

Stormy GPC Endorsement Meeting

Houston Gay Political Caucus President Steve Shiflett opened that organization's candidate endorsement meeting last Wednesday, February 26 hoping the reason for a packed house was the result of a, "call for unity," within the community.

By night's end unity was not evident. The verbal gunfire left holes in the walls.

Held at the Montrose Activity Center, the purpose of the meeting was for the general GPC body to endorse candidates in the May 3 primary election.

Several weeks before the endorsement meeting candidates are screened by a series of committees. Those screening committees vote, then recommend endorsement of candidates to the GPC body. At the general endorsement meeting, such as last Wednesday, the group approves, modifies or disapproves what the screening committees recommend.

Because it is illegal for corporations to engage in political activity and fundraising, the Gay Political Caucus Inc. needed to organize a political activity committee. This was done before the meeting last Wednesday evening. The Texas Gay Political Caucus is the political action committee of the Houston Gay Political Caucus. After the reading of the previous minutes and a few announcements the Gay Political Caucus adjourned with the Texas Gay Political Caucus immediately

coming to order.

The group endorsed Ron Waters over Jack Ogg in the State Senate race, District 15.

When it came to hearing the endorsement recommendation for the State Representative race, District 79, Shiflett told the crowd that after an emergency executive meeting the previous Monday, he decided against appointing a committee to screen the District 79 candidates. Each candidate would be allowed to speak before the general caucus. After speaking, the candidates would answer three questions from a questionaire presented to all candidates screened.

Shiflett told the crowd that in last week's Montrose Star, (#184), a political

ad named eight out of nine members of the GPC board endorsing Debra Danburg. He said the possibility for an unbias screening committee was, seriously "sabotaged" by the ad.

"The seeds of doubt have already be sown," Shiflett commented. Many of the people on the screening committees are new to TGPC, and Shiflett felt they would not, "hold up well" under the backlash that could occur if they were to endorse one candidate over another. Under present GPC bylaws the president has the power to dissolve such a committee.

Shiflett explained that after his re-

St. Tropez -- A Wonderful Restaurant and Cabaret

This week we are taking a rest from the kitchen chores and creations and going out to eat!

Six of us took the tour.

St. Tropez, an exciting new cabaret/Resaurant that is what we have needed and wanted in Montrose for a long time. Not only are the drinks generous, the food superb, and the prices surprisingly reasonable, the service is extra friendly.

We entered at 9 PM. The Matre'D greeted us warmly and asked if we would like to take a tour of the premises since it would be a few minutes before a table large enough would be setup.

We did.

We are very impressed.

Every corner we turned we were greeted and made to feel warmly welcomed.

We went upstairs to the beautiful and very comfortable cabaret for a few minutes. The drinks are generous, the bartenders and waiters made us know we were welcomed.

And the house was full.

After drinks, we were seated at our table for the magnificent beginnings (now remember, the prices are really reasonable.) The table was set with very white tablecloth, extra large white napkins and in the center of the table was a crystal candlestick with a tall taper.

And the butter was added decoration, too. It was formed in a large art

deco sculpture and capped with a sprig of parsley. The flatware was french in style and the china was simple, large and white.

There were some interesting copper serving containers, too.

We had for a beginning, Amaretto Mushrooms - a real eye opener that calls for a return trip to St. Tropez. The mushrooms are sauteed in Amaretto and garlic butter. Some of us had the Crabmeat Bisque with crisp garlic toast. It is a real winner, too. St. Tropez offers five appetizers, all superb.

After the appetizers, which are served at the table, we then proceeded to the salad buffet - notice I did not say

Bisexual couple have 'come a long way' and they feel good

SAN FRANCISCO - It was Alice's 35th birthday when I interviewed her and her husband in San Francisco. She's blond and slender. He's Barry, dark and slender. Together they make Barry and Alice -- a bisexual couple.

They've come a long way, they feel, since the early days of their 13-year-old marriage. Alice said that Barry, since admitting his homosexual side, has become more spontaneous, less passive, more joyful, and more interesting. Barry said that Alice has become, since accepting the lesbian part of herself, softer, more open to people, and less competitive with women.

