Mark W. Slaymaker, son of Steve C. Slaymaker, senior engineer, Processing Engineering, plans to attend Rice University majoring in chemistry.



He is completing his high schooling in La Porte and working part-time as a clerk for Kroger in La Porte.



BICENTENNIAL SENIOR PRESENTS OWN MINUTE ON TV



While in Colonial Williamsburg, Shelley, winner of the Bicentennial Seniors competition, stood before the cameras with teleprompter nearby to tape her Bicentennial Minute. The Minute will be aired May 29 on CBS-TV.

"Two hundred years ago, many of Philadelphia's citizens were worried about their future," says Shelley Smith.

Another in the long line of Bicentennial Minute speakers, Shelley Smith is not the usual show business name or nationwide celebrity. She is, however, a public figure, for she is the national winner of the Bicentennial Seniors Program. And she is presenting the Minute, which she researched and wrote, on CBS-TV, Saturday, May 29.

Shelley won a \$10,000 scholarship for writing a theme in addition to the Minute and completing a current events test.

A senior at Crestwood High School in Cresco, Iowa, Shelley competed with some 18,000 students who entered the competition. The contest was sponsored by Shell in cooperation with the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

She taped her Minute in Williamsburg, Virginia, at the national meeting of the



At the time of his death, he was a shift supervisor in "A" Department with 28 years of company service.




Funeral services were conducted by St. Helen's Catholic Church with burial in Resurrection Cemetery in Pearland.

Following is the script of her Minute:

"I'm Shelley Smith...Two hundred years ago today, many of Philadelphia's citizens were worried about their future. The jobs, homes and lives of many patriots were endangered because of their political beliefs.

"In the dimly lit study of a small Philadelphia home, Dr. Benjamin Rush, a talented physician, zealous patriot and devoted husband, wrote a reassuring letter to his young wife, Julia.

"Our cause prospers in every county of the province. The hand of heaven is with us. Did I not think so, I would not have embarked in it. You have everything to hope and nothing to fear from the part which duty to God, to my country and to my conscience have led me to take in our affairs."

"Americans were ready to sacrifice for the cause of freedom."


