
OFFSHORE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM UNDERWAY
IN COMPANY'S GULF OF MEXICO OIL FIELDS

J. F. Bookout, Vice President, New Orleans Exploration and Production Area, announced plans for an extensive development program in three newly discovered oil fields on its offshore holdings east of the Mississippi River in the Gulf of Mexico. All but one of the tracts involved were acquired in the June 1967 Federal lease sale.

The program involves construction and installation of five drilling and development platforms in record water depths, and the drilling in the next two years of some 120 new wells at a total cost of over \$50 million. Substantial additional sums will be required for new oil and gas pipelines and production facilities. This development, concentrated in the Main Pass Block 290, South Pass Block 70, and South Pass

NEW SALES TAX NOW EFFECTIVE

The new 1% sales tax for Greater Houston, Pasadena, Galveston, and many other Texas cities is now effective. The tax was approved by the voters of the various cities last year and brings the total sales tax in most Texas cities to 3%, 2% of which is the state sales tax. For the convenience of Refiners, the following table shows the breakdown on the tax paying schedule:

<u>Amount of Sale</u>	<u>Tax</u>
1 to 16 cents	None
17 to 49 cents	1¢
50 to 83 cents	2¢
84¢ to \$1.16	3¢

For amounts beyond \$1.16, the tax may be computed by using multiples of the above or figuring a tax of 3% on the items purchased. The taxes apply, generally, to all purchases except for necessities such as food and drugs. According to the Tax Research Association, the added penny in tax (per dollar) will cost about 2½ cents per capita daily in Houston, bringing in about \$27,000 a day for the city.

Block 62 Fields, is expected to yield a production rate of 10 million barrels annually by the end of 1969.

Already well under way, the development program was preceded by the drilling of 24 exploratory tests to delineate producing areas. Three development platforms have been installed and drilling is in progress. A 27-mile oil pipeline has been laid from South Pass Block 62 to shore, and this field is now on production. Forty additional miles of pipeline will be laid this year to connect the other two fields.

The development work, which is in water depths in excess of 300 feet, is at the outer-depth limits of the industry's present offshore operations. It marks another first for Shell in offshore technology.

A 30-NATION TOUR IN SAN ANTONIO
AWAITS VISITORS TO HEMISFAIR 1968

Refinery employees and their families planning to attend HemisFair 1968 in San Antonio are urged to make reservations early for lodging and tickets in order to avoid possible disappointment.

With more than seven million visitors from nations throughout the world expected to attend the six-month long fair, available tickets, hotel and motel accommodations promise to constantly diminish as opening day draws nearer.

Scheduled from April 6 until October 6, HemisFair 1968 will utilize the theme "Confluence of Civilizations in the Americas" to support celebration of the 250th birthday of San Antonio.

HemisFair officials suggest persons planning to attend arrange for accommodations through their travel agents. However, San Antonio official housing bureau will assist with arrangements if necessary. Inquiries should be sent to: Visitor Services, P.O. Drawer H, San Antonio, Texas 78206.

Located on a 92.6 acre tract 200 yards from the Alamo, HemisFair 1968 will feature brilliant new pavilions, exotic lagoons, theatres and a garden area.

Some 4½ acres of the site have been deeded to the United States government for construction of its \$6.7 million, two-building exhibit. Another 6½ acres have been given to the State of Texas for its \$10 million Institute of Texan Cultures. Both exhibits are under construction.

Soaring above HemisFair 1968 will be the 622-foot Tower of the Americas. Being built with a \$5.5 million general obligation bond issue passed by San Antonio voters, the tower will have a revolving restaurant at the 550-foot level, an enclosed observation deck with a capacity of 500 persons at the 580-foot level, and an open observation deck at 605 feet. Construction started in mid-February.

Tickets at the gate will cost \$2 for adults, \$1 for children. Admission to virtually every exhibit inside the grounds will be free.