They have gone public with their sexual biographies in their Prentice-Hall book Barry and Alice because they want to educate the public about the realities that are often denied by traditional role expectations and behavior. When asked why they don't keep such information to themselves, their reply is: "We're not ashamed! It's not something anyone should be ashamed of!"

But in the mid-seventies they did feel

ashamed--also very isolated and very odd. They hope their book will help others feel less alone. Thet don't feel that their relationship is as "unusual" as talkshow hosts would have it. It's only "unusual" because people have been afraid to disscuss it until now.

They want to prevent others from suffering the way they did. When Barry had his first adult homosexual experiences, he felt that he should go into therapy in order to stop. Alice went with him. Unfortunately they had a therapist who tried to get Barry to be totally heterosexual.

They survived all that, and they began to learn, as Barry puts it, that "sex is good for you." Alice dicovered that she hadn't lost her husband; she learned how to give herself "permission" to explore her repressed homosexuality.

Now both of them have a "primary relationship" with each other, but they also have lovers on the side, both brief ones and some that have lasted several years. Alice spoke of having learned not to be offended by what Erica Jong called "the zipless fuck," something difficult for

many women to learn because it goes against everything they've been taught.

They usually meet the lovers of the other person, to curtail jealousy and resentment. They in fact often become friends with these people. It's part of Barry and Alice's attempt to bring honesty instead of deception to their marriage.

Probably there has been a logical development in this couple's life together that reflects the history of the past 20-25 years in America. They were both in the Peace Corp, both have been active in the women's and the anti-war movements. Barry is a lawyer who has been involved in civil rights causes. Alice is a writer who has championed liberal ideas.

Barry feels that society and religion have used sexual repression to control people. Very arbitrary rules have been set up, not to accommodate the human beings involved, but the nations in which they dwell.

They hope that their child, now seven, will grow up in a more liberal world. They do not bombard him with bisexual rights speeches, but they do introduce

him to their side-lovers and to their gay and bisexual friends. They make it clear that sometimes people prefer as lovers those of the same sex.

According to Barry, their child one day came home from school and said about him and his school chum: "Daddy, when we grow up, Billy and I are going to be homosexuals."

What they really meant isn't clear of course since "faggot" is still a pretty negative word in most schools. But perhaps it signals a far different attitude toward homosexuality that can result from early chilhood training.

I asked Barry and Alice if they ever have problems with VD and—yes, Virginia—even crabs. They said it's been known to occur. But it's something they can live with—and get taken care of. They find the satisfactions of their longterm relationship plus their other relationships more satisfying than the narrower lives that they used to live.

Sometimes people accuse them of being "self-indulgent," but their response is, "Why shouldn't people have as much out of life as they can?"

Bill S2210 Would Delete 'Sexual Deviation' From INS Act

WASHINGTON, DC - (IGNA) -

Companion legislation to Senator Cranston's Immigration bill (S 2210) has been introduced in the US House of Representatives. This bill would delete the term "sexual deviation" from the Immigration and Naturalization Act.

The bill (HR 6303) was introduced by Representatives Julian Dixon, Anthony Beilenson, and Henry Waxman, all Democrats from California, to counter the recent decisions of the Immigration Service to prevent known homosexuals from visiting the United States.

In a "Dear Colleague" letter urging other Members of the House to cosponsor the bill, they wrote:

"We are disturbed that INS resources continue to be expended in enforcement of this policy. To continue to deny aliens entry into the United States solely on their sexual orientation, in the words of the late William O. Douglas, 'would be tantamount to saying that Sappho, Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo, Andre Gide, and perhaps even Shakespear, were they to come to life again, would be deemed unfit to visit our shores."

The Gay Rights National Lobby urges people to write their Represen-

tatives to support this legislation. GRNL lobbyist Steve Endean said, "While it is merely a matter of common of sense to end the outdated policy of barring lesbians and gay men from entry, the political reality is that it will be very difficult to secure passage of this legislation--and constituent pressure is the key."

