## Mid-East factions to sign treaty

(UPI)—President Nixon announced Thursday that Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger had achieved an agreement by Israel and Egypt on withdrawal of their forces from the Suez Canal front. Daily artillery and tank duels there had threatened to renew the war and block the Geneva peace conference.

The announcement was made simultaneously in Jerusalem, Washington and Cairo after a week of intensive negotiations by Kissinger who shuttled between Jerusalem and the Egyptian Nile River resort city of Aswan.

Nixon said the cease-fire would be signed at noon 6 a.m. EDT Friday at Kilometer 101 on the Cairo-Suez road where Kissinger got Israeli and Egyptian military commanders to sit down together in November to discuss peace for the first time in years.

None of the announcements mentioned the Soviet Union which is co-chairman of the Geneva conference with the United States. Israeli and Egyptian

dispatches indicated earlier there would be a simultaneous announcement in Moscow but none was forthcoming. The fact Russia was not mentioned emphasized the personal nature of the Kissinger triumph.

Nixon said, "I am pleased to announce that at this moment representatives of both governments are making an announcement along the following lines: "In accordance with the decision with the Geneva conference the governments of Egypt and Israel with the assistance of the government of the United States, have reached agreement on the disengagement and separation of their military sources. The agreement is scheduled to be signed by the chiefs of staff of Egypt and Israel at noon Egypt-Israel time today at Kilometer 101 on the Cairo-Suez Road.

"The commander of the United Nations Emergency Force, Gen. Silasvuo, has been asked by the parties to witness the signing."

The President in a televised statement congratulated President Anwar Sadat of Egypt, Prime Minister Golda Meir of Israel and their colleagues for "the very constructive" effort they made.

He added, "We in the United States can be proud of the role we have played, particularly Secretary Kissinger. . . so agreement could be reached."

Describing "the significance of the agreement," Nixon noted that "after four wars. . . this is the first significant step toward a permanent peace in the Mideast."

"But this is a very significant step reached directly as a result of negotiations between the two parties and therefore seems to me has a great deal of meaning to all of us here and around the world."

Nixon pledged, "I personally shall see that all negotiations, any efforts that can lead to that per-

## Business College starts fund drive

A fund drive to raise \$400,000 for the College of Business Administration will begin with a kickoff luncheon at noon Monday in the Houston Room, UC.

College of Business Alumni Association is conducting the drive to provide student aid, fund research, and an endowed chair and buy modern business equipment, Bill Green, chairman of the alumni division of the fund drive, said.

Green said the six-week drive will begin with three weeks of telephone contacts and end with three weeks of personal contacts. Students from the business communications classes and business fraternities will help with the telephone contacts, he said.

Student aid and research are the primary goals of the fund drive, Green said. He said the alumni want to make more loan and grant money available to underclassmen, he added.

Travis Traylor, chairman of the campaign, will be the featured speaker at the kickoff luncheon, Green said.

Green said most of the funds will be endowed. They will be invested securely and will probably earn about eight per cent

interest, he added.

The volunteers in the drive will call graduates from UH College of Business Administration asking for contributions. Ten students and ten alumni will meet in the board room of the Alumni Association building each night for twelve nights to make the calls.

Prizes will be given to individuals and teams which solicit the most pledges, Green said.

Dr. King, a human rights advocate, was killed by an assassin's bullet on April 4, 1968.

## WANTS TO TEACH

### Law dean Neibel resigns

John B. Neibel, dean of the Bates College of Law, announced Thursday that he is resigning from his position effective August 31.

He said he will remain at UH in a teaching capacity following his nine-year term as dean of the college of law.

UH Pres. Philip G. Hoffman said of Neibel's resignation, "Dean John Neibel has served the University with distinction for 17 years as faculty member, assistant dean and Dean of the Bates College of Law."

"During his nine years of leadership, he has effectively presided over the period of greatest qualitative and quantitative development of the College," Hoffman added.

Emmett B. Fields, executive vice-president and dean of facilities, said of Neibel: "John B. Neibel is an important person in the affairs of UH, a contributor to its progress in many ways, and I look upon his achievements with gratitude."

