SHELL OIL NET INCOME UP 13% IN THIRD QUARTER

Shell Oil Company consolidated net income for the Third Quarter of 1964 amounted to \$48,446,000 or \$.80 a share, Monroe E. Spaght, President, announced Wednesday, October 21. This represents an increase of 13% over the \$43,022,000 or \$.71 a share, earned in the Third Quarter of 1963.



SHELL OIL NET INCOME (continued)

This was the highest Third Quarter income reported in the history of the Company, Mr. Spaght noted.

Consolidated net income for the first nine months of 1964 was also a record at \$144,006,000 or \$2.38 a share, a gain of 8% over the \$133,943,000 or \$2.21 a share reported for the same period last year.

Mr. Spaght credited the gains primarily to Shell's growth in all areas of the Company's activities. He said the capital expenditures for the nine months were nearly double those for the same period of 1963. A high level of capital expenditures is expected to continue into next year.

Shell's refined products sales volume rose 9% to 209,494,000 barrels, primarily as a result of larger auto gas sales. Gross production of crude oil and natural gas liquids amounted to 127,173,000 barrels, up 3%, gross production of natural gas, 496,151 million cubic feet, up 10%, and Refinery intakes 181,339,000 barrels, up 7%.
