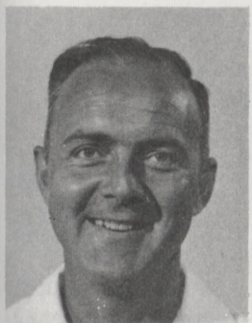


BOB BRYAN JOINS FIRE & SAFETY DEPARTMENT

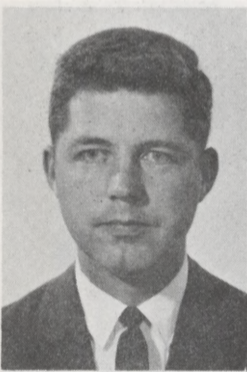

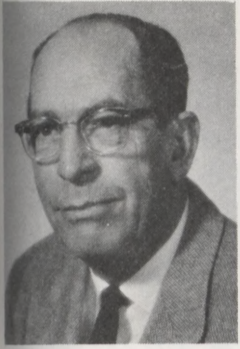

FORMER DISTILLING MANAGER MC CLELLAN DIES
RETIRED FROM HOUSTON REFINERY IN 1967

T. T. McClellan, 62, died on Sunday morning, September 8, 1968. He had retired from Houston Refinery as Manager Distilling on September 1, 1967, after more than 37 years of Shell service.

"Mac" was a graduate of Southeastern State College with a B.S. degree in science and began his Shell career at the Arkansas City Refinery Laboratory as a Chemist in April, 1930. After a variety of assignments, he became Head of Treating at the Arkansas City Refinery in June, 1937. In May, 1938, he was transferred to Shell's Norco, Louisiana, Refinery in the same capacity. He became Head of Treating at the Houston Refinery in July, 1939, and held this position until March, 1945, at which time he was transferred to Shell's Head Office Manufacturing Operations as a Senior Technologist in New York. In August, 1946, he returned to the Houston Refinery as Manager Treating and was subsequently appointed to the position of Manager Distilling in November, 1960.

He is survived by his wife, Lois, and a daughter. Funeral services were held on Tuesday, September 10, at the Nassau Bay Baptist Church, and burial was at the Forest Park Lawndale Cemetery in Houston.

BIKE SAFETY RULES

This is the third in a series of bicycle safety rules which were supplied by the Pasadena Noon Optimist Club in cooperation with the Pasadena Police Department.

- ...Avoid stunt riding, racing, and weaving in traffic.
- ...Slow down at all intersections, look to the right and left before crossing.
- ...Dismount and walk your bicycle across heavy traffic.
- ...Avoid riding on sidewalks or cutting across lawns.
- ...Stop before crossing the sidewalks when riding out of an alley or driveway.
- ...Pull to the right for emergency vehicle using red lights or sirens. (Pull completely off street, if possible.)
- ...Ride a safe distance from trucks, buses, and other vehicles.
- ...Look out for cars pulling into traffic. Watch for sudden opening of car doors.

GAME IDENTIFICATION
HUNTERS' RESPONSIBILITY

The recent killing of a rare whooping crane, thought to be a snow goose by a hunter, is an emphatic reminder that the burden of game identification rests squarely on the shoulders of the hunter, says Robert G. Mauermann, deputy director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Similar wasteful tragedies occur every hunting season, but never reach the limelight because the species involved are not in the spotlight of world opinion as the embodiment of conservation efforts. The rare whooping crane was one of the last 48 in the wild of its kind remaining on earth.

During the 1967 white-winged dove season in the Rio Grande Valley, hunters killed a few of the scarce red-billed pigeons, also protected by law but not so much in the limelight. Had the hunter known what was in his sights, he would not have pulled the trigger.

Biologists said the Rio Grande Valley is the northern most limits of the birds' range and as a result it is seldom seen in the U. S. Biologically, the bird can never hope to be as numerous as the white-winged or mourning dove since it lays a single egg.

Exact identification is also a necessity in hunting mourning dove in areas where whitewings exist. There are several pockets of whitewings outside the 21 counties in the Rio Grande Valley where whitewings are hunted. Without positive identification, the mourning dove hunter could easily bag a whitewing in a closed season and closed area.

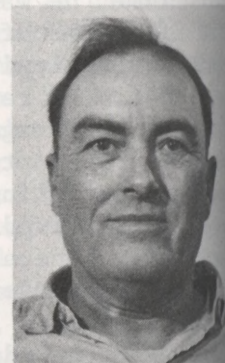

MORE ACCIDENT ATTITUDES

Here are some more of the attitudes compiled by the director of the traffic division of the National Safety Council which are directly related to accidents of all kinds:

- (1) Hostility - a constant unfocused feeling of anger towards others, resulting in an aggressive attitude.
- (2) Attitude of inferiority - "I won't be pushed around".
- (3) Competitiveness - trying to get ahead--to beat the other fellow.
- (4) Unconscious self-destruction - an attitude frequently noted by psychologists - a need to injure yourself.
- (5) Exhibitionism - showing off.
- (6) Pleasure in destruction - a personality maladjustment in which pleasure is derived from destroying things.
- (7) Transfer of guilt - creating situations in which blame can be placed on others, thus relieving feelings of guilt on the part of the instigator.