Fields added a dean's search committee will be appointed soon

to find a replacement for Neibel, a product of the college he has served for so many years.

The dean of the University of Texas Law School, Page Keeton, expressed surprise when he learned of Neibel's resignation. He also said, "I must say that it appears that deans don't want to stay deans for too long anymore."

During Neibel's tenure as dean, the Bates College of Law has experienced significant growth in size and prestige:

Its enrollment has increased from 400 to 700 students.

The size of the law library has jumped from 30,000 to 120,000 volumes.

The college moved from a basement location in the main library to occupy a modern, \$4.1 million structure which is being expanded to meet further enrollment growth.

The number of faculty has increased from 11 to 22.

The college has gained national prominence as the home of the National College of District Attorneys and the National College of Criminal Defense Lawyers and Public Defenders.

Neibel graduated from UH with a LLB degree in 1956, and im-

mediately joined the faculty as assistant professor of law and assistant to the dean. After attending the University of Michigan on a fellowship, Neibel returned to UH in 1959 and was named assistant dean of law.

Active in the community as a lecturer and speaker, Neibel has spoken many times on the legal status of women in Texas and constitutional revision. Another field in which he specializes is due process in civil litigations.

Concerning his resignation, Neibel said, "I have enjoyed immensely the challenges and opportunities afforded me over the years in working with a devoted law faculty that has permitted us to bring the College of Law to its present position of eminence and success."


"With the dedicated support of the University's administration and Board of Regents, we have been fortunate to share in the tremendous overall progress of UH and look forward to a future for the College and the University marked by growing distinction," he added.

Most of the law faculty contacted made no comment on Neibel's resignation.

Student records are released only for use by faculty and professional staff for authorized University-related purposes.

The release of student records for off-campus use occurs only with the student's knowledge and consent, or where required by law, or upon subpoena duces tecum. These records shall include:

NOTE: If a student does not wish any of the above information to be released by the Registrar's Office, it is the student's responsibility to notify the Registrar's Office.

Interpretation and Exceptions to the Policy: Determined by a committee composed of Vice President for Student Life, Assistant Dean of Faculties, Dean of Admissions and Records, Director of Office of Information, two Faculty Members, President of the Student Association and two students appointed by the Student Senate. The Dean of Admissions and Records will serve as chairman.


**Exception Number 1.** The Dean of Admissions and Records may authorize (and advise the Interpretation and Exceptions Committee) the release of appropriate student information which will be used to study, through legitimate research, the quality of education and the educational process. Recipients of such information would be bound by professional and ethical standards to treat information received as confidential and must agree that above all the student's right to privacy will be protected.

**Exception Number 2.** The Registrar may without the release of the student certify in support of a student's application for educational benefits these reports to the Social Security Administration: enrollment, full-time—part-time status under institutional standards, not enrolled.

### Reconsider

Despite what anyone says about the letter of the law, we still find it particularly onerous that two UH students, recently no-billed by the Harris County Grand Jury in the sociology department laxative case, should now find themselves facing the same charges, administering an injurious substance to a minor, in the University Court system.

Perhaps the best step that could be taken in this case would be for the Student Life Council, which recommended on December 21 that the case go before the Student Court, should reconsider the evidence.

In view of the Grand Jury's decision to no-bill after being confronted with substantiated evidence, it seems the Student Life Council might have let the hassling which has enveloped the sociology department lately influence their decision.

It seems now that they were too willing to accept the charges as true or worthy of court scrutiny simply on their face value without bothering to inquire further into the matter.

In all fairness to the two students, Pattie Tyser and Gwendolyn Harris, the Student Life Court should reconsider their earlier decision. Perhaps they could save the Student Court a lot of time and effort.

# New fund aids 9 students

The first winners of the George M. Kirksey Memorial Scholarships in communications were announced recently by Dr. Campbell Titchener, chairman of the Department of Communications at UH.

