Dear Mrs Cunningham:-

We are starting in with real work, Monday we hope to get into an office, lent us by Mr. Chandler (for as long as the war lasts). It looks as if all the Women's clubs are going to work together in the City clean up work, and our hands are full of real work. Six police-women were granted us and are at work, and about twenty more volunteer police-women will be given authority.

This seems to be the time for us unitedly, to ask for some of the things we have been wanting a long time, such as play-grounds for the children, fair trials for women, and some kind of censorship for amusements etc.

Now to do all this we have to employ a Secretary. All the Suffragists I have spoken to, regard this work as the most vital suffrage work we can do at the present time. You will be pleased to know how ready the women are for this work and how ready they all are for Women's Suffrage. For this reason I believe we would rather have a check at the present time than to have an organizer.

Thank you for the list of donors and I will send the "Thank you cards" immediately. Did I send you a contribution of \$2.00 from Mrs E.G. Cliverri? If not, I will send it with another small sum of \$1.38 which I have for our campaign.

Miss Eleanor Brackenridge and I sent telegrams to every one of our Representatives, and we are not going to forget Senator Culberson. I am sending you a copy of the paper with an account of our mass-meeting, and you will see the resolution we sent. My brother manufactured the resolution.

Hope you have fully recovered, and my family join me in cordial best wishes.
