The Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association has appointed a nine-man panel of consultants to assist public agencies in devising effective regulations and procedures to prevent air pollution.




Houston Refinery Process Superintendent Gene Smith was appointed to the panel which will serve as the technical subcommittee on air and refinery effluent for the Association's Air and Water Conservation Committee. The committee's first assignment has been to study proposed regulations for smoke and particulate control as proposed by the State Air Control Board.


JERRY D. TERRY TO JOIN HOUSTON REFINERY AS ASSISTANT MANAGER INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS



REFINERY PENSIONER TOM HOBBS DIES
RETIRED AS ZONE FOREMAN IN 1961

Houston Refinery Pensioner Tom B. Hobbs died on February 4, 1967, in Houston. Tom retired as a Zone Foreman in 1961 after having worked for Shell for over 27 years.



He was a long-time resident of Houston, having been born there in 1906. He attended Harrisburg school in Harrisburg, Texas, and joined Shell in 1929 as a Painter at the Houston Refinery and worked in a variety of positions until he was named a Labor Sub-Foreman in 1939. In 1946 he became a Zone Supervisor, and in 1955, he became a Zone Foreman.

Funeral services were at the Saint Christopher Catholic Church and burial was at the Garden of Gethsemani on February 6. Tom is survived by his widow, Mrs. Madeline Hobbs, and a son.

SEVENTH WORLD PETROLEUM CONGRESS
SLATED FOR APRIL

Some 6,000 oil industry representatives from around the world are expected to attend the Seventh World Petroleum Congress in Mexico City April 2-9.

A total of 406 papers will be presented at the meeting, 146 from the United States. The subjects cover all aspects of the industry's science and technology from the origin of oil and gas to the impact of the oil industry on agriculture, on civil engineering and building construction, and on the chemical industry.

Shell people will present 12 of the papers. A. H. Boulton, Assistant to the President of Shell Development Company, is vice chairman of the U.S. National Committee for the Congress and is a member of the Permanent Council.

WATCH THOSE SLIPS!

Two disabling injuries were experienced in 1967 - fortunately neither was serious. Both incidents involved slipping - one was on level surface and the other resulted from a fall from a tank car. There are three sure ways to minimize or eliminate slipping hazards --

- Where possible clean slippery surface areas or apply some non-skid material.
- Have secure footing.
- Good hand holds or life line "tie-offs" prevent falls if slipping occurs.

Each slip is a potential fall or injury -- Think about it and prevent the slip.

and for necessary modification of existing ones, and any regulations established should sufficiently meet the need of the public as to give assurance it will stand for a reasonable period of years.

Also, regulations should be enforceable without undue disagreement as to when a facility is in violation, and established regulation should provide flexibility to the owner or operator of a facility so the performance objectives can be achieved in the most economical manner available to him, and reasonable time schedules should be provided for implementation of changes so they can be accomplished in an economical, planned manner and not be expensive crash programs.

In future issues of the SHELLEGRAPH, a series of questions and answers about pollution will be printed to keep Refiners informed and abreast of the pollution situation.


