
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERS AND SOLICITORS TAKE UNITED FUND TOUR

JACK COX ACCEPTS NEW ASSIGNMENT IN HEAD OFFICE MANUFACTURING TECHNOLOGICAL




J. R. Cox has accepted a new assignment in Head Office Manufacturing Technological effective October 1.

DICK BAUER, HEAD OFFICE, NAMED CHAIRMAN OF NEWLY FORMED MINORITY PURCHASING COUNCIL

Houston and its minority business community will be assisted by a newly formed organization called the Houston Regional Minority Purchasing Council, Inc., according to Richard J. Bauer, Vice President Purchasing and General Services for Shell Oil Company. The Council is chartered as a non-profit, non-stock corporation in the State of Texas.

Bauer, who will serve as the Council's first Chairman, said that the goals of the new Council are twofold:

--identify minority-owned firms and assist them to qualify as suppliers of goods and services to Houston's corporations.

--promote policies that will encourage the corporations to participate in purchasing from such minority firms.

Membership to the Council includes Exxon Chemical, Tenneco, Brown & Root, Gulf Oil, Southwestern Bell, Texas Instruments, Texas Commerce Bank, First City National Bank, American General Insurance, Inheuser-Busch, Inc., and U.S. Plywood Champion Paper. Other Houston area member institutions are Rice University, the University of Houston, Business Resources Dev. Center (BRDC), Houston Area Urban League of United Latin American Citizens, Mexican-American Contractors Association, TSU Small Business Development Center, Volunteers in Technical Assistance (VITA), and the Houston Association of General and Sub-Contractors. The Houston offices of the Small Business Administration (SBA), the Department of Commerce, and the District OMBE Representative are also members.

Bauer said that one of the most effective means for advancing the cause of minority business enterprise is by expanding their markets through increased opportunity to do business with established corporations. Access to the marketplace is necessary for growth, and this obvious fact has special significance for the minority firm, whose markets are generally limited to its immediate community.

At the Council's first organizational meeting August 15,



the members elected the following individuals as Directors: R. J. Bauer, Vice President of Shell Oil; Tracy S. Park, Jr., Vice President of Tenneco; D. H. Harbour, Director of Purchasing for Brown & Root; John G. Tipple, Personnel Relations Manager for Southwestern Bell; Samuel E. DuBois, Assistant Vice President of Texas Commerce Bank; Abraham Ramirez, National Legal Adviser for the League of Latin American Citizens; and Roger P. Rosenberg, Private Consultant.

The Houston Regional Minority Purchasing Council is affiliated with the National Minority Purchasing Council which was officially formed in May 1972. The purpose of the National Council is to promote the adoption and implementation of corporate policies that will encourage purchasing of goods and services from minority-owned firms. Bauer was appointed to serve on the National Council by Secretary of Commerce, Fredrick B. Dent.