Nine outstanding students, each majoring in either print or broadcast communications, received scholarships for the spring term, which are restricted to students in these fields of study by terms of the late Kirksey's will.

The scholarship funds come from dividends of a \$138,000 bequest from the Kirksey estate. Criteria for candidates for the Kirksey Scholarships are: probability of finishing school, career potential as assessed by

the full department faculty, and need.

The nine students receiving the first Kirksey Scholarships are: Vicki Bomke, journalism senior; Constance Cooper, journalism senior; Pat Deeves, R-TV junior; Tina Peters, R-TV junior; David S. Ritz, R-TV junior; Keith Smith, R-TV junior; John W. Taylor, Jr., R-TV senior; Ruth E. Teal,

journalism senior; and John Ventura, journalism junior.

Kirksey, who was active in Houston journalism at KTRK-TV, Channel 13 and as a writer for the Houston Press, also donated his personal library to the communications department. He died in 1971.



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# Judge to hear complaints on mayor's race outcome

A February 7 court hearing was granted on defeated mayoral candidate Dick Gottlieb's request for a court order to force City Council and former mayor Louie Welch to either hold a new election or certify Gottlieb the winner of December's runoff election.

A temporary restraining order was granted on Wednesday which will prevent any city official from disposing of precinct poll lists and affidavits of voters who forgot to bring their registration forms to the polls.

The hearing will be in a civil district court before Judge Wyatt Heard.

Gottlieb's decision came shortly after the December 4 election. "Following December 4, we were deluged with 'sorry you lost' calls

By December 6, we were receiving totally different calls involving alleged irregularities. After awhile there were different reports and hundreds of calls," he said.

Reports of irregularities which were documentable were received, Gottlieb said. The Christmas holidays interfered greatly with the research his volunteers were doing on the reports, he added.

"When we finally reviewed everything we had, the books in 25 precinct polls were completely devoid of signatures. In the election, 13 of those polls I had won and 12 he had won," Gottlieb said. "I lost 5,000 votes in those polls, but Fred lost 10,000."

Gottlieb pointed out Section 8.08 of the Texas Election Code requires all voters to sign the precinct poll lists.

"The result of that little caper alone would substantially change the race," Gottlieb said.

David Berg, Gottlieb's attorney, uncovered many examples of

voter signatures being placed on the poll books by persons other than the voters themselves.

Gottlieb said the apparent forgeries, coupled with the unsigned poll books, brought him to challenge the outcome of the race.

"I detest being called the poor loser. I detest the thought of my family and my supporters coming out of this with egg on their faces. But there was just no way in all good conscience I could walk away from this," he said.

"I'm sure this kind of thing is all part of the game of politics. But Watergate is telling us something about stopping this kind of foolishness.

Hofheinz commented he is "not the least concerned about it," and even a bit surprised, as Gottlieb sent him a telegram on inaugural day wishing him the best of luck.

(Continued from Page 1) manent peace. . . will have the full and complete support of the government of the United States."

Nixon said the difficulties of the upcoming negotiations should not be underestimated.

Recalling the U.S. military alert October 25 designed to keep the Soviet Union from sending forces into the Middle East, the President described that area of the world, "more than any other area," as a place where "great powers can be brought into confrontation."

He said his announcement was a step "that paves the way to other steps" toward a permanent peace.

Nixon said the role of the United

States in the negotiations was as a mediator working for a settlement where "every nation in the area would be able to live in peace and be secure. . ."


Kissinger has visited the Middle East three times since war erupted last October, trying to work out a cease-fire between the Israeli and Arab forces.

# Edwards emerges from mediocrity

Not many kids on their block can say that Elvin Hayes is one of their best friends and helped recruit them during their high school days.

Sid Edwards can make that boast and is satisfied with his choice of schools.

"I'm satisfied that I came here even though my sophomore and junior years were rather, well, mediocre. But this year is my last so I just had to suck it up and do something positive," he said.