San Francisco Billing United Artists Overtime in Police Dept. Overtime

san Francisco — (IGNA) - The city of San Francisco is billing United Artists for the overtime paid police for supervising the demonstrations over the controversial movie Cruising.

"As soon as we get the official figures, we will sent them a bill," Mel Wax, press secretary for Mayor Dianne Feinstein, said. "If it weren't for them, we wouldn't have the expense."

The bill could run between \$41,000

and \$130,000.

The press secretary acknowledged that the decision to bill the film's distributor is unprecedented.

He said that the company was unwilling to delay the showing until the situation could be defused. "United Artists purposely put out eryviolent, provocative film."

Transamerica Corporation spokeswoman Jane Hall said that Feinstein's action "smacks of politics."

Tom Hyden, Jane Fonda host a Gay Western Week-end at 200 arce Ranch

SANTA BARBARA, CA — (IGNA)

- Jane Fonda and Tom Hayden were hosts at a "Gay Western Week-end" at their 200 acre Laurel Springs Ranch, a mountaintop spread outside Santa Barbara.

The week-end long party was a political fundraiser for the Campaign for Economic Democracy founded by Hayden and his wife to foster cooperation between the citizen organization and the gay community.

Forty gay males paid \$50 each for

three days and two nights featuring a hoe-down, barbecue, softball, swimming and hiking.

Sam Hurst, the CED staff director described the 1 to 2 million homosexual voters living in California as "an emerging political constituency" and the party as part of "an ongoing attempt to build a political relationship with a respected constituency.

Hurst said CED works closely with the Gay Community Services Center of Los Angeles.

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To Learn About Gay Awareness Photographer Turns to Camera

LOS ANGELES - (IGNA) - A gallery in Los Angeles, Cameravision, recently held *Gay: A Photographic Essay*, an exhibition of photographs of gay men and lesbians.

The photographs, most of them taken 10 years ago, are by Anthony Enton Friedkin, son of David Friedkin, who wrote the sreenplay for *The Pawmbroker*.

He told the Los Angeles Herald-Examiner: "I started taking the pictures when I was 19 or 20 because of a personal desire to know more about gay people and gay awareness. It was something I didn't understand at all, but I realized that homosexuals were considered outcasts and adjusted their lifestyles around that. I was attracted to their sense of freedom and their control of their destinies."

Friedkin acknowledges that his images are not representative of the enitre gay community, but only of the

people that he found most interesting--personally and photographically. He also notes that the gay movement is substantially different today from what it was when he shot the pictures ("They have asserted themselves so magnificently!"), so a viewer should not assimilate these photographs as a contemporary vision.

Friedkin's subjects range from female impersonators to male prostitutes to homosexual singles to Chicano gays to lesbian lovers. Even the most outrageous men in drag are presented without a freakish quality. The photographer recognizes the power of the photograph to glorify or indict.

In this show he has restrained the editorial potential of his medium. The view he presents is a candid, random one.

One of the characters in the exhibit is Jim Aguilar, a young man from

East Los Angeles. He has beautiful, delicate features and long brown hair, a contrast to the harsh barrio grafitti in the background of many of the pictures. In some pictures he looks lonely and in others he appears proud, confident, and handsome.

One of the most joyous pictures is an action photo of a group of lesbians playing football. The photograph operates on the stereotype of gay women as devoid of womanly traits, yet the gaiety and camaraderie of these athletes are distincly feminine.

One of the first photographers to shoot in Watts after the riots, Friedkin has turned to a number of other communities for inspiration. His most recent work includes series on the denizens of Beverly Hills, surfers and their lives out of the water, and the backlots at Universal studios.

"Photography," he said, "is a way for me to create the fossils of my time."

Gay Pride Week Planning Continues

Fifty people met on Sunday, March 23 for the third organizational meeting of Gay Pride Week 1980. All committee chairs reported on the progress which has been made in the past three weeks towards finalizing plans made earlier this month. The project is remarkably ahead of schedule on all fronts.

