## Fire truck dedicated to DPMC inspector

Paul Bond, a senior safety inspector at DPMC, was honored recently by the Deer Park Volunteer Fire Department for his years of service with the organization.

Bond, fire chief from 1959 to 1964, retired from the department in 1978 after a 25-year firefighting career. A plaque honoring him was placed on a new Unit 11 pump truck, which was dedicated to the former chief at a recent Gulf Coast Firemen's Association meeting.

"I'm very proud they dedicated the truck to me," said Bond, a tall, soft-spoken inspector in his 35th year with Shell. "I have very good memories of my years with the Fire Department."

He started as a volunteer fireman in 1952, when the station was housed in an old garage. He was a member of the group almost from the beginning of the department's creation — and he helped guide it into one of the nation's best-equipped volunteer fire departments.

"I used to live near the old station, so I saw it every day," Bond said. "I became interested in it. If you enjoy helping people, then that's the way to go."

He had joined the department as just another volunteer, but in 1955 he was named Lieutenant, and Assistant Chief a year later. In 1959, Bond was named Fire Chief, a position he held five years before stepping down to captain the Rescue and Emergency Corps.

"You have to be committed to the job," said Bond, a 1946 Deer Park High School graduate. "If you don't like to get up in the middle of night when you're called, you're in the wrong place. In a volunteer

department, you need good rules and discipline, or you don't have a department."

Bond has been active in other fire associations as well, serving as president of the Gulf Coast Firemen's Association and the Harris County Firefighters Association.

Bond has been fortunate to combine his professional career with his firefighting experience. In many ways, his job as a

safety inspector parallels his duties with the fire department.

"Our responsibility is to ensure the plant is a safe place to work. We write safety and fire permits, make inspections and audits, and check equipment," he said. "It's all general housekeeping."

Bond may have left the Deer Park Fire Department, but despite his retirement, his name will ride on.

## New benefits added to GLI policy

A new post-retirement benefit providing lifetime coverage is one of the new options in the Supplemental Group Life Insurance (GLI) plans.

The costs of premiums for Complex policy-holders who elect not to take the post-retirement benefit will be reduced under the new plan, which becomes effective May 1.

The premium for Supplemental GLI

coverage without the post-retirement benefit will be reduced from .8 percent of base pay to .65 percent of base pay (from .4 percent to .325 percent for half coverage).

To introduce the changes, an open enrollment period is available now through April 12. During this time, you can join Supplemental GLI if you are a member of the basic plan, or increase your rate of participation in the sup-

plemental plan without providing proof of good health.

Information concerning the new policies has been sent to the homes of all employees. Included in the packet is an enrollment card, which should be completed and returned to Employee Relations by April 12.


