On June 3 the Alumni Association became richer by 975 new members. That number received various diplomas or certificates, and were welcomed into the graduate ranks by Presi-



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Philosophy Outlined By President

over the rumors regarding changes in methods and philosophy of operation under General Bruce's administration. The following paragraphs, prepared by the General's office, are designed to replace the rumors with facts.

"The philosophy of the University," stated the president, "may be summarized as follows: The University desires those students who are qualified to receive and benefit from those fields we are qualified to teach." In spelling out just what is involved in carrying out that objective in the immediate future, the president emphasized three points: Admission requirements, Placement tests, and Counseling.

In the reference to the first two of these, the president re-emphasized that there is a distinct difference between admission requirements and placement tests.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

To be admitted to the University for credit toward a degree, entering Freshman must present at registration a transcript showing graduation from an accredited high school. That transcript must show at least fifteen units of work accomplished. These should include: three units in English; two units in two of the following fields: Social Studies, Natural Science, Foreign Languages; two units in Mathematics (limited to algebra, geometry, and trigonometry); and six units of electives (not including physical or military training, nor more than four units of vocational subjects). PLACEMENT TESTS

Prior to matriculation, preferably before graduation from high school, each prospective Freshman will be administered placement tests. These are designed to ascertain aptitude and achievement, so that at registration or very shortly thereafter the student may be placed where he belongs - neither beyond nor beneath his capacity. These placement tests are not entrance examinations even though required of all Freshmen, whether graduating high school seniors or transfer students.

Where these placement tests show that the Freshman is not prewill be assigned to special courses are engaged in this service.

COUNSELING

President Bruce emphasized the fact that the administering of the placement tests comprises but part of the process. The whole University is engaged in a coordinated guidance program. An appointment for counseling is made with each student immediately upon completion of the placement tests. This initial counseling is followed by a program of guidance which is especially detailed at the Freshman level, but is continuous throughout pared to pursue College English or the student's university carreer.
