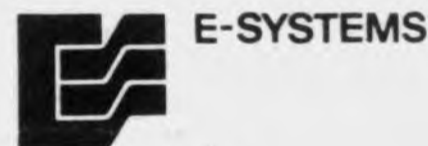

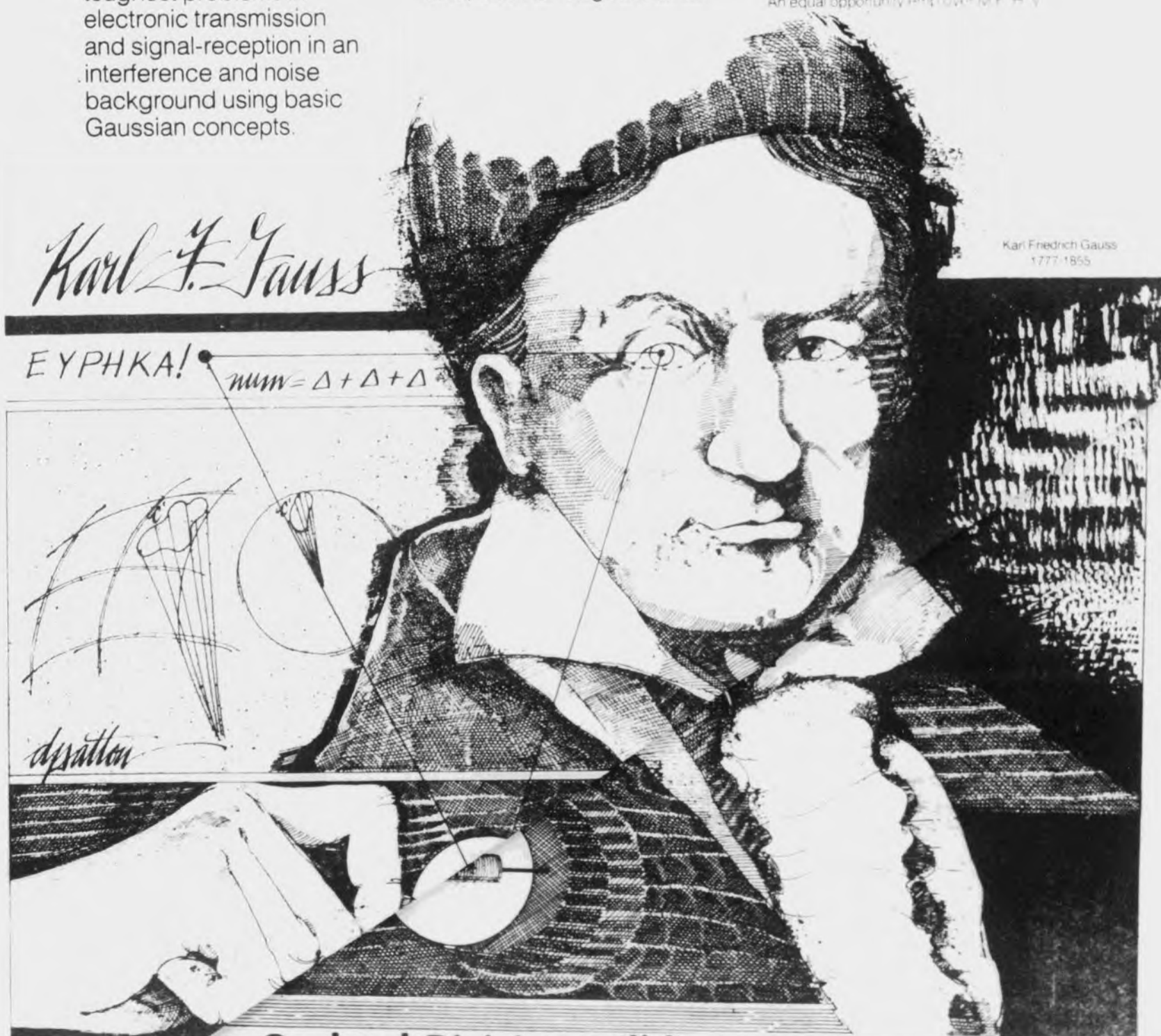