What Edwards has done is a complete turnaround. After 15 games "El Cid" is averaging over 15 points a contest and is the Cougars' leading rebounder at 9.6. What is amazing is that the former high school All-American from Schenectady, N.Y. (Linton High School) is hitting a scorching 57.6 per cent from the field.

Coach Guy Lewis says Edwards' blossoming is a surprise. "Frankly, after Sid's first two varsity season performances, we really weren't counting heavily on Sid's scoring much. I figured he would help us some on the boards, but Sid certainly has been the most pleasant surprise I've had this year.

"I think his improvement has come because Sid has finally decided to move without the ball, I mean get in position for a shot, get the pass and take the shot. Before he wasn't doing that, and therefore, wasn't getting open for

a shot. Now Sid is improving every game," smiled Lewis.

Edwards agrees with Lewis' assessment.

"My not moving for an open shot definitely hurts. But another reason is that the last two years

we've had the big scorers and big rebounders so I knew I wouldn't be starting every game and I really think that affected my attitude," the 215-pounder said.

"Now I'm starting every game and early in the year when teams were trying to stop Louis (Dunbar) from scoring or cutting Maurice (center Presley) off the boards, I knew I had to contribute more for this team to win like they have in the past. And I think I've helped," he said.


No one would disagree, Sid.

During the Christmas holidays, Edwards scored a career high 28 points against Oral Roberts and was named to the all-tournament team in the All College Tournament in Oklahoma City.

Then, a week later, Edwards was named as the Most Valuable Player in the UH-hosted Bluebonnet Classic.

Just recently Edwards canned 9-10 free throws which helped UH nip intra-city rival Rice.

"Lately, it seems like the fans have been down on us, but I really can't understand it. I mean, we've won five straight. I guess after last year's 23-4 team people get upset that we don't do that every year. Well, we're 10-5 now and we're young and we have to adjust to each other."

## Cougar cagers try WTSU and nation's number three defense

The Houston cagers will hardly have time to undo their shoe laces following a feverish 91-83 loss to undefeated Centenary last night, before a stingy West Texas State bunch will have them knotting the strings back together.

West Texas State, 7-2 in season play, rolls into Hofheinz Pavilion

with a team that has handed opponents a miserly 56.2 points and 36 rebounds per tip-off. But coach Guy Lewis' Coogs will hardly be satisfied to stop at that low mark, not even against the nation's third most unyielding defense.

Lewis' confidence is banked in the scoring combo of Louis Dunbar, Maurice Presley, Sidney Edwards, and Otis Birdsong, who

have all bucketed into double figures to slide UH into a tie for the 10th slot in total team offense.

When the UH big men aren't dropping in buckets, they're breathing around the rims for any stray leather—and that's where WTSU mentor Ron Ekker's game plans come in. "The key to beating Houston is definitely in the ability to rebound against them," said Ekker, adding, "if we can get them in rebounding then we'll be able to do something else with them."

Ekker will try the backboard battle by starting two centers, Reginald Ramey and Dallas Smith, both scraping the boards at 6-8, a pair of hot-handed guards in Howard Taylor and Joe Cosey, and a lone 6-7 forward, Dana Albright. Cosey doesn't seem to know he's a guard however and has picked the rims for nine carooms per contest.

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# Gents gun down Coogs

SHREVEPORT—The Cougars gave a gallant try in their quest to end the ten game win streak of the Centenary Gents here in Shreveport last night. However the strength of 7-1 Robert Parrish and the scorching shooting of junior Leon Johnson smothered all hopes as the Coogs fell 91-83.

Houston lead at the half 43-40, behind a seven point scoring spree, engineered by freshman reserve Otis Birdsong but could not withstand the firepower of Johnson who finished the game with 32 points, and the board-scraping of Parrish who snagged 25 rebounds.

Birdsong lead the Cougar scoring with 26 points, his alltime high. Sidney Edwards bagged 12, while Maurice Presley scored 14 and had 12 rebounds before fouling out with 7:46 remaining in the second half.

All-American Louis Dunbar finished the game with but 7 total points, seven below his average. Dunbar his only 7 of 24 field goal attempts but was not the only Cougar to suffer a poor shooting night. Houston as a team completed only 37 of 89 field goal efforts for a cool 41.6 percent.