George Walhers, committee chairperson in charge of Saturday's softball game and picnic on June 21, has negotiated with both the Houston Police Department and the Fire Department for a double header on that day to be followed by the picnic. Secured is Memorial Park I field for the event.

Both departments are not only willing but enthusiastic about the event this year, partially in response to our willingness to donate a portion of the proceeds from the event to the widows of officers who have fallen in the line of duty.

After some discussion of Tuesday's events, the group approved a motion devoting that day to the Physically Challenged Gay persons in the community, and that the task of organizing this day be given to the Astro Rainbow Alliance of the Deaf. Several members of the Rainbow Society were present at the meeting and agreed to report back to the committee after discussing this at their next meeting.

The Homophile Interfaith Alliance has worked with Chairpersons Chuck Larsen and Rita Wanstrom to continue plans for the evening service on Wednesday, June 25, the National Day of Remembrance. The group is presently negotiating with the First Unitarian Church on Fannin as a possible place for this service.

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And on Friday, March 21, Larry Bagneris filed the formal application with the city for the 1980 Gay Pride Week parade permit. Serious problems with the city are not anticipated although it will take some time for this to clear.



One Million Expected at 'Washington for Jesus' March

April 28 and 29 are the dates the National March on Washington for "righteousness and morality" is scheduled. "Washington for Jesus" and "One Nation Under God" are striving to have one million supporters attend the two day event. Their literature claims "Washington for Jesus" will be a unique experience. "For once," organizers say, "the city of Washington, DC will not be the site of a demonstration, a march, or a protest. Instead, it will be blessed with a once-in-a-lifetime celebration of the Lordship of Jesus Christ."

Although organizers claim this is not a political event, they do plan to "visit all members of Congress in the love and the name of the Lord." Too, state coordinators are organizing grassroots involvement by Congressional districts and city/county coordinators by precincts.

The Texas Gay Task Force recommends meeting US representatives and senators in their district offices, and setting an appointment during March or April; if that is not possible.

Also to meet with their staff members.

The religious leaders have said, "Our purpose is not to build a political organization. Our purpose-first is to glorify God in the land again and to commit our ways unto rightoeusness. And, secondly, to remain active and vocal.

God has called us to be watchmen, and watchmen sound the alarm. We feel that will be our main ministry throughout this nation. We will remain informed in order to warn. We feel this nation ios set apart by God for a particular work in this world.

That's why we'll call it "One NAtion Under God."

The Washington events will be televised by the Christian Broadcasting Network and the PTL Network.

delegate.



election as GPC president one volunteer member of his re-election committee was fired from his regular job — an apparent repercussion of his opponent's defeat.

That opponent, former GPC vicepresident Larry Bagneris jumped to the floor, cutting off Shiflett in midsentence, reminding Shiflett he should tell the whole story, that one of Bagneris' election committee members was also fired from his regular job after the last GPC presidential election.

Shiflett quickly ruled Bagneris out of order for interupting the chairperson while he was speaking.

Parlimentary procedure was broken, questioned, and shakily in order as many from the group questioned Shiflett's motives in his decision to call off the District 79 screening.

At one point Sue Cummings told Shiflett the group was not there to be lectured by the chairperson.

Shiflett's using the word 'sabatoge' to describe the Danburg endorsements, brought accusations of bias. A young woman sought parlimentary procedure in 'challenging' the GPC president. For Shiflett to step down in chairing the meeting was angrily suggested numerous times. Disagreements on parliamentary proceedure caused tempers to flare, the group to become unruley.

Chuck Hickman, a GPC board member, stood up and explained he was chairperson of the Political Action Committee during the GPC screening in the last Mayor's election. Because of a conflict of interest concerning former Mayorial Candidate Nobel Ginther, both he and the chair voluntarily stepped down and appointed another chair to the

Shiflet laid down the law – firmly telling the crowd that he had no intention of giving up the chair.

The five candidates: Peter Armato, Debra Danburg, Don McCrorey Richard Petronella, and Ray Schmidt, addressed the audience, each giving prohuman rights presentations.