Centenary, meanwhile singed the chords for 40 fieldgoals of 78 for a 51.6 percentage, hitting 20 of 36 in the second half.

Centenary's Goliath, Parrish was effectively held at bay by the Houston 2-3 sagg defense with Dunbar and Presley surrounding

the 7-1 "Chairman of the boards." Parrish scored only 18 points but took advantage of the situation when Presley fouled out.

Sophomore David Marrs, whose aggressive play earned him a starting berth, tried valiantly to halt the backboard domination of Parrish but was completely outmuscled as the Coogs dropped their sixth game in fifteen outings.

The two teams meet again on February 23 in Hofheinz Pavilion. In the meantime the Cougars take on Missouri Valley Conference foe West Texas State Saturday night at 8 p.m. in Hofheinz Pavilion.

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

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# Cycle 'queen' goes for jumping record

Debbie Lawler — thrill seeker and motorcycle daredevil. As she so aptly says, "Evil Knievel is the king of all motorcycle jumpers, but I am the queen."

Tonight and Saturday she will utilize her cycle skills in the Astrodome in her attempt to break the Men's World Indoor Jumping Record by jumping over 16 Chevrolets during the 1974 Thrill Show and Destruction Derby.

Wednesday afternoon she discussed what compels her to risk her life in a sport once dominated by men.

"I like danger," she said, "I'm a thrill seeker from the word 'go.' I do everything . . . I skydive, scuba dive and ski. That's the type of person I've always been. I feel that you only have one life and why not live it to the full extent."

Danger may escort the cycle queen, but the former actress-model looked more destined for Hollywood than the grease and dirt of the cycle world. Her long blonde hair falls down her shoulders, and it is hard to believe that her brown pant suit will soon be traded for the cycle suit on the table.

Pointing to her suit she said it was the only one like it in the world.

"It's for me only. It has a new type of shock absorbant material in it. It's only a quarter of an inch thin, but they can drop an egg on it from a hundred feet in the air and it won't break."

Lawler started riding motorcycles when she was nine years old and began jumping about a year and a

half ago. The only injury that she has received from motorcycle jumping is a torn fingernail. But she has received her share of bruises while cycle racing.

"I'm a very safety-minded person and a very safe driver on the road; however, I've had very serious motorcycle wrecks while racing. I pulled my shoulder muscle out and strained the ligaments in my arms and back and broke three ribs.

"Racing is a very hazardous sport," she said. "In this, there is no margin for error. You cannot be fancy free and ride as fast as you can go."

Is there any special equipment added to her motorcycle to assist her in making the jump?

"No, I use a stock motorcycle, because I don't need anything added to it. I'm very light, I weigh 109 pounds and my bike weighs 220 pounds."

Lawler said her speed, which is about 77 or 78 miles per hour, is a major factor in determining where she lands.

What does she think about while jumping?

"Hold on, hang on," she answered. "You can't see anything going that fast. All you can see is your up ramp. You can't see your

down ramp. By the time you get a chance to see the other side, you're down."

Lawler acted while in high school and will play herself in a film of her life story.

"We already have the options on my life story to be produced as a movie," she said. "We're negotiating with Warner Brothers studios. I've shot several different segments already."

"I did a lot of Shakespeare in high school. I was born and raised in Oregon and we had the Shakespearean festival right at our back door."

Lawler is presently on a tour and next on the agenda is the Amphi Theatre in Chicago, and then Detroit. After that, a European tour is scheduled. But Lawler does not mind the hectic pace.

"I really and truly enjoy my work and I enjoy the people I work with — that's why I got into this business. I used to be a professional model and I just got tired of the nine-to-five hassle."

Lawler plans to continue jumping until she gets bored with it.

"Then, I'd like to go to the moon," she said, "I'd like to be the first woman astronaut."




Houston businessman and civic leader Elliott A. Johnson has been named chairman of the UH 1974 Excellence Campaign.