After the candidates completed their presentations a motion was made to endorse Ray Schmidt for the District 79 race. On top of that a 'substitute motion' was brought forth, that would call for no District 79 endorsement by TGPC.

In discussion on the passage or defeat of the substitute motion a member of the audience told how through TGPC's bickering, "You're going to screw yourselves."

TGPC counsel, Jim Wells, supported, 'no endorsement,' saying he was "continually amazed" that the group agreed on so much, so often but how it was able to "zero in" on one issue which couldn't be agreed upon.

He urged the group to vote for noendorsement, saying all the candidates were good, and for this reason GPC members would not be as likely to support the endorsed candidate, which could split the group.

After much parliamentry ping pong the substitute motion calling for no endorsement in the District 79 race was defeated.

The original motion to endorse Ray Schmid was dropped and a motion made for a dual endorsement of Armato and Danburg. This motion was defeated 124 to 62.

A motion was then made to allow the group to take a vote on whether or not Debra Danburg could singly be endorsed. This motion passed 137 to 38.

The Caucus then voted on whether or not to endorse Debra Danburg, and an almost unanimous affirmation secured her endorsement by the Texas Gay Political Caucus

The Star will begin coverage of the upcoming election in next week's issue. A list of TGPC endorsements will also be printed.

Tyrone Power

Book Explores the Actor's Bisexuality in 'Photoplay' Prose

(The following was reviewed by Daniel Curzon, whose 'Among the Carnivores' was picked as one of the best books of 1979 by 'the Advocate')

'The Secret Life of Tyrone Power' By Hector Arce, Bantam Books, \$2.75.

If you like *Photoplay* prose and find anything and everything about movie stars facinating, you'll like Hector Arce's biography of Tyrone Power

I must confess that I read every word, even the overly long genealogy of the actor's ancestors.

But then I'm a sucker for Holly-wood glamor, false and manufactured as it is. The fact that Tyrone Power didn't have a terribly exciting life and made few memorable films hardly seems to matter. We eat up such things anyway.

Thus the power of movies.

Yet, to be direct, the primary interest n this book comes from *one* aspect of the famous Hollywood star -- he was bisexual. He married three tmes and had side affairs with women.

He also had male lovers and numerous male tricks. The biographer seems to contradict himself from time to time by saying such things as, "What's more, he had come to realize that, while he desired sex with males, he didn't feel comfortable with the concept of an exclusive emotionl and sexual commitment to another man.

"His sensitivities were primarily directed to women."

Well, Mr. Arce, tell me how a Hollywood star of the last generation could have lived openly in a homosexual relationship and survive. Even you state elsewhere in the book that he, "risked losing everything should it become public knowledge..."

Is it any wonder then that his male lovers were secretive and uncommitted?

To give Arce his due, he's quite good on the studio commercialism that made Tyrone Power a commodity to be exploited for as long as his box office appeal held up, only to be shunted aside when he was no longer useful to the powers that were. Or to the ficke public for that matter.

Arce likewise takes a cold look at the hopeless trash that most of Tyrone Power's movies actually were. Hence we are left with 'glamour' that is based on junk.

I was also pleasantly surprised that Arce would be so blunt as to account for the anti-gay taboo in the film world (a taboo that's still strong, to judge from the way the author refuses to name names where famous homosexuals are concerned) by mentioning that many decision-makers in movies are Jewish -- with the resulting long history of taboo about the "abomination of abominations."


The worst part of the book is a smug intolerance for gay behavior, an attitude very much akin to the same repression that the author shows to have been the major obstacle to Tyrone Power's greater satisfaction in his personal life. Arce can't seem to overcome a desire to 'explain' homosexual traits.

It's from 'a chemical imbalance within the fetus,' you see, or maybe it's from 'weak or absent fathers and domineering, frustrating mothers.'

Or Power was a bisexual because he was both a 'mama's boy and a chip off the old (man's) block. UGH!

Maybe someday we will get to the point where biographers will not more 'analyze' the causes of a person's sexual behavior than they do his skin color. By the looks of this book we are not there yet.




